15	I WOULD LIKE TO, FIRST OF ALL, MR. CHAIRMAN,

17	IMPORTANT HEARINGS WITHIN THE NEIGHBORHOODS WHFRE CITIZENS

19	PLEASED TO HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO TESTIFY BEFORE THE

24	MY CREDENTIALS AS A WITNESS IN THESE

25 HEARINGS BEGINS WITH MY APPOINIMENT TO THE MAYOR'S POLICE

i	ADVISORY BOARD BY FORMER MAYOR DILWORTH. AS A MEMBER OF THAT
2	BOARD I HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO REVIEW THE FACTS AND HUNDREDS
3	OF CASES OF ALLEGED POLICE ARUSE OF AUTHORITY AND THE USE OF
4	EXESSIVE FORCE ON CITIZENS OF THIS CITY.
5	AS A PRACTICING ATTORNEY FOR 19 YEARS, I
6	HAVE REPRESENTED SCORES OF CLIENTS WHO HAD BEEN THE VICTIMS
7	OF POLICE BRUTALITY AND ABUSE; AND AS AN INDIVIDUAL I HAVE
8	BEEN ILLEGALLY STOPPED AND DETAINED BY PHILADELPHIA POLICEMEN
9	ON MORE THAN ONE OCCASION. WHILE THE EXCESSES OF SOME
10	POLICEMEN ARE A RELATIVELY NEW PROBLEM TO THE PHILADELPHIA
11	MAJORITY COMMUNITY, IT IS A BITTER TRADITION OF THE CITY'S
12	BLACK COMMUNITY.
13	AS A LAW SCHOOL STUDENT I WALKED UP ANN DOWN
14	COLUMBIA AVENUE BETWEEN MY PARENT'S HOME AND LAW SCHOOL
15	ALMOST EVERYDAY FOR THE THREE YEARS BETWEEN 1954 AND 1957. I
16	WAS REGULARLY STOPPED BY POLICE WHO SEARCHED MY BRIEFCASE. I
17	NEVER COMPLAINED ABOUT THESE INCIDENTS OR REPORTED THEM
18	BECAUSE I REALIZED THAT NOTHING WOULD BE DONE ABOUT IN AND I
19	WOULD PROBABLY ANTAGONIZE POLICEMEN WHO WOULD THEN MAKE
20	CERTAIN THEY FOUND SOMETHING INCRIMINATING ME.
21	SINCE BECOMING A LAWYER I HAVE BEEN
22	ILLEGALLY STOPPED AND DETAINED BY POLICEMEN ON TWO OCCASIONS.
23	EACH OF THOSE INCIDENTS WERE REPORTED TO THE POLICE
24	DEPARTMENT AND IN EACH CASE, POLICE OFFICIALS MERFLY
25	JUSTIFIED THE ACTIONS OF THE OFFICERS INVOLVED.

IT IS ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE FOR A BLACK MALE TO 1 2 LIVE IN THIS CITY WITHOUT BEING STOPPED AND DETAINED BY THE POLICE WITHOUT JUST CAUSE AND THERE IS CURRENTLY NO REMEDY 3 FOR THESE VIOLATIONS OF CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS AND PERSONAL 4 PRIVACY. 5 IN SUPPORT OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS I INTEND 6 TO MAKE TO THE COMMITTEE, I WOULD LIKE TO SUBMIT, AND I HAVE 7 THEM HERE, COPIES OF THE COMPLAINTS WHICH HAVE BEEN FILED BY 8 9 MY LAW FIRM IN 15 SUITS ALLEGING VARIOUS ACTS OF POLICE ARUSE AND BRUTALITY. THE ACTS INVOLVED RANGE FROM SHOOTING A CAB 10 11 DRIVER TO DEATH TO FIRING BULLETS INTO THE BEDROOM WHERE SMALL CHILDREN WERE ASLEEP, TO ILLEGALLY ENTERING A PRIVATE 12 13 RESIDENCE AND BEATING THE ENTIRE FAMILY -- MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN -- WITH NIGHTSTICKS AND BLACKJALKS. 14 15 THESE 15 SUITS INVOLVE THE COMPLAINTS OF 30 PERSONS; 22 ARE MEN, 14 ARE WOMEN, AND FOUK ARE CHILDREN. 16 17 IN ADDITION, THERE ARE SIX OTHER CASES WHICH MY LAW FIRM IS CURRENTLY PREPARING FOR SUIT. IN THE CASES 18 WHICH HAVE BEEN FILED, 65 POLICEMEN ARE SUED. 19 20 I HOPE THE COMMITTEE WILL CAREFUL REVIEW 21 THESE COMPLAINTS, ALL OF WHICH ARE SWORN TO UNDER DATH. 22 I SUGGEST TO THE COMMITTEE THAT FOR EVERY 23 SUCH COMPLAINT, THERE ARE AT LEAST TEN WHERE INDIVIDUALS DO 24 NOT CONTACT LAWYERS OR ANYONF ELSE. 25 IN ADDITION TO COLLECTING COMPENSATORY AND

PUNITIVE DAMAGES FOR ACTS OF ARUSE BY POLICEMEN, THESE SUITS 1 SHOULD SERVE AS A DETERRENT, BUT BECAUSE THE CITY HAS IN THE 2 3 PAST SUCCESSFULLY DELAYED THESE SUITS AND THE INDIVIDUAL POLICEMAN DOES NOT SHARE THE PURCHASE OF THE COST OF 4 LITIGATION NOR THE PAYMENT OF THE VERDICT, THEY HAVE NOT BEEN 5 6 A DETERRENT. TO CORRECT THE PROBLEMS CAUSED BY THE CITY'S 7 DELAYING TACTICS, I RECENTLY FILED AN ACTION WITH THE 8 PHILADELPHIA COURT OF COMMON PLEAS REQUESTING THAT ALL CASES 9 10 OF ALLEGED POLICE ABUSE AND BRUTALITY BE GIVEN PREFERENCIAL. LISTINGS FOR TRIALS AND THAT JUDGES BE SPECIALLY ASSIGNED TO 11 OVERSEE ALL PRETRIAL MOTIONS SO AS TO EXPEDITE THE CASES. 12 PRESIDENT JUDGE EDWARD J. BRADLEY HAS 13 14 GRANTED THESE REQUESTS; AND NOW LAWYERS WHO REPRESENT PERSONS WHO ARE THE VICTIMS OF POLICE ABUSE CAN HAVE THEIR CASES 15 EXPEDITED, AND IT IS POSSIBLE TO BRING ONE OF THESE CASES TU 16 TRIAL IN ABOUT EIGHT MONTHS. 17 BEFORE THIS APPROACH WAS TAKEN, IT TOOK AS 18 LONG AS TWO YEARS TO BRING ONE OF THESE CASES TO TRIAL. 19 20 IT IS ALSO IMPORTANT FOR THE COMMITTEE TO 21 KNOW THAT THESE CIVIL SUITS INVOLVE MORE THAN AN ACTION FOR 22 ASSAULT AND BATTERY. THE LAW ALSO PROVIDES FOR RECOVERY OF INTENTIONALLY INFLICTING EMOTIONAL HARM, FALSE IMPRISONMENT, 23 FALSE ARREST AND VIOLATION OF RIGHTS GUARANTEED BY THE STATE 24 25 CONSTITUTION.

HOWEVER, THE PROVISIONS OF THE LAW AND THE 1 OBTAINING OF AN ADEQUATE REMEDY ARE NOT ALWAYS AVAILABLE TO A 2 VICTIM OF ABUSE BECAUSE OF THE CONTROL OF THE INVESTIGATORY 3 PROCESS BY THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. 4 THEREFORE, I RECOMMEND TO THE COMMITTEE THAT 5 LEGISLATION BE DRAFTED AND ENACTED TO DO THE FOLLOWING: 6 7 REQUIRE THAT LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TAKE DISCIPLINARY ACTION COMMENSURATE WITH THE OFFENSE WHENEVER A CIVIL TRIAL RESULTS 8 IN A FINDING THAT A POLICE OFFICER HAS BEEN GUILTY OF ABUSE 9 OF AUTHORITY OR THE USE OF EXCESSIVE FORCE. THUS FAR THERE 10 IS NO SUCH REQUIREMENT. 11 REQUIRE THAT ANY ACCUMULATED PENSION OR 12 OTHER FUNDS OF AN OFFICER GUILTY OF ABUSE, WHICH ARF IN THE 13 CONTROL OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT, BE ATTACHED TO HELP PAY ANY 14 VERDICTS BASED ON POLICE ABUSE. OTHERWISE, A POLICEMAN WHO 15 COMMITS BRUTALITY DOESN'T PAY ANYTHING; AND THE TAXPAYERS, 16 17 ONE OF WHOM IS THE VICTIM OF THE BRUTALITY, ENDS UP PAYING HIS OWN VERDICT. 18 REQUIRE THAT LOCAL POLICE DEPARTMENTS 19 MAINTAIN AS PUBLIC RECORDS ALL CUMPLAINTS OF ALLEGED POLICE 20 ABUSE AND THE DISPOSITION OF THOSE COMPLAINTS. 21 22 REGULATE THE USE OF WEAPONS BY POLICE 23 OFFICERS, THUS FAR, THAT IS BASED ON POLICIES AT THE LUCAL 24 LEVEL. THERE IS NO UNIFORM REGULATION OF WHEN A FOLICEMAN 25 PULLS HIS GUN.

1	IN ONE OF MY CASES WHICH IS THE CASE OF THE
2	CAB DRIVER WHO WAS SLAIN, THE POLICE OFFICER STOPPED THE CAB
3	DRIVER WHO WAS DRIVING THE CAB ANN HAD HIM SPREAD-EAGLE
4	AGAINST THE CAR AND HELD A COCKED REVOLVER IN HIS BACK WHILE
5	HE SEARCHED HIM, AND SUBSEQUENTLY SHOT THE MAN IN THE BACK
6	AND NILLED HIM.
7	NOW THERE WAS AMSOLUTELY NO REASON FOR THE
8	POLICE OFFICER TO DRAW HIS WEAPON AND TO COCK IT.
9	THE FIRST REPORTS FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT
10	WERE THAT THIS WAS STANDARD PROCEDURE; LATER POLICEMEN SAID
11	IT WAS NOT STANDARD PROCEDURE. SO OBVIOUSLY THERE IS NO
12	CLARITY AS TO WHEN POLICE OFFICERS ARE SUPPOSED TO EVEN USE
13	THEIR WEAPONS.
14	PROVIDE FOR A STATE SUPERVISED INVESTIGATION
15	WHENEVER A POLICE OFFICER SLAYS AN UNARMED PERSON.
16	I THINK THAT TO HAVE A LUCAL POLICE
17	DEPARTMENT INVESTIGATING ITS OWN MEMBERS WHEN THEY SLAY AN
18	UNARMED CITIZEN IS REALLY A RIDICULOUS SITUATION, AND THE
19	RESULTS OF SUCH AN INVESTIGATION ARE PREDICTABLE.
20	PROVIDE TO THE HEIRS OF A VICTIM OF A

IN THE PROSECUTION OF CRIMINAL MATTERS, IT IS OFTEN VERY DIFFICULT TO GET A DISTRICT 2 3 ATTORNEY, AS IT WAS WITH PREVIOUS DISTRICT ATTORNEYS IN THIS CITY, TO PROSECUTE POLICE BRUTALITY CASES. 4 PROVIDE PROTECTION FOR POLICE OFFICERS WHO 5 ACT TO INTERVENE TO STOP POLICE ARUSE OR WHO REPORT OFFENSES 6 7 BY FELLOW OFFICERS. THE LAST RECOMMENDATION IS THE RESULT OF 8 9 THOSE INSTANCES WHERE POLICE OFFICERS HAVE CUMPLAINED 10 PRIVATELY AND OFF THE RECORD ABOUT THE ABUSES OF FELLOW OFFICERS, BUT HAVE BEEN AFRAID TO TRY TO PREVENT THE ABUSES 11 OR TO REPORT THEM. 12 ABUSE OF AUTHORITY AND THE USE OF EXCESSIVE 13 FORCE ARE VERY SERIOUS PROBLEMS IN THIS CITY. THESE 14 15 VIOLATIONS OF LAW AND HUMAN RIGHTS ARE COSTING LIVES AND SEVERE EMOTIONAL AND PHYSICAL PAIN FOR MANY DECENT, 16 17 LAW-ABIDING CITIZENS WHO WORK HARD. PAY TAXES AND HAVE A RIGHT TO PROTECTION FROM OFFICIAL ABUSE. 18 19 NEVERTHELESS, IT WOULD BE UNFAIR NOT TU STATE THAT THERE ARE ALSO THOUSANDS OF PHILADELPHIA 20 POLICEMEN WHO DO NOT ARUSE THEIR AUTHORITY AND HAVE NEVER 21 22 USED EXCESSIVE FORCE. 23 I AM CERTAIN THAT MANY OF THEM ARE ASHAMED 24 OF THE NATIONAL REPUTATION WHICH PHILADELPHIA POLICEMEN HAVE FOR BRUTALITY. THESE POLICEMEN ARE ALSO VICTIMS OF THE 25

POLICIES OF THE CURRENT ADMINIS/RATION WHICH REFUSES TO ACT 1 2 AGAINST POLICEMEN, NO MATTER HOW CONVINCING THE EVIDENCE, 3 THAT THEY HAVE ABUSED THEIR AUTHORITY. IT MUST BE POSSIBLE TO WIN THE BATTLE AGAINST 4 5 CRIME AND CRIMINALS WITHOUT BEATING, KILLING AND ARUSING HONEST, LAW-BIDING CITIZENS. 6 7 IT MUST BE POSSIBLE TO BE BORN BLACK IN PHILADELPHIA AND LIVE WITHOUT UNJUSTIFIED AKRESTS AND 8 DETENTION BY POLICEMEN. IT MUST BE POSSIBLE TU BE FREE IN 9 10 PHILADELPHIA WITHOUT THE FEAR OF UNWARRANTED POLICE INTRUSION 11 INTO OUR LIVES. THE CHALLENGE TO THIS COMMITTEE, AND TO ALL 12 13 OF US WHO STILL BELIEVE IN OUR DEMOCRACY, IS TO FASHION THE RULES OF LAW AND THE AVAILABLE REMEDIES THAT WILL PROVIDE THE 14 MAXIMUM ASSURANCE THAT EACH OF US AND ALL OF US CAN LIVE 15 WITHOUT FEARING THE POLICE WHO PROTECT US. 16 WE DARE NOT FAIL TO MEET THIS CHALLENGE. 17 18 THE COMMUNITY DESPERATELY NEEDS GOOD POLICE PROTECTION; BUT WE SHOULD NOT HAVE TO SURRENDER PRECIOUS RIGHTS OF LIBERTY TO 19 20 GET THAT PROTECTION. CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANN YOU, MK. BOWSER, DO 21 22 YOU HAVE THOSE AFFIDAVITS WITH YOU? 23 A. I HAVE THEM HERE, I WILL LEAVE THESE HERE FOR THE COMMITTEE 24 CHAIRMAN RHODES: QUESTIONS ON MY RIGHT. 25

REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI. 1 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: I WILL PASS. 2 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS, DO 3 YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS? 4 5 **REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS:** Q. MR. BOWSER, YOUR OBSERVATIONS AND YOUR 6 RECOMMENDATIONS ALSO I CONGRATULATE YOU FOR. I THINK THAT 7 THEY ARE SOUND AND I ESPECIALLY AM PLEASED BY YOUR REMARKS 8 THAT GENERALLY INDICATE THAT IT IS A VERY IMPORTANT TASK THAT 9 10 THIS COMMITTEE UNDERTAKES, FROM WHAT YOU SAY. AND IT ALSO SEEMS TO SUGGEST THAT YOU CONSIDER THIS PROBLEM A VERY 11 12 SERIOUS AND WIDESPREAD ONE IN PHILADELPHIA. 13 IS THAT CORRECT? 14 ABSOLUTELY. A. 15 I ALSO AGREE WITH YOUK RECOMMENDATIONS, MOST Q. ALL OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS, AND IN PARTICULAR ONE WHICH WE 16 17 HAVE BEEN STRUGGLING WITH AND ONE WHICH I HAVE ALWAYS ADVOCATED, THAT THERE BE A MECHANISM ASIDE FROM THE LUCAL 18 19 DISTRICT ATTORNEY AND POLICE, WISELY POINTED OUT, THAT 20 DOESN'T DEPEND ON THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY. YOU HAVE TO HAVE A MECHANISM TO ASSURE THEY DON'T CONTROL IT AND NEEP THE 21 22 CITIZENS FROM MANING A COMPLAINT. 23 YOU SEEM TO LIMIT THAT MACHINERY THOUGH TO 24 CASES OF KILLING. WE HAVE HEARD A LOT OF TESTIMONY INDICATING 25

1	A LOT OF OTHER FORMS OF ABUSE AND INTIMIDATION. OF COURSE
2	WHEN THE KILLINGS GET IN THE PAPER, THEY RECOUNT THAT.
3	I WONDER IF YOUR IDEA WOULD ALSO APPLY TO
4	THE SITUATION SO THAT ANY CITIZEN WHO WAS INTIMIDATED,
5	ARUSED, PHYSICALLY ARUSED, EVEN THOUGH HE DIDN'T DIE, CAN
6	IMMEDIATELY HAVE A FAIR HEARING BY A STATE SOURCE.
7	WOULD YOUR COMMENTS ALSO SUPPORT SUCH AN
8	IDEA?
9	A. I THINN IN THE ARSTRACT THAT WOULD BE A
10	GREAT THING. I THINK THE REALITY OF IT, THE VOLUME WOULD BE
11	OVERWHELMING. I DON'T KNOW HOW THAT CAN BE MANAGED.
12	I KNOW WHEN I WAS ON THE PULICE ADVISORY
13	BOARD, THE VOLUME WAS ENORMOUSLY THICK. WE TOON EVERY
14	COMPLAINT. AND NOT ALL COMPLAINIS AKE JUSTIFIED; SO THAT I
15	WOULD SUGGEST THAT THERE SHOULD BE SOME JUKISDICTIONAL LIMIT.
16	NOW WHETHER IT IS INJURING OR KILLING, YOU
17	KNOW, IT'S SOMETHING THAT COULD BE DETERMINED; BUT I THINK IF
18	YOU OPEN TO EVERY COMPLAINT, YOU WOULD REALLY BE ASKING FOR A
19	MAJOR TASK AND A MAJOR PARTICIPATION OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT BY
20	THE STATE WHICH MIGHT NOT BE WARRANTED.
21	BUT THERE OUGHT TO BE, THE CUTOFF DOESN'T
22	HAVE TO BE WHAT I RECOMMEND, IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE WILLINGS,
23	IT COULD BE PHYSICAL INJURY.
24	Q. FROM WHAT WE HAVE BEEN HEARING, IT SEEMS TO
25	BE TRUE THE PROBLEM IS WIDESPREAD AND A MAJOR PROBLEM. AND

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ALSO WHAT SEEMS TO BE TRUE, THERE IS NOWHERE TO GO. AND IF 1 WE HAVE A MAJOR PROBLEM FOR CITIZENS AND NOWHERF TO GO, IT 2 SEEMS TO ME THE PROBLEM MAY BE BIG BUT SUMEONE HAS TO HANDLE 3 THAT PROBLEM. 4 AS I SAID, I THINN THAT WOULD BE IDEAL IF I) 5 Α. COULD BEEN MANAGED, I THINK IT WOULD BE IDEAL. 6 7 Q. MR. BOWSER, YOU HAVE INDICATED THROUGH YOUR COMMENTS THAT THE NATIONAL REPUTATION OF THE PHILADELPHIA 8 POLICE FORCE FOR POLICE VIOLENCE IS ONE THAT WE SHOULD BE 9 10 ASHAMED OF, EVEN THOUGH YOU SAY IT IS NOT THE WHOLE FORCE. 11 IS IT YOUR OPINION THAT THE PHILADELPHIA POLICE SITUATION ON POLICE VIOLENCE IS --12 13 Α. WELL, I HAVE READ TWO AKTICLES IN NATIONAL 14 MAGAZINES WHICH RATED PHILADELPHIA IN POLICE VIOLENCE SECOND ONLY TO HOUSTON. AND I REPRESENT CLIENIS IN HOUSTON, I WAS 15 IN HOUSTON WHEN THE PRIOR MAYOR OF HOUSTON WENT ON TELEVISION 16 17 TO SAY HE COULDN'T CONTROL THE POLICE ANY LONGER. THE POLICE VIOLENCE GOT SO BAD IN HOUSTON, THE MAYOR WENT ON TELEVISION 18 19 AND SAID THAT HE JUST COULDN'T CONTROL THEM ANYMORE. 20 AND I THINK IT WAS TIME OR PHILADELPHIA MAGAZINE, THEY RATED PHILADELPHIA SECOND. 21 22 Q+ TO HOUSTON? 23 DO YOU THINK THE POLICE, ESPECIALLY IN PHILADELPHIA, CAN CONTROL THE POLICE VIOLENCE? 24 MY EXPERIENCE IN CITY GOVERNMENT IS THAT THE 25 Α.

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PHILADELPHIA POLICE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE HAS BEEN AMENABLE 1 2 TO DIRECTION; THAT WHEN THE POLICY DIRECTION WAS FIRM, CLEAR AND WHEN IT WAS DISCIPLINARY ACTION TAKEN OF POLICY, THAT THE 3 POLICE OFFICERS OF THIS CITY HAVE CONFORMED. 4 AND I STILL HAVE IN MY MIND A VIVID MEMORY 5 6 OF THE '64 DISTURBANCE IN THE CITY WHEN THEN MAYOR TATE GAVE ORDERS THAT THE POLICE WERE NOT TO ARREST OR APPREHEND ANY OF 7 8 THE PEOPLE INVOLVED BECAUSE HE DIDN'T WANT TO AGGRAVATE THE SITUATION, AND THAT ORDER WAS CARRIED OU) TO THE LETTER, AND 9 I THINK THE RECORD OF THE POLICEMEN AS A WHOLE IS THAT THEY 10 DO RESPOND TO POSITIVE DIRECTION. 11 12 I THINK THAT, HOWEVER ---BUT IN 1967 WHEN THE THEN POLICE CHIEF 13 Q. VIOLATED THE ORDERS OF THE MAYOR --14 WELL, THAT'S RIGHT. I SAID AS A WHOLE, I 15 Α. AM NOT --16 17 AND NOW MAYOR? Q. 18 A. YES. I SAID AS A WHOLE. 19 BUT HOWEVER WHEN DAY AFTER DAY THERE HAVE 20 BEEN POLICE OFFICERS INVOLVED IN CASES WHERE VERDICTS, HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS HAVE BEEN PAID BY THIS CITY 21 22 BECAUSE OF POLICE BRUTALITY AND NOTHING HAPPENED TO THE 23 POLICE -- I DON'T MEAN HE WAS SLAPPED ON THE WRIST. NOTHING 24 HAPPENED TO HIM, THAT'S ABSOLUTELY RIDICULOUS. WHEN A 25 POLICEMAN SEES THAT DAY AFTER DAY, WHAT KIND OF RESPECT CAN

YOU EXPECT HIM TO HAVE? 1 Q. IN SOME CASES POLICEMEN HAVE ACTUALLY BEEN 2 3 PROKOTED? A. THAT'S RIGHT. 4 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THANN YOU. 5 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER. 6 REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER: 7 Q. YOU MENTIONED IN YOUR TESTIMONY THEY REALLY 8 DON'T HAVE ANYBODY TO TURN TO. 9 WHAT WOULD BE YOUR FEELING ON A SITUATION 10 WHERE WE MIGHT HAVE HAD AN ELECTED BOARD RATHER THAN AN 11 12 APPOINTED ONE? A. I THINK THAT THAT WOULD BE FINE IF THERF WAS 13 LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY FOR IT. THE REASON WHY THE POLICE 14 15 ADVISORY BOARD WAS APPOINTED WAS BECAUSE THERE IS NO AUTHORITY FOR IT UNDER THE CITY CHARTER EXCEPT THE GRANT TU 16 THE MAYOR OF AUTHORITY TO APPOINT ADVISORY BOARDS AND 17 18 COMMITTEES. 19 BUT IF THERE IS LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY FOR I) AND AUTHORITY FOR INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATION, BECAUSE OUR 20 21 BOARD GOT A BAD REPUTATION BECAUSE WE HAD TO USE THE 22 INVESTIGATION OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THAT'S JUST A 23 RIDICULOUS, THAT'S A LUDICROUS SITUATION. 24 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE SCIRICA. REPRESENTATIVE SCIRICA: NO QUESTIONS. 25

CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON. 1 2 **REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON:** Q. THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR TESTIMONY. 3 MY QUESTION, MOVING TU AN AREA TRYING TO 4 FORMULATE SOME OPINION AS TO WHERE OUR CITY IS AT THE 5 PRESENT TIME, JUST HOW BAD IS THE SITUATION OF POLICE 6 VIOLENCE IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA? 7 I WOULD SAY THAT I HAVEN'T DONE A SURVEY. 8 A. Ι READ THE STUDIES AS I AM SURE YOU HAVE, MR. RICHARDSON; BUT I 9 WOULD SAY AFTER INTERVIEWING THE INDIVIDUALS INVOLVED IN 10 11 THESE COMPLAINTS THAT IT REALLY IS HORRENDOUS. ONE WOMAN INVOLVED IN A SUIT HAD JUST COME 12 HOME FROM THE HOSPITAL, IN FEBRUARY, THERE WAS SNOW ON THE 13 GROUND; THE POLICE CAME IN HER HOUSE, THEY WENT DOWNSTAIRS 14 AND STARTED BEATING UP HER MOTHER AND FATHER. SHE CAME DOWN 15 AND SAID, "WHAT HAPPENED?" SHE HAD GUTTEN OUT OF BED AND HAD 16 ON A PAIR OF PANTIES AND BRA. THEY DRUG HEK OUT OF THE HOUSE 17 18 BY HER ANNLE, IN THE SNOW. ANOTHER LADY'S CASE NOT FILED YET, THEY CAME 19 TO HER HOUSE BECAUSE A SHOOTING BRONE OUT. SHE WAS LOOKING 20 OUT OF THE WINDOW WITH HER CHILDREN, THEY FIRED INTO THE 21 HOUSE, BROKE IN, RUSHED UPSTAIRS, FIRED INTO THE ROOM WHERE 22 CHILDREN SIX OR SEVEN YEARS OLD WERE ASLEEP, FIRED A SHOTGUN 23 24 IN THE CLOSET. SHE TOLD THEM NO ONL ELSE WAS IN THE HOUSE. 25 THEY THREW HER DOWNSTAIRS. THEN THEY

FINALLY LEFT. THE DISTRICT ATFORNEY IS NOW INVESTIGATING. 1 2 MOST PEOPLE GET THE IDEA THESE CASES INVOLVE ONE PERSON AND A POLICE OFFICER ON THE STREET. I WILL TELL 3 YOU THE COMPLAINTS WE RECEIVE INVOLVE IN MANY INSTANCES WHOLE 4 FAMILIES JUST BEATEN SYSTEMATICALLY. 5 I WILL GO TO TRIAL TOMORROW TO DEFEND A 6 CITY EMPLOYEE WHO WAS TAKEN OFF THE STREET AND BEATEN BY A 7 PHILADELPHIA POLICEMAN. AND HE IS NOT THE ONLY ONE WE 8 REPRESENT; SO IT IS A VERY SERIOUS PROBLEM. 9 10 Q. MK. BOWSER, FOR OUR RECORDS THERE HAS BEEN TESTIMONY OVER AND OVER AGAIN, BUT I) SEEMS TO ME THE 11 SINCERITY OF THIS PROBLEM DOESN'T SEEM TO GET OUT LINE IT 12 13 SHOULD. YOU INDICATED IN THE POOR MINORITY COMMUNITY 14 15 THE PROBLEM IS PREVALENT. COULD YOU EXPOUND JUST A LITTLE ON WHERE WE ARE RELEVANT TO THE NUMBER OF POOR AND BLACKS WHO 16 17 ARE TREATED BY THIS PARTICULAR PROBLEM IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA. WOULD YOU SAY IT IS THE POOR BLACKS WHO ARE 18 TREATED THE WORST? 19 WELL I WOULD SAY, I WOULD CITE FOR YOU 20 Α. 21 BECAUSE I DON'T WANT TO USE MYSELF AS AN AUTHORITY, BUT I 22 WOULD CITE IN THE STUDILS BY DR. MARVIN WOLFGANG OF THE 23 UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA WHO RECENTLY TESTIFIED IN A CASE -- I DON'T THINK IT WAS IN THIS JURISDICTION, BUT HE 24 TESTIFIED IN PHILADELPHIA AND IN OTHER URBAN CENTERS -- IT IS 25

ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE FOR A BLACK MAN TU GROW UP AND NOT BE 1 2 UNLAWFULLY AND UNJUSTIFIABLY STOPPED AND DETAINED BY POLICE. THERE WAS A STUDY IN THE CITY OF 3 PHILADELPHIA WHICH SHOWED THAT 50 PERCENT OF THE BLACN MALES 4 IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA WILL BE ARRESTED FOR A MAJOR 5 CRIME BEFORE THE AGE OF 18. 6 7 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHAT STUDY WAS THAT? THAT WAS BY DR. MARVIN WOLFGANG. THAT STUDY 8 Α. CAME OUT I THINN MAYBE FOUR OR FIVE YEAR ACO. SU INSOFAR AS 9 THE MINORITY COMMUNITY IS CONCERNED, THIS IS A NORMAL 10 11 OCCURRENCE, 12 I MEAN A YOUNG MAN WHO I KNOW IN THIS 13 AUDIENCE SAID TO ME WHILE I WAS SITTING HERE TONIGHI, "DO YOU THINN I HAVE A CASE?" I SAID, "WHAT HAPPENED?" 14 HE SAID; "THE OTHER NIGHT I WAS WALNING DOWN 15 THE STREET WITH MY WIFE, THE POLICE PULLED UP BESIDE ME; HE 16 SAID, 'PUT YOUR HANDS UP ON THE CAR.' I SAID, 'WHAT HAVE I 17 18 DONE?' HE TOON ME TO ELEVENTH AND WINGER, PUT ME IN A CELL. 19 I SAID, 'I WANT TO MAKE A CALL.' THEY KEPT ME THERE 40 20 MINUTES, I SAID, 'WHAT WAS I ARRESTED FOR?'* 21 AND HE ASNED ME, HE ASNED ME, "DO I HAVE A 22 CASE?" AND THAT IS BECAUSE HE HAS LIVED, AS I HAVE LIVED AN! 23 AS SOME OF THE MEMBERS ON THE COMMITTEE HAS LIVED WITH THIS THING AS A NORMAL OCCURRENCE. 24 25 I WALNED FROM THIS CORNER TO TEMPLE LAW

1	SCHOOL EVERYDAY; AND TWO OR THREE TIMES A WEEN; BECAUSE I HAD
2	A BRIEFCASE I WAS STOPPED, PUT UP AGAINST THE WALL AND
3	SEARCHED. I HAD MY BRIEFCASE BECAUSE I WAS A LAW STUDENT.
4	Q. IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA CAN YOU TELL US
5	WHO RUNS THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, THE COMMISSIONEOR THE MAYOR?
6	A. THE MAYOR, AND NOT BECAUSE THE BECAUSE
7	THAT'S THE WAY THE CITY CHARTER SETS IT UP. THE MAYOR IS
8	DIRECTLY AND ULTIMATELY RESPONSIBLE FOR THE OPERATION OF CITY
ç	DEPARTMENTS AND HE HAS ALL THE AUTHORITY HE NEEDS UNDER THE
10	CITY CHARTER.
11	IN SOME CITIES LIKE HOUSTON, LOS ANGELES AND
12	OTHERS, THERE IS SORT OF A SHARING OF PONER BETWEEN THEM,
13	CITY COUNCIL AND THE MAYOR.
14	Q. BUT HE COULD STOP THE BRUIALITY HERE?
15	A. OH, YES, HE COULD STOP II.
16	REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: THANK YOU.
17	CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WHITE.
18	REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: NO QUESTIONS.
19	CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE JOHNSON,
20	REPRESENTATIVE JOHNSON:
21	Q. IT SEEMS WE WILL HAVE TO USE SOME SORT OF
22	MECHANISM AS A DETERRENI. WHAT YOU ARE SAYING TO ME, AND I
23	THINK I LIKE THE IDEA, IS TO FIND SOME WAY TO BRING ABOUT A
24	PENALTY PLUS FOR ANY POLICEMAN WHO IS PROTECTED IN
25	PHILADELPHIA.

