III. DCED FY2024-25 BUDGET POLICY PRIORITIES

Job Creation, Site Development, Workforce Training, Business Growth and Attraction:

Reignite Pennsylvania's economy by investing the resources needed to attract and retain businesses, support expansion efforts, and position the Commonwealth as a national leader in economic development. Job creation and retention helps ensure businesses and communities provide opportunities for all the state's residents, improve the local tax base, achieve prosperity and a higher quality of life for families and communities. Workforce training helps bridge the current skills gap, maintain a sustainable competitive economic environment, and support critical current and future needs of individuals, local governments, businesses, and industries.

- Offer the highest and most professional level of services to businesses making strategic, high-value investments in Pennsylvania to provide customized technical and financial assistance, including specialized workforce training.
- Support site readiness and development through the establishment of certified sites criteria and targeted investments.
- Collaborate with partners at the state, regional and local levels to provide coordinated services.
- Take an integrated approach to development, packaging traditional community and economic development programs based on industries' needs, geographic location benefits and community assets.
- Engage with key business leaders and influencers – including professional site selection practitioners – to share actionable information during the expansion or relocation decision-making process.

Pennsylvania Innovation Economy:

Capitalize on our leadership in research and development by creating access to capital and technical assistance for entrepreneurs to commercialize new and emerging innovations. This commercial activity provides job growth in key sectors such as Life Sciences, Robotics and Technology, Agriculture, Manufacturing, and Energy, all while strengthening the resilience and interconnectivity of our supply chains and deepening cross-sector collaboration across the Commonwealth.

- Accelerate technology transfer to commercialize new products and services.
- Provide technical support and access to capital for Pennsylvania's emerging entrepreneurial companies in technology and life sciences through strategic partners and networks (Bens, LSGH, IRCs, LDDs, SBDC, Industrial Dev. Orgs, Higher Ed. etc.)

- Increase workforce participation by coordinating efforts between learning institutions and businesses to educate, train, and/or certify employees for current job pipeline.
- Retain our best and brightest by encouraging young entrepreneurs to stay in PA and start/grow businesses.

Pennsylvania World-Wide:

Leverage Pennsylvania's international business connections—managed and facilitated by DCED— to increase exports sales in markets around the world and bring more foreign investment into the Commonwealth. These efforts will create more jobs in Pennsylvania and enable economic growth.

- Highlight sites and our skilled workforce for more international investors to invest and expand in the Commonwealth.
- Provide technical assistance to Pennsylvania companies to export their products and services and license technologies in target markets to grow employment here.
- Build the profile of Pennsylvania in international markets as a hub for Life Sciences, Robotics and Technology, Manufacturing, Agriculture and Energy industries.
- Work with regions across the Commonwealth to strengthen our unique local industrial ecosystems with international engagement—from hardwoods and powdered metals to educational services and healthcare.

Pennsylvania Assets:

Launch new business and tourism brands and marketing campaigns to build Pennsylvania's image as a destination to visit, a place to grow a business, a community to call home, and a state to feel proud of thanks to a strong quality of work and life.

- Inform potential and existing businesses and employers about Pennsylvania's economy, business climate, and industry resources and services.
- Increase domestic and international leisure travel to the commonwealth to grow the tourism industry's economic impact.
- Collaborate with industry stakeholders and partners to develop and implement cooperative business marketing initiatives.
- Inform potential and existing visitors about Pennsylvania's unique destinations, activities, and attractions.

Pennsylvania Communities:

Champion and promote all Pennsylvania regions by supporting tailored, flexible regional strategies, investing in downtowns and main streets, and building local leadership capacity to make Pennsylvania a top state to live, work, play, and innovate. Strive for equitable regional growth while increasing job creation, wages, and labor force participation across the commonwealth.

- Create attractive, livable communities by revitalizing downtowns and surrounding neighborhoods and promoting sound land use practices. These efforts will improve the quality of life and economic competitiveness of communities and assist local governments to maintain fiscal stability and effective delivery of services to the needy.

Communities have long struggled with the challenges posed by the unoccupied, vacant buildings and open, empty lots that constitute the growing problem of blight.

IV. DCED FY2024-25 BUDGET PROGRAM PRIORITIES

Program: Job Creation, Site Development, Workforce Training, Business Growth and Attraction.

Goal: Reignite Pennsylvania's economy by investing the resources needed to attract and retain businesses, support expansion efforts, and position the Commonwealth as a national leader in economic development.

Pennsylvania First

The Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) runs Pennsylvania First (PA First), a comprehensive program that offers grants for job creation and retention, infrastructure projects, and workforce development by providing the Commonwealth the flexibility necessary to rapidly respond to companies' needs, increasing investment in the state, and enabling Pennsylvania to compete more effectively with other states. Eligible uses for PA First funding include job training; land and building acquisition and construction; purchase and upgrade of machinery and equipment; construction and rehabilitation of infrastructure; working capital; and environmental assessment and remediation.

WEDnetPA is Pennsylvania's incumbent worker training program and provides funding to Pennsylvania companies for essential skills and advanced technology training. WEDnetPA is a job training alliance of numerous partners, including several universities in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education, Pennsylvania's community colleges, Pennsylvania College of Technology, North Central PA Regional Planning & Development Commission, and the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford. WEDnetPA alliance partners seek the input of local workforce development boards and key economic development organizations to determine the target industries and training priorities in their regions. Since its inception, this program has trained over one million Pennsylvania workers.

Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority (PIDA)

The Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority (PIDA) provides low-interest loans and lines of credit for a wide range of Commonwealth businesses including manufacturing, industrial, health care, agricultural, research and development, hospitality, defense conversion, information technology, construction, day care, retail, and service enterprises, as well as for the development of industrial parks and multi-tenant facilities. Eligible costs include real estate acquisitions, construction and renovation projects, machinery, and equipment acquisitions, and working capital costs. The interest savings realized through PIDA's program enables the recipient companies to invest the savings back into the business and its workforce to remain competitive.

Industrial Sites Reuse Program (ISRP)

The two components of the Industrial Sites Reuse Program (ISRP) that are combined to work together includes the Industrial Sites Cleanup Fund (Act 2 of 1995) and the Industrial Sites Assessment Fund (Act 4 of 1995). Many of the Keystone Opportunity Zone (KOZ) sites have received ISRP assistance.

The Industrial Sites Cleanup Fund is designed to encourage the reuse of blighted and former industrial sites. The program provides grants and low-interest loans to companies, municipalities, and private non-profit economic development entities for environmental assessments and remediation work. Funds are available for both site assessment and remediation and can fund up to 75% of the project cost, with a maximum of \$200,000 for site assessment and \$1.0 million (grants) for site remediation.

The Industrial Sites Assessment Fund authorizes grants to municipalities, counties, municipal authorities, redevelopment authorities, and economic development agencies to perform environmental assessments of contaminated industrial sites. In 2000, the Act was amended to permit performance-based loans for uniquely situated projects. Performance-based loans require the borrower to meet certain agreed-to performance standards related to the project being funded. If those standards are met, the loan is forgiven.

PA SITES

The program will support site readiness and development through the establishment of certified sites criteria and targeted investments. Pennsylvania has an inventory shortage of highly competitive sites (those with sufficient infrastructure, transportation, and quality amenities). The state is also home to 90 Federal National Priority List (NPL) sites that require extensive remediation and redevelopment efforts due to high amounts of contamination. This combination of factors has hindered our economic competitiveness. Other states such as NY, VA, and OH have implemented certified sites programs that attract developers by ensuring that their basic site qualifications are met. There are very limited funds currently available to remediate and certify sites for development at scale.

Program: Pennsylvania Innovation Economy

Goal: Capitalize on our leadership in research and development by creating access to capital and technical assistance for entrepreneurs to commercialize new and emerging innovations. This commercial activity provides job growth in key sectors such as Life Sciences, Robotics and Technology, Agriculture, Manufacturing, and Energy, all while strengthening the resilience and interconnectivity of our supply chains and deepening cross-sector collaboration across the Commonwealth.

Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority (BFTDA)

The Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority (BFTDA) ensures that Pennsylvania technology-enabled companies, entrepreneurs, and innovators have the necessary tools and capital to build their businesses. The BFTDA supports the advancement of technologies in traditional and emerging industries through a series of programs that are flexible, dynamic, and built to proactively respond to changing markets in key industry sectors.

BFTDA's current funded programs are

- Ben Franklin Technology Partners, which are strategically located throughout the Commonwealth and are designed to advance the commercialization of new technologies and support company growth; and
- Venture Investment, which provides risk capital to venture partnerships that invest in Pennsylvania-based companies

The Pennsylvania Life Sciences Greenhouse Initiative (LSG)

Since 2002, Pennsylvania's three Life Sciences Greenhouses have been stimulating economic growth and job creation by providing critical capital to university-based researchers, emerging companies, and companies seeking to expand. Investments by the greenhouses are designed to advance the life sciences and stimulate economic growth, focusing on the health and welfare of Pennsylvanians, commercialization of new health care technologies, and creation of high-quality sustainable jobs.

Partnerships for Regional Economic Performance (PREP)

Partnerships for Regional Economic Performance (PREP) supports the coordination and collaboration of over 100 economic development organizations in 10 regions across Pennsylvania. Core partners include the Industrial Development Organizations, Local Development Districts, and the Small Business Development Centers. PREP is designed to integrate these networks by encouraging regional coordination of economic development efforts and provide customer service to the business community resulting in a comprehensive, efficient, and statewide economic development delivery strategy.

PREP partner organizations deliver a wide array of coordinated business development services designed to encourage the creation of new companies and increase the capacity of Pennsylvania businesses to compete successfully in the global economy. Partners also collaborate to provide the necessary infrastructure (broadband, business sites, incubators, etc.), needed to attract, retain, and expand businesses. The PREP network will focus on providing technical assistance to advance the key sectors prioritized in Pennsylvania

Engage! is a Pennsylvania statewide business retention and expansion program designed to interact with targeted companies regularly and proactively. The overall goal of Engage! is to retain existing businesses in a community and to help them grow and expand by building solid relationships with business owners or key decision makers and economic development partners. Engage! provides grants to identify and target companies, engages those companies through various outreach methods, assesses their needs, and assists through referrals and direct technical assistance.

Manufacturing PA

Launched in 2017, Manufacturing PA is a multi-faceted initiative designed to support Pennsylvania's manufacturing community, with an emphasis on small to medium-sized manufacturers. Manufacturing PA supports Pennsylvania's manufacturing community through the department's strategic partners including Industrial Resource Centers, Pennsylvania's colleges, universities, technical schools, and nonprofit organizations that provide critical training and workforce development opportunities. Manufacturing PA also promotes innovative problem solving by matching higher education with the business community.

