

- Successful placement of all but three employees following the closings of SCIs Cresson and Greensburg in conjunction with the opening of SCI Benner Township.
- Mental Health Initiatives:
 - **O** Implemented Crisis Intervention Team training for employees who work closely with mentally ill offenders.
 - **Organization of Segan Providing Mental Health First Aid training to employees.**
 - Continued providing Certified Peer Support Specialist training to inmates who assist other inmates who are currently in mental health treatment.
- Awarded performance-based contracts with financial incentives to MHM Services for mental health services, and to community corrections contractors for community corrections services.
- Began a Transitional Housing Unit (THU) pilot reentry program at SCIs Albion, Camp Hill, Graterford, and Muncy.
- Began operating "Veterans Units" to house the more than 2,500 offenders who previously served in the military.
- Partnered with the PA Board of Probation and Parole to establish non-residential reentry services.
- Reduced DOC population growth from an average of 1,500 inmates per year over the past several decades to 64 inmates per year under Governor Corbett's Administration:



Population

The state prison population increased by less than 1% (328 inmates) between 2012 and 2013.... The average annual inmate population increase of 64 inmates per year over the last 3 years is the lowest average increase in over 40 years. Total population increased to 51,512 in 2013 from 51,184 in 2012.


DOC Population Growth



The DOC population increased 12%, from 46,028 in 2007 to 51,512 in 2013.

- Population grew at an average annual rate of 3.8% per year from 2007 to 2010,
- Population grew at an average annual rate of less than 1% per year from 2011 to 2013,
- Population increased by 317 inmates in 2011,
- Population decreased by 454 inmates in 2012,
- Population increased by 328 inmates in 2013.

Population by Type




Part I violent offenders comprised less than half of the inmate population for the past 5 years.

The composition of the population has remained consistent between 2007 and 2013:

Number of parole violator admissions increased 43% since 2007.




New court commitments grew 12.7% from 10,222 in 2007 to 11,520 in 2013, with a slight decrease of 1.4% in 2012.

In 2013, 6,884 of the new court commitments were Part II less serious offenders and 4,636 were more serious Part I offenders.

There were 1,063 more parole violator admissions in 2013 compared to 2012.

Other admissions have increased since 2006 primarily due to the State Intermediate Punishment Program and Detentioners.

In 2013, parole releases increased by 8%.



In 2013, there were 19,177 releases back into the community as parolees or max-outs. In addition, there were 2,638 other releases (such as release detentioners, deaths, and releases to other jurisdictions).

Staff and Inmate Safety-


Assaults, misconducts, and drug use are all indicators of prison safety.

The rate of total inmate on inmate assaults has increased slightly since 2007.

The rate of total inmate on staff assaults remained stable since 2007 (between 12 and 17 per 1,000), with the rate of assaults requiring medical treatment remaining at or below 1 per 1,000.


Key Indicators

The rate of inmate on inmate assaults per 1,000 inmates declined between 2007 and 2008 with slight annual increases through 2013.



DOC annual random drug test positive rate remained at less than 0.3% since 2007.




The rate of inmate on staff assaults was 13.8 per 1,000 inmates in 2013.

In 2013, 27% of drug finds were on visitors, 29% were expired inmate prescription finds, and 44% were illegal drug finds.



A small percentage of inmates are responsible for a disproportionate number of misconducts. Since 2007, 6% of inmates have accounted for 33.5% of the serious misconducts.