1 Α. THERE SHOULD BE SOME DISCIPLINARY ACTION, 2 ABSOLUTELY. CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI. 3 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: 4 5 Q. AND YOU SUGGESTED REGULATING THE USE OF WEAPONS BY POLICE OFFICERS? 6 7 FIRST OF ALL, THERE IS LAW ON IT, Α. REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI. THE LAW IN THE COMMONWEALTH OF 8 PENNSYLVANIA IS A POLICE OFFICER DOES NOT HAVE A RIGHT TO USE 9 A WEAPON WHICH IS LINELY TO CAUSE DEATH OK SERIOUS BODILY 10 11 INJURY UNLESS THERE IS A THREAT TO HIMSELF, TO ANOTHER PERSON 12 OR A FLEEING FELON, AND NORMALLY THAT'S A FELONY OF A VERY 13 SERIOUS CRIME, ONAY. SO THAT REALLY THAT IS INTERPRETED BY THE LOCAL POLICE DEPARTMENT AS A DIFFERENT THING AND 14 15 INTERPRETED DIFFERENTLY BY POLICEMEN. I GIVE YOU THE CASE OF A WOMAN WHO HAS A 16 CHILD WITH NO FATHER, OR NO HUSBAND OR NO SON BECAUSE A 17 POLICE OFFICER HELD A COCNED GUN IN HIS BACN. THE MAN WASN'T 18 RESISTING, HE WAS DOING HIS JOB, BUT THE POLICE OFFICER WAS 19 20 SEARCHING, NOW THE POLICE OFFICER MAY HAVE MADE A MISTAKE 21 ABOUT SEARCHING, ALL RIGHT, YOU MAKE MISTANES, WE ALL DU; I 22 DON'T THINK AN AMERICAN SHOULD BE CONDEMNED FOR THAT. BUT 23 THERE IS NO REASON FOR TAKING OUT A REVOLVER AND HOLDING IT IN THIS MAN'S BACK AND CERTAINLY NOT COCNED. 24

25 Q. YOU ARE STATING WHAT WE HAVE NOW?

THAT'S RIGHT, THE LAW THAT I CITE TO YOU IS A. 1 2 CASE LAW AND THAT'S WHY IT DOESN'T HAVE THE EFFECT II SHOULD HAVE. IF WE HAD A STATUSE WHICH WOULD PROSCRIBE PENALTIES, 3 THEN I THINN IT WOULD MAKE A DIFFERENCE. 4 5 CHAIRMAN RHODES: MR. BOWSER, WHILE WE ARE TRYING TO PASS 6 Q. THIS LEGISLATION, IF WE DO WHAT YOU SUGGESTED TO US, THAT 7 WOULD TAKE TIME, AS YOU KNOW. 8 9 A. YES. 10 Q. IT PROBABLY CAN'T BE PASSED THIS YEAR. 11 A. YES. WHAT WOULD YOU SUGGEST IN THE MEANTIME? 12 Q. 13 Α. I REALLY DON'T THINK ANYTHING CAN BE DONE LEGISLATIVELY. 14 15 Q. I AM NOT SUGGESTING LEGISLATIVELY, WHAT CAN THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA DO IN THE INTERIM BETWEEN 16 17 THE PASSAGE OF LEGISLATION AND THE SITUATION AS IT EXISTS NOW? 18 19 A. I THINN THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA 20 COULD, THROUGH L.E.A.A. OR THROUGH DIRECT APPROPRIATION, FUND 21 A LOCAL INVESTIGATORY AGENCY, PROVIDE FUNDS TO THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE TO CONDUCT INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATIONS OF 22 THESE CASES. 23 RIGHT NOW, FOR EXAMPLE, ONE OF THE DISTRICT 24 25 ATTORNEY'S CHIEF INVESTIGATORS, I DON'T WANT TO MENTION HIS

NAME, I DON'T WANT TO GET HIM IN ANY MORE TROUBLE, IS A MAN 1 2 WHO REQUESTED TO GO TO THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. THEY DIDN'T WAN! TO LET HIM GU. 3 4 SINCE HE WENT ANYWAY, THEY ARE THREATENING TO TAKE AWAY HIS PENSION AND EVERYTHING ELSE, BECAUSE HE WENT WITH THE 5 DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S, WHO THE POLICE DEPARTMENT DOESN'T LINE. 6 SO IF THE STATE, PARTICULARLY SINCE WE HAVE 7 A DISTRICT ATTORNEY NOT AFRAID TO INHEPENDENILY AND 8 AGGRESSIVELY INVESTIGATE THESE COMPLAIN(S, IF THE STATE WOULD 9 PROVIDE THESE FUNDS, TO INVESTIGATE THOSE COMPLAINTS, THAT 10 COULD HAPPEN RIGHT NOW. 11 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WHITE. 12 **REPRESENTATIVE WHITE:** 13 WE HAD TESTIMONY FROM REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 14 Q. 15 DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE WHO POINTED OUT TO US THEY ARE 16 HAVING DIFFICULTY GETTING POLICE RECORDS TO CONDUCT INVESTIGATIONS. 17 THAT'S TRUE. 18 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: IT WILL TANE US TIME --19 20 ONE OF THEIR MAIN PROBLEMS, THEY HAVE AT A. THEIR DISPOSAL LEGAL TOOLS, BUT THEY DON'T HAVE THE MANPOWER 21 22 TO GET AN INJUNCTION TO FORCE THEM TO TURN OVER THE RECORDS. 23 THAT'S WHY I SAID IF THEY HAD THE FUNNING FOR THE ADDITIONAL 24 MANPOWER, FOR THE AUDITIONAL INVESTIGATION, THEY COULD, 25 THROUGH THE COURTS, GET THE RECORDS FASTER AND COULD CONDUCT

1 THE INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATIONS. CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE SCIRICA HAS A 2 3 QUESTION. REPRESENTATIVE SCIKICA: 4 5 MR. BOWSER, YOU INDICATED THERE ARE CERTAIN Q. LEGISLATIVE REMEDIES THAT CITY COUNCIL SHOULD CONSIDER AS 6 WELL, BUT I TAKE IT FROM YOUR STATEMENT THAT THE MAIN PROBLEM 7 IS ADMINISTRATIVE. YOU INDICATED THAT THE MAYOR OF ANY 8 MAYOR, GO A LONG WAY TOWARDS REMEDYING THIS PROBLEM SIMPLY BY 9 TANING CERTAIN ACTIONS. 10 11 DO YOU HAVE ANYTHING IN MIND WHEN YOU SAY 12 THAT? YES. AS I SAID BEFORE, THE MAYOR BY 13 A. ESTABLISHING A POLICY, FOR EXAMPLE, OF TAKING DISCIPLINARY 14 ACTION AGAINST POLICE OFFICERS WHO ARE NOT ONLY CONVICTED OF 15 A CRIME BUT POLICE OFFICERS WHO ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR VERDICTS 16 AGAINST THE CITY. 17 THERE ARE POLICE OFFICERS RESPONSIBLE FOR 18 19 THIS CITY HAVING TO PAY OVER A HALF MILLION DOLLARS IN THE SHENANDOAH CASE WHERE THIS AMERICAN INDIAN WAS NICKED TO 20 21 DEATH, AND NOTHING HAPPENED TO THEM. IF YOU WORK FOR A 22 PRIVATE EMPLOYER AND CAUSE A HALF MILLION DULLAR LOSS TO THE 23 COMPANY, SOMETHING WOULD HAPPEN TO YOU, YOU WOULD GET DEMOTED OR PROBABLY FIRED. NOTHING HAPPENED TO HIM. 24 25 THE GAGLIARDI CASE, OVER A HUNDRED THOUSAND

DOLLARS; NOTHING HAPPENED TO THE POLICE OFFICER. 1 AND I THINK IF THERE WAS DISCIPLINARY ACTION 2 3 TAKEN IN THIS AREA -- NOW I AM NOT SUGGESTING THAT EVERY COMPLAINT SHOULD RESULT IN DISCIPLINE TO POLICE BECAUSE EVERY 4 5 COMPLAINT IS NOT JUSTIFIED; BUT WHERE THERE IS A FINAL DETERMINATION BY THE COURT AND JUKY -- WHICH IS THE ULTIMATE 6 7 DETERMINATION IN THIS COUNTRY -- THAT THERE HAS BUEN POLICE BRUTALITY, THERE SHOULD BE SOME PUNITIVE ACTION TANEN 8 9 AGAINST THE PERSON WHO DID If. 10 AND THE MAYOR RIGHT NOW HAS THE POWER TO DO 11 IT. CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANN YOU VERY MUCH, MR. 12 BOWSER, FOR COMING FORWARD AND TESTIFYING TONIGHT. 13 (WITNESS EXCUSED.) 14 15 NOW WE WILL GO TO OUR NEXT WITNESS, MR. 16 CULP. 17 DO YOU HAVE IN YOUR POSSESSION A SUBPOENA TO APPEAR TONIGHT? 18 19 MR. CULP: YES, I DO. 20 ----LEROY CULP, 2331 N. 10TH SIREET, 21 22 PHILADELPHIA, PA., SWORN. 23 CHAIRMAN RHODES: PLEASE PROCEED, MK. CULP. 24 I WAS WALKING ON GERMANTOWN AVENUE WITH MY Α. 25 TWO SONS. AS WE APPROACHED GERMANIOWN AND LEHIGH AND I SAW

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AN INCIDENT, ABOUT 12 OR 13 FELLOWS STARTED WALKING TOWARDS 1 THE OTHER SIDE. 2 3 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHEN WAS THIS, MR. CULP? AROUND SIX YEARS AGO. AND I WALKED DOWN TO 4 A. 5 GERMANTOWN AND SOMERSET; AND AS I APPROACHED I SEEN A FELLOW ON THE GROUND HANDCUFFED. BUT IN THE MEANTIME, 12 OR 13 6 7 FELLOWS WERE INTERFERING WITH THE POLICE MANING AN ARREST. 8 AND I SAID: "FELLOWS, DON'T INTERFERE WITH THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. LET THEM MAKE THE ARREST, AND I WILL 9 10 MANE THE COMPLAINT FOR YOU. I KNEW A COUPLE OF THE FELLOWS, 11 THEY PLAYED TENNIS IN HIGH SCHOOL. IN THE MEANTIME THEY BACKED OFF, OKAY, THEY AGREED FOR ME TO GO TO THE PULICE 12 STATION AND MAKE THE COMPLAINT IN THEIR BEHALF. 13 14 ONE OFFICER, I APPROACHED HIM, HE AGREED 15 THAT HE WOULD DRIVE ME UP TO 25TH POLICE DISTRICT, FRONT AND 16 WESTMORELAND. IN THE MEANTIME HE TOLD ME, JUST TAKE YOUR 17 TWO CHILDREN HOME FIRST, THEN I WILL DRIVE YOU UP TO MANE THE COMPLAINT." SO I GOT IN THE CAR, LET HIM DRIVE ME HOME, 18 19 DROVE UP TO THE POLICE STATION AND HE LET ME OUT AND HE 20 PROCEEDED ON. 21 I WALKED INTO THE POLICE STATION, I TOLD THE 22 SERGEANT I WOULD LIKE TO SPEAK TO THE LIEUTENANT OR WHOEVER 23 WAS IN CHARGE TO MAKE THE COMPLAINT IN BEHALF OF THE FELLOWS 24 AT EDISON HIGH SCHOOL. IN THE MEANTIME SOME OFFICERS CAME IN AND 25

1	SAID, "YOU'RE UNDER ARREST." I SAID "ARREST OF WHAT?" "I'M
2	PLACING YOU UNDER ARRESI." I SAID, "I JUST CAME UP HERE TO
3	MAKE A COMPLAINT IN BEHALF OF THE EDISON HIGH SCHOOL FELLOWS
4	BECAUSE I DIDN'T WAN' TO SEE NO RIOT STARTED."
5	THE NEXT THING I NNEW I WAS HANDCUFFED,
6	TAKEN UPSTAIRS TO CHECK, IN THE MEANTIME I WENT UPSTAIRS
7	AND CHECKED, THE SERGEANT CAME OUT AND STARTED QUESTIONING
8	ME. HE ASKED ME WHAT HAPPENED, AND I TOLD HIM WHAT I WAS UP
9	THERE FOR,
10	CHAIRMAN RHODES: STILL IN HANDCUFFS?
11	A. NO, THEY HAD TAKEN THE HANDCUFFS OFF ME
12	AFTER I GOT UPSTAIRS.
13	CHAIRMAN RHODES: DID THEY TELL YOU WHAT YOU
14	WERE UNDER ARREST FOR?
15	A. NO, THEY STILL DIDN'T TELL ME WHAT I WAS
16	UNDER ARREST FOR.
17	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THE NATURE OF THE CHARGES?
18	A. THE NATURE OF THE CHARGES AT ALL.
19	CHAIRMAN RHODES: GO AHEAD.
20	A. I EXPLAINED TO THE SERGEANT THAT I WAS
21	WALKING ON GERMANTOWN AVENUE WITH MY TWO KIDS AND I SAW THIS
22	CROWD, FELLOWS INTERFERING WITH THE POLICE MANING AN
23	APPREHENSION; AND I EXPLAINED TO THEM THAT I WOULD GO UP
24	THERE AND MAKE A COMPLAINT FOR THEM, AND THEY AGREED.
25	AND HE TOOK MY STATEMENT HE READ ME MY

1 RIGHTS AND EVERYTHING, AND HE COULDN'T FIGURE OUT HIMSELF WHY 2 I WAS UP THERE. I STILL HAD TO MAKE THE COMPLAINT. I MADE A PHONE CALL TO MY WIFE AND SHE MADE A COUPLE OF PHONE CALLS 3 FOR ME. AND ABOUT --Δ REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: YOU WERE MAKING THE 5 COMPLAINT TO THE DETECTIVE OR TO SOMEBODY ELSE? 6 I GAVE HIM MY STATEMENT OF WHAT HAPPENED. 7 A. Q. TO THE DETECTIVE? 8 9 A. THE DETECTIVE UNSTAIRS. YOU THOUGHT THAT WAS THE COMPLAINT THAT YOU 10 Q. WERE FILING AGAINST THE POLICE? 11 NO, HE WAS ASKING ME --12 A. 13 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: HE WAS ASKING YOU ABOUT 14 YOUR ARREST, RIGHT? 15 Α. MY ARREST. 16 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: AND YOU WERE TELLING HIM 17 ABOUT WHAT HAD HAPPENED; AND YOU THOUGH (THAT BY DOING THAT YOU WERE ALSO FILING A COMPLAINT AGAINST THE POLICE? 18 NO, I WAS FILING IT IN BEHALF OF THE 19 A. STUDENTS, THAT'S WHY I WAS THERE. 20 CHAIRMAN RHODES: GO AHEAD, MK. CULP. WE 21 22 UNDERSTAND. 23 AND AROUND 3:00 O'CLOCK, THEY HAD TAKEN ME Α. DOWNSTAIRS AND PLACED ME IN A VAN AND TAKEN ME DOWN TO THE 24 25 ROUNDHOUSE. I STILL HADN'T BEEN CHARGED WITH ANYTHING.

ABOUT 7:00 O'CLOCK MY HEARING CAME UP AND --1 WELL, IT WAS A COUPLE OF CHARGES, AND I WAS RELEASED ON MY 2 3 OWN RECOGNIZANCE. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHAT WERE YOU CHARGED WITH, 4 MR. CULP? 5 A. STARTING A RIOT --6 7 CHAIRMAN RHODES: INCITING A RIOT? INCITING A RIOT, HATING WHITE PEOPLE -- IT 8 A. WAS ABOUT SIX OR SEVEN CHARGES. 9 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DISORDERLY CONDUCT? 10 ACTUALLY I DIDN'T KNOW UNTIL I GOT --11' Α. 12 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: YOU SAID INCITING A RIOT AND SOMETHING ABOUT WHITE PEOPLE? 13 14 A. HATING WHITE PEOPLE. CHAIRMAN RHODES: YOU WERE CHARGED WITH HATING 15 WHITE PEOPLE? 16 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THAT WAS WRITTEN DOWN 17 ON A PIECE OF PAPER AS A CHARGE? 18 A. THAT'S WHAT THE POLICE OFFICER SAID AT THE 19 POLICE STATION. 20 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: ARE YOU SURE? 21 22 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: DO YOU HAVE A COPY OF THAT COMPLAINI? 23 24 A. ND. CHAIRMAN RHODES: THE POLICE OFFICER VERBALLY 25

1 TOLD YOU THAT?

2 A. IN FRONT OF THE JUDGE. CHAIRMAN RHODES: IN FRONT OF THE JUDGE? 3 STARTING A RIOT, HATING WHITE PEOPLE ---4 Α. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: 5 INCITING A RIOT IS A CRIME, BUT THERE IS NO CRIME ON THE BOONS CALLED HATING WHITE 6 PEOPLE. 7 HE TOLD THE JUDGE THAT. 8 A. 9 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: IN ORDER TO INFLUENCE 10 THE JUDGE? I DON'T KNOW. 11 A. 12 CHAIRMAN RHODES: YOU MAY PROCEED, MR. CULP. AND BEFORE I LEFT THE POLICE STATION UP 13 A. THERE AT FRONT AND WESTMORELAND, THE SERGEAN) TOLD ME DON'T 14 WORRY ABOUT IT, HE DIDN'T BELIEVE THE STORY OF WHAT TOON 15 16 PLACE OF THE INCIDENT, I MEAN WHAT THE POLICE SAID TO THEM. AND AT THE HEARING, JUST BEFORE THE HEARING STARTED I WENT 17 18 OVER TO THE SERGEAN(; HE WAS TALKING TO ME, HE SAID, "DON'T WORRY ABOUT IT, YOU ARE INNOCENT AND EVERYTHING IS ALL 19 20 RIGHT." BUT AT THE POLICE STATION THE PRINCIPAL CAME 21 22 UP -- I'M SORRY, I WILL GO BACK TO THE POLICE STATION. THE PRINCIPAL FOR EDISON HE CAME TO THE POLICE STATION, THE 23 STUDENT THAT WAS ARRESTED, HE WAS A LITTLE BANGED UP AND 24 PLACED IN A CELL. THIS WAS TOLD TO ME FROM THE PRINCIPAL, 25

AND AT THE HEARING 1 THEY DROPPED THE CHARGES. 2 3 BUT THE IDEA IS MANING A COMPLAINT -- GOING TO THE POLICE STATION AND MANING A COMPLAINT AND END UP BEING 4 ARRESTED, SPENDING QUITE A FEW HOURS IN THERE AND LOSING TIME 5 FROM WORK. 6 7 CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS THAT THE END OF YOUR TESTIMONY, MK. CULP? 8 9 BEFORE YOU GO ON; JUST FOR YOUR INFORMATION; 10 YOU ARE NOT THE FIRST PERSON WHO TESTIFIED TO THE SUBCOMMITTEE THAT THEY WERE ARRESTED TRYING TO MAKE A 11 12 COMPLAINT. DO YOU HAVE ANOTHER INCIDENT? 13 WELL, THIS HERE ON MY BROTHER ABOUT TWO 14 A. YEARS AGO, IT WAS IN THE PAPER JULY 16, 1978, ON THE MAYOR 15 ABOUT BRUTALITY; AND I WILL ELABORATE ON SOME OF IT BECAUSE 16 THERE'S STILL SOME LITIGATION GOING TO COURT WHERE FRANK 17 RIZZO, NNOWING HE DON'T LIKE TO COOPERATE WITH THE LAWYER, 18 WAS FINED \$350 IN FEDERAL COURT, AND STATED MITCHELL CULP WAS 19 OUT TO GET HIM, BIG GUNS AND ALL THIS, LINE GO TO THE 20 21 COURTROOM WHERE THE CASE IS, LINE, SET UP WITH THE JUDGES. 22 AND WHAT HAPPENED, I HAD FILED A COMPLAINT 23 DIRECTLY WITH THE MAYOR'S OFFICE AND THE INCIDENT -- THEY HAD 24 CALLED THE HOUSE AND WANFED US TO COME DOWN AND COMPROMISE ON THE BRUTALITY CASE WITH MY BROTHER. WE TOLD THEM NO, WE 25

NOWLDN'T COME DOWN AND COMPROMISE; OTHERWISE, THEY WOULD DROP 1 THE CHARGES AGAINST HIM IF HE DROPPED THE CHARGES --2 3 CHAIRMAN RHODES: AS SUCCINCTLY AS YOU CAN SAY IT, WHAT WERE THE ALLEGATIONS OF BRUIALITY INVOLVING YOUR 4 5 BROTHER? HE HAD BEEN STOPPED AT TENTH AND BROWN FOR 6 A. 7 GOING THROUGH A STOP SIGN, AND AT THE HEARING THE PULICE ADMITTED THEY BIDN'T DO ANYTHING WRONG. THE CASE WAS THROWN 8 9 OUT OF COURT. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHAT DID THEY DO AFTER HE 10 WENT THROUGH THE STOP SIGN? 11 12 A. THEY STOPPED HIM AND ASKED FOR 13 IDENTIFICATION. CHAIRMAN RHODES: THAT'S ALL THEY DID? 14 15 THE POLICE HAD TANEN HIS IDENTIFICATION ---A. HE HAD IDENTIFICATION AND A STARTER PISTOL IN HIS HAND. THE 16 POLICE TOOK THE IDENTIFICATION AND LEFT THE STARTER PISTOL; 17 18 WALNED AWAY, CAME BACK AND GAVE HIM HIS IDENTIFICATION. 19 AND THEY HAD TAKEN HIM DOWN TO THE POLICE STATION AND THEY BROKE HIS LEG IN ABOUT SIX OK SEVEN 20 21 DIFFEREN(PLACES. CHAIRMAN RHODES: THEY TOON HIM TO THE POLICE 22 STATION AND BROKE HIS LEG? 23 24 THEY HAD CALLED A BACK-UP TEAM --A. 25 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: IN HOW MANY PLACES?

1	A. I THINN DAVE NNOWS SOMETHING TOO ABOUT IT.
2	THEY CALLED A BACK-UP TEAM AND CALLED A
3	PADDY WAGON TO TAKE HIM DOWN TO THE POLICE STATION.
4	HE WAS BEATEN WITH THE HANDCUFFS BEHIND HIS
5	BACK, AND HIS LEGS WERE BRONEN IN SIX DIFFERENT PLACES.
6	CHAIRMAN RHODES: HIS NAME WAS MITCHELL CULP?
7	A. YES.
8	CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHEN DID THIS INCIDENT OCCUR?
9	A. ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO.
10	CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS THAT IT, MR. CULP?
11	A. OH, AT THE HEARING OF THE WHOLE THING THE
12	POLICE ADMITTED THAT HE DIDN'T DO ANYTHING WRONG IN THE
13	BEGINNING. ALL THE CHARGES AND EVERYTHING WAS DROPPED
14	AGAINST HIM.
15	REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON:
16	Q. MR. CULP, LET ME ASK YOU THIS QUESTION:
17	THAT CONCERNS YOUR BROTHER'S CASE?
18	A. MY BROTHER'S CASE.
19	Q. CAN WE ASK THAT YOU LEAVE THAT COPY SO WE
20	CAN MAKE COPIES AVAILABLE TO MAKE IT A PART OF THIS RECORD?
21	BECAUSE WITH THE PROBLEM OF THE ACOUSTICS AND SOUND AND
22	EVERYTHING, WE CAN'T CLEARLY UNDERSTAND WHAT THESE PROBLEMS
23	ARE CONCERNING YOUR BROTHER'S CASE. AFTER HE WAS STOPPED
24	WITH THE STARTER PISTOL, WHAT HAPPENED IS NOT CLEAR.
25	A. THERE ARE SOME IMPORTANT THINGS THAT I CAN'T

DISCUSS. I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE IT TO THE COMMITTEE AND POINT 1 2 OUT SOME THINGS WHICH YOU WOULD HAVE TO LOOK INTO IT. IT'S VERY IMPORTANT, BECAUSE WHEN YOU HAVE A BRUIALITY CASE, 3 CERTAIN THING GO DN, EVIDENCE GETS LOST; AND I THINN THE 4 COMMITTEE SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THEM. 5 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: YOU FILED A SUIT 6 FOR YOUR BROTHER? 7 YES. 8 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: QUESTIONS FROM THE COMMITTEE. 9 BEFORE WE START, I WOULD LINE TO ACKNOWLEDGE 10 THE PRESENCE OF REPRESENTATIVE MARN COHEN, A MEMBER OF THE 11 SUBCONMITTEE, TO MY EXTREME LEFT. 12 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESEN(ATIVE JOHNSON. 13 REPRESENTATIVE JOHNSON: 14 15 WHAT WAS THE COMPLAINT YOU WERE GOING TO Q. 16 FILE WITH THE POLICE DEPARTMENT WHEN YOU WERE ARRESTED YOURSELF? YOU NEVER TOLD US THAT. 17 MY COMPLAIN 1? I TOLD THE FELLOWS I WOULD GO 18 Α. UP THERE AND MANE A COMPLAINT, DON'T INTERFERE WITH THE 19 20 POLICE DEPARTMENT, DON'T INTERFERE WITH THE POLICE MAKING AN 21 ARREST; I WILL MAKE A COMPLAINT. 22 Q. WHAT WAS THE COMPLAINT, POLICE BRUTALITY ON 23 THE YOUNG MAN? WHAT WAS THE COMPLAINT? POLICE BRUTALITY BECAUSE THE FELLOW, HE 24 Α. 25 DIDN'T DO ANYTHING WRONG. AFTER I TALNED TO THE FELLOW HE

1	DIDN'T DO ANYTHING WRONG AND THEY ADMITTED IT.
2	EVERYTHING WAS DROPPED, THEY SQUASHED THE
3	CASE, THE STUDENT AT EDISON HIGH SCHOOL. IT NEVER CAME TO
4	TRIAL, IT WAS SQUASHED.
5	CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS.
6	Q. WE HAVE HAD TESTIMONY THAT VERY FEW BLACK
7	FAMILIES IN PHILADELPHIA ARE UNTOUCHED BY POLICE VIOLENCE OR
8	POLICE ABUSE; YOUR FAMILY WAS TOUCHED TWICE; AT LEAST.
9	I JUST WANT TO BE CLEAR: DO YOU HAVE THE
10	PAPER THAT GAVE THE CHARGES WHEN YOU WERE ARRESIED?
11	A. NO, I DIDN'T RECEIVE ANYTHING.
12	Q. YOU DIDN'T RECEIVE ANY PAPER?
13	A. THEY DIDN'T GIVE ME ANYTHING.
14	Q. YOU WENT TO 11TH AND WINTER?
15	A. FOR A HEARING, I WENT TO THE HEARING AT 11TH
16	AND WINTER.
17	Q, HOW LONG AGO WAS THAT?
18	A. OH, ABOUT SIX OR SEVEN YEARS AGO.
19	Q. THAT'S WHEN THEY STILL HAD PRELIMINARY
20	HEARINGS AT THE POLICE STATION FOR CERTAIN CRIMES.
21	DID YOU EVER GO TO COURT OR WAS If
22	A. NO, IT WAS DISMISSED.
23	Q. IT WAS DISMISSED AT THE MAGISTRATE'S
24	HEARING?
25	A. YES.

