Mr. BIRMELIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I will be quite brief.

This is the bill that passed unanimously last session. It deals with the results that we found out when a prisoner named Norman Johnston escaped from Huntingdon prison a few years ago, and we found out that he potentially received weapons of escape through the deliberate negligence of a couple of the people who were working at the prison. And in the investigation that followed up to the prison escape, we realized that the only thing that could be done with these two employees who had essentially cost hundreds of thousands of dollars to the taxpayers of Pennsylvania as well as jeopardized their safety and perhaps even the lives of many Pennsylvanians was that we could fire them from their jobs, and we feel that that is not a strong enough disincentive for people doing these sorts of things. So this particular legislation deals with that problem and makes it a criminal offense for people to introduce into correctional facilities any weapons or implements of escape or of harm that they could do to others.

So I would appreciate the full support of the House. Thank you.

On the question, Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Gordner.

Mr. GORDNER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just very briefly, I am going to be voting "no" on this resolution.

We are telling basically the city of Philadelphia to install lights, and I think that is a decision that should be up to each and every municipality. Those folks are elected just as we are elected, and I would not want this august body to direct the town of Bloomsburg or the borough of Berwick to do something, and as a result I am voting "no."

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Horsey.

Mr. HORSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, our first responsibility to kids who come to school is their safety. There are numerous elementary schools, Mr. Speaker, that do not have crossing guards, Mr. Speaker, in the city of Philadelphia, nor do they have yellow flashing lights. The State will pay for and/or help the school system if they would step forward and, quote, "do the right thing," which is install yellow flashing lights, which do not tell motorists to stop but tell them to slow down in a zone where small children are.

It is only a resolution; thank you. It is encouraging them to put up the yellow flashing lights. I have had small kids who have been killed in the city of Philadelphia; nevertheless, it has not been lately, but they have been killed on their way to and from school, and I believe this could have been avoided by just encouraging drivers who are going past elementary schools to slow down. That is the only thing this resolution does, is ask the school system to look into installing these yellow flashing lights. I need to know who would be opposed to this process of protecting children and why. I need to know if the previous speaker, in his school system, if he has yellow flashing lights.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would urge a positive vote. The SPEAKER. Ms. Manderino. on the question.

Ms. MANDERINO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the maker of the resolution stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Horsey, indicates he will stand for interrogation. The lady may begin.

Ms. MANDERINO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am very familiar with this issue as it deals with the city of Philadelphia. As a matter of fact, a resolution -I cannot remember if it is by way of resolution or ordinance - has already passed city council, because it was my city councilman in the 4th district who put forth that legislation, and we worked with a lot of schools in our district. So I just want to understand what impact what we are doing here might have on what has already been done locally before I decide how I want to vote.

Mr. HORSEY. Mr. Speaker-

Ms. MANDERINO. Let me pose a few questions, if I may.

My understanding is that the way it is now in the school district is that the schools— There are actually two different levels. There are flashing lights for public schools and then the flashing lights for the nonpublic schools. The flashing lights for the schools are on an installation schedule, is my understanding, and a cost to be shared by the school district and I thought it was the city, but maybe it is the State. The school lights in front of the nonpublic schools, if a nonpublic school wants a school light to be installed, they have—

The SPEAKER. Ms. Manderino?

Ms. MANDERINO. Yes?

The SPEAKER. Are you interrogating or debating?

Ms. MANDERINO. I am sorry; I am interrogating. I apologize. I am trying to set out the policy as I understand it and ask how this will impact it.

If a nonpublic school wants a school light now, they have to come up with the money to put the light in front of their school to maintain it. If I vote for this, am I changing anything or recommending to city council that they change the policy that they have set out with regard to the payment of lights for different kinds of schools in our district?

Mr. HORSEY. Mr. Speaker, I do not believe that this particular resolution has any impact on that very question. It only encourages the city to put yellow flashing lights on all elementary schools and/or high schools, yes. There are no timetables involved in the resolution. There is no money mentioned. I just want them to do it. There are schools in the city of Philadelphia that do not have crossing guards and do not have yellow flashing lights.

Ms. MANDERINO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think—

Mr. HORSEY. And it involves -I will close with the answer in a second - and it involves kids who are, you know, 5, 6, 7 years old walking home alone, and that is not acceptable, Mr. Speaker.

Ms. MANDERINO. Thank you.

I have finished my interrogation. Just briefly.

I would encourage members to support the resolution. I understand the very legitimate concern that the prior speaker had raised, but because the city council has already passed their own legislation with regard to this, I believe this resolution

reflects exactly what the city legislation that was passed more than a year ago already does. So I do not think we are dictating to a local government that they do something different than what they have already agreed to do.