Pennsylvania Business One-Stop Shop

The Pennsylvania Business One-Stop Shop streamlines the process for businesses to start and expand in Pennsylvania by serving as a source to guide aspiring entrepreneurs and established businesses through all stages of development, including planning, registering, operating, and growing. Services and resources are available through a website, toll-free number, and dedicated program office housed in the department. This program is an interagency, collaborative effort involving the Departments of State, Revenue, and Labor and Industry and actively engages PA's Partnerships for Regional Economic Performance, local governments, state legislators, and many other economic development organizations and networks to promote the program's services and resources across the Commonwealth.

Energy

DCED leverages Pennsylvania's massive stake in global energy to develop home grown energy resources and attract energy intensive industries to the state, attracting investments that enhance Pennsylvania's manufacturing base by utilizing energy assets. Pennsylvania has been a leader in coal production and in the last decade has rapidly become a leader in natural gas production. A marked decline in coal-fired electric generation has led to retirements of plants across the Commonwealth. These sites have premier access to rivers, roads, rail, utilities, and transmission, which demands a comprehensive statewide effort to market and incentivize these sites for repositioning and redevelopment. Utilizing Pennsylvania Energy Horizons, a statewide public-private network, to obtain feedback from stakeholders allows the department to refine where Pennsylvania should focus its energy efforts and support the state's interest in redeveloping decommissioned coal-fired power plants.

Innovation Fund

This flexible and large-scale fund will allow the Commonwealth to act as an investor, supporting key innovative efforts and encouraging entrepreneurs to scale their products in the state. In the first year, the state will make a "down payment" on this initiative boosting funding to the existing innovation infrastructure, doubling down on federal investment opportunities, and investing in priority industry sectors. This fund will serve as a critical mechanism to better support Pennsylvania's entrepreneurs and incentivize deployment of additional venture capital throughout the state. The fund will increase our competitiveness with other states that have outpaced our investment in innovation in recent years.

Program: Pennsylvania International Business Development

Goal: Leverage Pennsylvania's international business connections—managed and facilitated by DCED— to increase exports sales in markets around the world and bring more foreign investment into the Commonwealth. These efforts will create more jobs in Pennsylvania and enable economic growth.

The Office of International Business Development (OIBD) maintains a network of authorized trade and investment representatives around the world. With this network and regional partners across Pennsylvania, the office pursues three goals. First, OIBD works to help Pennsylvania companies to export to new markets by providing customized assistance to ensure companies are ready to export, and then providing in-market research, vetted business connections, and other assistance to facilitate their business. Second, OIBD works to promote Pennsylvania as a place to do business by informing international audiences of Pennsylvania's strengths and serving as a business concierge helping international companies to conduct site searches, research business opportunities, and ultimately establish a presence and grow in Pennsylvania. Third, OIBD works to connect Pennsylvania companies, universities, cultural institutions, and communities to global partners for mutually beneficial information exchanges and business opportunities.

Program: Pennsylvania Assets

Goal: Launch new business and tourism brands and marketing campaigns to build Pennsylvania's image as a destination to visit, a place to grow a business, a community to call home, and a state to feel proud of thanks to a strong quality of work and life.

Marketing to Attract Tourists

Tourism is a key industry for Pennsylvania, injecting billions of dollars annually into the Commonwealth's economy and generating tax revenues each year which allow for investments in vital services including public safety, education, and other essential programs that benefit Pennsylvanians. Those critical tax revenues also fund the work of tourism promotion partners across the state. The Pennsylvania Tourism Office's marketing activities provide exposure to out-of-state markets for the many small Pennsylvania tourism businesses that lack the resources to advertise beyond their local areas. Marketing to Attract Tourists provides funding for a marketing agenda including the popular visitPA.com website, social media channels, media relations activities, an annual travel guide, and a small targeted paid advertising campaign. The tourism office encourages public-private partnerships within the industry to maximize Pennsylvania's presence on the national and global travel and tourism stage. The tourism office leverages social media communities including Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, YouTube, Pinterest, and others to provide highly customized, personalized, and targeted information directly to travelers, extending the reach of the office's traditional marketing efforts.

Marketing to Attract Business

Attracting and retaining businesses is a priority for any location seeking industry growth and economic stability. The Pennsylvania Business Marketing Office encourages business decision makers to locate or stay in the state by promoting the competitive advantages of doing business in Pennsylvania. The office also promotes DCED's many programs for technical assistance, financial support, and workforce training resources for businesses. The Marketing to Attract Business program provides necessary funding to support the office's business marketing initiatives. This includes the PA Gets It Done microsite and content, DCED and Business One-Stop Shop websites, proactive media relations, DCED's social media channels (including LinkedIn, Twitter, and Facebook), paid advertising, and targeted events. The office collaborates with local and regional economic development organizations, community partners, and workforce development professionals to maximize the reach of collective marketing efforts.

Program: Pennsylvania Communities

Goal: Champion and promote all Pennsylvania regions by supporting tailored, flexible regional strategies, investing in downtowns and main streets, and building local leadership capacity to make Pennsylvania a top state to live, work, play, and innovate and hence achieve equitable regional growth while increasing job creation, wages, and labor force participation across the commonwealth.

Main Street Matters

The Main Street Matters program is designed to encourage public-private partnerships that support initiatives to grow and improve the stability of neighborhoods and communities, promote social and economic diversity, and provide a strong and secure quality of life. The program offers designation opportunities and financial resources to assist communities in achieving revitalization goals and making physical improvements.