DID YOU READ THE CHARGE THAT HAD A CHARGE OF Q. 1 HATING WHITE PEOPLE, OR WAS THAT SOMETHING THAT WAS SAID? 2 YES, IT WAS SAID. 3 A. WAS THAT AT THE PRELIMINARY HEARING? Q. 4 THAT'S RIGHT, SIR. 5 A. DO YOU NNOW THE OFFICER'S NAME WHO SAID 6 Q. 7 THAT? NO, I DON'T. 8 A. I WANT TO BE CLEAR. YOU WERE TRYING TO 9 Q. 10 ASSIST THE POLICE AND NEEP THE YOUNG FELLOWS FROM GETTING ARRESTED FOR IN/ERFERING WITH THE POLICE; IS THAT RIGHT? 11 THAT'S RIGHT. 12 A. AS A RESULT YOU WENT TO THE POLICE STATION 13 Q. AND YOU WERE ARRESTED FOR DOING NOTHING; IS THAT RIGHT? 14 THAT'S RIGHT. 15 A. Q. YOU ARE A PERSON WHO WAS TRYING TO BE 16 COOPERATIVE AND RESPECTFUL TO THE POLICE OFFICER; YOU WERE 17 ALSO A PERSON WHO WAS TRYING TO COOL SOME YOUNG FELLOW DOWN 18 TO DO THE SAME THING? 19 20 A. YES. 21 YET YOU ENDED UP BEING ARRESTED FOR TRYING Q. 22 TO DO THAT; IS THAT RIGHT? 23 A. YES. DID YOU STRIKE ANY POLICE OFFICER AT ALL? 24 Q. 25 A. NO CONTACT.

DID YOU THREATEN TO STRIKE ANY POLICE Q. 1 2 OFFICER? NO, I DIDN'T. 3 Α. AT THE POLICE STATION WAS THERE ANYBODY WHO Q. 4 5 COULD HEAR WHAT YOU HAD TO SAY BEFORE YOU WERE ARRESTED? IN OTHER WORDS --6 NO, SIR, NO ONE AT ALL. 7 Α. Q. DID ANY POLICE OFFICER SAY TO ANYBODY ELSE 8 THAT YOU DID COMMIT A CRIME AND YOU WERE ARRESTED? 9 10 Α. THE ONLY PERSON WHO SAID ANYTHING WAS THE DETECTIVE SERGEANI UPSTAIRS. 11 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THANK YOU. THAT IS 12 13 ALL. CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANN YOU, REPRESENTATIVE 14 WILLIAMS. 15 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE, DO YOU HAVE ANY 16 17 QUESTIONS? REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: NO. 18 19 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER. 20 REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER: 21 Q. YOU SAID YOUR BROTHER'S LEG WAS BROKEN IN SIX DIFFERENT PLACES. COULD YOU TELL THIS COMMITTEE WHAT 22 23 SORT OF METHOD WAS USED TO DO THAT? 24 IT WAS A STICK. Α. 25 CHAIRMAN RHODES: A NIGHTSTICN?

1 Α. YES. **REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER:** 2 THAT'S THE ONLY METHOD THAT WAS USED? 3 Q. YES, THE ONLY METHOD THAT I KNOW OF. A. 4 CHAIRMAN RHODES: ALL RIGHT, THANK YOU, 5 6 REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER. 7 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI, DO YOU HAVE ANY 8 QUESTIONS? 9 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: I HAVE SEVERAL 10 QUESTIONS. REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: 11 12 I AM NOT CLEAR. YOU SAID WHEN YOU WALKED UP Q. TO BREAN UP THIS INCIDENT, THE STUDENT WAS HANDCUFFED. WHEN 13 YOU SAW HIM IN HANDCUFFS, WAS HE MARKED UP AT ALL OR HAD HE 14 BEEN BEATEN AT ALL? 15 16 NO, HE WAS LAYING ON THE GROUND. Α. BUT YET, LATER THE PRINCIPAL OF EDISON TOLD 17 Q. YOU HE HAD BEEN BEATEN? 18 THIS WAS AT THE POLICE STATION, NOT AT THE 19 A. SCENE. 20 21 Q. HE HAD TOLD YOU HE HAD BEEN BEATEN? 22 THE INCIDENT UP TO THE POLICE STATION, HE A. 23 WAS ROUGHED AROUND AT THE POLICE STATION. 24 Q. OH, BUT HE WASN'T ON THE SCENE? 25 NO, NOT ON THE SCENE, NOT ON THE SCENE. A.

WHEN I GET THERE HE WAS LAYING ON THE GROUND. 1 AS OF YOUR KNOWLEDGE, WHEN YOU WALKED UP TO 2 Q. THAT INCIDENT, DID YOU SEE POLICE BRUTALITY? 3 NO, SIR. A. 4 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: THANN YOU. 5 CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS YOUR BROTHER HERE, MR. 6 CULP? 7 A. NO. HE IS NOT HERE. 8 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANK YOU, MR. CULP. 9 (WITNESS EXCUSED.) 10 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THE NEXT WITNESS IS MK. 11 PRENTICE CHANDLER. 12 13 MK, CHANDLER, DO YOU ACKNOWLEDGE THAT YOU 14 HAVE IN YOUR POSSESSION A SUBPOENA TO APPEAR HERE TONIGHT? MR. CHANULER: YES. 15 16 PRENTICE L. CHANDLER, SWORN. 17 CHAIRMAN RHODES: STATE YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS 18 19 FOR THE RECORD. 20 MY NAME IS PRENTICE L. CHANDLER. I LIVE AT A. 21 2335 PIERCE STREET, SOUTH PHILADELPHIA. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHY DON'T YOU PROCEED AND 22 RELATE TO US THE INCIDENT YOU WOULD LIKE TO TELL US ABOUT. 23 24 Α. ON JUNE 27TH, I THINK IS THE EXACT DATE, I 25 CAME HOME FROM WORN ---

CHAIRMAN RHODES: JUNE 27TH OF THIS YEAR? 1 THIS YEAR, 1978. AND I CAME HOME FROM WORK 2 A. 3 AROUND 5:00 O'CLOCN. AND THE NIDS IN THE BLOCK HAD THE FIREPLUG ON AND THEY WERE CHASING EACH OTHER THROUGH THE 4 BLOCK GOING IN THE WATER, AND TO KEEP FROM GETTING WET 5 MYSELF BECAUSE THEY WERE WETTING SOME OF THE GROWNUPS, I WENT 6 IN THE HOUSE. NOBODY WAS IN THE HOUSE BUT ML, MY WIFE -- THE 7 WHOLE FAMILY WAS OUTSIDE. 8 I WENT IN THE HOUSE, HAD MY DINNER, TOON MY 9 10 SHOES OFF, MY SHIRT OFF, AND WAS SITTING THERE WATCHING 11 TELEVISION. WHEN ALL OF A SUDDEN THERE WAS THIS KNOCKING ON MY DOOR. THIS WAS BETWEEN 5:30 AND QUARTER OF 6:00. AND ONE 12 OF THE KIDS WAS FRANTICALLY SCREAMING FOR ME TO GO DOWN TO 13 THE CORNER, THE POLICEMEN WERE DOWN THERE BEATING UP MY TWO 14 15 BOYS. I STUCK MY FEET IN MY SHOES AND PUT MY SHIRT 16 17 ON WITHOUT BUTTONING IT, WITHOUT TYING MY SHOES I RAN OUT THE HOUSE AND RAN TO THE CORNER TO SEE WHAT WAS GOING ON. 18 19 AS I GOT TO THE CORNER I COULD SEE THESE POLICEMAN, SEVERAL OF THEM WITH MY TWO BUYS, ONE BEING 16 AND 20 ONE BEING 19, UP AGAINST THE WALL AND HAD THESE STICKS, WHILE 21 22 OTHER POLICEMEN WERE HOLDING THEM THEY WERE HITTING THEM WITH 23 THEIR STICKS. 24 I RAN IN THE MIDDLE OF --25 CHAIRMAN RHODES:

HOLD IT, ARE YOU TESTIFYING THAT YOUK TWO 1 Q. SONS WERE BEING HELD BY POLICE OFFICERS UP AGAINST THE WALL? 2 3 A. AND BEATEN. IS THAT YOUR TESTIMONY? Q. 4 5 A. THAT IS MY TESTIMONY. THE OFFICERS WERE HOLDING YOUR SONS WITH Q. 6 BOTH HANDS UP AGAINST THE WALL? 7 8 A. NOT EXACTLY LINE THAT. 9 Q. EXPLAIN TO US WHAT YOU SAN. 10 WHAT I SAW -- THE FIRST ONE THAT I SAW WAS A. 11 MY OLDEST SON, 19. ONE OFFICER HAD A STICK UNDER HIS NECK, HAD HIS NIGHTSTICK UP UNDER HIS THROAT LIKE THIS. 12 (INDICATING) 13 14 ANOTHER OFFICER WAS TO HIS RIGHT WITH HIS ARMS AROUND HIM; AND THIS OTHER OFFICER WAS ON HIS LEFT SIDE 15 WITH HIS NIGHTSTICK AND IN THIS MANNER WAS THRUSTING THE 16 NIGHTSTICK INTO HIS STOMACH AND CHEST AREA. 17 HOW FORCIBLY WAS HE DOING THIS? 18 Q. WELL IT SEEMED TO ME, IT SEEMS AS HE WAS 19 A. DOING IT AS HARD AS HE POSSIBLY COULD. 20 21 Q. HOW BIG A POLICE OFFICER WAS IT? 22 THIS PARTICULAR POLICE OFFICER WHO WAS DUING Α. 23 THIS WITH THE NIGHTSTICN WAS JUST A MEDIUM BUILD POLICE 24 OFFICER. BUT HE WAS DOING IT AS HARD AS HE COULD? 25 Ω.

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A. IT SEEMED TO ME THAT HE WAS DUING IT AS HARD 1 2 AS HE COULD, WITH THE FULL THRUST OF HIS NIGHTSTICK. 3 WAS YOUR SON MAKING ANY OUTCRY? Q. WELL, HE HAD HIM BY THE THROAT. 4 A. 5 Q. WHAT ABOUT YOUR OTHER SON? MY OTHER SON THEY HAD HIM UP IN LINE A 6 A. 7 LITTLE ALLEYWAY -- IT'S NOT AN ALLEYWAY, BUT A DOORWAY. I 8 DIDN'T SEE HIM AT FIRST, I SAN MY OLDEST SON. BUT AS I 9 DARTED TOWARDS THE MIDDLE OF THE STREET TO SEE WHAT WAS GOING 10 ON, I SAW THEY HAD MY YOUNGER SON, 16, UP IN THIS LITTLE 11 DOORWAY. 12 Q. GO AHEAD. 13 AND AS I TRIED TO IDENTIFY MYSELF, I RAN IN A. 14 THE MIDDLE OF THE STREET WHERE THE OFFICERS WERE AND I TRIED 15 TO IDENTIFY MYSELF AS BEING THE FATHER. THIS ONE OFFICER WHO I WILL NEVER FORGET NAMED LYNCH, GRABBED ME AND SHOVED ME ---16 17 BECAUSE I WAS ALREADY IN A RUNNING MOTION -- HE SHOVED ME AGAINST THE WALL AND SAID, "YOU ARE GOING WITH THEM TOD." 18 19 I SAID," I AM THE FATHER, I AM TRYING TO 20 FIND OUT WHAT IS GOING ON. . AND THAT'S WHEN A COUPLE OF THE 21 OTHER OFFICERS AND LYNCH, THEY GRABBED ME AND THEY PINNED ME UP AGAINST THE WALL AND THEY STARTED TO HIT ME WITH THE 22 23 STICKS.

24Q.WHEN YOU SAY THEY STARTED TO HIT YOU WITH25THE STICKS, DID THEY HIT YOU IN THE SAME MANNER AS THEY DID

1 YOUR SONS?

2 WELL, TWO OFFICERS GRABBED ME -- LET ME A. 3 EXPLAIN EXACTLY AS IT HAPPENED: TWO OFFICERS GRABBED ME; AND AS THE OFFICERS GRABBED ME, ONE OFFICER WHICH I DUN'T 4 REMEMBER, ALL I REMEMBER IS HIM BEING A TALL THIN OFFICER, 5 TRIED TO COME OVER WITH HIS SHICK, BUY I BROKE MY HAND LOOSE 6 AND I GRABBED THE STICK. AND WHEN I GRABBED THE STICK, BY 7 8 THIS TIME SEVERAL OFFICERS WRESTLED ME AROUND THE SIDE OF THE 9 BUILDING.

10 AND THEN THIS OFFICER CAME BACK AROUND ---AND IT WAS ONE BLACK OFFICER AMONG THEM AND HE PUT HIMSELF 11 12 BETWEEN ME AND THESE OTHER OFFICERS. AND THIS THIN OFFICER WHO TRIED TO HIT ME WITH THE STICN THE FIRST TIME COULDN'T 13 GET OVER TOP TO HIT ME, SO HE HIT ME ON MY LEG. I COULD 14 15 STAND UP AND SHOW YOU. THEN I WAS STRUGGLING, I HAD ONE LEG 16 LINE THIS, HE STARTED TU POP ME IN THIS AREA OF MY LEG WITH 17 THAT STICK. (INDICATING)

Q. WHAT WOULD HAVE HAPPENED TO YOU IF THAT
BLACN OFFICER HAD NOT POSTED HIMSELF BETWEEN YOU ANN -A. I COULD ONLY RENDER AN OPINION; BUT MY
OPINION IS IF THAT BLACN OFFICER HAD NOT PUT HIMSELF BETWEEN
ME AND THOSE TWO PARTICULAR OFFICERS, THAT I WOULD HAVE BEEN
IN PRETTY BAD SHAPE.

24Q.HOW MANY TIMES DID THE OFFICER STRIKE YOU?25A.I DIDN'T COUNT THE TIMES, BUT I) WAS

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1 CONTINUOUS. DID YOU HAVE ANY IDEA OF WHAT WAS GOING ON 2 Q. AT THAT TIME WITH YOUR SONS? 3 NO, BECAUSE AS I SAID THEY WRESTLED ME A. 4 AROUND THE CORNER. I COULD NOT SEE WHAT WAS HAPPENING TO MY 5 OTHER TWO BOYS. 6 7 BUT WHEN THEY GOT THE HANDCUFFS ON ME AND THEY HAD TAKEN ME BACK TO THROW ME IN THE WAGON THEY STILL 8 GOT MY TWO BOYS UP AGAINST THE WALL, AND AT THIS TIME THEY'RE 9 HANDCUFFED. 10 BUT THIS ONE OFFICER LYNCH AND THIS OFFICER 11 12 --- I CAN'T THINK OF HIS NOW -- MANCINI, OFFICER MANCINI, THEY WERE STILL BEATING ON MY YOUNGEST BOY WHOSE NAME IS JEFFREY. 13 Q. FOR THE RECORD, WHAT WAS THE LOCATION OF 14 15 THIS INCIDENT? WELL, IT WAS AT 23RD STREET AT POINT BREEZE 16 A. AND PIERCE. 17 Q. DO YOU KNOW THE NAME OF THE BLACK OFFICER 18 WHO INTERPOSED? 19 20 Α. NO, I DON'T. 21 Q. WOULD YOU RECOGNIZE HIM IF YOU SAW HIM 22 TODAY? 23 A. I CERTAINLY WOULD, I WOULD RECONIZE HIM. Q+ GO AHEAD WITH YOUR ACCOUNTING. 24 MEANWHILE, WHILE ALL THIS MELEE IS GOING ON, 25 A.

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THE NAME-CALLING -- I WOULDN'T EVEN REPEAT THE NAMES THAT I 1 2 WAS CALLED OR THAT I HEARD THEM CALL MY BOYS. WE WOULD LINE YOU TO REPEAT THOSE NAMES FOR 3 Q. 4 THE RECORD. "BLACK SON OF A BITCH, BLACK MOTHERFUCKER, I 5 Α. WILL BLOW YOUR NIGGER BRAINS OUT, I WILL SCATTER YOUR NIGGER 6 GUTS OUT HERE ON THE STREET." THIS IS WHAT THEY SAID TO ME. 7 DID OFFICER LYNCH SAY THESE WORDS TO YOU? 8 Q. OFFICER LYNCH AND OFFICER MANCINI, AND THIS 9 Α. OTHER THIN OFFICER, I DON'T NNOW HIS NAME. 10 11 Q. WOULD YOU RECOGNIZE HIM IF YOU SAW HIM 12 AGAIN? 13 A. I THINK I COULD RECOGNIZE HIM; TALL, THIN BLOND OFFICER, BUT I DIDN'T SEE HIM ANYMORE. I SAW THESE 14 OTHER OFFICERS AFTER WE WERE ARRESTED. 15 Q. DO YOU NNOW WHAT DISTRICT OFFICER LYNCH AND 16 17 OFFICER MANCINI ARE FROM? THEY WERE COMING OUT OF THE 17TH DISTRICT. 18 A. 19 Q. WE HAVE HEARD OF THE 17TH DISTRICT BEFORE. 20 YEAH. A. WHAT HAPPENED NEXT, MR. CHANDLER? 21 Q. 22 WELL, THEY HANDCUFFFED US -- THEY HANDCUFFED Α. 23 ME AND THEY THREW ME INTO THE WAGON. THEY CONTINUED TO BATTLE MY OTHER TWO SONS. 24 25 AND FINALLY THEY HAD MY YOUNGEST BUY

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HANDCUFFED BEHIND HIM AND THEY WERE BRING HIM TOWARDS THE 1 2 WAGON AND ONE OF THE OFFICERS -- NOW WHICH ONE, I DUN'T NNOW 3 WHICH NOW -- HIT HIM ACROSS THE MIDDLE OF HIS BACK WITH HIS STICK AND MADE HIM FALL FLAT ON HIS FACE. 4 COULD YOU TELL US WHAT HAPPENED NEXT, MR. 5 Q. CHANDLER? 6 7 THEN THEY PICKED HIM UP AND THREW HIM IN THE Α. 8 WAGON, AFTER HE FALLS, THEY PICK HIM UP AND THROW HIM INTO 9 THE WAGON. WAS HE UNCONSCIOUS? 10 Q. NO, THEY DID NOT HIT HIM IN THE HEAD, THEY 11 A. 12 DID NOT HIT HIM IN THE HEAD. THEY HIT HIM IN THE CHEST AREA AND ALSO HIT HIM ACROSS THE BACK. 13 14 AND THEY HAD TO TAKE HIM TO THE HOSPITAL LATER ON THAT NIGHT BECAUSE HE COMPLAINED OF NECK PAINS. 15 WHAT HAPPENED NEXT, MR. CHANDLER? 16 Q. 17 WELL, THEY TOON US DOWN AND ARRESTED US. Α. 18 THEY PUT US IN THIS LITTLE ROOM, I DON'T NNOW WHAT TYPE OF 19 ROOM IT IS; BUT THESE TWO OFFICERS STILL WANTED TO GET -- MY YOUNGEST SON HE WAS SWOLLEN AND MAD. AND THEY ASKED HIM 20 21 QUESTIONS; IF HE DIDN'T ANSWER THEM FAST ENOUGH; THEY STILL 22 WANTED TO BEAT HIM. AND I HAD TU TELL HIM TO, "ANSWER HIM 23 QUICKLY AND DON'T STICN YOUR MOUTH OUT BECAUSE THEY ARE JUST 24 LOONING FOR AN EXCUSE TO REALLY DO YOU IN." AND I DIDN'T 25 WANT TO SIT THERE AND WATCH THEM DO ANYTHING ELSE BECAUSE I

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DON'T KNOW WHAT THEY WOULD HAVE DONE. 1 2 Q. WERE YOU ABLE TO TALK TO YOUK CHILDREN IN 3 THE POLICE STATION? YEAH, THEY HAD US ALL IN THE SAME ROOM. A. 4 Q. WERE YOU ALL HANDCUFFED? 5 6 WE WERE ALL HANDCUFFED. A. DID THEY TAKE THE HANDCUFFS OFF AT THE 7 Q. STATION? 8 9 A. THEY TOOK THE HANDCUFFS OFF MAYBE 15 OR 20 MINUTES LATER. I AM NOT SURE OF THE EXACT TIME, BUT IT WAS 10 11 AT LEAST 15 OR 20 MINUTES LATER WHEN THEY TOOK THE CUFFS OFF. WHEN THEY TOON THE CUFFS OFF, THEY MADE ME 12 EMPTY MY POCKETS. THE ONE POLICEMAN TOLD ME TO EMPTY MY 13 POCNETS, AND EVEN MY BILLFOLD. HE TOOK MY BILLFOLD AWAY FROM 14 HE, TOON EVERYTHING OUT OF IT, INCLUDING PICTURES AND 15 EVERYTHING DUMPED IT ON THE TABLE AND THREW IT BACK TO ME AND 16 TOLD ME TO PUT ALL THE STUFF BACK. 17 CONTINUE WITH YOUR ALCOUNT IN YOUR OWN 18 Q. 19 WORDS. AFTER THAT WE STAYED THERE FOR ABOUT -- THAT 20 A. WAS THE END OF THE PUSHING AND SHOVING, MORE OR LESS. WAS ANY PART OF THIS AGREEMENT THAT YOU Q. 6 7 WOULD NOT BRING ANY CHARGES OR SUITS AGAINST THE CITY? 8 WELL, THIS CAME ABOUT AT MY SON'S HEARING. A. DID YOU KNOW OFFICER LYNCH BEFORE THAT DAY? 5 Q. NO. 6 A. HOW ABOUT OFFICER MANCINI? 7 Q. 8 Α. NO, SIR, I DID NOT. YOU DID NOT RECOGNIZE ANY OF THOSE OFFICERS? 9 Q. I HAD NEVER SEEN THEM BEFORE. 10 A. 11 Q. YOU HAD NEVER ANY PERSONAL CONTACT WITH THEM 12 BEFORE THAT DAY? 13 A. NO. TO YOUR KNOWLEDGE, HAD YOUR SON EVER HAD ANY 14 Q. 15 PERSONAL CONTACT WITH THEM BEFORE? NO, THEY HAD NOT. MY OLDEST SON, IF I COULD 16 A. MAKE A STATEMENT, I TOLD ONE OFFICER DOWN AT THE STATION, I 17 AM 43 -- I WILL BE 43 THIS MONIH. I HAVE NEVER BEEN ARRESTED 18 19 BEFORE, I HAD NEVER HAD ANY ENCOUNTERS WITH POLICEMEN AND NEITHER HAD ANY ONE OF MY SONS -- THE YOUNGEST ONE GOT FICKED 20 UP ONE TIME WHEN HE WAS 13 YEARS OLD ON A MISTANEN IDENTITY 21 22 THING. THAT WAS THE ONLY ONE WHO HAD EVER HAD AN ENCOUNTER WITH THE POLICE FROM MY EN(IRE FAMILY. 23 24 I AM FROM THE OLD SCHOOL, I AM STRICT WITH 25 MY NIDS. THEY OBEY THE LAWS AND THE LAWS OF THE CITY OR

4	AND I HAVE LIVED PRACTICALLY ALL MY ADULT

6	THE LAW. HERE THEY ACCUSE ME OF ASSAULT.
7	I RUN DOWN TO THE CORNER AND I SEE 15 TO 16
8	POLICEMEN WITH NIGHTSTICKS AND WEAPONS AND I GO DOWN THERE
9	WITH NOTHING, AND INSULT THE OFFICER? I AM NOT CRAZY.

17	YOU, I HAVE BEEN GIVEN THE ADVICE TO DO SO BUT I THINK IT'S
18	JUST LIKE SPITTING IN THE WIND, SO I DON'T WANT TO
19	IT COST ME A SMALL FORTUNE ALREADY. I LOST
20	TIME FROM WORN; I HAD TO GET MONEY FOR A LAWYER; AND I DON'T

2 I HAD A PETITION SIGNED AND I DON'T WANT TO Α. 3 --- I DON'T NOW EXACTLY HOW MANY NAMES WERE ON THAT PETITION WHO WANTED TO BE WITNESSES, IT WAS WELL OVER 50; BUT NOBODY A 5 ASNED FOR ANY WITNESSES TO BE CALLED, THE JUDGE OK NOBODY ELSE, SO I NEVER HAD OCCASION TO USE THEM. 6 7 BUT I HAD WELL OVER 50 WITNESSES WITHOUT EXAGGERATING, IT MIGHT HAVE BEEN WELL OVER A HUNDRED, BUT I 8 9 WILL SAY 50 EYEWITNESSES TO THE INCIDENT WHO WERE WELLING TO COME TO COURT AND BE A WITNESS FOR ME FOR THE WHOLE 10 11 INCIDEN (. 12 Q. IT'S TOO BAD, REALLY, THAT YOUR ATTORNEY DIDN'T PURSUE THAT. 13 HE TOLD ME, HE SAID THE CASE IS RISKY TO TRY 14 A. NO MATTER HOW GOOD IT LOOKS. PEOPLE HAVE A TENDENCY TO 15 BELIEVE POLICEMEN, SO DO JUDGES. HE SAID, "IF YOU GOT A WAY 16 OUT, TANE THE WAY OUL BECAUSE THERE IS NO GUARANTEE THAT YOU 17 18 CAN WIN IT WHEN YOU GO TO TRIAL." SO HE IS THE ATFORNEY, HE KNOWS THE LAW; I 19 TOON HIS ADVICE. 20 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THAT'S WHY YOU HIRED HIM. 21 REPRESENTATIVE SCIKICA, ANY QUESTIONS? 22 23 REPRESENTATIVE SCIRICA: NO. 24 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON. 25 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON:

1Q.MR. CHANDLER, THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR2TESTIMONY.3COULD YOU TELL US IN YOUR OWN WORDS WHAT

4 WOULD YOUR OPINION BE OF THIS POLICE DEPARTMENT IN THE CITY 5 OF PHILADELPHIA IN MATTERS THAT ARE RELATED TO THE KINUS OF 6 ABUSE THAT WE JUST HEARD?

A. WELL, I'LL TELL YOU SIR, I HAVE READ IN THE PAPERS EVERYDAY, JUST ABOUT EVERYDAY ABOUT POLICE BRUTALITY BUT I HAVE NEVER -- I HAVE SEEN SOME POLICE ROUGHNESS, I HAVE SEEN THEM GO A LITTLE BEYOND WHAT THEY SHOULD HAVE DONE, YOU NNOW; BUT I HAVE NEVER SEEN, I HAVE NEVER WITNESSED AN ACT LINE THIS BEFORE.

13 NOW AS I SAY, I ALWAYS FELT THAT THE PULICE WAS A NECESSARY PART OF OUR LIVES BECAUSE WHEN YOU LIVE IN 14 15 POOR NEIGHBORHOODS AND I MIGHT AS WELL SAY I), THE SO-CALLED GHETTO NEIGHBORHOODS, YOU HAVE ALL NINDS OF THINGS GOING ON 16 AND SOMETIMES THE ONLY HOPE -- I HAVE BEEN GLAD TO SEE A 17 POLICE CAR, I WILL PUT IT THIS WAY. I HAVE WALKED IN CERTAIN 18 AREAS, AND WHEN I SEEN A POLICE CAR, IT MADE ME FEEL GOOD. 19 20 BUT NOT ANYMORE.

