### SENATE MESSAGE

#### AMENDED HOUSE BILLS RETURNED FOR CONCURRENCE

The clerk of the Senate being introduced, returned bills from the House of Representatives numbered and entitled as follows:

##### HOUSE BILL No. 455

An Act amending the act of June 24, 1939 (P. L. 872), entitled "The Penal Code," further defining "state institution" with reference to trespassing and changing the penalties.

##### HOUSE BILL No. 944

An Act amending the act of June 1, 1956 (P. L. 1944), entitled "An act providing a permanent allocation of a part of the fuels and liquid fuels tax proceeds to cities, boroughs, incorporated towns and townships for their road, street and bridge purposes; . . ." authorizing municipalities to use part of the tax to purchase road equipment and to purchase street signs with the proceeds of the tax.

##### HOUSE BILL No. 1166

An Act amending the act of December 31, 1965 (P. L. 1257), entitled "The Local Tax Enabling Act," limiting

(the amount of wages, commissions or earnings that may be deducted at any one time.

### SENATE MESSAGE

#### HOUSE BILLS CONCURRED IN BY SENATE

##### HOUSE BILL No. 83

An Act requiring notification to the natural parents or parent of a child placed voluntarily under foster care whenever such child is admitted to a hospital in certain cases.

##### HOUSE BILL No. 326

An Act amending "The Penal Code," approved June 24, 1939 (P. L. 872), changing the penalty for malicious acts on a private game preserve.

##### HOUSE BILL No. 724

An Act amending the "City State Highway Law," approved June 22, 1931 (P. L. 720), adding a route in the City of Jeannette.

##### HOUSE BILL No. 939

An Act amending "The Insurance Company Law of 1921," approved May 17, 1921 (P. L. 682), specifying additional matters to be determined by the Insurance Commissioner prior to his making an approving determination in connection with certain acquisitions of or offers to acquire outstanding capital stock of any corporations which beneficially own outstanding capital stock of any Pennsylvania insurance company, providing for the further regulation of insurance holding companies which beneficially own or control or are affiliated with insurance companies qualified and licensed to transact the business of insurance in Pennsylvania, prohibiting certain activities, and providing penalties.

### PERMISSION TO ADDRESS HOUSE

Mr. RYBAK requested and obtained unanimous consent to address the House.

Mr. RYBAK. Mr. Speaker, at the end of the session on July 13, there was read into the record a resolution honoring the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the city of Bethlehem for its part in preserving Moravian music. The Moravian Music Foundation of Bethlehem and its board of trustees are responsible for the music of this program and all music that has been preserved in the Bethlehem Moravian archives.

A trustee of that foundation is Mrs. Thomas Butterfield of Bethlehem, who would like to alert every member of this House that the inaugural festival of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts will honor Pennsylvania colonial music, and it is the only event which pays tribute to any special area or group in the entire festival. This will take place in Washington, D. C., at the John F. Kennedy Center at 3 p.m., on September 12, 1971.

The Piedmont Chamber Orchestra and the Westminster

Choir will perform, and the concert will feature this beautiful, early-Moravian music.

I would like to submit into the record an article that details this festivity by Albert Hofammann, "Moravian Music Honored."

Mr. RYBAK presented the following article for the Legislative Journal:

### MORAVIAN MUSIC HONORED

By Albert Hofammann

Moravian music will be featured in one of the concerts opening the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C., in September.

A program by the Piedmont Chamber Orchestra and the Westminster Choir at 3 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 12, will be the first Sunday matinee during the inaugural festival which will open Sept. 8 and continue for two weeks of music and dance. This concert will feature instrumental and vocal music by Moravian musicians whose work has not only a special historic significance but which also has a close relation with the cultural history of this country and, in some instances, with the early days of Bethlehem.

Each composition to be performed in the Sept. 12 program is part of the collections of the Moravian Music Foundation. Recognition of this Moravian music at the gala opening of the multi-million-dollar cultural center in the nation's capital is appropriate because of the high development of musical activity at Moravian settlements in the days of the 13 colonies.