Regional Hubs Challenge

Taking inspiration from competitions like the federal Build Back Better Regional Challenge, Pennsylvania's Regional Hubs Challenge will both incentivize the development of regional plans as well as fund those plans at scale on a competitive basis. By backing well planned regional strategies, we will combine local vision and regional expertise with state resources to provide a bottom-up approach to statewide economic development that meets the individual needs of each of our diverse regions.

Just as we scale regional resources, we must invest in capacity building to ensure that every community has the skills and talent to effectively access state and federal economic development programs. State government will resource and launch an economic development training program to provide both the technical assistance and the networking opportunities necessary for local partners to be successful in economic development and community revitalization efforts.

Planning Expansion Initiative

DCED's new planning initiative will empower municipalities with comprehensive planning tools and support, empowering local governments to fully engage with their constituents and identify what investments must be prioritized for their good and the Commonwealth overall. To support this initiative, DCED is significantly expanding its planning abilities for the first time in over a decade. The existing 4-person team is being expanded to 14 to address growing demand among municipalities for planning support as they face an increasingly complex workload. The state will be divided in half between East and West, with a director in Harrisburg, managers in each region, and five planners under each manager.

Strategic Management Planning Program

To assist municipalities interested in improving their fiscal position, the Strategic Management Planning Program (STMP) provides financial assistance to municipal and county governments for the development and implementation of five-year financial management plans and departmental operational overviews. The STMP plans supply both short-term and long-term strategies to promote best management practices and ultimately avert financial distress.

The department's Center for Local Government Services has developed an approach to identify at-risk municipalities called the Early Warning System. The system looks at multiple financial factors to determine which municipalities may be experiencing fiscal difficulties. This approach, combined with the resources available under STMP, provides tools that aid in keeping governments from filing for financial assistance under Act 47 of 1987, commonly known as the Municipalities Financial Recovery Act.

Municipalities Financial Recovery Program – Act 47

The Center for Local Government Services has a responsibility to assist local governments facing potential financial insolvency. When a municipality is declared distressed by the department, the Municipalities Financial Recovery Program is used to provide technical assistance in the fields of financial management and public administration, as well as financial assistance through the Distressed Municipalities Revolving Fund. Act 47 also empowers the Governor to issue a declaration of fiscal emergency for the purpose of enabling the department to prepare an emergency action plan. The Act further empowers the Governor to appoint a receiver for the purpose of preparing a recovery plan to be confirmed by Commonwealth Court.

Whole-Home Repairs Program (WHRP)

The Whole-Home Repairs Program (WHRP) was established in 2022 using Covid-ARPA (SLFRF) funds. The program provides funding to county-wide agencies to address habitability and safety concerns, provide measures to improve energy or water efficiency and make units accessible for individuals with disabilities. The program addresses housing insecurity and the climate crisis by providing grant funding to county programs supporting up to \$50,000 per unit in repairs for homeowners and small landlords to support upkeep and weatherization deferral work. Additionally, this program provides funding to the counties for investment into construction related workforce development programs.

Municipal Assistance Program

The Municipal Assistance Program (MAP) was created to help local governments plan for and effectively implement a variety of services, improvements, and soundly managed development. MAP provides funding for two groups of activities:

- Shared service activities – regionalization, consolidation, or merging of services; shared personnel; high impact projects serving many municipalities or large areas; and boundary change efforts; and
- Community planning – comprehensive plans; community revitalization plans; zoning and subdivision ordinances; and Transit Revitalization Investment District planning studies

Neighborhood Assistance Program

The Neighborhood Assistance Program (NAP) has served as a resource for non-profits, businesses, and neighborhoods for over 40 years to improve communities for low-income populations and economically distressed neighborhoods in specific geographic locations throughout Pennsylvania. Through NAP, businesses can receive up to 80 percent tax credits on their contributions to a community project led by a nonprofit organization. NAP promotes a shared belief that healthy, thriving neighborhoods are a cornerstone of Pennsylvania's success. The tax credit incentive is a powerful way to offset most of the costs of business contributions to projects while fostering relationships with the nonprofit sector and giving businesses real input and leadership in the direction of their community.

Transportation Projects

Funding is transferred annually to the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) to assist with the implementation of a variety of transportation projects including projects that coordinate local land use with transportation assets to enhance existing communities; projects related to streetscape, lighting, sidewalk enhancement, and pedestrian safety; projects that will improve connectivity or the use of existing transportation assets; and projects related to transit-oriented development. Financial assistance provided by the CFA is matched by local funding.

Weatherization Assistance Program

The U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE) Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) assists low-income families who lack resources to invest in energy efficiency upgrades and weatherization readiness measures to their single-family home or multi-family unit. Funds are used to improve the energy efficiency of low-income homes using the most advanced technologies and testing protocols available in the housing industry. Weatherization services primarily involve diagnostic assessment of air leakage, health and safety repairs, electric baseload measures, and client energy education.

Low-Income Heating and Energy Assistance Crisis Interface Program (LIHEAP-Crisis)

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) provides annual funding to the Department of Human Services (DHS) to administer a cash-grant heating bill supplement program, known as LIHEAP. DHS provides 15% of their annual allocation to DCED to administer the LIHEAP-Crisis Programs through the WAP network of public and non-profit agencies operating in all 67 counties of the Commonwealth. The program provides primarily direct crisis heating services including furnace repair and replacements throughout Pennsylvania's winter months, as well as weatherization and deferral work, and cooling and maintenance work throughout the year to low-income families.