21 BUT I WILL TELL YOU THE TRUTH, FROM WHAT I 22 HAVE SEEN OVER THE LAST COUPLE OF YEARS, I HAVE GROWN TO FEAR 23 THE POLICE. I WOULD HATE TO BE STOPPED BY A POLICEMAN AND BE 24 BY MYSELF. I WOULD HATE TO BE STOPPED BY TWO POLICEMEN AND 25 BE BY MYSELF. I'D LINE TO HAVE SOMFBODY WITH ME.

IN OTHER WORDS, YOUR REACTION AT THIS POINT 1 Q. 2 IN TIME HERE IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, IS DIFFERENT FROM THE TIME PRIOR TO THIS INCIDENT THAT OCCURRED TO YOU AND YOUR 3 FAMILY? 4 5 A. VERY DEFINITELY. 6 Q. COULD YOU EXPOUND ON WHY, WHEN YOU HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO FILE A COMPLAINT, A FEDERAL COMPLAINT OR A 7 8 CIVIL SUIT, WHY DO YOU NOT WANT TO FILE IT? 9 WELL, AS I TOLD THE GENTLEMAN BEFORE, I FELT Α. 10 IT WOULD BE A WASTE OF TIME, EFFORT AND MONEY. NOW THE FIRST THING THAT STUCK IN MY MIND 11 12 WAS THE CRADLE CASE. IF HE COULD NOT WIN A CASE AGAINST THE PHILADELPHIA FOLICE DEPARTMENT FOR WHAT THEY DID TO HIM, WHAT 13 CHANCE DO I HAVE? 14 15 Q. ARE YOU REFERRING TO THE CASE IN SOCIETY HILL WHERE THERE WERE NINE WHITE WITNESSES WHO TESTIFIED THEY 16 17 SAW --RIGHT, WHITE WITNESSES. IF HE COULDN'T WIN 18 Α. 19 THAT CASE WITH WHITE PEOPLE TESTIFYING ON HIS BLHALF AS TO 20 WHAT THEY SAW, THEN I THINK I GOT A PRETTY POOR CHANCE, AND I 21 WOULD NOT WASTE MY TIME. I TELL YOU, I CAME HERE BEFORE THIS 22 23 COMMITTEE BECAUSE I WANTED TO GET THIS THING OFF MY CHEST AND WANTED PEOPLE TO KNOW WHAT WAS ACTUALLY GOING ON; AND I 24 25 WANTED TO SAY WHAT I HAD TO SAY.

YOU WRITE THESE LAWS. 4 PEOPLE FROM THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA OR THE COUNTY OF 5 PHILADELPHIA, THEY GOT THEIR BOYS IN HARRISBURG TOO, THEY 6 7 HAVE THEIR HIGHER BOYS WHO ARE HIGHER THAN THE LEGISLATURE, 8 I WILL SAY. THESE BILLS GET IN THE COMMITTEE AND NEVER 9 COME OUT, IT WOULD TAKE YEARS BEFORE THINGS AKE FINALLY DONE. 10 11 I APPRECIATE YOU TRYING TO MAKE AN EFFORT, 12 THAT IS THE MAIN THING. FOR SO LONG NOBODY MADE AN EFFORT TO DO ANYTHING ABOUT IT. BUT ONCE YOU HAVE MADE AN EFFORT, THEN 13 14 MAYBE OTHERS WILL FOLLOW AND SOMETHING WILL BE DONE ABOUT IT. 4	ELLEN WALTON, SWORN.
5	CHAIRMAN RHODES: WE WILL HEAR FROM MS, WALTON,
6	BECAUSE OUR SOUND SYSTEM HAS NOT AKRIVED
7	A. I DON'T TALK TOO LOUD.
8	CHAIRMAN RHODES: TALK AS LOUD AS YOU CAN.
9	A. LAST YEAR ON SEPTEMBER 1/1H OF 1977 MYFATHER
10	THERE WAS A DISTURBANCE IN SOUTH PHILADELPHIA.
11	CHAIRMAN RHODES:
12	Q. SEPTEMBER
13	A. 17, 1977.
14	Q. 17TH?
15	A. YES. IN SOUTH PHILADELPHIA IN THE 1500
16	BLOCK OF SOUTH OPAL STREET THERE WAS A DISTURBANCE IN THE
17	BLOCK CONCERNING MY FATHER AND SOME PEOPLE IN THE BLOCK, 1500
18	BLOCK OF SOUTH OPAL STREET; AND A POLICEMAN WAS CALLED. THE
19	POLICEMAN ARRIVED
20	Q. WHAT KIND OF DISTURBANCE WITH YOUR FATHER?
21	A. I GUESS IT WAS ROWDINESS IN THE HOUSEHOLD
22	SITUATION, AS FAR AS I NNOW. I AM NOT A WITNESS. I AM
23	TALKING ABOUT WHAT INCIDENT HAPPENED TO MY FATHER.
24	THE POLICEMAN CAME FROM THE 17TH POLICE
25	DISTRICT AT 20TH AND FEDERAL. POLICEMAN ROBERT NOCH ARRIVED

IN A POLICE CAR CRUISING BY DOWN THE STREET. 1 HOW DO YOU SHELL HIS LAST NAME? 2 Q. 3 Α. N-O-C-H, ROBERT. Q. YOU MAY PROCEED. 4 THE WOMAN WHO CALLED THE POLICEMAN REPORTED 5 A. 6 THAT THE MAN WHO WAS WALKING DOWN THE STREET STAGGERING WAS THE ONE WHO THREATENED HER. 7 AND HE STARTED CRUISING ALONG AND HE STOPPED 8 MY FATHER -- RATHER, HE ASKED HIM. HE DIDN'T STOP. MY 9 FATHER DIDN'T STOP, AND HE NEPT WALKING AND THE OFFICER NEPT 10 CRUISING DOWN THE STREET SLOWLY. HE WAS BY HIMSELF. MY 11 12 FATHER NEPT GOING. HE ASNED HIM TO STOP AGAIN. 13 SO I THINK THE THIRD TIME WHEN HE ASKED HIM TO STOP AND HE DIDN'T STOP HE KEPT GOING. SO FINALLY HE DID 14 STOP; AND HE ASKED HIM TO COME OVER TO THE CAR. 15 16 MY FATHER -- FROM WITNESSES -- HE WALKED 17 OVER TO THE CAR AND HE RAISED HIS HAND LINE THAT, GOING 18 AGAINST THE CAR BECAUSE THE OFFICER CALLED HIM TO THE CAR. THE OFFICER SAID HE HAD A NNIFE IN HIS HAND, 19 20 THIS WAS IN THE PAPER; AND HE FIRED A SHOT AND KILLED MY 21 FATHER. 22 MY FATHER DIDN'T HAVE A NNIFE IN HIS HAND AT 23 ALL BECAUSE LATER WHEN HE FELL THE NNIFE THAT WAS SUPPOSEDLY 24 IN HIS HAND WAS IN HIS POCKET AND IT FELL WHEN HE FELL. 25 Ω. WHAT WAS YOUR FATHER'S NAME?

1 JERVY LEWIS, J-E-R-V-Y-. A. SO HE FELL -- HE STAGGERED, TRIED TO WALK 2 3 HOME. HE WAS SHOT TWO TIMES. THE OFFICER NEVER GOT OUT OF THE CAR. 4 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: THE OFFICER FIRED THE 5 SHOT FROM INSIDE THE CAR? 6 YES, HE WAS SITTING IN THE CAR AND HE SHOT 7 A. . HIM BECAUSE MY FATHER WALKED TOWARDS THE CAR, WAS STRETCHING 8 HIS HAND LINE TO SAY, "WHAT DO YOU WANT?" SO HE FIRED THE 9 10 SHOT. MY FATHER DIDN'T HAVE A NNIFE IN HIS HAND, BUT THE PAPERS SAY HE HAD A NNIFE COMING TOWARDS THE OFFICER. THE 11 OFFICER WAS SITTING IN THE CAR. THERE WAS NO NNIFE IN MY 12 FATHER'S HAND. THERE WERE WITNESSES WHO SAW THIS. THEY 13 NEVER SAW A NNIFE IN HIS HAND. 14 SO WHEN HE WALKED AWAY FROM THE CAR TRYING 15 TO GO BACK HOME, HE FELL AND STAGGERED AND HE FELL -- AND HE 16 17 WAS DRUNK . SO THE WITNESSES SAW THE NNIFE ON THE GROUND 18 19 AND IT WAS CLOSED. THE OFFICER NEVER GUT DUT THAT CAR. AND WHEN HE FINALLY DID GET OUT HE GOT OUT ON THE OTHER SIDE; AND 20 MEANWHILE HE GOT REENFORCEMENTS AND THEY CAME. 21 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU HAVE A NAME OF ANY 22 23 WITNESS WHO WAS AN EYEWITNESS TO THIS INCIDENT? A. YES, WE DO. 24 CHAIRMAN RHODES: COULD YOU GIVE HE THE NAMES? 25

1	A. NO, I PREFER NOT TO GIVE THEM NOW.
2	REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: IN PRIVATE?
3	A. YES, FOR PERSONAL REASONS, PRIVATE.
4	CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS THIS CASE UNDER
5	LITIGATION?
6	A. YES. IT IS IN THE ATTORNEY'S HANDS.
7	CHAIRMAN RHODES: HAVE YOU FILED A CIVIL SUIT?
8	A. YES, A CIVIL SUIT WAS FILED.
9	CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHAT WAS THE OFFICER'S NAME
10	THAT SHOT YOUR FATHER?
11	A. ROBERT KOCH.
12	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THE SAME OFFICER?
13	A. THE SAME OFFICER THAT WAS CRUISING DOWN THE
14	STREET.
15	CHAIRMAN RHODES: WAS HE BY HIMSELF?
16	A, HE WAS BY HIMSELF, NO ONE WAS WITH HIM AT
17	THE TIME HE FIRED THE SHOTS.
18	SO IN THE MEANWHILE THE WITNESSES SAID THAT
19	HE WAS TREMBLING AFTER HE SHOT HIM, HE WAS REALLY SHANING.
20	SO AFTER HE GOT FINALLY THE OTHER
21	OFFICERS CAME TO ASSIST HIM AND THEY LEFT MY FATHER LAYING IN
22	THE STREET; AND FINALLY THEY GOT HIM AND THEY STARTED RUBBING
23	THE BLOOD OFF OF THE CAR.
24	AND WITNESSES TRIED TO GET HIS BADGE NUMBER,
25	THE GUY WHO WAS RUBBING THE BLOOD OFF OF THE CAR; AND HE

1 TURNED THE BADGE TO KEEP THEN FROM CHECKING HIS BADGE AND HIS 2 NAME FROM HIS I.D. TAG. 3 SO FINALLY THE WAGON CAME AND WHEN THEY FINALLY TOON MY FATHER -- THEY LEFT HIM ON THE GROUND FOR 4 5 MAYBE 10 OR 15 MINUTES WHILE THEY WERF ASSISTING THE OFFICER WHO SHOT HIM. 6 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: WHEN YOU SAY "ASSISTING" 7 8 THE OFFICER WHO SHOT MY FATHER, THE OTHER 9 Α. OFFICER WHO CAME TO HIS RESCUE ASSISTED HIM AND LEFT MY 10 11 FATHER LAYING DOWN THERE IN THE STREET BEFORE A WAGON FINALLY CAME TO PICK HIM UP. 12 AND WHEN THEY PICKED HIM UP AND PUT HIM IN 13 THE CAR, THE WAGON, THEY THREW HIM IN THE CAR AND THEY DID 14 15 NOT DO IT GENTLY, A MAN WHO WAS WOUNDED. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WAS HE STILL ALIVE? 16 AS FAR AS I KNOW! BUT THE WAY HE WAS SHOT, 17 A. HE WAS SHOT IN HIS CHEST. HE DIDN'T SHOOT HIM ONE TIME AS WE 18 LATER FOUND OUL, HE SHOT HIM TWICE. 19 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU KNOW FROM THE MEDICAL 20 EXAMINER WHAT THE TIME OF DEATH THAT WAS ESTABLISHED? 21 THEY SAY AFTER 11:00, BUT I DON'T REALLY 22 Α. THINN SO. I THINN MY FATHER DIED ALMOST IMMEDIATELY BECAUSE 23 HE WAS BLEEDING INTERNALLY. AND THE WAY HE SHOT HIM WAS 24 25 RIGHT THROUGH HIS LUNGS AND IT WAS REALLY, YOU KNOW, SO BAD

1 THAT THEY COULDN'T DO ANYTHING FOR HIM. 2 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DID THEY TRY TO DO ANYTHING FOR HIM? 3 A. SO THEY SAY. 4 LATER THE HOSPITAL CALLED MY MOTHER WITH A 5 \$5,000 HOSPITAL BILL AND SHE SAID, "IF YOU WANT TO CHARGE 6 ANYBODY FOR I), CHARGE THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, BECAUSE SHE 7 8 IS NOT PAYING THAT BILL. BUT IN THE MEANWHILE GETTING BACK TO WHEN 9 THEY WERE TAKING MY FATHER TO THE HOSPITAL, NEIGHBORS TOLD 10 THE POLICEMEN THAT HIS WIFE LIVES ACROSS THE STREET. THEY 11 12 DID NOT GO TO HER HOUSE AND RING THE BELL AND SAY, "WOULD YOU 13 COME WITH US TO THE HOSPITAL." AND WHEN MY MOTHER WENT TO THE HOSPITAL SHE 14 15 HAD TO TAKE SEPTA TO GO TO THE HOSPIJAL BECAUSE THE POLICEMEN WOULD NOT TAKE HER IN THE CAR AT ALL. 16 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DID SHE TAKE PUBLIC 17 TRANSPORTATION TO THE HOSPITAL? 18 SHE HAD TO WAIT FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION TO 19 Α. GO TO THE HOSPITAL BECAUSE THE POLICEMAN WOULD NOT LET HER IN 20 THE CAR OR THE PADDY WAGON TO GO TO THE HOSPIJAL. SHE HAD TO 21 WAIT FOR THE SEPTA ON THE CORNER TO TAKE HER TO GRADUATE 22 23 HOSPITAL. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: HOW FAR IS THAT 24 25 INCIDENT THAT OCCURRED FROM GRADUATE HOSPITAL?

WELL, IT WAS SAY, BETWEEN 19TH AND 20TH ON 1 A. 2 TASKER STREET; ANU GRADUATE HOSPITAL IS AT, WELL, 19TH AND LOMBARD STREETS. SO IT WAS A DISTANCE. 3 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: WERE YOU ---4 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WAIT, IS THAT THE END OF 5 YOUR TESTIMONY ON THE INCIDENT? 6 WELL, THERE WERE WITNESSES AROUND, YOU KNOW, 7 Α. 8 BUT THEY DIDN'T -- THE POLICE STARTED COMING AROUND CHECKING, LOOKING FOR BULLETS AND ALL OF THAT. 9 BUT ONE THING, THEY NEVER CAME TO OUR HOUSE 10 AT ALL THE WHOLE TIME. THEY NEVER SHOWED UP THERE TO SAY 11 WHAT HAPPENED. THEY NEVER CAME TO THE HOSPITAL AT ALL. 12 13 CHAIRMAN RHODES: SO YOU WERE NEVER INFORMED BY THE POLICE THAT YOUR FATHER HAD BEEN SHOT? 14 NO. HIS NEIGHBORS CAME TO MY MOTHER WHO WAS 15 Α. IN THE YARD, IN THE BACK YARD, AND TULD HER THERE WAS A 16 SHOOTING, THAT HER HUSBAND WAS SHOT, AND SHE FINALLY CAME 17 OUT. THEY WOULD NOT LET HER INTO THE CAR. SO SHE HAD TU 18 19 TAKE SEPTA TO GO TO GRADUATE HOSPITAL. 20 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU KNOW IF THERE WAS A POLICE INVESTIGATION OF THE SHOOTING? 21 22 A. SO THEY SAY, YES; BUT WE NEVER HEARD ANYTHING AROUT IT. EVERY TIME WE CALLED UP TO FIND OUT 23 ANYTHING -- I EVEN WENT TO THE D.A.'S OFFICE IN CITY HALL TO 24 25 FILE A COMPLAINT -- AND ALSO I HAVE BEEN GETTING THE

1	RUN-AROUND. I WENT TO THE 17TH PRECINCT AND THEY GAVE ME THE
2	RUN-AROUND THERE. I SPOKE TO THE CAPTAIN, I FORGET HIS NAME,
3	HE GAVE ME THE RUN-AROUND. HE DIDN'T WANI TO TALK TO ME.
4	AND LATER I FOUND OUT THAT THE OFFICER WAS A
5	ROOKIE AND HE WASN'T EVEN ON THE FORCE FOR A MONTH. AND I
6	COULDN'T UNDERSTAND HOW LATER I SAID, "WHY WOULD THEY SEND
7	A ROONIE OUT THERE WHO WAS ONLY ON THE FORCE FOR A MONIH?"
8	HE DIDN'T HAVE ANYBODY EXPERIENCED WITH HIM.
9	CHAIRMAN RHODES: WAS HE ON PROBATION?
10	A. THAT ROOKIE, I DON'T NNOW BECAUSE HE WASN'T
11	OUT OF THE ACADEMY FOR MAYBE A MONTH. I DON'T THINN HE WAS
12	OUT TWO MONTHS BEFORE THEY PUT HIM ON THE STREET.
13	CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS HE STILL ON THE FORCE?
14	A. AS FAR AS I NNOW, HE IS. HE WAS NOT
15	SUSPENDED OR ANYTHING AFTER THAT INCIDENT HAPPENED.
16	CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS THAT THE EXTENT OF YOUR
17	TESTIMONY?
18	A. YES.
19	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANK YOU.
20	REPRESENTATIVE COHEN.
21	REPRESENTATIVE COHEN: I HAVE NO QUESTIONS.
22	CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE JOHNSON.
23	REPRESENTATIVE JOHNSON: I HAVE NO QUESTIONS.
24	CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WHITE.
25	REPRESENTATIVE WHITE:

MRS. WALTON, WHEN YOU WENT TO THE 17TH 1 Q. 2 POLICE DISTRICT WHAT NINDS OF QUESTIONS WERE YOU ASNING OF THE OFFICERS THERE? YOU SAY YOU FIRST TALKED TO THE DESK 3 SERGEANT? 4 YES, I ASNED TO SPEAN TO THE COMMANNING 5 A. OFFICER THERE, AND AFTER I ASNED FOR HIM, THEY ALL LOONED AT 6 ME WONDERING WHY WAS I WANTING TO SEE SOMEBODY SO HIGH UP IN 7 8 AUTHORITY. SO FINALLY HE CAME AROUND, YOU KNOW, TO SEE 9 10 ME . YOU DID GET A CHANCE TO SEE THE COMMANDING 11 Q. 12 OFFICER? 13 A. I DID. 14 Q. GO AHEAD. AND FINALLY HE CAME AROUND TO SEEING ME, AND 15 Α. I TOLD HIM I WOULD LINE TO FILE A COMPLAINT BECAUSE I CALLED 16 DIFFERENT OFFICERS AND THEY TOLD ME THIS IS THE FIRST STEP 17 18 FOR ME TO DO. 19 SO WHEN I WENT TO SEE HIM, HE ACTED LINE HE 20 DIDN'T WANT TO BE BOTHERED. 21 SO I TOLD HIM THIS IS MY RIGHT TO DO THIS. 22 Q. WHAT WERE YOU ASKING HIM? I ASKED HIM LIKE -- I EXPLAINED TO HIM WHAT 23 A. HAPPENED AND I WOULD LIKE TO FILE A COMPLAINT. 24 25 Q. YOU EXPLAINED THAT YOUR FATHER HAD BEEN

1 SHOT? 2 A. I TOLD HIM ALL OF THAT. 3 YOU TOLD HIM YOU WANTED TO FILE A COMPLAINT Q. 4 AGAINST THE OFFICER? AGAINST THE OFFICER. 5 A. WHAT WAS HIS RESPONSE TO THAT? 6 ۵. HE ACTED LINE HE DIDN'T WANT TO BE BOTHERED. 7 A. HE SAID YOU HAVE TO GO TO THIS PLACE. I SAID, "LOON, THIS IS 8 WHERE I WAS TOLD TO COME AND THIS IS THE FIRST SIEP I AM Ø. 10 STARTING. I SAID. I APPRECIATE YOUR COOPERATION, AND AFTER 11 ALL IT IS A MURDER AND HE DID NILL MY FATHER." 12 WHERE WERE YOU TOLD TO GO? Ω. I WAS TOLD TO GO TO CITY HALL AND MAKE A 13 Α. 14 COMPLAINT TO THE D.A.'S OFFICE. SO I WENT THERE LATER. I MEAN, I GOT THE RUN-AROUN) BETWEEN THE D.A.'S OFFICE AND 15 THERE. 16 Q. YOU WENT TO THE D.A.'S OFFICE? 17 18 A. YES. 19 WHEN DID YOU GO TO THE D.A.'S OFFICE, HOW Q. 20 SOON AFTER? 21 ALL THIS HAPPENED WITHIN A WEEK, I THINK A. 22 SEPTEMBER 27TH I WENT TO THE D.A.'S OFFICE. THEY GAVE ME THE 23 RUN-AROUND. AS SOON AS I SAID WHO I WAS AND WHAT THE INCIDENT WAS, THEY STARTED HUSH-HUSH AND WHISPERING AROUND 24 25 EACH OTHER.

1 AND FINALLY SOMEBODY WOULD TALK TO ME AND 2 TOLD ME I WOULD HAVE TO COME BACK LAIER AND WRITE A STATEMENT OUT. I DID THAT ABOUT A WEEN LATER AND THEN THEY WROTE IT 3 DOWN; BUT I NEVER HEARD FROM THEM. 4 EVERY TIME I CALLED THAT D.A.'S OFFICE, THEY 5 WOULD GIVE ME THE RUN-AROUND. 6 7 Q. YOU STILL HAVE NOT HEARD FROM THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE? 8 9 A. I CALLED AND THEY SAY, "WE ARE STILL INVESTIGATING," AND THIS HAS HAPPENED SINCE SEPTEMBER. 10 11 ρ. ARE YOU CALLING THE POLICE ABUSE UNIT?. I HAVE CALLED RENDELL'S OFFICE SINCE HE HAS 12 A. BEEN THERE, I HAVE CALLED FITZPATRICK'S OFFICE SINCE HE WAS 13 THERE. AND I HAVE SPONEN TO MS. SYLVESTER; SHE IS NEVER 14 THERE. 15 AND RENDELL'S OFFICE, THEY STARTED -- I 16 17 SAID, "LOON, I AM TIRED OF THIS RUNNING AROUND, I WOULD LINE SOME ANSWERS." I WANTED TO SPEAN TO RENDELL. THEY SAID, 18 19 "YOU HAVE TO HAVE AN APPOINTMENT." I SAID, "I WOULD LIKE TO 20 HAVE AN APPOINTMENT WITH HIM." I TOLD THEM WHY, AND THEY STARTED CHANGING EVERYTHING AROUND. I FELT IT WAS REALLY 21 LINE I WAS GETTING THE RUN-AROUND AGAIN. 22 23 I SAID, "LOOK, I VOTED FOR THIS MAN." I SAID, YOU WANT ME TO VOTE FOR HIM AND THIS IS WHAT I AM 24 25 GOING TO GET?"

Q. HAVE YOU HIRED PRIVATE COUNSEL TO HANDLE 1 2 YOUR SUIT? 3 A. MY MOTHER HAS, YES. Q. YOUR MOTHER HAS PRIVATE COUNSEL TO HANDLE 4 5 YOUR SUIT? AND THE CITY IS NOT COOPERATING AT ALL 6 YES. A. BECAUSE MY MOTHER TRIED TO GET A DEATH CERTIFICATE, THE CAUSE 7 HER BENEFITS FOR SOCIAL SECURITY AND V.A. WAS 8 OF DEATH. 9 HELD UP FOR ABOUT EIGHT MONTHS BECAUSE THEY WOULD NOT COOPERATE BY GIVING HER A DEATH CERTIFICATE, BECAUSE THERE IS 10 11 A YOUNG MINOR OR CHILD IN THE HOUSEHOLD UNDER 18 YEARS OF 12 AGE . SHE IS THE SOLE SUPPORTER OF THE HOUSEHOLD. 13 14 Q. WHO IS THE ATTORNEY HANDLING YOUR CASE? I WOULD RATHER LEAVE IT PRIVATE. IF YOU 15 A. WANT TO ASK ME LATER, I WILL GIVE IT. BECAUSE MY MOTHER IS 16 17 REALLY UPSET. WHEN I TOLD HER ABOUT I) SHE SAID, "PLEASE DON'T GIVE THEM TOO MUCH." SHE IS VERY UPSET BEHIND THE 18 19 WHOLE THING. WHY IS SHE AFRAID TO GIVE US INFORMATION? 20 Q. 21 Α. BECAUSE THE POLICEMEN NEEP -- THEY NEEP 22 WALNING AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD, FOIN/ING AT THE WITNESSES, LINE THEY WERE NIND OF BEING HARASSED A LITTLE, I THINN, 23 RIGHT AFTER THIS INCIDENT HAPPENED BECAUSE EVEN SOME OF THEM 24 25 ARE NIND OF ALMOST SHYING AWAY FROM WANFING TO TESTIFY

1 BECAUSE IT IS LIKE THEY FEEL THAT THEY ARE BEING HARASSED. 2 EVERY TIME YOU LOON AROUND THEY ARE COMING, NNOCNING ON THE 3 DOOR, WANTING TO TALK TO THEM. REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: NO FURTHER QUESTIONS. 4 5 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON. **REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON:** 6 HAVE YOU EVER DETERMINED BY THE CORONER'S 7 Q. REPORT WHAT THE CAUSE OF DEATH WAS EXACTLY? 8 9 WELL, IT WAS A GUNSHOT WOUND OF HIS CHEST. Α. 10 HE WAS SHOT TWICE IN HIS CHEST. THE WAY THEY SAY THE CAUSE OF DEATH WAS A GUNSHOT WOUND. 11 THAT IS ALL THEY SAID? 12 Q. 13 A. AND HEART FAILURE AND ALL THAT OTHER STUFF. ALL RIGHT, EVERYONE DIES OF HEART FAILURE. 14 Q. AND I THINK IT WAS SHOCK. 15 Α. 16 Q. DID YOUR MOTHER REQUEST AN AUTOPSY? WHEN I WENT -- WHAT HAPPENED WAS, I 17 NO. A. WENT TO THE HOSPI)AL BECAUSE THEY CALLED ME AT MY HOME AND 18 19 ASNED ME TO GO TO THE HOSPITAL BECAUSE MY FATHER WAS SHOT. 20 Q. WHO CALLED? MY SISTER-IN-LAW. I WENT TO THE HOSPITAL 21 A. 22 AND I ASNED TO SEE MY FATHER. THEY SAID, YOU CAN'T SEE HIM BECAUSE HE IS IN THE OPERATING ROOM." SO I GO UPSTAIRS AND I 23 24 WAIT IN THE RECUPERATING ROOM. AND THESE POLICEMEN COMES AROUND AND SAID, "OH, HE IS DEAD." I SAID, "WHO IS DEAD, 25

WHO, MY FATHER?" THEY SAID, "NO, NO." AND I LATER FOUND OUT 1 IT WAS HIM BECAUSE IT WAS ABOUT TEN O'CLOCK, AND THEN THE 2 AUTOPSY REPORT SAYS ABOUT 11:30. 3 4 AND I SAT AND I WAITED. AND AFTER THEY TOLD ME IT WAS ABOUT 11:30, I GUESS, AND THEY TOLD ME THAT HE WAS 5 DEAD. SO I SAID, 'OH, MY GOD' CAN I SEE HIM?' THEY SAID, 6 7 "NO, WE HAVE TO CLEAN HIM UP FIRST." I SAID, "WHAT DIFFERENCE DOES IT MANE IF HE HAS TO BE CLEANED UP, HE IS 8 9 DEAD. THEY SAID NO, FOR PERSONAL REASONS, SOME TYPE OF CORONER'S EXAMINATION, THEY HAVE TO MAKE SURE ALL INSTRUMENTS 10 IS THERE. 11 SO FINALLY WHEN I DID --12 WHO IS "THEY"? WHEN YOU SAY "THEY," WHO IS 13 Q. IT THAT TOLD YOU? 14 THE NURSES AND THE DOCTORS IN THE HOSPITAL. 15 Α. I DON'T REMEMBER THEIR NAMES. 16 SO FINALLY WHEN I GO UP TO SEE HIM THEY HAD 17 HIM ALL STRAPPED UP AND TIED UP; BUT I WANTED TO PULL THE 18 SHEET BACK AND SEE JUST WHAT WAS WHAT, BUT THEY WOULD NOT 19 LET ME LOOK AT HIM. THEY HAD HIM ALL TIED DOWN AND STRAPPED 20 21 UP WITH A SHEET AND ALL, ALL OVER HIM. AND THEY SAID THAT AN AUTOPSY HAS TO BE 22 23 DONE, I SAID, "NO. YOU SHOULD CALL US AND LET US NNOW ABOUT IT. ' AND I GAVE THEM MY TELEPHONE NUMBER FOR THEM TO CALL ME 24 BEFORE AN AUTOPSY COULD BE MADE BECAUSE I DIDN'T THINN IT WAS 25

RIGHT WITHOUT OUR PERMISSION. 1 BUT THEY TOLD ME NO, THAT THEY HAVE TO DO IT 2 ANYWAY BECAUSE OF THE CIRCUMSTANCES THAT LED TO HIS DEATH. 3 BUT THEY NEVER CALLED. THEY SAID THEY WOULD 4 CALL TO LET US KNOW THAT THEY WOULD HAVE TO DO THE AUTOPSY, 5 BUT THEY NEVER CALLED. AND I ASKED MY MOTHER; SHE SAID NO, A THEY DIDN'T CALL HER EITHER. 7 8 Q. NOW WHEN YOU TALK ABOUT THE WITNESSES --THIS IS A VERY IMPORTANT POINT -- WHEN YOU TALK ABOUT THE 9 10 WITNESSES BEING HARASSED IN THE COMMUNITY --THE WITNESSES WHO SAW IT HAPPEN, WHO SAW THE 11 Α. INCIDENT. AND DURING THE TIME THE POLICE NEPT COMING BY AND 12 HARASSING, LINE EVERY DAY THEY NEEP COMING BY THE HOUSE AND 13 ASKING THEM QUESTIONS AND ALL THAT, AND FINALLY THEY SAID, 14 "I DON'T WANT TO TALK TO YOU AT ALL." 15 IS THERE ANY OTHER INDEPENDENT AGENCY OTHER 16 Q. 17 THAN THE POLICE WHO WERE COMING AROUND THE HOUSE AND ALSO THE 18 PERSONS YOU WANTED TO SEE? DID YOU CONTACT ANY OTHER 19 ORGANIZATIONS LINE P.I.L.C.O.P. OR A.C.L. OR ANY OF THOSE 20 OTHER ORGANIZATIONS? WE CONTACTED THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, THE 21 Α. 22 ATTORNEY GENERAL. 23 Q. UNITED STATES ATTORNEY'S OFFICE AT SIXTH 24 STREET? 25 WE WENT THERE WITH THE WITNESSES AND THEY A. .

