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PROCEEDINGS

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: We now call to order the House Subcommittee on Crimes and Corrections on Special Session legislation. Before you this morning is Special Session Bill 81 -- Senate Bill 81.

I have circulated to the members here a letter that I received just recently from the Pennsylvania Bar Association. I just got it on my desk today, so as you can see, it was dated yesterday, so I didn't have a chance to circulate it before we got here this morning.

And the Pennsylvania Bar Association has reviewed the bill. They don't take a position on it as of today; however, they have made suggestions on several points that they feel that the bill should and could be amended.

If you recall, this is the bill that dealt with unitary review, with death penalties. The prime sponsor of the bill, it is his intention, I believe, to try to provide for a quicker process to move those who have been convicted and found to be punishable by the death penalty through the legal process. I think it is Senator Greenleaf's bill -- yes, Senator Greenleaf's bill.

And what I would like to do is entertain a motion to move Special Session Senate Bill 81 and recommend it

to the full House Judiciary Committee.

REPRESENTATIVE FEESE: So moved.

REPRESENTATIVE BOSCOLA: Second.

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: So moved by Mr. Feese;
Representative Boscola seconds it. Any questions or
discussion?

Mr. Masland?

REPRESENTATIVE MASLAND: I just think that I received this fax yesterday from the PBA and there may be some things in there, again, that we want to consider as amendments. I realize that this is not the proper forum for those, but -- I mean, I think it's worthwhile moving it ahead to the Committee, but I question whether we could hold it up if we want to, but it's worthwhile moving it ahead to the full Committee and having them consider those amendments at that time.

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: Members can hold it up if they wish to; it would be my recommendation that you don't. However --

REPRESENTATIVE MASLAND: Of course, the Chairman of the Committee could reach down and pull it out, whether we hold it up or not.

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: Yes, but he has asked us to do this because we held the public hearings on the two bills, and he has asked us to recommend them.

REPRESENTATIVE MASLAND: I understand.

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: And if you have a suggestion or an amendment in particular that you want to be considered, I think that this is a good way to forewarn you that you need to do that as soon as possible.

Other comments or questions?
(No response.)

I will entertain a vote then on Special Session Senate Bill 81. Are there any negative votes on the bill?

(No response.)

Hearing none, the Secretary will cast a unanimous vote for Special Session Senate Bill 81. Are there any comments or questions?

Representive Maitland?

REPRESENTATIVE MAITLAND: A question; you had sent out a memo about touring some State correctional institutions.

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: I was going to speak on that; thank you for bringing it up.

At the suggestion of some of the members of the Judiciary Committee, we have tentatively scheduled four days in November for going to different prisons. And Mary Beth Marshik, who is working with the Department of

Corrections and who formerly worked on this Committee staff and therefore is quite cooperative when we need her -- not that she wouldn't have been otherwise, but she has been working with us to develop a schedule.

And here are the dates that I am fairly sure we are going to be going; it will be November the 1st, the 8th and the 9th, and the 15th.

The November 1st will be Camp Hill. Since we will be in session the two days before that -- that is a Wednesday -- we can just stay over one more night and we can go to the Camp Hill facility. Camp Hill is -- I believe, Mary Beth, is still the clearinghouse for any of the prisoners in the State, if not all of them.

MS. MARSHIK: Yes.

REPRESENTATIVE BIRMELIN: And it is probably good for you to see that prison first.

And then we are probably going to be seeing, and I am not sure in what order, Muncy, Graterford, and Cole Township. At the request of some of the members, Cole Township has been added to that list.

Now, I have been getting some memos from some of the members, not only about what prisons they want to see but what they would like to see in the prisons. So what we are going to be doing is trying to give you a comprehensive look at the prisons; not just where they lock them up and that sort of thing, but we want to look at the drug and alcohol treatment portions. Especially in Muncy, we want to look at the attempts made for the maintenance of family ties with women with children, and some of the other services that are offered in the prisons so we have a comprehensive look.

We also would encourage you to eat the meals while you are there -- I know, you're wincing. But we are going to arrange for meals in some of the prisons, if not all of them. We think it would be a good idea for you to experience that as well.

We have opened up these tours; however, you need to be aware that all House members are going to extend invitations to Senators. And while specifically I think House Judiciary Committee members would and should go at least to one of these prisons, I think that all House and Senate members should.

And so we are going to open that up; Camp Hill will be the first one on the first of November, and that will probably be the first thing in the morning so you can get home by the end of the day.

Any other questions or comments?
(No response.)

Okay. Attorney Preski informs me that the two bills that you just voted out will be considered by the

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full Committee on the 17th, which is Tuesday of next week.

So if you do have amendments, be prepared, and I have also been forewarned that the Special Session Senate Bill 81 is going to have amendments by several members. I am not sure who; I know some of them, but be prepared for that, and that may be a controversial bill.

Hopefully, my bill won't be, House Bill 2066, and we will be able to get that slipped through fairly quickly.

Well, hearing and seeing no further comments, this meeting is adjourned.