Small Cities Community Development Block Grant

The federal Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program, commonly known as the Community Development Block Grant Program, provides financial assistance to:

- Expand low- and moderate-income housing opportunities.
- Enhance economic development and job opportunities for low- and moderate-income individuals
- Correct deficiencies in water and sewer systems
- Address blight; and
- Improve streets, streetscapes, recreational facilities, and public facilities to strengthen a pro-growth and pro-business environment.

HOME Investment Partnerships Program

The HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program provides municipalities with grant and technical assistance to expand the supply of safe, code compliant, and affordable housing for low- and very low-income Pennsylvanians. The department awards these funds on a competitive basis to projects which leverage other resources and demonstrate significant community impact.

- The program prioritizes funding in the following areas:
 - Development of rental housing for low-income households
 - Preservation of existing low-income housing units through rehabilitation of owner-occupied homes
 - Expanding the capacity of certified Community Housing Development Organizations to develop affordable housing; and
 - Assistance to low-income homebuyers to acquire newly constructed or existing homes

Emergency Solutions Grant Program

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program is the first step in achieving self-sufficiency for homeless individuals and families, while also assisting other households to avoid the causes of homelessness. ESG funds support households and individuals that earn less than 30 percent of median income. DCED awards ESG funds through a competitive application process to eligible entities in the following priority areas:

- Rapid re-housing (services to remove individuals/families from their homeless status quickly and move them into stable permanent housing)
- Homelessness prevention (services to assist individuals/families at risk of becoming homeless)
- Street outreach services

- Emergency shelters (includes renovations, operational costs, and essential services); and
- Homeless Management Information Systems

Community Services Block Grant

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) aims to reduce poverty in a community or those areas of a community where poverty is a particularly acute problem. Addressing the causes and conditions of poverty requires community engagement activities which remove obstacles that block self-sufficiency, such as employment and training resources; community stakeholder collaboration; literacy activities; affordable housing issues; grassroots activities that provide intervention to the causes of poverty; addressing the needs of youth through programming or coordination; and increased engagement in community planning and improvement activities.

Personnel costs are based on a complement of 301 salaried positions throughout the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED). Employee personnel costs in the GGO complement are transferred to other DCED funds and federal programs based on actual time devoted to those programs. Where possible, a portion of operating costs as described below is transferred to other DCED programs on a pro-rata basis. The requested budget reflects the net amount after the anticipated transfer of costs to other programs.

7. Overview of the Program:

The GGO appropriation for DCED supports agency-wide expenditures that include personnel, operating, and fixed asset costs. Many appropriations administered by DCED have no provision for personnel charges or operational expenditures and are 100% funded by the GGO budget. Operating and fixed asset costs support DCED agency-wide expenditures, IT costs, building and parking leases, COPA shared service expenditures, office supplies, etc.

8. Program Performance:

The primary measure of program performance in the GGO appropriation is customer satisfaction with the quality and responsiveness of DCED personnel. The Department's performance measures are listed in Section II of this submission.

5. Legislative Authorization:

The Office of Open Records (OOR) was created by Act 3 of 2008. The Supreme Court has held that the OOR is a unique and *sui generis* independent body. The Commonwealth Court has held that the OOR is a quasi-judicial agency.

6. Cost Assumptions:

Even with the fulfillment of the 24th position (currently in the interview stage), the OOR is in need of three additional legal positions to address an unprecedented increase in Right-to-Know Law appeals that it must adjudicate within the legally required thirty-day deadline; the looming 2024 presidential campaign will certainly accelerate the spike in county appeals, which saw a 77% increase in the aftermath of the 2020 election.

7. Overview of the Program:

The legislative mandate of the OOR is to decide appeals under the Right-to-Know Law (RTKL) and to serve as a resource for citizens, public officials, and members of the media in obtaining public records of their government. Under the RTKL, the OOR is also required to provide training sessions covering the RTKL and the Sunshine Act, to establish a mediation program, to issue advisory opinions, to establish a website, to conduct a biannual review of fees charged under the RTKL, and to prepare an annual report for the Governor and the General Assembly.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

The OOR's accomplishments in calendar year 2023¹ include the following:

- Received and docketed 3,015 appeals, breaking a new record.
- Decided 2,986 appeals.

- Responded to 1,269 Right-to-Know Law requests directed to the OOR.
- Participated in or monitored more than 350 cases in the Supreme Court, Commonwealth Court, and Courts of Common Pleas.
- Provided 49 training sessions, mostly virtual, attended by nearly 3,000 public officials, lawmakers, judges, agency employees, solicitors, and requesters.
- Fully launched the OOR E-File Appeal Portal, a system to process all OOR RTKL appeals.
- Conducted a bi-annual study that found that 73% of reviewed agencies' websites contain all the information required to be posted by the Right-to-Know Law.

5. Legislative Authorization:

The Pennsylvania General Assembly established the Office of Small Business Advocate (OSBA) in 1988 [Act of December 21, 1988 (P.L. 1871, No. 181)] to protect and represent every Commonwealth regulated utility consumer with 250 or fewer employees, who is paying a small business tariffed rate for utility service, as defined by our Statute.

Furthermore, OSBA's legislative obligations were expanded as part of the 1993 modifications of Pennsylvania's Workers Compensation Act, Article XIII at 77 P.S. 1041.1, et seq., due to OSBA's established litigation competence and success. The OSBA also provides expert actuarial review and evaluation, in addition to comments and recommendations for improvement, on the loss cost filings that the Pennsylvania Compensation Rating Bureau (PCRB) and the Coal Mine Compensation Rating Bureau of Pennsylvania (CMCRB) submit annually to the Pennsylvania Insurance Department.