SPOKE TO THEM. 1 BUT THE ATTORNEY DOWN THERE SAID RIGHT AS OF 2 NOW THEY CAN'T DO BUT SO MUCH BECAUSE THE CITY HAS EVERYTHING 3 TIED UP. 4 5 Q. WHAT DO YOU MEAN BY THAT? THEY CAN'T GET ANY ANSWERS. LINE IF THEY Α. 6 7 WANT ANSWERS TO CERTAIN THINGS, THEIR HANUS ARE TIED UP BECAUSE THE CITY IS NOT COOPERATING WITH THEM AS FAR AS LINF 8 9 RELEASING CERTAIN INFORMATION. THEY WANTED A TAPE, LIKE OF THE PAROLE OFFICER -- LINE A TAPE, THEY MANE A TAPE EVERY 10 TIME. 11 THE PATROL TRANSMISSION BETWEEN THE POLICE 12 R. CAR AND ITS HEADQUARTERS? 13 SOMETHING HAPPENED TO IT. THEY DON'T KNOW 14 A. 15 WHAT HAPPENED TO IT. ANYWAY, THEY COULDN'T GET IT. CHAIRMAN RHODES: ANY OTHER QUESTIONS? 16 17 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: THANN YOU VERY MUCH, MRS. WALTON. I NNOW IT WAS VERY HARD FOR YOU TO 18 TESTIFY. I WANTED TO MAKE SURE THE RECORD WAS CLEAR, TO 19 20 BRING OUT CERTAIN POINTS. 21 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE SCIRICA. 22 REPRESENTATIVE SCIRICA: NO QUESTIONS. 23 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE OLIVER. REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: 1 2 α. YOU MENTIONED, MADAM, WHEN THE OFFICERS CAME IN THE ASSIST CAR, INSTEAD OF TANING YOUR FATHER TO THE 3 HOSPITAL, THEY WERE ASSISTING THE OFFICER? 4 5 A. YES. I BELIEVE WHAT YOU MEANI WAS CONSOLING THE 6 Q. 7 OFFICER RATHER THAN ASSIST? THEY WERE ASSISTING HIM BECAUSE WHAT THEY 8 A. DID WAS THEY STARTED WIPING THAT CAR. TO ME THAT WAS 9 ASSISTING HIM WHEN THEY WERE HELPING HIM TO GET HIM AWAY FROM 10 11 THE SCENE OF THE CRIME BECAUSE JUST BEFORE THAT A COUPLE WEEKS OR SO BEFORE THEY HAD ANOTHER INCIDENT IN SOUTH 12 13 PHILADELPHIA. I WANTED THE RECORD TU SHOW THE OFFICER WAS 14 Q. NOT IN ANY DANGER. 15 NO, HE WAS NOT IN ANY DANGER AT ALL. 16 A. THEY WERE CONSOLING HIM RATHER THAN 17 Q. ASSISTING YOUR FATHER. 18 19 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHO MIGHT HAVE BEEN ALIVE. 20 REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: 21 Q. WHO COULD HAVE BEEN ALIVE, RATHER THAN DEVOTE THE ATTENTION TO YOUR FATHER WHO WAS IN GRIEF? 22 I THOUGHT THEY WOULD HAVE ASSISTED THE 23 A. INJURED BEFORE THEY WOULD GO TO HIM BECAUSE HE DID THE CRIME, 24 BUT HE WILL BE ALL RIGHT LATER, I WOULD THINK. 25

CHAIRMAN RHODES: IS THAT ALL, REPRESENTATIVE 1 2 DUMAS? REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: 3 SHE MENTIONED SHE DID NOT WANT TO MENIION Q. 4 5 HER ATTORNEYS NAME? A. NO. 6 Q. I WILL GET TO THAT LATER. 7 I WOULD LIKE TO KNOW IF YOU ARE SATISFIED 8 WITH YOUR ATTORNEY'S PROGRESS RELATING TO YOUR FATHER'S 9 10 DEATH? SONEWHAT. HE WOULD SAY IF WOULD TAKE YEARS 11 Α. BEFORE ANYTHING COULD BE DONE, ESPECIALLY BECAUSE OF THE SUIT 12 AGAINST THE CITY, BECAUSE OF ALL THE CORRUPTION THAT IS GOING 13 ON NOW IN THE PHILADELPHIA POLICE DEPARTMENT, AND THE CITY IS 14 NOT COOPERATING. 15 16 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DON'T FORGET THIS IS A PUBLIC 17 RECORD. THAT'S ALL RIGHT. A. 18 REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: THANK YOU. 19 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI. 20 21 **REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI:** Q. WHAT TIME OF DAY WAS THIS? 22 23 A. THIS HAPPENED BETWEEN 7:30 AND 8:00 D'CLOCK 24 IN THE EVENING, ON A SATURDAY. CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WHITE HAS JUST 25

HOW LONG HAD YOUR PARENIS LIVED IN THAT 7 COMMUNITY? 8 OH, SINCE 1953. A. WERE THEY WELL-KNOWN BY THE NEIGHBORS IN THE 9 Q. 10 BLOCK? OH, YES, THE NEIGHBORS AND ALL NNOW THEM. 11 A. HAD YOUR FATHER HAD ANY DIHER CONTACT WITH 12 Q. THE POLICE DEPARTMENT PRIOR TO THIS INCIDENT? 13 14 YES. ONE OF THE REASONS WHY I REALLY Α. 15 BELIEVE MY FATHER DID NOT GO TO THAT POLICE --ONAY. HE HAD BEEN ARRESTED -- HE HAD BEEN 16 Q. TO THE 17TH DISTRICT BEFORE? 17 18 YES. A. 19 WOULD YOU SAY THAT YOUR FATHER WAS KNOWN BY Q. 20 MANY OF THE VEGERAN OFFICERS WHO PATROL THAT PARTICULAR AREA? 21 Α. I DON'T THINK SO. 22 Q. YOU DON'T THINK SO? 23 A. NO. REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: 24 THANK YOU. REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: ONE SHORT QUESTION. 25

3	REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS:
4	Q. HOW OLD WAS YOUR FATHER?
5	A. FIFTY-EIGHT.
6	REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: FIFTY-EIGHT, THANK YOU.
7	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANN YOU FOR TESTIFYING, I
8	AM VERY SORRY. I KNOW IT IS DIFFICULT FOR YOU TO TALK AROUT
9	THIS INCIDENT, BUT I AM SURE WE WILL USE THIS INFORMATION IN
10	OUR REVIEW.
11	A. I WOULD LIKE TO SAY SOMETHING ELSE TOO.
12	CHAIRMAN RHODES: GO AHEAD.
13	A. I FEEL THAT ANY TIME A ROOKIE OFFICER COMES
14	OUT OF THE ACADEMY, THAT ANY TIME HE IS OUT IN THE STREET, HE
15	SHOULD BE ASSIGNED WITH SOMEBODY WHO IS MORE IN SENIORITY
16	OUT THERE IN THE STREET. AND IF HE IS IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD,
17	WHEREVER THE NEIGHBORHOOD IS, THAT HE SHOULD BE FAMILIAR WITH

CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU HAVE IN YOUR 15 POSSESSION A SUBPOENA TO APPEAR BEFORE THIS SUBCOMMITTEE? 16 17 MISS MOORE: YES. 18 ____ SANDRA MOORE, SWORN. 19 20 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WOULD YOU STATE YOUR NAME AND 21 ADDRESS FOR THE RECORD. SANDRA MOORE, 5426 MERION AVENUE. 22 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: MKS, MOORE, YOU HAVE TO SPEAN 23 LOUDER. THAT IS NOT A MICROPHONE. THERE IS NO MICROPHONF. 24 25 OTHER PEOPLE WON'T HEAR YOU UNLESS YOU SHEAK AS LOUD AS YOU

CAN, LINE I AM TRYING TO, ONAY? 1 YES. 2 Α. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHY DON'T YOU PROCEED AND 3 TELL US YOUR ACCOUNT. 4 YOU WANT MY NAME AND ADDRESS AGAIN? 5 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: I THINN THE REPORTER GOT 6 7 THAT. THIS INCIDENT HAPPENED ON SATURDAY NIGHT, 8 A. 26TH -- 28TH OF MAY. A FRIEND AND MYSELF --9 10 Q. WHAT YEAR? 178. 11 A٠ 12 Q. THIS YEAR? 13 A. YES. WE WERE TRAVELING THROUGH THE PARK FROM WEST PHILADELPHIA ON OUR WAY TO NORTH PHILADELPHIA WHEN 14 15 WE WERE STOPPED BY A POLICE CAR. "WE," MEANING WHO? 16 Q. ME AND ANOTHER FRIEND, EARL JONES, 17 A. WE WERE STOPPED BY A POLICE CAR AND THEY 18 TOLD TO PULL OVER. WHEN WE PULLED OVER, THE POLICE OFFICER 19 20 CAME UP TO THE CAR AND HE ASNED FOR THE LICENSE. AND WE WERE 21 SITTING THERE WAITING WHILE HE CHECKED THE LICENSE AND THE 22 REGISTRATION CARD. WHOSE LICENSE DID HE ASK FOR? 23 Q. EARL JONES, THE DRIVER OF THE CAR. 24 A. Q. WHO WAS DRIVING? 25

EARL JONES, THE DRIVER OF THE CAR. 1 A. 2 AFTER THIS WE WAITED ABOUT TEN OK FIFTEEN MINUTES WHILE HE WENT BACK TO HIS CAR AND HE GAVE SOME 3 INFORMATION OVER THE WALKIE-TALKIE, WHATEVER. 4 5 HE CAME OVER TO THE CAR AGAIN AND ASKED US 6 TO GET OUT OF THE CAR. WE THEN GOT OUT OF THE CAR. I HAD ASNED THE OFFICER WHAT WAS THE MATTER 7 8 AND HE SAID, "NOTHING, JUST GET OUT OF THE CAR." WERE THOSE HIS EXACT WORDS? 9 Q. 10 A. HE SAID, "NOTHING," AND THEN MR. JONES GOT OUT OF THE CAR AND HE GOT OUT OF THF CAR AND HE SEARCHED HIM. 11 ONAY. THEY TOON HIM OVER TO THE CAR AND HE STOOD THERE FOR 12 A WHILE. HE GOT BACK IN THE CAR AND HE SAT THERE WITH ME. 13 14 TEN MINUTES LATER THEY TOLD US TO GET OUT OF THE CAR AGAIN. THIS TIME I GOT OUT OF THE CAR ALONG WITH 15 HIM, BECAUSE I WAS GETTING AFRAID. 16 17 IT WAS REALLY DARN. WE WERE IN AN AREA THAT WAS OFF OF THE ROAD AND WE HADN'T BEEN TOLD WHY WE WERE 18 STOPPED. 19 AFTER AWHILE THE OFFICER NEPT FEELING ON MY 20 21 FRIEND, MK. JONES. HE PICKED HIS COLLAR UP, HE STARTED LOONING INSIDE HIS CLOTHES AND THINGS LIKE THIS. 22 23 HE SEEMED VERY NERVOUS AND HIS HAND WAS SHAKING, AND I WAS AFRAID. I DIDN'T KNOW EXACTLY WHAT WAS 24 25 HAPPENING.

THE POLICEMAN'S HANUS WERE SHANING AND HE 1 Q. 2 SEEMED NERVOUS? 3 A. VERY NERVOUS. HE STARTED PULLING UP MK. JONES' COLLAR AND LOOKING UP HIS CLOTHES. AND I SAID, "WHY 4 ARE YOU DOING THIS?" ANOTHER OFFICER WAS STANDING THERE WITH 5 6 HIM. AND I ASNED HIM WHY IS HE DOING THIS? WHY WERE WE 7 STOPPED? AT THIS TIME NEITHER ONE SAID ANYIHING -- THE ONE SAID NOTHING. BUT ONE OFFICER SAID TO ME, JUST BE QUIET, HE 8 HAS A RIGHT TO DO THIS. THEY TOLD ME TO GET BACK IN THE 9 10 CAR. WE GOT IN THE CAR AND THEY MADE US SIT THERE 11 12 AGAIN FOR LINE TEN OR 15 MORE MINUTES, AND THEN THEY TOLD US TO GET BACK OUT AGAIN. WE GOT BACK OUT OF THE CAR AND THEY 13 14 STARTED SEARCHING HIM AGAIN. 15 BY THIS TIME I WAS VERY UPSET, BECAUSE I WAS 16 VERY AFRAID. I DIDN'T KNOW EXACTLY WHAT WAS GOING TO HAPPEN. IT WAS NO CARS AROUND. IT WAS JUST THE CAR THAT WE 17 WERE SITTING IN AND THE POLICE CAR. 18 SO I ASKED HIM WHY WAS HE SEARCHING MY 19 20 FRIEND AND WOULD HE LET US GO. HE SAID, "JUST BE QUIET." 21 HE SAID TO MY FRIEND, "WHAT'S THE MATTER, ARE YOU TRYING TO GET SMART?" BY THEN HE IS TRYING TO 22 23 INTIMIDATE HIM. HE SAID, "WHAT DID YOU SAY?" HE SAID, "I'M 24 NOT SAYING ANYTHING." ESPECIALLY -- MY FRIEND WASN'T SAYING 25 ANYTHING.

I SAID: "WHY ARE YOU DOING THIS? WHAT 1 2 RIGHT DO YOU HAVE TO DO THIS TO US? WHY ARE YOU SEARCHING US?" 3 WE GOT BACK IN THE CAR -- IT HAPPENED ABOUT 4 FIVE OR SIX TIMES WE WERE MADE TO GET IN AND OUT OF THE CAR, 5 GET IN AND OUT OF THE CAR. 6 7 A POLICE WAGON CAME. THEY MADE A CALL AND A 8 POLICE WAGON CAME. WE STILL WEREN'T TOLD ANYTHING, WHY WE 9 WERE CHARGED, OR WHERE THEY WERE TANING US OR ANYTHING. 10 WE WERE THEN HANDCUFFED AND PUT INTO THE POLICE WAGON. WE WERE DRIVEN AROUND IN THE DARN FOR AWHILE. 11 I WAS VERY SCARED BECAUSE I DIDN'T UNDERSTAND WHAT WAS 12 13 HAPPENING. AND I WAS AFRAID THAT -- I WAS JUST AFRAID THEY 14 WERE GOING TO DO SOMETHING TO US. BUT AFTER ABOUT 45 MINUTES OF HARASSMENT WE 15 16 WERE TANEN TO A POLICE STATION, I REALLY DON'T NNOW WHERE, I 17 NEVER FOUND OUT. YOU WERE DRIVEN AROUND FOR 45 MINUTES? 18 Q. FROM THE TIME THEY STOPPED US UNTIL THE TIME 19 A. 20 WE GOT TO THIS OTHER PLACE, POLICE STATION, IT WAS 45 MINUTES. THEY TOON US TO THIS PLACE AND TOON US TO THIS ROOM 21 22 WHERE THERE WAS A LOT OF NARCOTICS. I WAS SCARED. 23 OH, IN THE PARK HE SAYS, "YEAH, WELL, DID YOU FIND ALL THAT STUFF IN THE CAR?" THIS FRIGHTENED ME 24 25 BECAUSE I NNOW WE DIDN'T HAVE ANY THING IN THE CAR, BUT I NNEW

1 THEY WERE TALKING AROUT DRUGS.

WHEN WE GOT TO THIS POLICE STATION, WHEREVER 2 3 IT WAS; I THOUGHT IT WAS IN THE PARN, BUT I AM NOT EVEN SURE. WHEN I ASNED WHERE WE WERE, NOBODY TOLD ME. THEY 4 DIDN'T TELL US ANYTHING. WE JUST WENT THROUGH THIS ROOM 5 WHERE THERE WAS A LOT OF DRUGS; AND WE WERE TOLD TO SIT DOWN, 6 AND THERE WAS STUFF ALL OVER THE TABLE. BY THIS TIME I 7 8 THOUGHT THEY HAD PLANIED SOMETHING ON US AND WE WERE GOING TO BE CHARGED WITH SOMETHING. 9 10 WE WERE HELD AT THIS STATION -- WE WERE 11 THERE FOR ABOUT A HALF HOUR. FROM THERE WE WERE TANEN DOWN 12 TO WHAT I FOUND OUT LATER WAS THE ROUNDHOUSE, 8TH AND RACE. 13 I WAS PUT IN THIS CUBICLE, THIS ROOM THAT 14 HAD NO WINDOWS OK ANYTHING. AND WHEN I WAS ASKED TO GO INTO THE ROOM, I ASKED TO SIT OUTSIDE OF THE ROOM BECAUSE I HAVE A 15 PHOBIA ABOUT BEING CLOSED IN. I DIDN'T KNOW WHY I HAD TO GO 16 IN IN THE FIRST PLACE, WHAT HAD I DONE. SO I WAS ALLOWED TO 17 SIT OUTSIDE. 18

19 I WAS ASKED MY NAME AND ADDRESS; I GAVE 20 THAT. WHEN I WOULDN'T GIVE MY SOCIAL SECUKITY NUMBER, I WAS 21 TOLD TO GET THE HELL INSIDE THIS CUBICLE, AND THEY SLAMMED 22 THE DOOR ON ME.

23 IN THE MEANTIME MY FRIEND, THE OFFICER WHO 24 ARRESTED HIM WAS INTIMATING HIM, "I BET YOU THINK YOU ARE 25 SOMEBODY, I BET YOU THINK YOU ARE SMART," ALL KINDS OF CRAZY 1 STUFF, STUFF I DIDN'T UNDERSTAND.

2 HE WAS PUT INTO THIS, WHATEVER THIS CUBICLE 3 WAS NEXT TO ME. I THINN THERE WERE OTHER MEN IN THERE. I 4 WAS IN THIS ONE BY MYSELF. I WAS ALONE, ABOUT A HALF AN HOUR 5 OR SO; I WAS VERY UPSET AND SCARED ABOUT BEING IN THFRE. I ASNED COULD I GO TO THE BATHROOM, I WAS TOLD, "YEAH, ONAY, 6 FINE, WE WILL GET YOU A MATRON." 7 AND AFTER AN HOUR WENT BY, I STARTED 8 BANGING ON THE DOOR. I WAS ASNING COULD I GO TO THE LADIES 9 10 ROOM, NOBODY HEARD ME. I WAS TULD NOTHING, I KNOCKED ON THE DOOR. 11 12 IN THE MEANTIME I WAS LISTENING TO WHAT WAS GOING ON IN THE OTHER CUBICLE. AND SOMEBODY WAS CUKSING. 13 THEY SAID, "WHICH ONE OF YOU M.F.'S DID THIS ON THE FLOOR?" 14 THIS GUY SAID, "WHICH ONE OF YOU DID IT BECAUSE I GOING TO 15 MAKE YOU LICK IT UP." 16 17 BECAUSE I WAS NIND OF FEARFUL ABOUT NNOCHING ON THE DOOR AGAIN, I HAD TO DO THE SAME THING, I HAD TO GO TO 18 THE BATHROOM ON THE FLOOR, BECAUSE I COULDN'T GET OUT. I 19 20 DIDN'T NNOCN ON THE DOOR ANY LONGER. OBVIOUSLY THEY WANIED 21 YOU TO DO THIS ON THE FLOOR. HOW LONG DID YOU WAIT? 22 Q.

23 A. I WAS NEPT IN THIS ROOM FOR THREE HOURS. 24 Q. HOW LONG DID YOU WAIT BEFORE YOU HAD TO 25 RELIEVE YOURSELF ON THE FLOOR?

1 I WAITED ABOUT AN HOUR AND A HALF. I WAITED Α. AS LONG AS I COULD, BELIEVE ME. I DON'T LINE WEITING ON 2 MYSELF. IT IS NOT PLEASANT. 3 THREE HOURS LATER SOMEONE OPENED THE DOOR 4 AND LOOKED IN. AT THAT TIME I ASKED THIS PERSON, THE 5 POLICEMAN, COULD I GO TO THE BATHROOM. SU I EXPLAINED THE 6 SITUATION THAT I HAD TO GO EARLIER TOO, BUT NO ONE WOULD LET 7 ME GO. HE SAYS, "THIS IS DISGUSTING," AND HE ALLOWED ME TO 8 GO TO THE BATHROOM. 9 10 THEN HE BEGAN TO REPRIMAND THE PEOPLE THAT 11 WERE THERE, "WHAT NIND OF STUFF IS THIS, WHY WAS SHE NOT 12 ALLOWED TO GO TO THE BATHROOM?" THEY CLAIMED THEY NEVER HEARD ME, I NEVER ASKED TO GO TO THE BATHROOM. 13 14 I SAID: "WHY ARE YOU TREATING ME LINE THIS? 15 I HAVEN'T BEEN CHARGED WITH ANYTHING, I AM BROUGH (HERE IN THE MIDDLE OF THE NIGHT, I HAVE BEEN HARASSED. WHAT RIGHT DU 16 17 YOU HAVE TO TREAT ME THIS WAY?" 18 ABOUT 6:30 IN THE MORNING, I WAS GIVEN MY POCNETBOON AND ESCORTED TO THE DOOR AND TOLD TO LEAVE. I 19 20 SAID, "I CAN LEAVE. WHAT DO YOU MEAN I CAN LEAVE?" BY THIS 21 TIME I AM JUST A NERVOUS WRECK, AFTER BEING IN A CUBICLE FOR 22 THREE AND A HALF TO FOUR HOURS. THEN I FIND OUT THAT MY FRIEND HAS NOT BEEN 23 24 RELEASED YET. SO I WAITED UNTIL ABOUT 6:30 THAT NIGHT AND 25 THEY RELEASED HIM.

1 WHEN HE CAME TO THIS HEARING ON ARRAIGNMENT 2 OR WHATEVER --HOLD IT. YOU WAITED AT THE STATION FROM 3 **a**. 6:30 IN THE MORNING UNTIL 9:00 AF NIGHF? 4 5 **A**. RIGHT, WAITING FOR MY FRIEND, 1 STAYED THERE BECAUSE I WANTED TO FIND OUT EXACTLY WHAT WAS GOING TO 6 7 HAPPEN TO HIM. 8 Q. SO YOU WAITED FROM 6:30 THAT MORNING UNTIL 9 9:00 THAT DAY? I WAITED FROM 6:30 IN THE MORNING UNTIL 6:30 10 A. 11 AT NIGHT. 6130 AT NIGHT? 12 Q. RIGHT. AT THAT FUNE HE CAME UP BEFORE THE 13 A. JUDGE. THEY SAID TO HIM THAT THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY HAD 14 DROPPED THE CHARGES. NOW I NEVER KNEW WHAT THE CHARGES WERE. 15 BUT SUPPOSEDLY, I WAS TOLD BY THE PERSON, THE COP THAT LET ME 16 GO TO THE BATHROOM THAT MORNING, THAT THEY SAID THEY FOUND 17 TWO BAGS OF REEFERS ON THE FLOOR 18 19 Q. ALL OVER, TWO BAGS OF REEFERS? 20 THIS WAS 1T, BUT HE WAS NEVER CHARGED WITH A. 21 THIS. 22 Q. ALLEGED? 23 ALLEGED, OKAY, THIS IS WHAT HE SAID. HE Α. SAID -- SOMEONE SAID THAT THERE WERE (WO BAGS OF REEFERS ON 24 THE FLOOR. 25

1	REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: FLOOR OF WHAT?
2	A. THE FLOOR OF THE CAR. SO WE WERE ALLOWED
3	THEN, AT 6:30 THEY RELEASED HIM.
4	WE WENT BACK OUT TO THE PARK, WHERE AT THAT
5	TIME WE LOOKED INSIDE THE CAR AND SOMEONE HAD WENT AND
6	URINATED ALL INSIDE, WHICH I THINK THE POLICE OFFICERS DID
7	BECAUSE WHEN WE LEFT, I REMEMBER, THAT NIGHT THEY SALD, "HEY,
8	DO YOU THINK YOUR CADILLAC WILL BE SAFE OUT HERE?" IT WAS
9	LIKE AN OLD BEAT UP CAR.
10	I THOUGHT THAT THEY MUST HAVE THOUGHT IT WAS
11	VERY SMART. I BELIEVE THEY URINATED INSIDE THE CAR, I DON'T
12	KNOW WHY.
13	WHEN WE CAME BACK THE NEXT DAY, A SUNDAY IF
14	WAS A LOT OF PEOPLE THERE, NOBODY HAD TAKEN ANYTHING OUT OF
15	THE CAR AND IT WAS STILL SITTING THERE, AND THAT WAS IT.
16	I DIDN'T KNOW WHO TO GET IN TOUCH WITH, I
17	DIDN'T KNOW WHERE TO GO FOR HELP. 1 FELT I JUST FELT IT
18	WAS UNRELIEVABLE
19	CHAIRMAN RHODES:
20	Q. IT SOUNDS UNBELIEVABLE.
21	A. THAT WAS THE FIRST TIME ANYTHING LIKE THAT
22	HAPPENED TO ME. I KNEW IT COULD HAPPEN BECAUSE I HEARD ABOUT
23	THINGS LIKE THAT, I NEVER EXPECTED IT TO HAPPEN TO ME.
24	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANK YOU,
25	A. THERE WAS ALSO ANOTHER INCIDENT, WHICH IS

MUCH SHORTER. 1 2 A HALF A BLOCK FROM WHERE I LIVE THERE IS A SCHOOL YARD ON LANCASTER AVENUE, AND I JOG THERE IN THE 3 EVENINGS I WAS RUNNING THERE ONE NIGHT WHEN A CAR CAME INTO 4 5 THE SCHOOLYARD. CHAIRMAN RHODES: 6 A POLICE CAR? 7 Q. 8 A. HE CAME AFTER ME AND RAN AFTER ME, AND HE 9 BLOCKED ME UP AGAINST THE WALL WITH HIS LIGHTS ON. 10 Q. WHEN WAS THIS? 11 A. THIS HAPPENED LAST YEAR IN JUNE. I DON'T KNOW THE DATE OF IT. IT HAPPENED IN '77. 12 MY BROTHER WAS SITTING THERE WAITING FOR ME; 13 14 IT WAS LATE AND SOMETIMES I GET SOMEBODY TO ACCOMPANY ME WHILE I RUN. AT THIS TIME THE POLICE OFFICER JUMPS OUT OF THE 15 16 CAR AND WHEN ---17 THE POLICE CAR JAMMED YOU AGAINST THE WALL? Q. I AM JUST RUNNING AROUND AND AROUND. 18 THE Α. 19 POLICE CAR COMES INTO THE SCHOOLYARD AND IT IS COMING AFTER 20 ME . AT FIRST I SEE IT COMING IN AND I IGNORE IT 21 22 UNTIL I FIND HE IS SPEEDING AFTER ME. AND I RUN AGAINST THE 23 WALL AND HE CHASES ME UP AGAINST THE WALL, AND I AM LIKE THIS 24 UP AGAINST THE WALL. 25 HE THEN PROCEEDS TO GET OUT OF HIS CAR REAL

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FAST, AND I TAKE OFF TO RUN UP THE STEP. THEN HE CROUCHES 1 DOWN IN A POSITION AND TAKES OUT HIS GUN AND HE SAID, "STOP, 2 YOU M.F. OR I WILL KILL YOU." 3 4 Q. HE ACTUALLY SAID THOSE WORDS? 5 A. YES HE ACTUALLY SAID THOSE WORDS. (NAS 6 PETRIFIED. 7 YOU STOPPED? a. – OF COURSE, ON THE SPOT, ON THE SPOT, BECAUSE 8 Å. I THOUGHT HE HAD SHOT ME. JUST THAT FAST, I THOUGHT HE HAD 9 10 KILLED ME. 11 AND WHAT HAD HAPPENED WAS HE DIDN'T REALIZE THAT I WAS A GIRL, POSSIBLY -- I DON'T KNON, MAYBE IT WAS THE 12 SHORT HAIRCUT. I DON'T KNOW WHAT THE EXCUSE WAS. 13 BUT HE ALSO SAID THERE WERE TWO YOUNG BLACK 14 15 BOYS OUTSIDE OF THE SCHOOLYARD WHO WERE WALKING AROUND, AND HE THOUGHT I WAS WITH THOSE TWO, AND THAT I WAS TRYING TO 16 17 BREAK INTO THE SCHOOL: BUT THE BUILDING, THE WINDOWS WERE TWO STORIES HIGH. I ASKED HIM, "HOW WAS I GOING TO GET UP 18 THERE, SCALE THE WALL?" 19 20 SO AT THIS TIME HE IS SHAKING AND SCARED, 21 AND I AM PETRIFIED. 22 ALL I COULD SAY TO HIM WAS, "WELL, IF YOU ARE 23 THAT AFRAID, YOU HAVE NO RIGHT AROUND HERE. YOU COULD HAVE KILLED ME FOR NOTHING, FOR NOTHING, I WASN'T DOING ANYTHING 24 25 BUT RUNNING."

