Senator MELLOW. Madam President, I request a recess for the purpose of a Democratic caucus to be held in our caucus room to the rear of the Chamber, and it will be a brief caucus.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Senator Pileggi.

Senator PILEGGI. Madam President, there will be a Republican caucus in the Rules room immediately following the recess.

The PRESIDENT. For purposes of Republican and Democratic caucuses, without objection, the Senate stands in recess.

AFTER RECESS

The PRESIDENT. The time of recess having expired, the Senate will come to order.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Senator Fumo.

Senator FUMO. Madam President, I rise for a point of personal privilege and would ask the indulgence of the Senate to make an important announcement.

The PRESIDENT. The gentleman may proceed.

Senator FUMO. Madam President, I have given many speeches in my life, but this is the most difficult speech I have ever had to deliver, so please bear with me for a few moments.

Effective today, I am temporarily stepping aside as the Democratic chairman of the Appropriations Committee. During the past number of years, my family, my staff, my friends and I have endured an intensive Federal investigation. Despite our cooperation in this process, as I and my office have produced thousands of documents, waived valid legal privileges and permitted every aspect of my public and private life to come under examination, this investigation has been marked by threats, intimidations, and frequent leaks to the media intended to embarrass me.

Now this investigation is coming to an end, and I am informed that Mr. Meehan, the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, will announce an indictment of me, probably this week. I am not happy about this, but in one sense, I am relieved. These years have not been easy on me, my family, my staff, and my friends. Now that phase is over, and I can move forward knowing whom and what I am fighting. I will be able to meet the allegations head on, instead of trying to answer the countless rumors that have attended this process. Sometimes the fear of the unknown is far more emotionally terrifying than the battle itself. I am no longer in a fight for my political life, but for everything that I hold dear. Those of you in this Chamber who know me know that I will not shrink from what lies ahead.

I have been informed that the charges will be made in a voluminous indictment, full of falsities, half-truths, and baseless legal theories. I know in my heart that I have not done anything illegal. I trust that you and the good citizens of Pennsylvania will keep an open mind and remember that they are only accusations. There are good answers to the charges. Unfortunately, some time will go by before I have an opportunity to present my side of the story in a courtroom.

In the meantime, I do want to mention some important things that my attorneys do not expect the indictment to allege. The indictment will not allege that I ever accepted a bribe, and as the government knows, I never did. It will not allege that I ever cast my vote in my own interest, rather than in the best interests of the Commonwealth, and as the government knows, I never did. It will not allege that I extorted PECO or any other business or person, and as the government knows, I never did. It will not allege that I sold my office, and again, as the government knows, I never did. Most importantly, it will not allege that I ever failed in any manner to carry out my duties as a Senator fully and completely. All of you in this Chamber know, I have carried out my duties as a Senator fully, completely, and effectively.

Instead, my attorneys advise me that the indictment will make two primary claims. One, that the assets of Citizens Alliance For Better Neighborhoods, a charitable organization which I supported and of which I am most proud, were misused for personal and political gain. Second, that my Senate office employees do nothing but political and personal work. Both claims are simply wrong.

Make no mistake, I am proud of Citizens Alliance. Among its more than \$10 million worth of accomplishments are: an outstanding charter school, a national award-winning residential development in a former blighted neighborhood, the rehabilitation of many trash-strewn, rat-infested vacant lots, financially strapped recreation facilities were kept open, and countless, countless other improvements that otherwise would not have been possible throughout the State, the southeastern Pennsylvania region, and the city of Philadelphia. It is truly about better neighborhoods.

I am also very proud of my staff, many of whom asked to stand with me today. The suggestion that my staff members are political operatives or personal assistants reflects an amazing ignorance of both the legislative process and the facts. Both my Harrisburg and Philadelphia staffs are widely acknowledged as among the hardest working and most dedicated in State government. No constituent phone call, no neighborhood concern or problem, no legislative issue or State agency matter goes ignored. They routinely work more than a 40-hour week, as do many other staffs in the Senate. They work beyond the hours of 9 to 5. I have a 24/7 operation, and my staff frequently works nights and weekends without overtime pay or bonuses. During my time in the Senate, with the help of my staff, I have dedicated my career to becoming as effective as I could for Philadelphia and its surrounding areas. We have produced more than \$8 billion in benefits for the city and the region. We have fought on behalf of consumers, intervened to save jobs, preserved historical assets, and rebuilt neighborhoods.