At least two of the composers whose work will be featured were Bethlehem residents at one time—John F. Peter and David M. Michael. Michael, indeed, wrote some music which "described" a trip up the Lehigh Canal. Other composers expected to share the program include C. F. Bach, C. I. Latrobe and Charles Homann. The works include not only that "water music" by Michael but also an overture which is one of the earliest large-scale works in this New World and a quintet which, as far as can be determined at this moment, is the first chamber music composed in this country.

#### Logical Choice

The Piedmont Chamber Orchestra, founded in 1968, is a logical choice to perform the instrumental music on this unusual program. Winston-Salem, site of the North Carolina School of the Arts, was one of the early Moravian centers in this nation. The Westminster Choir School is at Princeton, N. J., close enough to Pennsylvania to share a bit in what might be called a Moravian aura. It may be interesting to note, too, that the conductor of the Piedmont ensemble will be Nicholas Harsanyi, new dean of the school of music at North Carolina School of the Arts and founder and former director of the Princeton Chamber Orchestra, which has played in Allentown.

According to Mrs. Thomas B. Butterfield of



Bethlehem, trustees of the Moravian Music Foundation and leaders of Moravian churches are being alerted to plan for bus or train arrangements for the concert. Mrs. Butterfield is a daughter of the late T. Edgar Shields, who had been director of music at Moravian Seminary and College for Women and at Lehigh University and who was organist at the Cathedral Church of the Nativity and for the Bach Choir.

#### Impressive Roster

The John F. Kennedy Center, created by an act of Congress to serve the entire nation, began its program arrangements three years ago in cooperation with the Washington Performing Arts Society and the National Symphony Association, among other groups. The inaugural will open with a concert Sept. 8 by the New York Philharmonic. The series is slated to include the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Boston Symphony and the Detroit, Chicago, London, Cleveland, Vienna, Prague, Toronto, Minnesota and New Philharmonic orchestras.

During the Center's first year performances in the concert hall or opera house will include programs by Artur Schnabel, Rudolf Serkin, Andre Watts, Marcel Marceau, Andres Segovia, the Ballet Folklorico of Mexico, Beverly Sills, Leontyne Price, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and the Dance Theater of Harlem.

The artistic administrator, George London, believes the Center has the opportunity to serve all Americans and to present both traditional and "new" work in the performing arts. The Center has had the support of four presidents, Congress, various foundations and corporations and many individuals.

#### VISITORS FROM HOLLAND WELCOMED

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman endeavor to confine his remarks to the motion that is before the House, the question of recommittal, rather than address himself to the merits of the bill?

Mr. ZELLER. The reason I do not want to see the bill recommitted is because it is going to die a sad death there. I would like to have this recommittal challenged today to keep the bill alive on the calendar, because I have an amendment to the bill.

I would like to have a roll-call vote and I would ask everyone to vote against recommittal.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, I have been informed by the caucus chairman that we have not caucused on this side on the Zeller amendment. I have my calendar marked that Mr. Zeller has amended this bill at least once. If this is a different amendment, we have not yet caucused on it and, therefore, he is not privileged to offer an amendment at this time, unless I am mistaken as to the amendment's content.

Mr. ZELLER. Mr. Speaker, I went to the minority side and presented it. I went to Mr. Irvis to present it to him. He refused to accept it, and this is to me—I am sorry, Mr. Speaker—just another stall. As far as I am concerned, I would like to challenge that. This is becoming quite ridiculous.

So if you want to hold the bill until tomorrow, I will go along with it, but we are going to run it, as far as I am concerned.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, the gentleman is mistaken. If I were going to try to stall his bill, I have been here long enough to know more subtle methods than this.

Mr. Speaker, I am merely informing the gentleman that according to my calendar his amendment has not been caucused on. I do not know whether the Republicans have caucused on it or not.