1 CHAIRMAN RHODES: SU FAR AS I CAN TELL, 2 EMPLOYING THAT WEAPON IS A VIOLATION OF THE STATE LAW UNDER 3 THAT CIRCUMSTANCE REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: WHAT WAS THE OUTCOME OF 4 5 THIS? THE OUTCOME OF THE INCIDENT WAS, I WAS JUST 6 Α. SO AFRAID, I KEPT ON RUNNING AND CRYING BECAUSE I DIDN'T KNOW 7 WHAT TO DO. 8 9 I DIDN'T STOP TO GET HIS NUMBER. I DIDN'T 10 DO ANYTHING. 1 WASN'T RATIONAL AFTER THAT. I JUST RAN ON OUT OF THE SCHOOLYARD WITH MY BROTHER. 11 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: DO YOU REMEMBER THE 12 13 CAR NUMBER? I DIDN'T HAVE ANY OF THAT INFORMATION. WHEN 14 **A**. I WAS ASKED THAT THE NEXT DAY, I DIDN'T REMEMBER ANY OF IT. 15 CHAIRMAN RHODES: YOU WERE SCARED? 16 17 YES. A. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: DO YOU KNOW WHAT 18 DISTRICT IT WAS? 19 20 NO. Α. REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: RIGHIFULLY SO. 21 ALSO THE FIRST INCIDENT WHERE I DID FIND ONE 22 A. THING ON THE FLOOR OF THE CAR WHERE HE WENT BACK, THERE WAS A 23 24 TICKET SAYING THAT WE HAD BEEN STOPPED FOR SUME KIND OF A 25 LIGHT FAILURE, THE BACK LIGHT OF THE CAR. I HAVE THE TICKET

NITH ME HERE. THE REASON WE WERE STOPPED THAT DAY WHEN WE 1 WERE HARASSED WAS THAT HE HAD A LIGHT FAILURE OR SUMETHING, 2 THE REAR LIGHT WAS MISSING. 3 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: IS THERE AN ۸ OFFICER'S NAME AND BADGE NUMBER? 5 I HAVE THE BADGE NUMBER ON THIS TICKET OF Α. 6 7 THE OFFICER WHO HARASSED US, ONE OF THEM. CHAIRMAN RHODES: 8 WHAT IS THE BADGE NUMBER? THE BADGE NUMBER IS 5125. YOU CAN SEE THE 9 A. NAME. I CAN'T MAKE IT OUT TOO CLEARLY. 10 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU WANT THE TICKET? 11 REPRESENTATIVE CIANCIULLI: WOULD YOU SUBMIT 12 13 THAT AS EVIDENCE? 14 A. YES, YOU CAN HAVE IT. 15 (DOCUMENT HANDED TO REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS BY THE WITNESS.) 16 REPRESENTATIVE DUMAS: ARASKY, I BELIEVE. 17 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU WANT THE TICKET? YES. 19 Q. --- IN THE CAR? 20 A. YES. 21 BEFORE THAT HAVE YOU HAD ANY ENCOUNTERS WITH Q. 22 THE POLICE? 23 Α. NO. 24 Q. DO YOU KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT THE KIND OF 25 POLICE VIOLENCE, ABUSES IN PHILADELPHIA, PEOPLE HAVE TALKED

1 **ABOUT BEFORE?** 2 I HAVE SEEN IT . I HAVE SEEN A MAN ALMOST, A. ALMOST LITERALLY BEATEN TO DEATH WHILE WAITING FOR A BUS. 3 Ĩ SAW ABOUT 15 POLICEMEN ATTACK A MAN AT 56TH AND MARKET 4 STREETS. I CALLED THE NEWSPAPERS TO SEE IF ANYBODY HAD SEEN 5 THIS AND WHAT COULD BE DONE. 6 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHEN DID THAT OCCUR? 7 THIS OCCURRED LAST SUMMER. 8 Α. 9 (DISCUSSION OFF THE RECORD.) 10 **REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON**: WHAT I AM TRYING TO GET AF, MRS. MOORE, 15 11 ۵. 12 IN THIS CITY THIS PROBLEM HAS BREWED FOR SOME TIME. IN YOUR ESTIMATION, WOULD YOU OR COULD YOU 13 14 DESCRIBE TO US THE REACTION OF THE PEOPLE IN THE CITY IN RELATIONSHIP TO THIS VERY SERIOUS PROBLEM THAT YOU DESCRIBED 15 TO US TODAY IN BOTH INSTANCES? 16 17 A. NELL --18 CHAIRMAN RHODES: YOU ARE UNDER DATH. WHAT DOES THAT MEAN? 19 A. CHAIRMAN RHOUES: IT MEANS IF YOU SAY SOMETHING 20 21 NOT OF YOUR PERSONAL KNOWLEDGE, YOU WILL PUT YOURSELF UNDER 22 JEOPARDY OF PERJURY. 23 GO AHEAD AND ANSWER THE QUESTION. WELL, BELIEVE ME I HAVE BEEN LIVING IN THE 24 A. 25 CITY FOR 31 YEARS NOW. I THINK IF 1 CAN REFLECT THE IMAGE OF

SOME PEOPLE IN THE CITY IT IS A FEELING OF ALIENATION, FOR 1 INSTANCE, WE ARE REALLY BEING INFIMIDATED. WE ARE BEING 2 BRUTALIZED AND, ACTUALLY, I ALSO BELIEVE WE ARE BEING 3 MURDERED. 4 LIKE I SAID, THAT INCIDENT I COULD HAVE VERY 5 WELL BEEN KILLED AND NUBODY WOULD HAVE KNOWN ANYTHING ABOUT 6 IT. I WOULD HAVE BEEN DEAD. 7 IT IS A FEELING OF HELPLESSNESS, YOU KNOW. 8 9 WHO CAN WE GO TO? WHO WILL HELP US? 10 AND THEN THERE IS THAT FEELING OF CREDIBILITY, OUR WORD AGAINST THE POLICEMAN'S WORD. IF THAT 11 12 POLICEMAN HAD SHOT WE THAT NIGHT IN THE SCHOOLYARD, WHAT 13 WOULD HE HAVE SAID? I WOULD HAVE BEEN DEAD, YOU KNOW. 14 AND IN THE INCIDENT IN THE PARK, HERE AGAIN, 15 THE POLICEMAN, WHOEVER THAT WAS, HE COULD HAVE SAID, "YES, WE 16 FOUND TWO BAGS OF REEFERS ON THE FLOOR OF THE CAR. ' IT WOULD HAVE BEEN OUR WORD AGAINST HIS. LIKE I SAID, WE WEREN'T 17 EVEN CHARGED WITH IT. BUT IT STILL WOULD HAVE BEEN. 18 I FEEL WHAT IS GOING ON NON IS HORRIBLE AND 19 20 I THINK -- I FEAR FOR MY LIFE, AND I FEAR FOR MY SON'S LIFE. 21 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANK YOU. 22 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: THANK YOU VERY 23 MUCH. I AT NO TIME WILL ALLOW MYSELF OR ANYONE ELSE TO BE 24 INTIMIDATED WHO COMES TO TESTIFY. (F I HAVE A QUESTION, I 25 THINK AS A COMMITTEE MEMBER WHO SITS HERE IN THE CITY OF

1 PHILADELPHIA AS AN ELECTED REPRESENTATIVE WHO FINALLY GOT 2 THIS HEARING TO COME TO PHILADELPHIA, I WILL ASK THESE QUESTIONS THAT ARE NECESSARY IN ORDER TO MAKE THE RECORD 3 4 CLEAR. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. 5 6 (APPLAUSE.) CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANK YOU, MRS. MOORE. 7 (WITNESS EXCUSED.) 8 CHAIRMAN RHODES: ELISHEBA SHABAZZ ALI AND J. 9 ABDUL JON, ARE THEY HERE? ARE THE OTHERS HERE ALSO. I 10 11 THOUGHT YOU WANTED TO TESTIFY FOGETHER. MR. JON: WE DON'T ACTUALLY TESTIFY TOGETHER. 12 CHAIRMAN RHODES! SHE IS NOT HERE AT THIS TIME? 13 MR. JON! NO, SHE IS NOT. 14 CHAIRMAN RHODES: MR. CHAIRMAN RHODES: MR. JON, WILL YOU STAFE YOUR 1 FULL NAME AND ADDRESS FOR THE RECORD. 2 MY FULL NAME 15 I. ADBUL JON, A/K/A MICHAEL 3 Α. JONES. MY ADDRESS IS 6812 CLEARVIEW STREET, PHILADELPHIA, 4 PENNSYLVANIA. 5 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THANK YOU, MR. JON. 6 7 ALL RIGHT. A. 8 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WILL YOU PROCEED AND TELL US THE INCIDENTS YOU WOULD LIKE TO RELATE TO US? 9 I HAVE SEVERAL INCIDENTS THAT I WOULD LIKE 10 Α. 10 REFER TO YOU. 11 I WOULD LIKE TO START OFF WITH AN OLD ONE, A 12 13 BEATING INCIDENT THAT OCCURRED TO MYSELF. YOU KNOW, I WAS BEAT UP BY THE POLICE AND 17 THEN I WAS TAKEN INTO COURT UNDER THE CRIME OF COMMITTING 18 ASSAULT AND BATTERY. AND WHEN IT WAS FOUND I DID NOT COMMIT 19 20 ASSAULT AND BATTERY -- ALTHOUGH IT WAS TOTALLY UNDERSTOOD 21 ASSAULT AND BATTERY WAS COMMITTED UPON ME --- THERE WAS NO 22 ACTION I COULD TAKE IN REGARD TO THE SITUATION. 23 WHEN DID THE INCIDENT OCCUR? Q. THE INCIDENT TOOK PLACE ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO 24 A. IN THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY OR MARCH. I WAS STANDING ON THE 25

CORNER WITH SOME FRIENDS OF MINE WHO WERE REPAIRING THEIR CAR 1 2 AT WHICH TIME AN OFFICER PULLED UP AND ASKED THEM WHOSE CAR 3 IT WAS. AND MY FRIEND TOLD THEM THAT -- IT WAS A CAR OF SOME FRIENDS OF MINE. 4 ANOTHER OFFICER PULLED UP AND HE AS WELL 5 CAME OVER AND WHAT-NOT. 1 THINK HE WEN' THROUGH THE COAT OF 6 ONE --- THE COAT INSIDE ONE OF THE CARS, AT WHICH FIME I TOLD 7 HIM THAT BELONGED -- I INDICATED THE OWNER OF THE CAR. 8 HE CAME OVER TO ME AND ASKED ME IF I HAD ANY 9 10 BUSINESS THERE AND WHAT-NOT. THESE 16 PEOPLE HOLD YOU RESPONSIBLE FOR CRIMES AND HOLD YOU 17 RESPONSIBLE FOR INJUSTICES YOU MIGHT DO TO ANOTHER AND WAGE INJUSTICES AGAINST YOU AT THE EXPENSE OF TAXPAYERS, CALLING 18 THEMSELVES PROTECTIVE AGENCIES. 19 IS THIS THE ONLY INCIDENT? 20 Q. 21 A. NO. 22 e. WHAT IS THE NEXT INCIDEN (? 23 THE NEXT INCIDENT CAME ABOUT DURING THE PAST A. 24 YEAR, SINCE MAY 20TH WHILE I HAVE BEEN AROUND THE MOVE 25 ORGANIZATION. SEVERAL TIMES, YOU KNOW, AROUND THE IMMEDIATE

TIME FROM MAY 20TH WHEN THE WARRANTS WERE FIRST PLACED OUT ON 1 2 MOVE, I WAS ARRESTED. I NAS ARRESTED FOR LOOKING LIKE 3 SOMEONE, YOU KNOW. THEY ARRESTED WE BECAUSE I WAS SUPPOSED TO BE SOMEBODY THEY ALREADY HALL LUCKED UP IN THE CONFINES OF 4 5 307 AND 309, 33RD STREET. I AM SAYING WHY DID THEY ARREST ME? BE ARRESTED WAS ON MARCH 16TH WHEN THEY FIRST IMPLEMENTED THE 20 21 BLOCKADE ON MOVE. 22 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THAT WAS YOUR FIRST CONTEMPT OF COURT ARREST? 23 I WAS ARRESTED FOR A POSSIBLE CONTEMPT OF 24 A. 25 COURT ORDER AT WHICH TIME I WAS ~- THE CONFEMPT OF COURT

1 ORDER WAS THROWN OUT, BUT THEY KEPT ME FOR CONTEMPT OF COURT 2 BECAUSE WHEN IT WAS SAID THAT THE COURT ORDER WAS READ TO ME 3 I SAID, "NO, IT WASN'T." I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO BRING TO YOUR ATTENTION Â 5 IN THIS COUNTRY AND IN THIS STATE YOU ARE SUPPOSED TO HAVE A LAWYER PRESENT. THEY HAD TWO DISTRICT ATTORNEYS PRESENT IN 6 THAT COURTROOM. I'VE BEEN IN HOLMESBURG, 1'VE BEEN IN 3 THE BETENTION CENTER, AND I'VE BEEN IN THE CREEK. 4 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: CREEK, MEANING 5 THE HOUSE OF CORRECTION? 6 7 HOUSE OF CORRECTION. A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU HAVE ANY FURTHER 8 9 TESTIMONY TO GIVE? 10 YES, I DO. A. 1 THING HAPPENED. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THIS DIDN'T HAPPEN 2 LAST YEAR, THIS HAS NEVER HAPPENED IN THE HISTORY OF THE 3 STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA. 4 NEVER POLICE BRUTALITY? 5 A. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: NEVER HAS --6 7 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: THIS IS THE FIRST TIME BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. 8 WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO BE ARLE TO DU? 9 Α. 10 CHAIRMAN RHODES: MRS. ALI --11 SISTER ELISHEBA SHABAZZ ALI. A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: SISTER ALI, THIS IS A DULY 12 CONSTITUTED INVESTIGATION WITH SUBPOENA POWER OF THE HOUSE OF 13 14 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA. 15 A. YES. CHAIRMAN RHODES: OUR AIM IN HOLDING THIS 16 HEARING IS TO DETERMINE, PURSUANE TO RESOLUTION 109 WHICH 17 AUTHORIZES THIS INVESTIGATION, WHETHER OR NOT THERE IS A 18 SERIOUS PROBLEM OF POLICE VIOLATION OF CIVIL RIGHTS OF 19 CITIZENS OF THIS CITY. 20 21 A. OKAY. 22 CHAIRMAN RHODES: IF, BY DIRECT TESTIMONY OF 23 INDIVIDUALS WHO SO FAR TESTIFIED BEFORE THE SUBCOMMITTEE AND WILL IN THE FUTURE TESTIFIED TO THIS SUBCOMMITTEE, IT IS 24 25 DETERMINED BY THIS SUBCOMMITTEE THERE IS A GRAVE AND SERIOUS

1	PROBLEM OF POLICE VIOLATION OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS OF THE
2	CITIZENS OF THIS CITY, THEN THIS COMMITTEE CAN RECOMMEND
3	EXTRAORDINARY ACTIONS TO THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE, TO THE
4	ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THIS STATE, TO THE ADJUTANT GENERAL OF
5	THIS STATE, TO THE LEGISLATURE OF THIS STATE TO PASS LAWS,
6	TAKE EXECUTIVE ACTION, WHATEVER IS NECESSARY TO BUARANTEE
7	THAT THE CITIZENS OF PENNSYLVANIA WHO HAPPEN TO BE CITIZENS
8	OF THIS CITY ARE NOT ABUSED.
9	A. I WOULD HAVE TO CUT YOU OFF.
10	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THAT IS WHAT THIS
11	INVESTIGATION IS.
12	A. I HAVE REALLY HEARD ALL OF THIS BEFORE. AND
13	IT STILL HAPPENS THAT POLICE BRUTALITY IS STILL ALIVE AND
14	THRIVING, NOTHING HAS BEEN DONE.
15	CHAIRMAN RHODES: THAT IS ALL WE CAN TELL YOU.
16	DO YOU HAVE ANY
17	A. NOW; I AM ASKING YOU ARE YOU GUING TO DEAL
18	WITH SOMETHING THAT IS QUITE PRESENT AND SOMETHING THAT IS
19	HAPPENING RIGHT NOW? I AM SURE JUST ABOUT ALL OF THE OTHER
20	CASES WERE LAST WEEN, LAST MONTH, LAST YEAR.
21	THIS IS SOMETHING THAT IS HAPPENING NOW, THE
22	MOVE GROUP. THEIR CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS HAVE BEEN VIOLATED,
23	THEIR CIVIL RIGHTS HAVE BEEN VIOLATED, AND THEIR HUMAN

IF YOU 5 WANT ENDORSEMEN'S OF POLICE BRUTALITY I AM SURE ALL OF THEM 6 WILL GIVE IT TO YOU, ALL OF THEM. 7 CHAIRMAN RHODES: SISTER ALI ---8 ALI. 9 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU HAVE PERSONAL 10 KNOWLEDGE OF INCIDENTS OF POLICE VIOLATIONS OF CIVIL RIGHTS 11 TO CITIZENS OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA THAT YOU WANT TO GIVE 12 13 US? 14 PERSONALLY, NO. PERSONALLY, NO; BECAUSE YOU Α. 15 KNOW WHAT, THERE IS NOTHING THAT 1 WOULD ACTUALLY ALLOW A 16 POLICEMAN TO DO TO ME. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WELL, WE MUST MOVE ON. WE 17 HAVE PEOPLE WHO DO WANT TO TESTIFY. 18 19 1 WANT TO KNOW WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO FOR Α. 20 THOSE PEOPLE? CHAIRMAN RHODES: WE ARE NOT HERE TO ANSWER 21 22 QUESTIONS. A. YOU ARE NOT HERE TO ANSWER QUESTIONS? 23 24 CHAIRMAN RHODES:. WE ARE HERE TO DETERMINE FUR 25 THE RECORD OF THIS COMMITTEE WHETHER OR NOT THERE IS A

PROBLEM IN THIS CITY; AND WE ARE ASKING PEOPLE TO COME 1 FORWARD TO TESTIFY. 2 (DISCUSSION OFF THE RECORD.) 3 (PAUSE.) 4 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS OR 5 6 RICHARDSON CAN MAKE A STATEMENT. DO YOU WANT TO MAKE A STATEMENT? 7 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: SISTER, I WANT TO SAY 8 THIS IN RESPONSE TO THE QUESTIONS, I DON'T KNOW WHETHER IT 9 WILL SATISFY YOU: 10 THIS COMMITTEE HERE IS A STATE COMMITTEE TO 11 12 INVESTIGATE CIVIL RIGHTS VIOLATIONS. IT IS HERE ONLY BECAUSE 13 A LOT OF US THINK THERE ARE OR MAY BE, I DON'T WAN' TO GET 14 INTO THAT. 15 WE ARE CONDUCTING A HEARING TO COLLECT INFORMATION FOR TWO REASONS, AS I SEE IT: ONE FOR 16 LEGISLATIVE AND OTHER KINDS OF RECOMMENDATIONS AND TWO, 17 18 HOPEFULLY TO BE AWARE OF THE FACT THAT IT EXISTS BECAUSE ---19 WELL ---Α. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: LET ME FINISH --20 21 BECAUSE MOST INSTITUTIONS THAT RUN THE SYSTEM DON'T BELIEVE THAT, OUR PEOPLE DON'T BELIEVE THAT. 22 NON, THAT MIGHT NOT SAY MUCH TO YOU. 23 NO, IT DOESN'T. 24 A. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: I WANT TO SAY ONE 25

ELISHEBA SHABAZZ ALI

1 ADDITIONAL THING TO YOU. WHATEVER LITTLE THIS IS, WHATEVER 2 LITTLE THIS IS, AND I KNOW NONE OF US HERE IS GOD, WE FOUGH! VERY HARD TO HAVE IT BE. AND YOU WILL HEAR A LOT OF PEOPLE 3 COME BECAUSE THEY WANT TO SAY WE HOPE THERE IS SOME HOPE. I DON'T BELIEVE IN DOING NOTHING. WHEN PEOPLE FIGHT YOU HARD 5 FOR ONE STEP, SOMETHING IS GOING ON. 6 NOW THAT MIGHT NOT SATISFY YOU BUT WE ARE 7 HERE, NOT ONLY SINCERELY, TO HOPEFULLY PROVIDE SOME HOPE. 8 9 THERE IS NO GUARANTEE BUT SOMEWHERE, SOMETIME, SOME PEOPLE 10 HAVE TO TURN THIS PROBLEM AROUND. WE JUST STARTED. ONAY. (APPLAUSE.) 11 WITH ALL DUE RESPECT TO WHAT YOU SAID, A LOT 12 US UP HERE HAVE HAD THE SAME PROBLEM YOU HAVE HAD IN OUR 13 FAMILIES TOO, THIS IS NOT AROUT ANY SPECIAL GROUP, ALL 14 RIGHT? 15 16 Α. BUT WE CAN TURN IT AROUND? 17 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THIS IS ABOUT EVERYBODY, BLACK, WHITE, YOUNG ---18 AS A MATTER OF FACT, SO FAR AS I AM 19 A. 20 CONCERNED AS LONG AS YOU ARE GOING TO DEAL WITH POLICE BRUTALITY AND CONTINUE TO HAVE THE PERPETRATOR OF THAT 21 BRUTALITY IN THE MAYOR'S SEAT, THEN YOU ARE NOT DEALING WITH 22 23 POLICE BRUTALITY. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: GO TELL HIM THAT. 24 WE'RE NOT GOD. WE ARE JUST TRYING. 25

I AM ASKING YOU TO GO TELL HIM THAT IF YOU 1 Δ. ARE GOING TO BE A STATE REPRESENTATIVE AND REPRESENT THE 2 PEOPLE OF THE STATE --3 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON 4 WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A STATEMENT. 5 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: REPRESENTATIVE 6 RICHARDSON WOULD LIKE TO SAY SOMETHING AT THIS TIME. 7 8 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: I JUST WANT TO SAY THE INQUIRY MADE BY SISTER ALL TO THIS COMMITTEE SHOULD NOT 9 BE TAKEN LIGHTLY AS ANY OTHER PERSON TESTIFYING BEFORE THIS 10 11 COMMITTEE. SHE HAS ASKED US LEGITIMATELY WHETHER OR NOT WE 12 WOULD AS A COMMITTEE LOON INTO THE SITUATION INVOLVING THE INJUSTICES OF THE MOVE ORGANIZATION, PERHAPS THE CIVIL 13 VIOLENCE AND CIVIL DISORDERS OUT THERE AT MOVE HEADQUARTERS. 14 I DO NOT THINK THAT WE CAN JUST SIT BY, MR. CHAIRMAN, AND NOT 15 DEAL WITH THE REQUESTS THAT HAVE BEEN MADE BY SISTER ALI. 16 WHAT I WOULD SUGGEST THOUGH, MR. CHAIRMAN, 17 18 IS THAT THIS COMMITTEE, SINCE IT IS HERE IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA AND IS HOLDING AN INVESTIGATION CONCERNING THIS 19 20 MATTER, 60 ON RECORD TO SPECIFICALLY -- ALSO AS WE ARE DOING 21 WITH THIS WHOLE QUESTION OF POLICE VIOLENCE -- LOOK INTO THE MOVE SITUATION RELEVANT TO THE QUESTIONS BEING RAISED BY THE 22 23 SISTER. I DON'T THINK THERE IS ANY WAY OUT OF THE WAY WHAT SHE HAS ASKED NOR IS IT A VIOLATION OF WHAT THIS COMMITTEE'S 24 RESPONSIBILITY IS WHILE WE ARE HERE IN THE CITY OF 25

PHILADELPHIA. 1 I WOULD SO MOVE --2 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WE ARE NOT IN A MEETING. 3 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: IF WE ARE NOT IN A 4 5 MEETING, I WOULD LIKE TO PLACE ON THE RECORD I WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A RECOMMENDATION TO THIS COMMITTEE THAT WE DO JUST THAT 6 WHILE WE ARE HERE IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA. I DO NOT 7 8 THINK HER REQUEST IS SOMETHING THAT WE SHOULD PLAY DOWN. REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: MAY I ASK --9 10 I WANT TO ASK A QUESTION: DO YOU HAVE THE A. POWER TO DO ANYTHING? 11 12 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THE QUESTION IS OUT OF ORDER. 13 A. CAN YOU DO ANY (HING? I KEAN CAN YOU DO ANYTHING OTHER THAN SIT THERE AND BECOME THE PUPPETS OF THE 14 PUPPETEER? I MEAN, CAN YOU DO ANYTHING? 15 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WHITE, DO YOU 16 WANT TO MAKE A STATEMENT. 17 18 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: I DO. 19 THIS COMMITTEE HAS THE POWER AUTHORIZED BY 20 THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES; AND EACH MEMBER OF THAT HOUSE -- THOSE WHO VOTED FOR AND THOSE WHO VOTED AGAINST THIS 21 INVESTIGATION, THE POWER, THE SUBPOENA POWER TO CONDUCT THIS 22 INVESTIGATION -- IS LOOKING TO SEE EXACTLY WHAT THE OUICOME 23 OF OUR HEARINGS ARE GOING TO BE. 24 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS POINTED OUT THAT WE 25

HAVE HAD TO FIGHT AND STRUGGLE EACH STEP OF THE WAY. WE HAD 1 TO FIGHT IN ORDER TO GET CRIMINAL VIOLATIONS BY LAW 2 3 ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS INCLUDED IN THE RESOLUTION FROM THE VERY BEGINNING BECAUSE THERE ARE INDIVIDUALS WHO SIT ON THIS 4 5 COMMITTEE WHO ARE MORE INTERESTED IN PROTECTING THE INTEGRITY OF THE LEADERSHIP OF THIS CITY -- WHO HAVE NOT BEEN TO ONE 6 7 HEARING, NOT ONE -- THAN THEY ARE IN PROTECTING THE RIGHTS OF 8 CITIZENS.

NOW, THOSE OF US WHO FEEL CONTRARY TO THAT
HAVE TRIED AS BEST WE COULD NOT TO WAIVER ONE IOTA IN THE
RESPONSIBILITY WITH WHICH WE WERE CHARGED, AND THAT IS TO
INVESTIGATE VIOLATIONS OF CIVIL RIGHTS OF INDIVIDUALS BY LAW
ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS AT THE TUP OF THAT LIST FROM THE
OUTSET. IT IS FOR US TO TAKE A LOOK AT THE ALLEGED ABUSE
CASES HERE IN PHILADELPHIA.

16 I SHARE PROBABLY THE SAME OPINION THAT YOU 17 DO WITH REGARD TO US CONDUCTING THESE HEARINGS? AT THE SAME 18 TIME ALMOST TOTALLY IGNORING THE FACT THAT PROBABLY RIGHT NOW WHILE THESE HEARINGS ARE GOING ON THERE ARE INDIVIDUALS, MOVE 19 20 MEMBERS, THOSE SUSPECTED AS BEING MEMBERS OF THE MOVE ORGANIZATION, AND THOSE WHO ARE FAR REMOVED FROM THE MOVE 21 22 SITUATION WHO ARE HAVING THEIR CIVIL RIGHTS VIOLATED BY LAW 23 ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS.