The OSBA is an independent Commonwealth agency, situated within the Department of Community and Economic Development for administrative support purposes. The agency has a complement of 10 and currently employs eight (8) staff while our regulatory advocacy colleagues have a complement of thirty-five (35) or more.

As the only one of its kind in the United States, Pennsylvania's OSBA plays a critical role in defining and sharing criteria for success with other states attempting to better safeguard their own struggling small business utility consumers.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The OSBA is fully funded outside the General Fund via annual assessments levied upon Pennsylvania's public utilities and workers' compensation insurance companies, in direct proportion to our legal and actuarial work in these areas.

OSBA's funds are held in restricted accounts under General Fund Appropriation line 16297 (Small Business Advocate-SBA) and 16315 (Workers' Compensation-SBA). Any funding not deployed by the OSBA during a fiscal year is returned to our restricted accounts at the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) and PA Insurance Department for reallocation, as necessary, and budgeted by the OSBA to successfully conduct its operations during the next fiscal year.

7. Overview of Statutory Programs:

Business Regulatory Utility Legal Advocacy:

The OSBA is mandated by legislation to protect the rights and interests of Pennsylvania's small business energy and utility consumers before the PUC, corresponding state and federal regulatory agencies, and in higher courts. As Pennsylvania's statutory Small Business Advocate, the OSBA represents every Commonwealth regulated utility consumer with 250 or fewer workers, who is paying a small business tariffed rate for utility service, as defined by our Statute.

Our attorneys, expert witnesses, and staff participate in regulated gas, electric, water, wastewater, telecommunications, steam, transmission, and pipeline utility cases brought before the PUC and the Commonwealth Courts. The OSBA also participates in company mergers, acquisitions, and Distribution System Improvement Charges (DSIC) proceedings, which help fund long-term infrastructure improvement plans.

Furthermore, the OSBA participates in a wide range of proceedings and investigations, including alternative utility ratemaking, utility default service proceedings, fully projected future test year filing requirements under Act 11 of 2012 and Act 120 of 2018, and all proceedings relating to changes in the federal income tax rate because of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017.

Additionally, the OSBA monitors, and engages, when necessary, to protect Pennsylvania's small business consumers in matters before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

Workers' Compensation Actuarial Review, Analysis and Advocacy:

The OSBA's specialized workers' compensation duties afford Pennsylvania's employers expert actuarial review and evaluation of, and the submission of comments and recommendations for improvement on, the loss cost filings that are submitted to the Pennsylvania Insurance Department each year by the Pennsylvania Compensation Rating Bureau (PCRB) and the Coal Mine Compensation Rating Bureau of Pennsylvania (CMCRB).

8. Program Performance and Impact:

Workers' Compensation Actuarial Review, Analysis and Advocacy:

Annually, the OSBA, along with our expert actuarial consultants, perform statutory reviews and analyses identifying opportunities while offering recommendations to the Pennsylvania Insurance Department and its annual filing.

The OSBA, along with its actuarial consultants, address the methodology used, changes to methodology from one filing to the next, data used, and judgments and assumptions applied in the process of calculating loss costs.

Our recommendations have directly led to critical decisions by the Pennsylvania Insurance Department and, at times, have reduced the loss costs initially filed by the CMCRB and PCRB. The recommendations have prevented Pennsylvania employers from paying more for workers' compensation insurance.

Small Business Regulatory Energy and Utility Advocacy:

In the past fiscal year, the OSBA's presence and participation in utility proceedings before the PUC has resulted in cost savings for small business consumers across the Commonwealth in excess of over \$100.0 million dollars.

The OSBA's significant impacts on the Commonwealth's small business utility consumers' various utility bills demonstrates the effectiveness of the OSBA's advocacy for all of Pennsylvania's small business consumers.

Additionally, the OSBA collaborated with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, Pennsylvania's regulated energy and utility advocates, legislators, and stakeholders to discuss the critical need for protections, programs, and an acknowledgment of the major role those small businesses play in the Commonwealth's economy.

OSBA's first-time capture and successful implementation of the following are examples of such successes:

- Inclusion of small business language in PA PUC's newsletters, press releases, and internal communication.
- Pre-filing meetings with all regulated utility's leadership.
- Meet and greets with legislators, PA PUC commissioners and staff, PA's One Stop Shop, Governor's Action Team, National Federation of Independent Businesses (NFIB), City of Harrisburg's Economic Development Team, and a host of other agencies.
- Toured multiple commercial corridors across the Commonwealth to meet with business owner's one-on-one.
- In-person attendance at various townhalls across the Commonwealth.

Relationship building and significant outreach are critical to future discussions with key stakeholders regarding the protections and programs for small business consumers. This is particularly important because former COVID protections are now only implemented on a case-by-case basis.

Program at Work:

The OSBA reviewed approximately 26,000 new PUC filings, yielding legal engagement in more than 33 new utility rate increase filings, including one merger proceeding across the electric, gas, telecommunications, water, and wastewater arenas, 23 base rate cases, and eight Section 1329 proceedings, resulting in a total overall requested increase of \$836.0 million.

The OSBA staff has also participated in more than 250 telephonic and virtual evidentiary and public input hearings involving nearly all of Pennsylvania's regulated utilities.

