SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS SENATE RESOLUTION ADOPTED

Senator MUTH, by unanimous consent, offered Senate **Resolution No. 316**, which was read by the Clerk:

A Resolution honoring the life and service of Toty Boley.

On the question. Will the Senate adopt the resolution?

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Montgomery, Senator Muth.

Senator MUTH. Mr. President, I rise with a heavy heart to honor the life and service of my friend, an invaluable member of our team in the 44th Senatorial District, Toty Boley. Toty was tragically killed in an automobile accident on June 15 in Chester County in my Senate district. Only 30 years old, Toty was the kind of person we all strive to be: thoughtful, empathetic, dedicated to his family, dedicated to public service, and dedicated to learning. At a young age, Toty came to the United States with his grandmother, Grandma Elizabeth, and his brother from Liberia. Toty graduated from Motivation High School in Philadelphia and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Slippery Rock University in 2017. He then earned a master's of public administration from Bowie State University in Maryland in 2020 and was set to enter his final year of law school at Widener Law Commonwealth here in Harrisburg. For the past 2 years, Toty was a member of my staff in our Royersford district office, where he excelled as a constituent services representative. No matter who came into my office, no matter what the issue was, Toty was a willing listener, a voice of reason, a helping hand for so many of our constituents, and a problem solver. Prior to working in the Pennsylvania State Senate, Toty also worked for the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and also was an intern with U.S. Senator Bob Casey and Congresswoman Mary Gay Scanlon. He was also currently working on an internship while working full time to complete an internship with the Montgomery County Public Defender's Office. Toty had so much life in him. He had such a bright future ahead of him. His fiancée, Morrisa, were just recently engaged earlier this year.

Mr. President, Toty dedicated his life to doing as much good as he could for others, from taking care of his grandmother and other members of his community and family in Philadelphia, to helping kids in his neighborhood, and even paying for scholarships for nine students in Liberia so that they could finish their education. In his own words, on a questionnaire from when he applied to work in our office, Toty indicated that his motivation was to make his grandmother proud, achieve his professional goals, and do as much good for others as he can in his lifetime. While his life was tragically cut short, Toty will always be remembered for his kindness, dedication, and his unwavering commitment to helping others. Words cannot fully express the magnitude of loss we all feel for Toty's passing. And I ask my colleagues to join me in expressing our condolences to Toty's family, friends, and to stand for a moment of silence to honor his life and service.

Senator ROTHMAN. Madam President, included in this omnibus bridge-naming bill is a naming of a bridge to memorialize Lance Corporal Jason Frye. It is located off of [Route] 233 over Sherman Creek in Perry County. Jason Frye, from Landisburg, a graduate of West Perry High School, was killed on October 6, 2005, while conducting combat operations near Fallujah, Iraq. He was a Marine Lance Corporal, and I appreciate you allowing me to take this opportunity--I received a beautiful note from Connie Frye, his mother, who told me there were two things that she was afraid of after burying her son. One was that, how she would get through those things that we go through in life, those Christmases and birthdays and marriages and 4th of July's and holidays that she would not have her son present for. The second thing, that she was afraid that people would forget about her son and the sacrifices that young Marine made for his country. And this bill goes a long way in making sure that the people of Perry County will not forget about one of their heroes, "JC" Frye.

The PRESIDENT pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Philadelphia, Senator Tartaglione.

Senator TARTAGLIONE. Madam President, I rise because today marks 6,574 days since our Commonwealth's legislature last passed an increase in our minimum wage. As we return to Session this week and try to hammer out our Commonwealth's budget for the next fiscal year, it is imperative we focus on our priorities, Madam President. Too often, it seems only the rich and powerful's needs are addressed and taken care of during our budget conversations. Creating tax cuts and loopholes for our highest earners, creating grant programs for corporations to fund development, and other special consideration are all too often the focus and highlight of our Commonwealth's budget, but not for me, Madam President. My priority this budget cycle is to ensure our Commonwealth's lowest earners have a seat at the table and are treated fairly and with respect. Madam President, I introduced Senate Bill No. 1186, which will raise the minimum wage of Pennsylvania's lowest earners to \$20 an hour with inflation-adjusted increases thereafter because I know our minimum-wage earners deserve better than our poverty level of \$7.25 per hour minimum wage. For too long, we have abdicated our duty, Madam President, our duty to act and legislate for our most vulnerable citizens, but we can change that today. Madam President, we have the chance to amend our errors and fix the almost 18 years of legislative inaction. We can and must include Senate Bill No. 1186 in any package of legislation that is passed. Passing a minimum wage increase will send a message to everyday Pennsylvanians that this legislature and our Commonwealth's leaders hear their needs and are taking decisive action to ensure we do not leave Pennsylvania behind. Let us come together and finally pass Senate Bill No. 1186 and move our Commonwealth from a minimum wage to a living wage, Madam President. Thank you.