24 BUT IT IS NOT GOING TO BE UNFIL WE CONCLUDE 25 THE HEARINGS, THE PUBLIC HEARINGS WITH REGARD TO CITIZENS

COMING FORWARD, HOPEFULLY FURTHER HEARINGS THAT WE WILL 1 INVITE OFFICIALS TO COME IN AND TO PRESENT TESTIMONY IN 2 DEFENSE, IN SOME CASES, OF SOME OF THE THINGS THAT PEOPLE 3 HAVE BEEN SAYING IN REGARD TO POLICE ABUSE. IT IS NOT GOING Δ TO BE FINISHED UNTIL WE COMPLETE THAT PHASE OF THE 5 INVESTIGATION, UNFIL A REPORT IS SUBMITTED TO THE HOUSE OF 6 REPRESENTATIVES, UNTIL LEGISLATION IS DRAFTED TO CURTAIL 7 POLICE VIOLENCE, AND LEGISLATURE CAN BE DRAFTED TO DO THAT. 8 WHEN YOU SPEAK OF THE LEADERSHIP OF THIS 9 CITY, NOT ONE STATE REPRESENTATIVE SITTING AT THIS PANEL HAS 10 11 THE POWER TO REMOVE FRANK RIZZO FROM OFFICE. IF IT IS GOING TO HAPPEN, IT IS GOING TO HAPPEN BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY 12 13 DECIDING ON THEIR OWN THAT FRANK RIZZO SHOULD NOT BE THERE. AND NOT ONE OF US HAS THE POWER TO REMOVE HIM AS AN 14 15 INDIVIDUAL. 16 BUT THAT IS A DECISION AND THAT IS A RIGHT THAT EACH ONE OF US AS CITIZENS AT SOME POINT MUST EXERCISE. 17 TO ANSWER YOUR QUESTION IN TERMS OF WHAT 18 POWER WE HAVE, IT DOES NOT GO BEYOND WHAT WE HAVE SAID. 19 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WE WILL GO OFF THE RECORD FOR 20 21 A MOMENT. (DISCUSSION OFF THE RECORD.) 22 23 (WITNESS EXCUSED.) CHAIRMAN RHODES: BACK ON THE RECORD. 24 THE NEXT WITNESS BEFORE THE COMMITTEE IS MR. 25

STATEMENT YOU WANT TO READ INTO THE RECORD, MR. NOTTAGE? 16 17 YES, I DO. A. 18 Q. GO AHEAD. 19 A. I WILL START OVER AGAIN. 20 MY NAME IS DAVID LIVINGSTUN NOTTAGE AND I 21 RESIDE AT 417 WEST UPSAL STREET, IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA, WHICH FOR THE RECORD IS IN THE UNITED STATES OF 22 23 AMERICA. THESE HEARINGS IN PHILADELPHIA ON PUBLIC 24 25 CONDUCT BY THE STATE HOUSE OF REPRESEN)ATIVES SUBCOMMITTEE ON

CRIME AND CORRECTIONS WHICH IS A PART OF A STATEWIDE
 INVESTIGATION INTO ORGANIZED CRIME, OFFICIAL CORRUPTION AND
 CIVIL RIGHTS VIOLATIONS IS INDEED PRAISEWORTHY. AND I HIGHLY
 COMMEND ALL THE MEMBERS OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE AS WELL AS ALL
 THOSE HAVING ANY PART, NO MATTER HOW SMALL, IN MAKING THESE
 HEARINGS POSSIBLE.

I COMMEND ALSO ALL THOSE PARTIPATING IN THE 7 STATEWIDE INVESTIGATION. I HAVE GREAT PRAISE FOR THE CLERGY 8 AND THEIR CONGREGATION AND THE DIHER ADMINISTRATORS FOR USE 9 OF THEIR AUDITORIUMS FOR MANING THESE HEARINGS A REALITY. 10 11 I ALSO HOLD IN HIGHEST ESTEEM EACH WITNESS AS WELL AS THOSE ATTENDING THE HEARINGS BECAUSE HAVING TO 12 13 PUBLICLY RELIVE EVENTS OF THEIR PAST EXPERIENCES MUST INDEED BE VERY PAINFUL. I WAS EDUCATED IN THE CITY OF BROTHERLY LOVE. I SERVED ACTIVE WAR DUTY IN THE U.S. AIR 10 FORCE, AND AFTER BEING HONORABLY DISCHARGED I SERVED IN THE 11 12 AIR FORCE RESERVES.

13 THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA IS A CITY OF 14 BROTHERLY LOVE. IT IS A GREAT CITY. THE CITY OF 15 PENNSYLVANIA IS A GREAT -- PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA IS A 16 VERY GREAT CITY. I SAID I WAS BORN HERE BUT MORE IMPORTANT 17 THAN THIS WAS THAT FREEDOM WAS BORN HERE. WORDS AND IDEAS 18 LIKE 'RIGHTS, FREEDOM, LIBERTY, JUSTICE FOR ALL,' MADE THIS 19 COUNTRY WHAT IT IS TODAY.

20 THE PROBABILITY OF MY DYING IN THE GHETTU 21 WHERE I WAS BORN IS EXTREMELY HIGH. IT WOULD BE TRAGIC 22 INDEED IF FREEDOM WHICH WILL NEVER DIE, DIES HERE IN THE CITY 23 OF BROTHERLY LOVE, ITS BIRTHPLACE.

24 MY TESTIMONY COULD RELATE TO MANY ABUSES BY 25 OFFICERS, OFFICIALS, OR IT COULD RELATE IN EVEN GREATER

NUMBER -- I DON'T KNOW IF YOU CAN TAKE THIS -- OF HONEST, 1 2 UPRIGHT, JUST AND EVEN UNDESERVING CONSIDERATIONS BESTOVED 3 UPON ME BY OFFICERS AND OFFICIALS. NEED I SAY THAT SOME OF MY BEST FRIENUS ARE 4 POLICE OFFICERS. NEED I SAY THAT SOME OF MY TENNIS PARTNERS 5 ARE POLICE OFFICERS. NEED I SAY THAT SOME OF MY CHURCH 6 7 MEMBERS ARE OFFICERS. WOULD YOU BELIEVE SOME MINISTERS ARE 8 OFFICERS? I SAY THAT TO SAY ALL THIS: I AM CONFIDENT THAT 9 THERE ARE MANY FINE POLICE OFFICERS. 10 11 I AM CONFIDENT AS IN MANY UTHER AREAS THAT QUOTE "GOOD" AS WELL AS OTHERS AS WITH THE -- AS WELL AS 12 OTHERS -- I AM CONFIDENT THAT THERE ARE MANY FINE POLICE 13 14 OFFICERS AS IN MANY OTHER FIELDS AS THERE ARE QUOTE 'GOOD' AS WELL AS OTHERS. I DON'T KNOW IF YOU NNOW WHAT I MEAN BY 15 THAT, BUT WHAT I MEAN IS THAT IN EVERY FIELD YOU ARE GOING TU 16 17 HAVE QUOTE "SO-CALLED GOOD," AS WELL AS YOU HAVE QUOTE "OTHERS". 18 19 BUT I AM ALSO CONFIDENT THAT THE QUOTE "GOOD" UNQUOTE OUTNUMBER THE OTHERS. YOU MAY NOT UNDERSTAND 20 21 WHAT I MEAN, BUT AS I GO ALONG YOU WILL UNVERSTAND. JUST AS IN OTHER GROUPS WE MUST BE VERY, 22 VERY CAREFUL NOT TO JUDGE THE WHOLE BY THE ACTS OF 23 INDIVIDUALS. THERE AKE GOOD TEACHERS AND OTHERS. I SHOULD 24 25 SAY THERE ARE QUOTE "GOOD" UNQUOTE TEACHERS AND OTHERS.

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THERE ARE QUOTE "GOOD" UNQUOTE DRIVERS AND OTHERS. THERE ARE 1 2 QUOTE "GOOD" UNQUOTE FATHERS AND OTHERS. THERE ARE QUOTE "GOOD" UNQUOTE STUDENTS AND OTHERS. 1 COULD GO ON CITING 3 EXAMPLE AFTER EXAMPLE, AND I AM CONFIDENT --4 IS THAT IT? CHAIRMAN RHODES: 5 -- THAT THE GOOD OUTNUMBER THE OTHERS. A. 6 NOW YOU NOTE I HAVE FREQUENTLY REFERRED TO 7 8 OTHERS WHEN I COULD HAVE USED OTHER WORDS SUCH AS -- I DON'T KNOW IF YOU CAN TAKE THIS -- PIGS, GESTAPO, OR JUST THE 9 OPPOSITE OF GOOD WHICH IS QUOTE "BAD" UNQUOTE. 10 I PUT THE WORD GOOD IN QUOTATION MARKS 11 BECAUSE I AM OF THE BELIEF THAT NO ONE IS GOUD, AT LEAST NOT 12 ALL THE TIME. LIKEWISE, I HAVE PUT THE WORD BAD IN QUOTES, 13 QUOTATION MARKS BECAUSE I AM OF THE BELIEF THAT IN ALL OF US 14 THERE MAY BE SOME BAD BUT NOT ALL BAD. 15 ACTUALLY I AM OF THE BELIEF THAT NO ONE IS 16 THEREFORE I USE THE WORD OTHERS. BUT BY OTHERS I MEAN 17 BAD. THE MISINFORMER, THE UNEDUCATED, THE BRAINWASHED, THE 18 FEARFUL, THE SICK WHICH INCLUDE MENIALLY, THE EMOTIONALLY 19 20 AND THE MORALLY ILL. THIS IS PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA, WHICH IS 21 THE CITY OF BROTHERLY LOVE. THIS IS THE UNITED STATES OF 22 AMERICA, THE LAND OF THE FREE. LET US NOT FORGET THIS. 23 WE 24 ALL CAN GO A LONG WAY IN THE DIRECTION OF CURING ALL ILLS AND 25 WRONGDOING. LET US NOT FORGET THAT THIS IS THE LAND OF THE

FREE AND THE OPPRESSION OF ANYONE WILL BE ITSELF DESTRUCTION 1 2 OF THE OPPRESSOR. IT IS STILL TRUE THAT UNITED WE STAND, 3 DIVIDED THIS COUNTRY WILL SURELY FALL. LET YOUR IDEAS AND 4 LEGISLATURE EMANATE FROM AN ATMOSPHERE OF LOVE AND COMPASSION 5 FOR ALL MANKIND AS HUMANS. BY SO DOING PHILADELPHIA, 6 PENNSYLVANIA, THE CITY OF BROTHERLY LOVE, THE UNITED STATES 7 OF AMERICA, THE LAND OF THE FREE AS WELL AS THE ENTIRE 8 UNIVERSE WILL BE A BETTER PLACE WHERE PEACE AND HARMONY WILL 9 FREELY FLOURISH. 10 11 CHAIRMAN RHODES. I WOULD LIKE TO KNOW WHO TO GO TO, TO HAVE 21 IT STOPPED, BEING UNDER SURVEILLANCE. 22 WHAT DO YOU MEAN YOU ARE UNDER Q. 23 SURVEILLANCE? 24 A. PHYSICAL SURVEILLANCE. SOMEONE HAD 25 COMMITTED A CRIME, AND I REPORTED IT TO THE POLICE AND THEY

LIKE I HAVE HAD NUMEROUS INCIDENTS A. 25 THAT HAPPENED TO ME BY THE PHILADELPHIA POLICE DEPARTMENT AND

THE CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE SQUAD. 1 2 IT WAS LIKE ONE TIME I WAS IN THE AREA OF 33RD AND POPLAR -- AND I AN NOT A MOVE MEMBER LET'S GET THAT 3 CLEAR, AND I WASN'T SUPPORTIVE AT THAT TIME. AS I WAS 4 5 WALKING DOWN 33RD STREET ---CHAIRMAN RHODES: APPROXIMATELY WHAT YEAR AND 6 7 WHAT MONITH WAS THIS? THIS WAS LIKE IN JULY OF 1977. 8 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: JULY OF '77? 9 10 RIGHT. A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: 11 GO AHEAD. AND LIKE I WAS WALKING DOWN 33RD STREET AND 12 Α. 13 A MOVE MEMBER ASKED ME TO GO TO THE STORE FOR HIM. SO HE 14 SAID HE WANTED TWO 50-POUND BAGS OF DOG FOOD AND 30 DOZEN OF EGGS. I WAS TOOKEN AROUND FIRST, YOU 7 KNOW, THEY DIDN'T TAKE ME TO THE POLICE STATION RIGHT AWAY. 8 9 THEY RODE ME ALL AROUND AND THREATENED ME IN THE FRONT OF THE 10 SEAT AND BACK WHAT THEY SHOULD DO TO ME, WHETHER THEY SHOULD 11 KILL ME WHATEVER, AND ALL THAT. SO, FINALLY I WAS TAKEN TO THE POLICE 12 13 STATION AT 55TH AND PINE STREETS WHERE I WAS HANDCUFFED TO A 14 CHAIR, WHERE I WAS LIKE THREATENED, YOU KNOW, AND LIKE TOLD 15 IF I WOULD EVER COME IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD AGAIN; THAT I WOULD BE KILLED. AND SO IN TURN I STAYED DOWN THERE FOR LIKE FOUR 16 17 HOURS UNTIL FINALLY I WAS RELEASED. AFTER I WAS RELEASED, I WAS STILL LIKE COMING AROUND THAT AREA. 18 19 AND THEN IN OCTOBER OF 1977, I WAS 20 CONFRONTED BY THE SAME OFFICERS AND THE SAME CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE SQUAD; AND THIS TIME I WAS WALKING DOWN THE 21 22 STREET AND THIS GIRL THAT LIVED IN THE AREA ASKED ME TO HELP 23 HER CARRY HER BAGS WHILE SHE TAKES HER LITTLE CHILDREN AND 24 CARRY HER CHILDREN TO A SUBWAY SURFACE CAR. SO I, IN TURN, OFFERED TO HELP HER. SO I HELPED HER. 25

1 AND AS I WAS WALKING DOWN I BOT NO FURTHER THAN ABOUT 33RD AND POPLAR THE SAME OFFICERS CONFRONTED HE 2 3 AGAIN AND SAID, "WIDN'T I TELL YOU I DON'T WANT YOU AROUND HERE NO MORE," LIKE THAT. HE ASKED ME WHAT DID I HAVE IN THE Δ BAG. I TOLD HIM LIKE I HAD SOME CLUTHES IN THE BAG THIS 5 WOMAN JUST GAVE ME. HE ASKED ME -- HE TRIED TO TAKE THE BAG ٨ 7 FROM ME. SO I TOLD HIM LIKE I WOULD EMPTY THE BAG AND LET HIM SEE WHAT IS IN IT, TAKE THE THINGS OUT ONE AT A TIME AND 8 9 LET HIM SEE WHAT WAS IN IT. HE IN TURN HE SAID HE DIDN'T WANT TO DO THAT. 10 HE IN TURN GRABBED ME BY THE ARM, AND SOME 11 12 MORE OFFICERS CAME AND THEY DID THE SAME THING, GRABBED ME BY THE ARM, PUT THE HANDCUFFS ON HE, ONLY THIS TIME HE PULLED 13 LIKE THE HANDCUFFS REAL TIGHT AROUND MY WRIST, PUT MARKS ON 14 MY ARM AGAIN, AND PULLED ME BY THE HANDCUFF, IT'S THE LITTLE 15 CHAIN PART AND SNAPPED ME ON DOWN AND THREW ME INTO THE 16 WAGON. AND I WAS ARRESTED THIS TIME AND I WAS PLACED LIKE 17 UNDER \$3,500 BAIL WITH NINE CHARGES. 18 19 AND DIG THIS, ONE OF THE CHARGES THEY GAVE ME WAS A RIOT CHARGE AND I WAS BY MYSELF. AND THE ONLY RIOT 20 21 THAT WOULD BE CAUSED WAS THE RIOT CAUSED BY THEM BECAUSE THERE WAS SO MUCH POLICE PRESENCE OUT THERE. 22 23 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: DID THEY CHARGE YOU 24 THE FIRST TIME? THEY THOUGHT ABOUT WHAT KIND OF CHARGE THEY 25 Α.

1 COULD GIVE ME.

REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: THEY DIDN'T CHARGE 2 3 YOU? THEY DIDN'T CHARGE ME, RIGHT, BUT THE 4 A. . 5 SECOND TIME THEY DID. THEY GAVE ME LIKE NINE CHARGES, \$3,500 BAIL, WHICH I DID A MONTH IN JAIL WAITING TO GO TO COURT. 6 AFTER I WENT INTO COURT I WAS DISCHARGED, YOU KNOW. 7 LIKE AFTER THAT DURING THE TIME THEY HAD THE 8 BARRICADES UP I WAS IN THE AREA AGAIN. THIS TIME I SEEN THE 9 SAME OFFICER RIDING UP BEHIND ME IN A CAR TRYING TO RUN ME 10 OVER AND I, IN TURN, LOOKED AROUND AND I SEEN THE CAR 11 SPEEDING TOWARDS ME, I GOT OUT OF THE WAY. AFTER I GOT OUT 12 OF THE WAY HE ROLLED PAST, HE WAS LIKE MAD CAUSE HE DIDN'T 13 14 HIT ME. AND THE LAST TIME --CHAIRMAN RHODES: DO YOU KNOW HIS NAME? 15 16 CORPORAL MICHAEL LUIZ AND JOE BLACK AND THE A. 17 THE REST OF THE OFFICERS, DRIVER OF THE WAGON, 1600, THE 39TH 18 DISTRICT. 19 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: IS JOE BLACK, BLACK? 20 Q. NO, HE IS WHITE. AS A MATTER OF FACT, ALL 21 A. 22 OF THEM ARE WHITE. AND I HAVE HAD NUMEROUS CONFRONTATIONS WITH 23 24 THEM. IT SEEMS LIKE EVERY TIME THEY SEE ME, THEY WANT TO HARASS ME. 25

Q. DID YOU HAVE A JURY TRIAL? 1 I HAD A JUDGE TRIAL BUT I ALSO HAD LINE 2 A. THREE WITNESSES WHO STATED THERE WASN'T NO RIOT. 3 Q. WAS THAT IN MUNICIPAL COURT OR COMMON PLEAS 4 COURT? 5 MUNICIPAL. WELL, IT WAS COMMON PLEAS COURT 6 A. CASE UNTIL I WENT TO THE HEARING AND THEY DROPPED SOME OF THE 7 CHARGES, YOU KNOW. 8 9 THEY DROPPED THE RIOT CHARGE? Q. DROPPED THE RIOT CHARGE. 10 A. AT WHAT STAGE DID THEY DROP THE RIOT CHARGE, Q. 11 AT THE PRELIMINARY HEARING? 12 RIGHT, AT 61ST AND THOMPSON. 13 A. LIKE I AM STILL SUFFERING FROM THE 14 HARASSMENT. AT THE SAME TIME THEY TOOK ME DOWN TO THE POLICE 15 STATION, THEY TOLD ME THEY WERE GOING TO FILE SOME MORE 16 CHARGES AGAINST ME. THEY TOON ME DOWN THERE AND PUT ME IN 17 FRONT OF A LINEUP -- LIKE SOMEBODY ROBBED SOMEBODY THAT NIGHT 18 SOMEWHERE IN THE AREA -- AND PUT ME IN THE LINEUP AND TRIED 19 20 TO MAKE SOMEBODY POINT ME OUT. 21 HOW DID THEY TRY TO MAKE SOMEBODY POINT YOU Q. 22 OUT? A LINE-UP IS COMPOSED OF SEVERAL PERSONS. HOW DID YOU 23 KNOW THEY TRIED TO MAKE SOMEBODY POINT YOU OUT? 24 THEY ASKED THIS WOMAN, "ARE YOU SURE?" THEY A. 25 ASKED HER, "ARE YOU SURE THIS IS NOT THE MAN HERE?"

THEY TOOK EVERYBODY OUT OF THE LINE AND THEY 1 CALLED ME. I REFUSED TO GO IN THE LINEUP FIRST. 2 WELL, THAT IS NOT A LINEUP. 3 Q. OH, IT WAS A LINEUP BECAUSE THEY HAD A WOMAN A. 5 WITH A TWO-WAY MIRROR AND THEY HAD THE WOMAN IN ONE ROOM, AND ME AND SEVEN OTHER GUYS STANDING UP IN ANOTHER ROOM ILLEGAL. 6 7 WHAT YOU JUST TALKED ABOUT IS NOT A LINEUP. Q. DID THEY HAVE TO FACE ONLY YOU; THAT IS NOT A LINEUP. 8 WHATEVER YOU WANT TO CALL IT. IT SHOULDN'T 9 Α. HAVE BEEN THAT. 10 HOW DID THEY COME TO DISMISS THE RIOT 11 Q. CHARGE? DID THE JUDGE BO THAT OR THE U.A., OR THE COP DO 12 13 THAT? WELL, I REALLY DON'T KNOW. THE JUDGE MADE 14 A. IT APPEAR THAT HE WAS DOING IT, BUT ---15 HE HEARD THE TESTIMONY AND DISMISSED IT? 16 Q. 17 NO, THEY DIDN'T HEAR TESTIMONY. I WENT TO A. THE COURT AND BEFORE I EVEN SAID ANYTHING, BEFORE ANYBODY 18 COULD SAY ANYTHING, THEY JUST LIKE DROPPED THE RIOT CHARGES 19 20 AND SOME MORE CHARGES. THEY KNOW IT WASN'T NO RIOT, JUST 21 LIKE THAT. I DIDN'T GET A CHANCE TO SAY ANYTHING. 22 Q. YOU SAY THEY KNEW THERE WAS NO RIOT CHARGE 23 AND THE RIOT CHARGE WAS PUT DOWN THERE BY THE POLICEMAN? THEY HAD TO KNOW. THEY MUST HAVE TALKED 24 A. ABOUT IT BEFORE I WENT INTO THE COURTROOM. I WAS LIKE NEVER 25

ASKED NO QUESTIONS. AIN'T NOBODY EVER SAID ANYTHING TO DROP 1 IT AND SEND WE BACK, YOU KNOW. 2 HAVE YOU ANY THING ELSE TO SAY? 3 Q. YES. I WOULD LINE TO POINT OUT THERE IS AN A. 4 INJUSTICE BEING DONE RIGHT OUT THERE UPON THE MOVE 5 ORGANIZATION. 1 THINK THEN PEOPLE GOT A LOT OF COMPLAINTS, 6 THEY WANT TO BE HEARD ALSO. IF THIS COMMITTEE CAN FIND ANY 7 WAY TO GET UP THERE TO HEAR THE COMPLAINTS, I THINK IT WOULD 8 9 PROVE ---10 Q. YOU MEAN GO INTO THE HOUSE? 11 YOU CAN GO OUTSIDE THE HOUSE. YOU CAN HAVE A. IT RIGHT OUT THERE. THEY CAN INVITE YOU. 12 13 Q. MOVE MEMBERS COME OUISIDE AND TESTIFY? THEY WOULD. THEY WILL COME AS FAR AS THEY 14 A. CAN COME. I THINK YOU KNOW, YOU CAN GET A LOT MORE POLICE 15 ABUSE CASES. BECAUSE THEY HAVE GUT A LOT TO SAY. 16 17 THAT IS THE SECOND TIME THAT HAS BEEN Q. SUGGESTED, THAT WE HEAR THE MOVE SITUATION. TO BE FRANK AND 18 19 HONEST, WE CAN'T DO EVERYTHING, ALL RIGHT. FOLKS COME HERE AND WE ARE EXPECTED TO GO OUT TO THE MOVE HOUSE AND EXPECTED 20 21 TO GO HERE AND THERE, THAT WOULD BE A LOT OF COMPLAINIS ON 22 US. 23 THAT IS THE COMPLAINT THAT IS BEING SEEN BY Α. 24 THE PEOPLE. THIS IS A COMPLAINT YOU READ ABOUT EVERYDAY. 25 WHAT DIFFERENCE DOES IT MAKE IF IT IS SEEN Q.

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1 OR IT IS NOT SEEN IF SOMEONE IS SUFFERING AN INJUSTICE? IT MAKES A LOT OF DIFFERRENCE. 2 A. 3 Q. WHAT? THE POLICE IS THERE EVERYDAY TRYING TO PUT A. 4 THESE PEOPLE OUT OF THEIR OWN HOMES. 5 WHAT DIFFERENCE IS THERE IF SOMEBUDY GETS Q. 6 BEAT UP IN THE DARK OR LIGHT, AS FAR AS THE PERSON IS 7 CONCERNED? 8 OH, IT IS NOT REALLY THAT MUCH OF A 9 A. 10 DIFFERENCE. YOU UNDERSTAND WHERE I AM COMING FROM? 11 Q. YES. 12 A. NOBODY IS EXPECTING US TO BE GOD, AT LEAST 13 Q. 14 NOT ME, I AM GOING TO BE FRANK AND HONEST. BUT I UNDERSTAND 15 WHERE YOU ARE COMING FROM AND I APPRECIATE IT. 16 CHAIRMAN SCIRICA: ARE THERE ANY MORE QUESTIONS 17 FROM MR. HALL? REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON. 18 19 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: YOU ARE SUGGESTING TO THIS COMMITTEE THAT, 20 Q. 21 ASKING US TO MEET, TO TAKE TESTIMONY BASED ON THE FACT THAT 22 MOVE IS HELD UP INSIDE OF THEIR HEADQUARTERS BECAUSE SOMEHOW 23 SOME COURT ORDER HAS BEEN PLACED ON THEM FOR THE 20 MEMBERS IN THE HOUSE TO BE ARRESTED WITHIN THE NEXT TEN DAYS. 24 25 IS THAT YOUR REASON FOR ASKING US TO HEAR

1 THEM? NO, THAT IS NOT MY REASON TO HEAR THEIR 2 A. 3 TESTIMONY. Q. IS THAT YOUR REASON FOR ASKING US TO DO Δ 5 THAT? A. YES, SIR. 6 7 Q. IN YOUR INCIDENT CONCERNING YOUR LAST ARREST WHERE THE FIRST TIME THEY THREW OUT THE CHARGES, RIGHT? 8 9 RIGHT. A. 10 Q. WERE YOU GIVEN ANY TIME? I STAYED IN JAIL FOR 30 DAYS BECAUSE OF THE 11 A. 12 EXCESS BAIL. IT WAS RIDICULOUS. WHAT WAS THE BAIL? 13 Q. 14 A. \$3,500. YOU STAYED IN JAIL FOR 30 DAYS? 15 Q. 16 A. THIRTY DAYS. AND AFTER THAT WHAT WAS YOUR SENIENCE, IF 17 Q. 18 YOU GOT ONE? A. 19 I WAS DISCHARGED, FOUND NOT GUILTY. I HAD A 20 TRIAL. 21 8. WHAT ABOUT THE SECOND TIME? 22 Α. THE SECOND TIME IS WHAT I AM TALKING ABOUL. 23 THE FIRST TIME I WAS RELEASED AFTER FOUR HOURS HARASSMENT AND 24 BEATEN AND HANDCUFFED HE TO THE CHAIRS AND WRISTS AND MARKS 25 AROUND MY FACE.

1 Q. HOW OLD ARE YOU, SIR? THIRTY. 2 Α. 3 Q. THIRTY? RIGHT. A. Δ AS A CITIZEN IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, 5 Q. HOW SERIOUS WOULD YOU SAY THE PROBLEM IS IN THE CITY OF 6 7 PHILADELPHIA CONCERNING POLICE VIOLENCE? THE PROBLEM IS VERY SERIOUS. LIKE PEOPLE 8 A. BEING KILLED AT LEAST ONCE A WEEK NOW. A LOT OF PEOPLE BEING 9 10 KILLED THAT THE PRESS DON'T KNOW ABOUT. THERE'S PEOPLE BEING 11 BEAT LIKE CONSTANTLY EVERYDAY. THERE'S PEOPLE BEING ARRESTED ON TRUMPED-UP CHARGES EVERY DAY. THE PROBLEM IS SO SERIOUS 12 13 LIKE ME MYSELF, LIKE I SAY I WASN'T IN SUPPORT OF MOVE AT THAT TIME, BUT I WANT TO DO SOMETHING ABOUT 11. 1 DON'T CARE 14 WHAT I HAVE TO DD, TO DD ANYTHING ABOUT IF, BESIDES TO KEEP 15 16 THEM OFF ME. 17 I AM PRETTY SURE THERE ARE A LOT OF OTHER PEOPLE FEEL THE SAME WAY LIKE I FEEL. EVEN IF IT COMES TO 18 19 VIOLENCE. I DON'T WANT TO BE NILLED. I AM QUITE SURE A LOT OF PEOPLE FEEL THE SAME WAY. 20 21 REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: THANK YOU VERY 22 MUCH, SIR. FORTY-THREE. 21 CHAIRMAN SCIRICA: WOULD YOU PLEASE RECITE YOUR STORY TO US. 22 23 A. I WAS IN MY LIVING ROOM ABOUT 1:00 0'CLOCK, 24 LET ME SEE, ABOUT 1:30 OR 2:00 O'CLOCK AT NIGHT, AND I HEARD 25 SOME SHOOTING.