As the only one of its kind nationally, the Pennsylvania Office of Small Business Advocate plays a pivotal role here in the Commonwealth, on behalf of Pennsylvania's small business utility consumers. The goal of the OSBA is to ensure that all of Pennsylvania's small businesses have access to safe, reliable, and affordable utility service. This is especially critical now to our small business consumers as they continue to persevere post COVID.

The OSBA's staff also provides one-on-one support and resources to our small business utility consumers such as:

- Responses to individual utility consumer complaints and inquiries, assisting and directing toward swift resolutions.
- Individual utility company contacts/referrals to assist our small business clients with assistance in payment arrangements.
- Telephonic and electronic small business owner contacts, communications, and referrals to the DCED Business One-Stop Shop, legislators, and others for their specific small business needs, etc.

7. Overview of the Program:

Throughout the Commonwealth, employers have reported difficulty with finding qualified candidates who satisfy specific skill requirements. Registered Apprenticeship is an employer-driven model that enables employers to provide customized training developed according to their talent needs. Additionally, apprenticeships provide job seekers with a structured career pathway that enables them to concurrently earn money and acquire skills.

Foundations in Industry Training (formerly known as the Pre-Apprentice and Apprenticeship Program) is a statewide program offering assistance to registered Apprenticeship Programs that foster high-quality, industry-specific training. The overall program goal is to increase apprenticeship availability to Pennsylvania employers to help support them with their talent recruitment and development needs. The program assists with the related instruction that complements on the job training to deliver the technical and academic competencies that apply to the job.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

For many years, DCED has funded what was known as the “Pre-Apprentice and Apprenticeship Program” to accomplish these goals using recaptured Pennsylvania First funds that have been returned or recaptured during project monitoring. The new line item will provide a dedicated source of funds for this targeted effort to build foundations in our workforce with industry-specific training opportunities.

Program at work:

Since the program was awarded funding in the FY2023-24 budget, it has gone through rebranding to promote the new name. It was officially opened to accept applications in late fall. Since that time, there has been a lot of interest in the program from trade organizations, employers, and educational institutions.

Chester County Economic Development Council

Chester County Economic Development Council is requesting a \$842,480 Industrial Sites Reuse Program grant on behalf of Chernow Development, LLC to perform environmental remediation on a building located at 4101 N. Delaware Avenue (the switch house at the former Richmond coal generating station) in the City of Philadelphia. In preparation for demolition of the building, many assessments have been performed and significant Asbestos-Containing Material (ACM) was discovered on each floor. Approximately 60,000 square feet of friable and non-friable material in the form of transit paneling, caulking, flooring, piping debris and roofing needs to be removed and disposed of properly. ISRP funds will be used for asbestos abatement on the entire building prior to demolition. Post-remediation and demolition, the site will be prepared for the development of a mixed-use office and commercial retail building.

The Redevelopment Authority of the County of Montgomery

The Redevelopment Authority of the County of Montgomery received a \$467,636 Industrial Sites Reuse Program grant to perform environmental remediation at the former Pottstown Plating Works property located at 125 South Washington Street, Pottstown Borough, Montgomery County. ISR funds will be used for remediation activities, installation of a protective cap, clean fill to fill pits, sumps, and trenches, installation of a vapor barrier system, properly abandon three groundwater supply wells, conduct two indoor air quality sampling, installation of 2 more additional groundwater monitoring wells, collect groundwater samples, remedial oversight, and the final report.

Program at Work:*Schuylkill River Development Corporation*

Schuylkill River Development Corporation received a \$56,250 Industrial Sites Reuse grant for a Phase II assessment of multiple sites along the lower tidal Schuylkill River located in Philadelphia City, Philadelphia County. The properties are located along the Schuylkill riverbank between the vicinity of 61st and Passyunk Avenue. The accumulative size of the properties is approximately six acres running along approximately 3,400 feet of the riverbank. The Phase II Environmental Assessment will include collecting soil samples approximately every 100 feet along the proposed trail alignment. Two samples will be collected at each location; one surface soil sample (zero to two feet below ground surface) and one at-depth sample (approximately two to four feet below ground surface). The samples will be analyzed for the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection Historic Fill Parameter List contained in the Management of Fill Policy. If the analytical results of this sampling indicate exceedances of DEP's residential Statewide health standard medium specific concentrations for any compounds of concern, potential exposure pathways will be assessed, and a combined remedial investigation report and cleanup plan will be submitted to DEP under the Act 2 program.

Greater Wilkes-Barre Industrial Fund

Greater Wilkes-Barre Industrial Fund received a \$198,500 Industrial Sites Reuse grant for the assessment at a former industrial property located 240-242 South Main Street in the City of Wilkes-Barre, Luzerne County. The subject property contains one parcel totaling 0.69 +/- acres. In addition, the subject property includes one improvement. The improvement was constructed between 1910 and 1939. The structure is built of block, steel, and wood and consists of two stories comprised of warehouse space, a storefront, a garage area, and a parking lot. The subject property is accessed from South Main Street and Gildersleeve Street. Based on a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment, the following Areas of Concern were identified. A suspected gasoline underground storage tank (UST) was identified on Sanborn mapping. The site reconnaissance confirmed the presence of the UST. The size and contents of the UST are currently unknown. The subject property contains several shelves and pallets of electrical capacitors and equipment presumed to have Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs). Hydraulic lifts were identified within the structure's floor located on the subject property. Hazardous materials such as Freon gas canisters, fire extinguishers, as well as pallets and shelves of hazardous materials/waste (paints/oils) were identified within the structure located on the subject property. Large amounts of debris throughout the building make further environmental assessment impossible. Removing the debris within the structure will allow for a complete environmental assessment and safe access. The current owner of the site will enter the PADEP Land Recycling Act (Act 2) and obtain an assessment project release. The planned future development will produce approximately 30± new jobs as the property will be used for the commercial space downtown.