EDWARD "CHAMP" HALL PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Mr. Sturla has a guest with him here today, and it is appropriate, it being the anniversary of the death of Martin Luther King, Jr. He has a guest who is prepared to give the remarks of Dr. King, his last major speech or at least the major speech that all of us recognize.

Anyone who wishes to leave the floor of the House, because there will be no further votes. I would request that they do it now. I know there are people with business. I know there are meetings to attend, and as a matter of courtesy, I would ask that anyone that is leaving leave now and that the other members-It is about a 15-minute presentation, I understand.

Mr. Sturla.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, 33 years ago today, on April 4, 1968, civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was assassinated at 6:01 p.m. as he stood on a motel balcony in Memphis, Tennessee. As many of you know, the night before that, Dr. King delivered what would be his last speech. That speech is "I've Been to the Mountaintop."

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With us today to mark this solemn anniversary is Lancaster businessman and resident of my district, Edward "Champ" Hall. Today he will be delivering that same speech, and for those of you who are in the hall and those of you who are listening out there, I think you will find it truly moving.

Mr. HALL. Thank you.

In reverential humility, adoration, magnification, glorification, and exhortation in the very lifting up of the name of our God.

To the Speaker of the House, Matt Ryan; to the House body: I would be remiss if I would not acknowledge State Representative Michael Sturla, who is doing a magnificent job.

We pay tribute and commemoration to the Honorable Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Dr. King was born January 15, 1929, in Atlanta, Georgia. He began college at the age of 15. In 1948 Dr. King graduated from Morehouse College, Atlanta, Georgia. In 1951 Dr. King graduated from Crozer Theological Seminary in Chester, Pennsylvania, with a master's in theology. In 1955 Dr. King graduated from Boston University with a Ph.D. (doctor of philosophy). In 1964 he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. He was the 12th American to ever receive this prestigious award and the youngest, at the age of 35.

Dr. King was the most influential and eloquent speaker of the civil rights movement. He was able to captivate the minds of many listeners, leaving them spellbound and mesmerized.

Dr. King had been arrested and jailed 28 times. He was beaten, he was stoned, he was stabbed, his home was bombed, and many, many death threats. It came on April 4, today, 1968. Dr. King was gunned down at the Lorraine Motel balcony in Memphis, Tennessee. He was pronounced dead at the St. Joseph's Hospital, also of Memphis, Tennessee.

In 1983 Congress voted to recognize King as a national holiday. President Ronald Reagan signed the bill to make it official. In 1986 the nation celebrated Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., as a holiday for the first time.

Without further hesitation, let us hasten along. These were the last words spoken in Memphis, Tennessee, by the Honorable Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., in the year 1968:

As I listened to Ralph Abernathy in his eloquent and generous introduction and then thought about myself, I wondered who he was talking about. Oh, it's always good to have your closest friend and associate say something good about you. And Ralph Abernathy is the best friend that I have in the world.

I'm delighted to see each of you here today in spite of a storm watch. You reveal that you are determined to go on anyhow. Something is happening in Memphis; something is happening in our world.

And you know, if I were to take a kind of general and panoramic view of the whole human history up until now and the Almighty said to me, "Martin Luther King, which age would you like to live in," I would take my mental flight by Egypt, and I would watch God's children in their magnificent trek from the dark dungeons of Egypt on across the Red Sea, through the wilderness on toward the promised land. And in spite of its magnificence, I wouldn't stop there. Oh, I would even move on by Greece and take my mind to Mount Olympus. And there I would see Plato, Aristotle, Socrates, Euripides, and Aristophanes assembled around the Parthenon, and I would watch them around the Parthenon as they discussed the great and eternal issues of reality.

But I wouldn't stop there. Oh, I would go by the great heyday of the Roman Empire, and I would see developments there, through various emperors and leaders. But I wouldn't stop there. I would even come up to the day of the Renaissance and get a quick picture of all that the Renaissance did for the cultural and esthetic life of man. But I wouldn't stop there. I would even go by the way to whom the man I am named had his habitat. And I would watch Martin Luther as he tacked his 95 theses on the door at the church of Wittenberg.

But I wouldn't stop there. Oh, I would even come up to 1863 and watch a vacillating President by the name of Abraham Lincoln finally come to the conclusion that he had to sign the Emancipation Proclamation. But I wouldn't stop there. Oh, I would even come up to the early thirties and see a man grappling with the problems of the bankruptcy of his nation and say that we have nothing to fear but fear itself.