1 CHAIRMAN SCIRICA: WHAT TIME OF THE YEAR WAS 2 THAT? ABOUT 1:30 OR 2:00. AND WE HEARD SOME 3 Α. SHOOTING. 4 WHAT YEAR? 5 CHAIRMAN SCIRICA: OH, THIS WAS THIS YEAR, JUNE 15TH, I THINK 6 A. 7 IT WAS, OR 16TH. CHAIRMAN SCIRICA: 1978? 8 9 A. YES. 10 ME AND MY DAUGHTER, WE WAS DOWNSTAIRS IN THE LIVING ROOM. WE HEARD SHOTS. SO WE RAN UPSTAIRS AND LOOKED 11 OUT THE WINDOW TO SEE WHAT WAS GOING ON. AND SOMEONE SAID 12 13 THE LADY UP THE STREET HAD GOT SHOT AND SOMEONE HAD CALLED 14 THE POLICE AND THE POLICE CAME, YOU KNOW. I MEAN QUITE A FEW 15 POLICE CAME AND A VAN CAME TO PICK UP THE LADY TO TAKE HER TO THE HOSPITAL. 16 17 AS THE VAN DROVE UP, A COUPLE MORE SHOTS RANG OUT AND THE POLICE CAME RUNNING TOWARDS MY FRONT BEDROOM 18 WINDOW WHERE MY SON WAS SLEEPING AND THEY JUST STARTED 19 20 SHOOTING, YOU KNOW. AND THEY RAN UPSTAIRS, ABOUT 20 23 SHOTS WAS FIRED BEFORE THAT. I DON'T KNOW HOW MANY SHOTS. 24 25 SO I WAS TRYING TO GET IN MY FRONT BEDROOM

11	REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS:			
12	Q. HON OLD IS YOUR SON, MRS. WILKINS?			
13	A. EIGHT.			
14	Q. GO AHEAD.			
15	A. SO AS I GOT MY WINDOW DOWN KEEPING THE SHOTS			
16	FROM COMING IN THE WINDOW, I WOULD TOUCH IT AND IT WOULD

HOUSE AT ALL? 20 21 NO. I WAS TELLING THEM THE TROUBLE WAS NEXT Α. 22 DOOR, YOU KNOW. WAS THERE SOME TROUBLE ACTUALLY NEXT DOOR? 23 Q. THERE WAS SOME TROUBLE, SOME SHOOTING GOING 24 A. . ON THERE. 25

1	Q. FROM THAT BUILDING?
2	A. YES. I HAD TOLD THEM, THAT IS HOW THEY CAME
3	UP TO MY HOUSE. THEY HEARD TWO GUNSHOTS. THEY WAS PARKED UP
4	THE STREET GETTING READY TO TAKE THE LADY TO THE HOSPITAL
5	THAT WAS SHOT.
6	WHEN THE SHOT RANG OUT AND THEY HEARD IT
7	FIRED, THEY RAN OVER TO MY FRONT WINDOW AND JUST STARTED
8	FIRING AT MY WINDOW.
9	Q. THEY APPARENTLY WERE THINKING THE SHOTS CAME
10	FROM YOUR HOUSE?
11	A. YES. BUT SEE, WHEN THEY GOT UPSTAIRS I TOLD
12	THEM THE TROUBLE WAS NEXT DOOR.
13	Q. WITHOUT CHECKING?
14	A. YES.
15	Q. AND WHEN YOU TOLD THEN, THEY JUST KEPT
16	COMING?
17	A. YES, THEY KEPT PUSHING ME ASIDE AND KEPT
18	GOING UPSTAIRS.
19	(PAUSE.)
20	WELL, SEE, THE MAN NEXT DOOR HAD SHOT HIS
21	GIRLFRIEND, YOU KNOW; AND SOMEONE CALLED THE POLICE. AND AS
22	I LOOKED OUT THE WINDOW TO SEE THEM PICK THE LADY UP TO TAKE
23	HER TO THE HOSPITAL, THEY HEARD TWO MORE SHOTS. SO THE GUY
24	NEXT DOOR HAD SHOT HIMSELF, YOU KNOW.
25	AS THEY CAME UP, YOU KNOW, AS THEY CAME UP

1	THEY KNOCKED MY DOOR DOWN; I TOLD THEM THE TROUBLE WAS NEXT
2	DOOR, YOU KNOW.
3	Q. SO THEY PICKED UP A LADY WHO HAD BEEN SHOT
4	BY HER BOYFRIEND?
5	A. YES.
6	Q. HE LATER ON SHOT HIMSELF; AND HIS HOUSE WAS
7	NEXT DOOR TO YOU?
8	A. YES.
9	Q. AND THEY RESPONDED TO HIM SHOOTING HIMSELF
10	BY COMING TO YOUR HOUSE?
11	A. YES.
12	Q. THAT IS SMART.
13	A. THEY NEVER DID NEXT DOOR THEY NEVER DID
14	GET INTO THAT HOUSE, YOU KNOW, UNFIL AFTER THEY HAD BROKE MY
15	DOOR DOWN, YOU KNOW. THE MAN DIDN'T NEVER SHOOT OUTSIDE. HE
16	JUST SHOT INSIDE.
17	SO THE POLICE OFFICER WAS LOOKING FOR WHERE
18	THE SHOOTING WAS COMING FROM. BUT THAT MAN DIDN'T SHOOT
19	OUTSIDE. HE WAS JUST INSIDE AT THAT TIME.
20	Q. YOU SAY THEY SHOT IN YOUR WINDOW?
21	A. YES, IN MY FRONT BEDROOM. THEY CAME ACROSS
22	THE STREET FROM THE VAN; AND JUST STARTED SHOOTING AT MY
23	WINDOW WHERE MY SON WAS LAYING IN BED, THE RIGHT WINDOW, AND
24	ONE GUN BULLET WENT
25	Q. IF SOMEONE HAD BEEN STANDING BY YOUR WINDOW,

1 THEY WOULD HAVE GOTTEN SHOT? 2 I WAS STANDING BY MY WINDOW TRYING TO GET A. THAT WINDOW DOWN AT THAT TIME THEY WERE SHOOTING. 3 IF ONE OF THE POLICEMEN'S RELATIVES HAD BEEN Q. 4 AT YOUR HOUSE, THEY WOULD HAVE SHOT THAT RELATIVE OF THEIRS? 5 WHAT RELATIVE? A A. I AM JUST TRYING TO MAKE A POINT, THEY WOULD 7 Q. HAVE SHOT NO MATTER WHO WAS THERE. 8 9 GO AHEAD. 10 AS I SAY, MY HUSBAND, AFTER THEY HANDCUFFED A. 11 MY HUSBAND, AT THAT TIME THEY WERE DOING SOME SHOOTING INTO THE MIDDLE ROOM WHERE MY OTHER THREE KIDS WERE LYING IN BED. 12 13 AND MY NEPHEW WAS STANDING BEHIND A DRESSER AT THAT TIME AND THEY FIRED SO MANY BULLETS; YOU KNOW; AT THAT TIME ---14 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: COULD YOU HOLD ON FOR 15 A MINUTE UNTIL WE FIND OUT WHAT THE TROUBLE IS. 16 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THE COMMITTEE IS DECLARED IN 17 RECESS FOR 15 MINUTES. 18 19 (RECESSED AT 10:03 D'CLOCK P.M.) 20 (10:15 O'CLOCK P. M.) 21 CHAIRMAN RHODES: THIS HEARING 1S NOW REOPENED. MRS. WILKINS, PLEASE CONTINUE. 22 23 AS I SAID, MY HUSBAND WAS COMING OUT THE A. 24 BACK DOOR AND THEY HANDCUFFED HIM. AND MY HUSBAND SAID, 25 "WHAT'S GUING ON;" BECAUSE THE BULLETS WERE COMING UP; AND

1 THEY CARRIED HIM OUT TO THE VAN.

AND EVERYONE SAID, "HE'S NOT THE RIGHT GUY YOU WANT." THEY SAID, "SO WHAT." THEY LOCKED HIM UP, PUT HIM IN THE VAN, AND LET HIM REMAIN THERE ABOUT 45 MINUIES --I DON'T KNOW HOW LONG HE WAS OUT THERE BECAUSE I WAS IN THE HOUSE.

7 THEY WENT IN THE BACK BEDROOM. ONLY ONE 8 COLORED COP WAS IN THIS GROUP OF POLICEMEN. AND I ASKED THEN, "WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FOR?" THEY BEGAN IN THE BACK 9 BEDROOM OVERTURNING MATTRESSES, THROWING THINGS OUT THE 10 CLOSET; AND I ASKED THEM WHAT WERE THEY LOOKING FOR. THEY 11 12 SAID, 'I WANT YOU DOWNSTAIRS.' I SAID, 'WHAT AM I GOING DOWNSTAIRS FOR, I HAVEN'T DID ANY (HING." SO THEN THIS POLICE 13 OFFICER JUST JERKED MY ARM AND SAID, "COME ON DOWNSTAIRS." 14 15 SO I JUST JERKED BACK AND SAID, "I AM NOT GOING ANYWHERE." I SAT DOWN ON THE BED. 16

17 THEY TORE THE MATTRESSES UP, BUT DIDN'T 18 BOTHER THAT BED BUT ALL THE OTHER MATTRESSES THEY TORE THEM 19 UPSIDE DOWN. THAT'S WHY I ASKED HIM WHAT WERE THEY LOOKING 20 FOR. THEY DIDN'T ANSWER ME.

21 THEN THEY WENT ON DOWNSTAIRS. THEN MY BABY 22 6 YEARS OLD, STARTED TREMBLING ABOUT A HALF HOUR OK SO. I 23 ASKED THEM TO TAKE HER TO THE HOSPITAL.

24 CHAIRMAN RHODES:

25 Q. AFTER THE POLICE OFFICER PULLED ON YOUR ARM

AND YOU PULLED BACK, WHAT HAPPENED THEN? 1 THEY LEFT ME ALONE. I TOLD THEM TO LEAVE ME 2 A. ALONE, 1 HAIN'T DONE ANYTHING. SO MY DAUGHTER TOLD THEM, 3 "LEAVE MY MOTHER ALONE, I WILL BRING HER DOWNSTAIRS." THEY 4 5 LEFT ME. THE HOUSE WAS IN DISARRAY? Q. 6 OH, YEAH. 7 A. Q. WHERE WAS YOUR HUSBAND? 8 MY HUSBAND WAS IN THE VAN. 9 A. Q. THEY TOOK HIM WITH THEM? 10 11 A. NO, THEY JUST LEFT HIM ACROSS THE STREET IN THE VAN ABOUT A HALF HOUR OR SO. 12 13 Q. THEN THEY RELEASED HIM? YES. 14 A. 15 Q. IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE YOU WANT TO TELL US 16 ABOUT THAT INCIDENT? MY BABY, LIKE I SAID, SHE HAD LIKE SOME 17 A. EXCITEMENT ABOUT A HALF AN HOUR OR SO AND I ASKED THEM TO 18 19 TAKE HER TO THE HOSPITAL. HE SAID SHE WILL GET THERE, 20 SOMETIME THAT NIGHT, MY BABY WHO WAS ABOUT SIX YEARS OLD. 21 THEN THEY LEFT OUL. 22 AND I SAID, "CAPTAIN, WHAT WILL THEY DO ABOUT 23 MY FRONT DOOR THEY KNOCKED DOWN THAT NIGHT?" THEY SAID, "SOMEONE WILL BE AROUND IN A COUPLE OF HOURS FROM NOW TO FIX 24 25 YOUR DOOR." AND MY DOOR WAS DOWN ABOUT TWO OR THREE NIGHTS

1 AND THEY CAME AND FIXED IT, THE HOUSING AUTHORITY PEOPLE; BUT 2 THE POLICE OFFICER WAS OUT THERE AT THAT TIME. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: BUT THE HOUSING 3 AUTHORITY --4 FIXED THE DOOR. 5 Α. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: IT WASN'T THE CITY 6 7 **OF PHILADELPHIA?** 8 NO. AND IN THE MEANTIME WHILE I WAS IN THE A. . BACK ROOM EXPLAINING TO THEM ABOUT WHAT WERE THEY TEARING MY 9 BACK BEDROOM UP FOR, THEY WERE IN THE LIVING ROOM SHOOTING. 10 YOU KNOW, MY OTHER KIDS WERE IN BED. 11 CHAIRMAN RHODES: 12 SO YOUR CHILDREN WERE IN THE BEDROOM, AND 13 Q. THEY WERE FIRING AT THAT BEDROOM? 14 YES, THEY HAD ABOUT SEVEN ---15 A. CARTRIDGES? 16 Q. 17 YES, AND THOSE IN THE CLOSET. A. 18 WERE YOU CONCERNED IF THEY WERE ACTUALLY Q. SHOOTING AT SOMEBODY, AS THEY WERE FIRING OUT OF THAT BEDROOM 19 20 WHERE YOUR THREE CHILDREN WERE ASLEEP? I WAS IN THE BACK ROOM AT THAT TIME OF THAT 21 A. 22 SHOOTING. 23 WHAT I MEAN IS ---Q. 24 -- WHEN I HEARD THE FIRING IN --A. 25 Q. WERE YOUR CHILDREN STILL IN THE ROOM WHEN

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THE POLICE OFFICERS WERE FIRING OUT THE WINDOW? 1 WHEN I PASSED THEIR BEDROOM TO GO DOWNSTAIRS 2 Α. THEY WERE IN BED. WHEN I CAME PAST MY MIDDLE BEDROOM, MY 3 CHILDREN WERE IN BED, AND MY SON WAS IN THE FRONT BED. AND I 4 GOT PAST THAT ROOM TO GO DOWNSTAIRS; AND I MET THIS POLICE 5 OFFICER COMING UPSTAIRS, AND I TOLD HIM, " THE TROUBLE IS 6 NEXT DOOR." 7 8 I WENT INTO THE BACK BEDROOM. AFTER THAT, I DON'T KNOW HOW MY KIDS GOT OF THAT BEDROOM. I DON'T 9 REMEMBER THAT. 10 Q. YOU DON'T REMEMBER WHETHER THEY WERE FIRING 11 WHEN THE KIDS WERE IN THE BED OR NOT? 12 13 A. LIKE I SAY, 1 DON'T KNOW IF THEY WAS IN THERE AT THE TIME THEY WERE SHOOTING OR NOT. I DON'T KNOW 14 HOW THEY GOT OUT OF THERE. I ASKED THEM, THEY SAID THEY 15 DIDN'T KNOW EITHER. 16 WERE YOU ONE OF THE CHILDREN IN THAT Q. 17 BEDROOM? 18 19 A. (GWENDOLYN WILKINS) NO, I WAS DOWNSTAIRS TOOJ BUT MY MOTHER TOLD MY OTHER SISTER TO GO GET THE OTHER 20 21 KIDS OUT OF THE BED. 22 (LINDORA WILKINS) I DON'T REMEMBER THAT A. 23 EITHER. (GWENDOLYN WILKINS) SHE TOLD MY NEXT TO 24 A. 25 THE OLDEST SISTER TO GET THE KIDS OUT OF THE BED.

DID THE POLICE OFFICER TRY TO GET THE 1 Q. 2 CHILDREN OUT OF THE ROOM BEFORE THEY STARTED SHOOTING? (LINDORA WILKINS) NO. LIKE I SAID, THEY 3 A. JUST STARTED FIRING, YOU KNOW. 4 5 Q. INTO THE ROOM? Α. MY FRONT WINDOW. 6 7 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN LIVING AT THAT HOUSE? 8 9 A. I HAVE BEEN LIVING THERE ABOUT EIGHT YEARS. 10 AND THEY JUST STARTED FIRING AT THE WINDOWS, YOU KNOW. 11 12 CHAIRMAN RHODES: 13 IN OTHER WORDS, FIRST THEY CAME TO YOUR Q. HOUSE AND STARTED FIRING THROUGH ONE OF YOUR WINDOWS, RIGHT? 14 15 A. UM-HUM. AND YOU COULDN'T SEE ANYBODY? Q. 16 17 A. NO. 18 Q. THEN THEY BROKE INTO THE HOUSE AND WENT INTO 19 ANOTHER BEDROOM WHERE YOU HAD THREE CHILDREN ASLEEP? 20 A. UH-HUM. AND YOU DON'T KNOW WHETHER THEY GOT THE 21 Q. 22 CHILDREN OUT OR NOT, BUT THEY STARTED SHOUTING OUT OF THAT BEDROOM --23 BUT I HAD A NEPHEW IN THAT BEDROOM TOO, AT 24 A. 25 THE SAME TIME. HE WAS HIDING BEHIND THE DRESSER! BECAUSE MY

NEPHEN HAD COME TO GET ME OUT OF THAT FRONT BEDROOM BECAUSE 1 2 MY DAUGHTERS, THEY WERE LYING ON THE FLOOR, TRYING TO GET ME ON THE FLOOR BECAUSE I WAS TRYING TO GET THE WINDOW DOWN. 3 BULLETS WERE HITTING THE WINDOW. 4 Q. HOW LONG WAS YOUR NEPHEW IN THAT ROOM? 5 THAT THEY WERE SHOOTING AT? 6 Α. 7 YES. Q. I DON'T KNOW BECAUSE, AS I SAID, I RAN PAST 8 A. 9 THAT ROOM TO GO DOWN, TO LET THEM KNOW THEY WEREN'T IN THE 10 RIGH! HOUSE. SO FOR THE RECORD THEY FIRST BEGAN FIRING Q. 11 12 INTO YOUR HOUSE MISTAKENLY THROUGH A WINDOW? 13 YES. Α. ABOUT HON MANY SHOTS DID THEY FIRE? 14 Q. 15 Α. I CAN'T SAY, IT WAS ABOUT 20. IT WAS JUST LIKE HAILING AT THE WINDOW, THE BULLETS WENT "PING, PING, 16 PING, SOMETHING LIKE THAT. 17 I WAS TRYING TO GET THE WINDOW DOWN, YOU 18 19 KNOW. THEY BROKE INTO THE HOUSE, WENT TO A BEDROOM 20 Q. 21 IN YOUR HOUSE AND BEGAN FIRING OUT OF THAT BEDROOM; WENT 22 INSIDE YOUR HOUSE, WENT TO A BEDROOM WHERE YOUR CHILDREN WERE 23 ASLEEP AND BEGAN FIRING OUT OF THAT BEDROOM? 24 YES, IN THE MIDDLE BEDROOM AND STARTED JUST A. 25 FIRING SHOTS.

1 Q. OUT OF THAT WINDOW? UM-HUM -- NO, YOU KNOW, JUST IN THAT ROOM. 2 A. OH, FIRING SHOTS IN THE ROOM? 3 Q. YES. A. 4 Q. AT WHO, AT WHAT? 5 AT MY NEPHEW. HE WAS HIWING IN THE CORNER A. 6 7 FROM THEM, YOU KNOW. THEY DIDN'T TELL HIM TO COME OUT WITH HIS HANDS UP OR NOTHING LIKE THAT. 8 OH, THEY WEREN'T SHOOTING OUT OF THE ROOM, 9 **a.** BUT THEY HERE SHOOTING AT SOMEBODY IN THE ROOM? 10 11 A. THEY WERE SHOOTING AT THE CLOSET. MY NEPHEW WAS HIDING BEHIND THE CLOSET, YOU KNOW, PROTECTION, I GUESS. 12 13 I DON'T KNOW. THEY CAME IN THE ROOM AND STARTED SHOOTING Q. 14 AT THE CLOSET? 15 A. YEAH. SHOOTING AROUND IN THAT AREA. 16 17 Q. OH, I THOUGH I THEY WERE SHOOTING OUT OF THE ROOM. 18 19 THEY WERE SHOOTING AT THE CLOSET? YEAH, 20 A. 21 HOW MANY SHOTS DID THEY FIRE INTO THE ROOM? Q. 22 I FOUND ABOUT SEVEN -- ABOUT FOUR OR FIVE OF A. 23 THOSE THINGS, YOU KNOW. 24 **DID THEY HIT YOUR NEPHEW?** Q. 25 NO, THEY DIDN'T HIT KIM, BUT THE SWEATER HE A.

1 WAS HOLDING OVER HIS HEAD TO TELL THEM HE HADN'T DONE NOTHING 2 -- AND ALSO A RIFLE, MY NEPHEW SAID IT WAS A RIFLE THAT PUT A BIG HOLE THROUGH THE WALL ABOUT THIS BIG. (INDICATING) 3 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE WHITE. 4 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: 5 Q. THEY WERE USING HANDGUNS OR WERE THEY USING 6 RIFLES, SHOTGUNS? 7 A. . WELL, THEY SAID IT WAS A MAGNUM. 1 DON'T 8 9 KNOW, SIR. 10 Q. A MAGNUM? YES, BECAUSE WHEN THEY PASSED HE I DON'T 11 A. 12 KNOW WHAT KIND OF GUNS THEY HAD; BUT 1 KNOW MY KIDS WERE IN THE BED AT THAT TIME. HOW THEY GOT OUT, I DON'T KNOW. BUT 13 14 THEY JUST COME IN AND STARTED FIRING, JUST LIKE THAT. MY SON WAS LAYING DOWN, THE BULLET JUST WENT 15 OVER HIS HEAD, AND THE FRONT OF THE WINDOW SILL WAS BROKEN 16 17 UP, YOU KNOW. 18 DO YOU RECALL THE NAMES OF ANY OF THOSE Q. POLICE OFFICERS? 19 A. THEY LEFT REAL FAST. I DON'T KNOW WHO THEY 20 WERE, BUT THOSE OFFICERS LEFT REAL FAST AND ONE SAID HIS 21 22 NAME, I THINK, OFFICER TRAVERS, SOMETHING LIKE THAT. 23 BUT THAT OFFICER, THE ONE WHO JERKED MY ARM, 24 MY DAUGHTER, LINDA, GOT HIS NAME. THE MAN STANDING --25 OFFICER TRAVERS WASN'T DOING ANYTHING, HE WAS GUARDING THE

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1 DOOR. CHAIRMAN RHODES: WOULD YOU RECOGNIZE THE 2 OFFICERS IF YOU SAW THEM AGAIN? 3 YES, I'D RECOGNIZE HIM. 4 A. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: DID YOU GET ANY 5 BADGE NUMBERS OR NAMES? 6 YES. I GAVE THEM TO THE LAWYER. 7 A. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: THAT'S ALL RIGHT, WE 8 CAN GET THOSE NAMES FROM ANTHONY JACKSON, COUNSEL SITTING 9 HERE THIS EVENING. 10 11 CHAIRMAN RHODES: DID YOU EVER GET ANY APOLOGY FROM THE PULICE 12 Q. DEPARTMENT ABOUT THIS MISTAKEN RAID ON THE HOUSE? 13 14 NO. BUT THE ONLY THING, I ASKED CAPTAIN A. MOORE, I SAID, "WHAT ARE YOU GUING TO DO ABOUT MY FRONT DOOR 15 16 BEING LEFT OPEN ALL NIGHT?" THEY SAID THEY WOULD SENT A 17 COUPLE OF OFFICERS. Q. YOU NEVER RECEIVED A FORMAL APOLOGY FOR 18 BREAKING IN YOUR HOUSE AND FIRING INTO YOUR BEDROOM? 19 20 NO. THEY SENT A LETTER TO ME YESTERDAY A. ABOUT WRITING A LETTER TO THEM LETTING THEM KNOW WHAT 21 22 HAPPENED IN MY HOME, OR SOMETHING LIKE THAT. THEY DIDN'T 23 SEND NO APOLOGY OR NOTHING LIKE THAT. Q. UID YOU FILE ANY COMPLAINT WITH THE CITY 24 25 ABOUT THAT?

1 A. YES, I DID. DO YOU HAVE THE RESPONSE FROM THE COMPLAINT? 2 Q. 3 Α. NO, NOT YET. LIKE I SAID, I WENT TO SEE SOME PEOPLE, WE 4 5 WENT TO SEE DOWN TO THE LAWYER'S OFFICE AND THEY DID TAKE HE DOWN TO THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE AND FILED A COMPLAINT 6 7 THERE . SO YOU HAD FILED A COMPLAINT WITH THE 8 Q. 9 DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE? 10 A. YES. AND THE CLOTHING --- I FOUND ABOUT SIX 11 12 CARTRIDGES. **BID YOU TURN THEM OVER TO YOUR COUNSEL?** 13 Ω. YES. AND I HAD A COUPLE OF BRUISES WHERE 14 A. THE OFFICER HAD JERKED ME THAT NIGHT. 15 16 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: WHAT ARE THE AGES OF 17 YOUR CHILDREN? 18 A. NINETEEN TO SIX YEARS OLD. 19 HOW MANY CHILDREN DO YOU HAVE? Q. 20 EIGHT. A. 21 CHAIRMAN RHODES: WHAT ARE THEIR AGES? 19, 18, 17, 13, 12, 10, 9, 8 AND 6. 22 A. CHAIRMAN RHODES: OKAY, IS THAT THE END OF YOUR 23 24 ACCOUNT? 25 YES. A.

YES. 4 CHAIRNAN RHODES: SO WHY DUN'T YOU PROCEED IN 5 YOUR OWN WORDS AND AS CAREFULLY AND SUCCINCTLY AS YOU CAN, 6 7 EXPLAIN EXACTLY WHAT HAPPENED. TWO FRIENDS, THREE ASSOCIATES AND MYSELF 8 Α. WERE STANDING OUTSIDE OF WAYLAND BAPTIST CHURCH, 25TH AND 9 COLUMBIA, WE WERE HAVING A CONVERSATION. 10 A PADDY WAGON DROVE UP, WENT TO THE LIGHT, 11 BACKED BACK, NOTICED I. ABDUL -- I DON'T KNOW HIS WHOLE NAME, 12 BUT HE GAVE TESTIMONY. 13 CHAIRMAN RHODES: JON. 14 AND SMILEY WHO ARE TWO MEN WHO WEAR THE 15 A. DREADLOCK HAIRDO. IF YOU DON'T KNOW, YOU WOULD ASSUME THEY 16 ARE MEMBERS OF MOVE, WHICH THEY ARE NOT. 17 I AM GOING UNDER THE ASSUMPTION THE POLICE 18 THOUGHT THEY WERE MOVE MEMBERS. 19 20 AT THIS TIME THEY GET OUT OF THE WAGON, THEY ASKED ABDUL AND SMILEY FOR I.D. BECAUSE THEY THOUGHT THEY HAD 21 22 WARRANTS FOR THEIR ARRESTS. AND I EXPLAINED TO THE POLICEMEN 23 THAT HE HAD JUST WENT THROUGH THIS SCENE WITH THEM ON THE WAY 24 TO THE HEARING AND HE DIDN'T UNDERSTAND WHAT WAS GOING ON. AT THIS TIME MR. SIMMONS ASKED THE POLICE 25

THEN BY THIS TIME TWO MORE WAGONS HAD 4 ARRIVED AND TWO POLICE CARS HAD COME UP. AND THE COPS THEN 18 SAID, "WELL, SOME OF THEM ARE IN THE STREET. WE JUST 19 ARRESTED ONL TODAY. 20 AND AT THIS TIME ALL OF YOU CAME OUT, AND 21 22 THE COPS STARTED COOLING OFF. 23 REPRESENTATIVE WHITE: DOES EVERYONE WHO WEAR 24 THEIR HAIR IN THE DREADLOCK STYLE CONSIDER THEMSELVES MEMNERS 25 OF MOVE?

IS THE PERSON YOU ARE REFERKING TO AS ABDUL WHO WAS THE PERSON THAT THE POLICE CAME UP TO, THE SAME 9 10 PERSON WHO SAID HE WAS ALSO KNOWN AS MICHAEL JONES WHO 11 TESTIFIED EARLIER AT THIS HEARING? 12 NO, NOT MICHAEL JONES. A. REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON: THAT IS HIS A/K/A. 13 REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAMS: 14 15 Q. HE TESTIFIED HIS A/K/A IS MICHAEL JONES; AND THAT IS THE SAME PERSON YOU TALKED ABOUT? 16 17 YES. A. Q. THE SAME PERSON WHO TESTIFIED HE HAD BEEN 18 ARRESTED EARLIER TODAY? 19 20 A. YES. 21 Q. HE HAS BEEN IDEN (IFIED, FIRST OF ALL, AS NOT 22 BEING A MEMBER OF MOVE OR UNDER ANY COURT ORDER OR --23 NO, HE IS NOT. A. 24 CHAIRMAN RHODES: REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON. 25 **REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON:**

Ø. WHAT I WANT TO SPECIFICALLY ASK YOU IS 1 WHETHER OR NOT YOU GOT ANY OF THE BADGE NUMBERS OR NUMBERS OF 2 3 THE CARS OR WAGONS? ONE WAS 17 -- ONE PADDY WAGON WAS 1702, THAT 4 A.