I am going to keep fighting with the same passion that I have always had for those who need our help - the poor, the unemployed, our senior citizens, our children, and the working men and women of Pennsylvania - but for the time being, I will do so as a rank-and-file member of the Senate. Before this indictment is issued, I will, pursuant to the spirit and the rules of this Senate, step aside as the Democratic chair of the Appropriations Committee until I am vindicated. My good friend Senator Gerald LaValle will become the acting Democratic Appropriations chairman. I take this step now, not only in the interest of the Senate and of my caucus, but because I do not want to cause any disruption to an already difficult budget process that is on the horizon.

To those of you in this Chamber whom I love so much, from both sides of the political aisle that sometimes separate us, who have expressed concern, support, and love, and who have prayed for me, I thank you from the bottom of my heart. My family and I ask that you continue to be with us in this battle.

To the people of Pennsylvania, I want to say that I believe in your fairness. For almost 30 years, I have worked for you and with you. I am confident that you will not judge me based on a many years' long one-sided campaign of scurrilous leaks to the media designed to undermine my office and attack my reputation.

This is the last time I will be speaking publicly about any of this. On the advice of my attorneys, I will say nothing more, and I ask for your understanding. I sincerely wish that I could tell my story now, but the time and place for that will be in a court of law. I can say to you now, again, that I am not guilty of these accusations. Sometimes in life the only choice we have when we face blatant injustice is to have the courage to stand up and fight. That is what I will do, not just to protect myself, but to protect others from facing similar confrontations in the future and to protect the good things that we can yet accomplish together.

Thank you, Madam President. Thank you, my fellow Members.

Senator WAUGH. Madam President, one week ago today the emotional and well-known saga of a Pennsylvania champion came to conclusion. The 3-year old stallion and Kentucky Derby winner, Barbaro, was euthanized after months of effort and prayer by so many not only here in Pennsylvania but across the nation. I rise today to offer this resolution on Barbaro's behalf.

We, the Senate, are proud to celebrate the life and the times of this great Pennsylvania champion. Barbaro's achievements highlight the grace and the beauty of the horse breeding industry and its importance to the Commonwealth and to our agricultural heritage. Also, Madam President, by way of this resolution, we would like to commend Roy and Gretchen Jackson, the owners of Barbaro, and Michael Matz, the trainer of Barbaro, for their extraordinary commitment to Barbaro and to the thoroughbred industry. The heartbreak alone, as you well know, Madam President, and many of the rest of us here who have animals know just the idea of watching that animal go from top of the world to injury on the track is heartbreak enough, but then for months to struggle and watch and in the end, ultimately have to put the animal down is a tremendous stress on the part of everyone involved.

Finally, Madam President, I think it is so appropriate today to remind, and no one in this room needs to be reminded but certainly to folks watching, to remind them that we in Pennsylvania were in the spotlight in two very important ways throughout this effort. First of all, obviously on behalf of Barbaro the animal, but secondly, New Bolton Center at the University of Pennsylvania's large animal hospital. We are so fortunate to have such a fine world-class facility at our disposal and representing our State, and this resolution finally commends New Bolton Center for the outstanding care in the treatment and effort that they put into trying to bring Barbaro back to productive life. If there was any chance, it was at New Bolton Center.

In the end, we celebrate the 3-year-old life of a Pennsylvania champion. This resolution will be left open if others would like to sign on. Thank you, Madam President.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Senator Dinniman.

Senator DINNIMAN. Madam President, I would also like to speak to this resolution. Barbaro was a horse that spent much of its time in Chester County in Senator Pileggi's and my districts. New Bolton is partly in my district, but mainly in Senator Pileggi's district, and this horse, his spirit gave us all hope, even in the most difficult of times. Sometimes we do not succeed in our struggles, but I think it struck a note in every citizen's heart and in their soul of the importance of struggling, struggling to survive, struggling to do the best we can in a life which is often filled with difficulties, and I want to thus state on behalf of the citizens of my district our true love for Barbaro and the spirit that he represented to each of us, and agreeing with Senator Waugh how grateful we are to have the New Bolton facilities within this Commonwealth. Thank you, Madam President.