If the gentleman is insisting on caucusing on his amendments, I will be glad to call a special caucus off the floor of this House now for the gentleman and we will discuss fiscal notes as well as the gentleman's amendment.

Now does the gentleman insist on amending the bill today?

Mr. ZELLER. Mr. Speaker, I have seen here, in the past, some of the circus performances that go on with regard to rhetoric. I am just a plain, ordinary, rural individual who is trying to get a bill through and I have had nothing but stalls.

Now I would not want to belabor this House any further in regard to taking us off the floor on an amendment. I appreciate it but this is a rather cheap remark and I feel offended by your making such a remark and I would like—

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, let me interrupt the gentleman. I do not know what has offended him. What has offended the gentleman?

Mr. ZELLER. In regard to your remark that you have been around here a long time and that you could have stalled it. I do not think that is necessary. We realize how long you have been around here. As a matter of fact, as far as I am concerned, I would like to let you know that I hope to be around here a long time in order to get some bills through that are going to help our people. This is one that is going to help them, and I hate to see these continued stalls. All they are are roadblocks.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, again I hate to interrupt the

gentleman, but the gentleman has, in his emotions, become confused.

I have no interest whatsoever in the gentleman's bill, except to run the calendar. The gentleman made the accusation that I was stalling. I told the gentleman that if I were to do that, I would have more subtle ways of doing it, and I assure him I would. I am not interested in stalling the gentleman's bill or the passage of the gentleman's bill. I am interested merely in scheduling the gentleman's bill and I ask again if the gentleman is insisting on amending the bill, tell me so and we will go off the floor and caucus on the gentleman's amendment.

It is just that simple. We do not have to get into any argument about it.

Mr. ZELLER. Mr. Speaker, I am not getting into any kind of an argument, and I think I am capable of handling it myself in that area, too, but what I am saying is this: I do not want to belabor this House any longer, and we can talk about it tomorrow. I would be very happy to entertain it tomorrow. Let us get on with the business.

Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman withdraws his amendment. The bill will go over in order.

Mr. ZELLER. I am not withdrawing the amendment.

The SPEAKER. For today you are withdrawing the amendment.

### LEGISLATION TO BE INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lackawanna, Mr. Crowley.

Mr. CROWLEY. Mr. Speaker, today I am introducing legislation which will provide an orderly process for the government of the city of Scranton in assuming its change from a second A classification to a third-class city.

Originally, I intended to introduce legislation providing for a referendum to enable the citizens to have the question of change of the form of government they so chose on the ballot. This was my thought after several meetings with both city officials, taxpayers, representatives, and others. To all of these people I stated that none of them had demonstrated clearly to me why one form was better than the other for the operation of our city, and I believed the best way to determine what the people wanted was to have it demonstrated by a vote.

While as a Representative I cast one vote on behalf of all my constituents, I have a concern, just as any other one of you, and I like to cast my vote not just according to my own feelings, but in a way that I believe expresses the desires of the majority of the people I represent.

So I asked the legal research office in Harrisburg to make a thorough and full analysis of the various acts and amendments concerning our city's classification, which they did, and I now find that Scranton has, in fact, become a city of the third class.

All of the various amendments since 1951 have expressed the statement that the classification should not be changed after only one census showing a decrease, but only after two censuses, showing that the decrease was not just a temporary one. I agree with the thinking of the past legislatures and would have voted for this as a legislator if I had this seat in the House at the time.

I also find that since 1961 there has been a provision in the law for a referendum to determine whether or not the present form should be retained, first, within a four-year period from 1961, and by an amendment of 1965, extended it for an additional six years.

This referendum could have been obtained during this 10-year period either by action of the city council, by ordinance or by a petition of 15 percent of the voters. Since this did not occur during the 10-year period in which it was available, I have to conclude it was not the wish of the people or councils that the present form be retained.

Both the legislators and the people sponsoring these various acts must have felt that this temporary status should not go on forever, because they clearly spelled out a time limitation when it should cease and clearly said that unless a form were adopted within 10 years, the city would automatically become classified in its proper population classification.