But I wouldn't stop there. Strangely enough, I would turn to the Almighty and say, "If you allow me to live just a few years longer in the second half of the 20th century, I will be happy." Now that's a strange statement to make, because the world is all messed up. The nation is sick. Trouble is in the land. Confusion all around. That's a strange statement. But I know, somehow, that only when it is dark enough, can you see the stars. And I see God working in this period of the 20th century in a way that men, in some strange way, are responding — something is happening in our world. The masses of people are rising up. And wherever they are assembled today, whether they are in Johannesburg, South Africa; Nairobi, Kenya; Accra, Ghana; New York City; Atlanta, Georgia; Jackson, Mississippi; or Memphis, Tennessee, the cry is always the same – "We want to be free."

And another reason that I'm happy to live in this period is that we have been forced to a point that we are going to have to grapple with the problems that men and women have been trying to grapple with through history, but the demands didn't force them to do it. Survival demands that we grapple with them. Men, for years now, have been talking about war and peace. But now, no longer can they just talk about it. It is no longer a choice between violence or nonviolence in this world; it's nonviolence or nonexistence.

And that is where we are today. And also in the human rights revolution, if something isn't done and isn't done in a hurry to bring the colored people of the world out of their long years of poverty, their long years of hurt and neglect, the whole world is doomed.

Oh, several years ago, I was in New York City autographing the first book that I had ever written. And while sitting there autographing, a black woman came up to me, and all I heard from her was, "Are you Martin Luther King?"

And I was looking down writing, and I said yes. Before I had known it, I had been stabbed by this demented woman. I was rushed to Harlem Hospital. It was a dark Saturday afternoon. And that blade, that blade had gone through, and the x rays revealed that the tip of the blade was on the edge of my aorta, the main artery. And once that's punctured, you drown in your own blood; that's the end of you.

Well, it came out in the New York Times the next morning that if I had merely sneezed, I would have died. Well, about 4 days later, after my chest had been opened and the blade had been removed, they allowed me to move around in the hospital in the wheelchair and to read some of the mail that came in from all over the States and the world, kind letters. I had received a letter from the President and the Vice President. I have forgotten what those telegrams said. I had received a visit and a letter from the Governor of New York City. I have forgotten what that letter said. But there was another letter that I'll never forget. It said simply, "Dr. Martin Luther King: I am a ninth grade student at the White Plains High School, and while it should not matter, I would just like to mention that I am a white girl. I read in the paper of your suffering and of your misfortune. And I read that if you would have sneezed, you would have died. Well, I'm simply writing you to say that I'm so happy that you didn't sneeze."

And I want to say today that I, too, am happy that I didn't sneeze, because if I had sneezed, I wouldn't have been around here in 1960, when we decided to take a ride for freedom and end its segregation in interstate travel. If I had sneezed, I wouldn't have been around here in 1960, when students all over the South were sitting in. And I knew as they were sitting in, they were really standing up for the best in the American dream, taking the whole nation back to those great wells of democracy which were dug deep by the Founding Fathers in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. If I had sneezed. I wouldn't have been around here in 1963, when black people in Birmingham, Alabama, aroused the conscience of the nation and brought into being the civil rights bill. If I had sneezed, I wouldn't have been around here in 1962, when Negroes in Albany, Georgia, decided to straighten their backs up. And whenever men and women straighten their backs up, they are going somewhere, because a man can't ride your back unless it is bent. If I had sneezed, I wouldn't have had a chance later that year, in August, to tell America about a dream that I had had. I wouldn't have been down in Selma, Alabama, to see the great movement there. I wouldn't have been in Memphis to see a community rally around those brothers and sisters who are suffering. Oh, I'm so happy that I didn't sneeze.

But it doesn't matter to me now. I left Atlanta this morning. As we got started on the plane, there were six of us. The pilot came over the public address system and said, "We are sorry for the delay, but we have Dr. Martin Luther King on the plane. To be sure all of the bags were checked carefully, to be sure there would be nothing wrong with the plane, we had the plane protected and guarded all night."

And then we got into Memphis. And some began to talk about the threats that were out. What would happen to me by some of our sick white brothers?

Well, I don't know now. We have some difficult days ahead, and like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And He's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight that we as a people will get to the promised land. And so tonight I'm not worrying about anything. I'm not fearing any man, because mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.

And with this faith, we'll be able to transform dark yesterdays into bright tomorrows, and with this faith, all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing the Negro spiritual of old, "Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!"

Dr. King injected in the veins of the universe the power of love. Stevie Wonder quoted that "Dr. King was a blind man also, because he didn't see neither black or white."

Thank you. Once again I want to thank State Representative Mike Sturla for the invitation.
