 - (1) Notwithstanding any statute to the contrary, judges of the courts of common pleas shall notify the Pennsylvania State Police, on a form developed by the Pennsylvania State Police, of:
 - (i) the identity of any individual who has been adjudicated as an incompetent or as a mental defective or who has been involuntarily committed to a mental institution under the act of July 9, 1976 (P.L.817, No.143), known as the Mental Health Procedures Act, or who has been involuntarily treated as described in section 6105(c)(4) [(relating to persons not to possess, use, manufacture, control, sell or transfer firearms)] or

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as described in 18 U.S.C. § 922(g)(4) [(relating to unlawful acts)] and its implementing Federal regulations; and

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Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
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