Since the 10-year period has passed without anyone taking advantage of the referendum provision provided during the 10-year period, the city is now classified under the Third Class City Code.

I am informed that similar to most situations over the past years, much thought was given to transitions up-

ward but very little thought to the fact that we might have decreases rather than increases.

These various acts affecting Scranton provided for election of the new officials at the next municipal election, which is this November, and for them to take office in April, 1971, and said nothing about their terms or salaries they will receive. The third class city laws do not provide for such, but only where municipalities are going upward in population to third class, and the provisions apply to newly created cities.

These provisions do not apply where the city is already created and changes only its classification, and in order to prevent any chaos and disorder in the change-over in form, I am introducing this legislation for this purpose. Under the law we will become governed by the commission of government for cities of the third class. It may be that this is not the best form for Scranton, and it satisfies one of the greatest complaints that councilmen have been voicing for many years, and, in particular, that they are not sufficiently informed of all the activities being carried on, or about finances, or do not have the proper budgetary controls. Under the new form in which the city will operate, the council will have a direct control and responsibility in all these areas, and the people who want a referendum will be given a choice of selecting any one of three different forms of government under the Third Class City Code, and I am sure we will have an opportunity of deciding it after experience with two different forms.

I am fully convinced that the present citizenry is more intelligent and better informed than many politicians, legislators and municipal officials recognize, and that they, the people, do know what they want, and when they did not petition for a retention of the present form of government in the 10 years they had the right to, they were well aware of what they were doing; and that if they do not like the form of government which we have now automatically inherited by law, they are aware of the options they will now have and will undoubtedly exercise them for the betterment of our city.

**PERMISSION TO ADDRESS HOUSE**

Mr. D. S. HAYES requested and obtained unanimous consent to address the House.

Mr. D. S. HAYES. Mr. Speaker, I spoke in this House last week about the road conditions in the Commonwealth and the safety hazards in my district due to weeds and weed encroachment, et cetera. Mr. Ritter took great exception to that remark.

I wish to read the following article from the Eric Morning News of Wednesday, July 14, 1971, only one day after I made that address. It says, under the caption of this picture:

A state patronage struggle between Governor Milton Shapp and employes of the Commonwealth's highway maintenance crews has left Erie County roads and highways lined with tall grass and weeds like these along Route 832 and the Sterricttania Road.

The recent death of an Albion boy was caused by high weeds, according to state police. This young man happens to be in my district. This is the important part I wish to emphasize.

State Police said that the recent death of a two-year-old Albion boy was partially caused by high grass.

Mr. Speaker, after reading that in the Morning News, I also made a call to another good friend in the news media, Mr. Robert McClymonds, who happens to be the editor and publisher of the Albion News. He also confirmed the report which appeared in the Morning News.

This young boy was a constituent of mine in my district. I respectfully request once again that the Governor of this Commonwealth do something about the safety conditions on our roads, not only in Erie and Crawford Counties but throughout this Commonwealth.

This is no place for partisan politics when you are dealing with human lives. If something is not done, we are going to lose more lives in Pennsylvania. Also, this young man's family has nothing to turn to now due to

the incompetence of not only the administration of the department, but also the lack of the public will to see it operated in a businesslike fashion—to quote the Governor.

I might say that I, formally, and, I am sure, many members here in the House, including Mr. Ritter, express our regret at the passing of this young man through no cause of his own, but through the neglect of the Department of Transportation in my district.

I would hope that, tragic as it may be, perhaps this will move some members, including the Speaker himself, to release that resolution which I put in last Tuesday and also the bill I put in calling for civil service for the laboring group in the Transportation Department and exempting those who happen to be superintendents, as well as four administrators under each. This should not be a partisan-level type situation, which it erupts into.

There are going to be a lot more deaths on the highways of this Commonwealth unless something is done to straighten them out and straighten them out in a hurry. I would hope that the Speaker and the majority leader would use their offices to see that this is accomplished.
