A RESOLUTION

Recognizing the Blue Lights Campaign and its efforts to raise 1 awareness of colorectal cancer in Pennsylvania. 2 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer in 3 the United States and the second leading cause of cancer-related 4 death among men and women combined; and 5 WHEREAS, One in 20 people will be diagnosed with colorectal 6 cancer in their lifetime; and 7 WHEREAS, The disease takes the lives of more than 50,000 8 people every year; and 9 WHEREAS, It is recommended that people begin screening for 10 colorectal cancer at 50 years of age or even earlier if they 11 have a family history of the disease; and 12 WHEREAS, With proper screening, colorectal cancer is 13 preventable, but one in three Americans of appropriate age do 14 not get the simple test every year; and 15 WHEREAS, Dr. Marianne Ritchie, a gastroenterologist with 16 Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia, has organized the 17

Blue Lights Campaign for the past five years to educate
Pennsylvanians about colorectal cancer and encourage them to get
screened; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Ritchie works with government officials and private businesses throughout Philadelphia to get many of the city's most well-known buildings and structures lit up in blue for one week in March each year in honor of National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month; and

9 WHEREAS, Participating places and buildings in Philadelphia 10 have included PECO, Two Liberty Place, the FMC Tower, the Cira 11 Centre, the Lit Brothers building, the Benjamin Franklin Bridge, 12 the Franklin Institute, Lincoln Financial Field and Boathouse 13 Row; and

WHEREAS, The State Capitol Building in Harrisburg and 14 courthouses and county buildings across this Commonwealth have 15 also been lit up in blue as part of the campaign; and 16 17 WHEREAS, It is Dr. Ritchie's hope that if people are surrounded by the blue lights, they will feel the urgency of the 18 message to talk to their health care provider about and get 19 screened for colorectal cancer, whether it is through a 20 colonoscopy or another physician-recommended method; and 21 22 WHEREAS, In addition to getting screened, individuals are encouraged to take preventive measures to reduce their risk of 23 developing the disease, such as eating healthier, increasing 24 physical activity and reducing alcohol and tobacco intake; and 25 WHEREAS, The House of Representatives recognizes the crucial 26 need to raise awareness of colorectal cancer among 27 Pennsylvanians in order to promote prevention and early 28 29 detection; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
