RE: House Bill 59

Dear Chairman Caltagirone:

Please accept this letter as written testimony regarding the need for enactment of House Bill 59, a bill to raise revenue for domestic violence services in Pennsylvania. I am writing to you on behalf of HAVIN (Helping All Victims In Need), a domestic violence and sexual assault center located in Armstrong County. Over the last several years, we have seen an increase in need and requests for services, Increases in costs for providing these services, and a marked decrease in state and federal funding. Our capacity to meet the needs of victims is steadily eroding and at this point, I feel we are in a death spiral. The nearly \$3 million annually that House Bill 59 would provide is desperately needed to get us out of this dangerous trend, and I urge you to make its passage this session a top priority.

HAVIN provides critical services such as crisis counseling, legal and medical advocacy and accompaniment, emergency shelter and 24-hour hotlines. We also provide outreach/education programs and training for law enforcement and other professionals.

HAVIN currently employees eight full-time, three part-time staff and a small group of volunteers to cover critical services 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 365 days per year. We all do multiple functions, for instance as the Executive Director, I provide direct services, do outreach, systems advocacy and prevention/education programs, grant writing, etc. Along with HAVIN's Board of Directors, I am primarily responsible for all fundraising.

During my tenure, we have worked diligently to educate the community about domestic and sexual violence, and to ensure victims of these crimes know where they can go for support. We have earned the respect and support of our community. Along with this, there is an expectation that we will be available to provide competent, supportive services to victims who face very difficult challenges. According to the US Census, Armstrong County's median income is \$35,501 with 13.6% of our population living in poverty. Many of the men, women and children that we serve are low income with limited to no transportation.

As the funding decreases, I have demands on my time to provide direct services. This is due to cutbacks of personnel and low wages, resulting in staff turn-over. Many of our cases are challenging, and require

expertise in sexual assault, domestic violence and other systems. Currently some of the situations I am involved in include a four-year old child sexual assault victim that is exceptionally complicated, I am doing counseling, advocacy and accompaniment in a domestic violence stalking case where the victim has fallen through too many cracks and we fear that some of the failures will result in her murder. I am also providing counseling to her ten-year-old son who's being engaged in the stalking behaviors by his father, and I am providing direct services, including counseling, advocacy and accompaniment to a politically sensitive situation where a law enforcement officer is the domestic violence perpetrator.

Needless to say, we are truly struggling. Due to funding cuts, we have reduced prevention/education staff down to one person. What that does is prevent us from informing the community about our services and ensuring that victims know where to receive support. I am finding that I do not have the time needed to do critical systems advocacy, which is creating an environment in our community where victims of sexual and domestic violence are in emotional and physical danger.

We have made good business decisions at HAVIN. For example, we job-share our fiscal person with another domestic violence shelter. This has resulted in a savings of approximately \$15,000 per year. We are doing fundraising in conjunction with them also, pooling our time and talents while increasing locally raised funds.

I am enclosing two documents. One is a Grant Funding Scale showing State and Federal funding trends for HAVIN with corresponding statistics of service provision. I am also enclosing HAVIN's expenses for fiscal years 01/02 through 06/07. Please note on the Grant Funding Scale that we have experienced over \$88,000 in State and Federal cuts. If you review our expenses, in particular those that we can control, i.e. salaries, program supplies, and professional services have decreased, while uncontrollable expenses for utilities, benefits, business insurance, and telephone have increased.

I want to share some specific information with you to help you fully understand the sacrifices those of who passionately care about victims make across the Commonwealth. If you please look at the expense chart, you will see that our benefits have increased (while salaries have decreased due to elimination of positions and reducing several full-time positions to part-time). We continue to provide healthcare coverage for full-time staff, excluding spouses and dependants. Our salaries are so low, an average of \$25,337 for our full-time workers (our range is lowest for shelter manager is \$15,000 to highest (myself) at \$50,700). Approximately four years ago I discontinued accepting our healthcare coverage because we experienced a 30 percent rate increase and there was nowhere we could absorb this in our budget. Our Board of Directors and I realized that the only alternative was to reduce coverage or to require HAVIN staff to assist in paying premiums. We knew these choices would result in staff turn-over. While I am covered by my husband's insurance, I must pay of this coverage. I am teiling you this not because I am a martyr, but to provide an example. I have a Masters Degree in Social Work, am a Licensed Social Worker with twenty-five years experience in social services. I know that caring, compassionate, experienced staff are critical to social services.

Many alternative funding streams, such as private foundations and grants want to pay for projects. We don't need funds for projects, or new programs, we need funds for core services. We need funds for operational expenses, including utilities, salaries and benefits so that victims receive quality supportive services. Victims receiving support from experts in domestic and sexual violence are less likely to require support from mental health and drug and alcohol programs, thus adequately funding domestic violence services is a win-win for all of us, most importantly the people we serve.

I am asking you to support House Bill 59. I know you understand that if the current trends continue, our life-saving services are in jeopardy. I am available for further discussion at your convenience.
