Co-sponsorship of FTC Food and Beverage Regulation Resolution

For decades U.S. health officials have been considering the problem of childhood obesity. According to the American Psychological Association, 20% of American children are overweight or obese. The prevalence of obesity has more than doubled for children ages 2 to 5 during the past two decades.

Children are exposed to at least ten food and beverage related advertisements every day during the three to four hours they spend watching television. At least 9 out of 10 of those commercials will advertise food that contains high, unhealthy levels of fat, sugar and/or sodium. A diet based in large part on these foods result in early onset diabetes, childhood obesity and other illnesses.

The Federal Trade Commission has recently been directed by Congress to introduce regulations to develop a set of principles to guide food industry efforts to improve the nutritional profile of foods marketed directly to children.

I am introducing a resolution to support the new FTC regulations controlling how unhealthy food and beverages are marketed towards children.