PENNSYLVANIA BUSINESS ONE-STOP SHOP (PA BOSS)

1. Legislative Authorization:

House Bill 1284 was signed into statute as Act 107 on October 24, 2018, to establish the Pennsylvania Business One-Stop Shop as a single online access point to aid aspiring entrepreneurs and existing business owners in the identification of appropriate resources to successfully and legally start or grow a business in Pennsylvania.

2. Cost Assumptions:

Funding is made available through DCED's General Government Operations and/or Office of Administration, Office of Information Technology.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Pennsylvania (PA) Business One-Stop Shop makes it simple for businesses to start and expand in Pennsylvania, spurring economic growth and job creation. It serves as the sole source to guide aspiring entrepreneurs and established businesses through all stages of development, including planning, registering, operating, and growing. As part of Phase I, services and resources were made available through the establishment of a website, toll-free number, and dedicated program office housed in the Department of Community & Economic Development (DCED). This program is supported by an interagency, collaborative effort involving the Departments of Labor & Industry (DLI), Revenue (DOR) and State (DOS).

Ad-hoc Collaboration Meetings occur to increase interagency collaboration efforts amongst DCED, DLI, DOR, and DOS and provide information sharing to better serve the business community and our respective agencies; including but not limited to agency updates that impact business entrepreneurs and owners, agency updates that impact content on the Business One-Stop Shop Website and any issues/concerns that may impact call/email volume that the Business One-Stop Shop Office may receive.

The PA Business One-Stop Shop Office regularly participates in outreach events; whether it's informational events about our Office or being asked to speak at various events hosted by State Representatives, Commonwealth Agencies, or External Partners. The Business One-Stop Shop collaborated in the past with the Pennsylvania Commission for Women on three webinars (Resources for Women Owned Businesses in October 2020, Aspiring Entrepreneurs, Challenges Women in Business Face in December 2020, and Women in STEM in June 2021) where there were 450 attendees across the three webinars. The Business One-Stop Shop plans to work with additional groups to provide outreach on Business Education and Resources.

The Office regularly reviews its website content to ensure there are no gaps and to make the necessary updates and improvements. In 2023, the website was enhanced to provide more valuable information to business owners and entrepreneurs. Most notably, the website was further enhanced to include new webpages for Hiring Workers (resources for businesses on hiring and inclusive workforce), Employer Services (employer resources on supporting employees with a disability), and new Small Diverse Business pages for Disability-Owned and LGBT+ - Owned Businesses.

In 2023, The PA Business One-Stop Office produced a video series that includes information on starting a new business in Pennsylvania, steps to hiring employees in Pennsylvania, and how to apply for a PA Business Tax Account. These videos reside on the Business One-Stop Shop website to be accessed by Citizens. As well as establishing a quarterly newsletter that provides the latest business updates, news from State Government, business resources, funding opportunities, and business deadline information to business entrepreneurs and owners that the Office provided service to. The newsletter was issued in January, April, and September 2023.

The PA Business One-Stop Shop continues to assess the services the Office provides by sending its Customer Feedback Survey. Based upon feedback and collected data the PA Business One-Stop Shop will adjust or enhance current services or create new ones to better meet customer needs. During the year 2023, the Business One-Stop Shop Office has sent out 3,364 Customer Surveys with an 11.75% return rate. The overall rating from 1.0 – 5.0 scale is a 4.0 (80% approval rating).

The program office oversees a technical project. Phases and key components of successful implementation included the following:

- Phase II commenced in Spring 2018. As a part of this phase, a Business Registration Checklist (named Business Checklist), incorporation of a single login (i.e., Keystone Login), and an integrated business account profile (named Business Hub) for each user looking to establish or maintain their business account with Pennsylvania.
 - In October 2019, the Business Checklist was implemented. A checklist can be generated for a user who is interested in receiving a personalized step-by-step guide to registering their business in Pennsylvania. This tool can be accessed through the Register section of the website.
 - In August 2020, the website was enhanced to provide a Customer Portal (named Hub Application) with a single sign-on login (Keystone Login) and Business Profile account management. When logged into the Hub, the user can create a checklist of steps necessary to create a new business, make modifications to basic information about their business, and link to other state agencies to work with them on the necessary registrations and payments. The last release of Phase II was deployed in November 2020 and included address verification functionality within the Hub Application, a customer self-service screen for Keystone Login, and remaining technical backlog items.
- Phase III began in January 2021. There were five total releases. These releases included:
 - Enhancements to the Business Checklist to include information about Amending a Business, Closing a Business, and Merging/Acquiring a Business in PA.
 - Collaborated with the Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Plant Industry.
 - Enhanced security for CWOPA users and separated their roles from Business Owners.
 - State Agency Application Customization.
 - information on available grants/funding for businesses.
 - Attachment Upload and Storing functionality for Business Hub users.
- Phase IV began in July 2022. There were five total releases. These releases included the addition of Help Guides to assist Users with navigating through the Business Hub Application, Department of State Business Filing Services System and Department of Revenue's myPATH system, and enhancements to the Business Checklist and the Business Hub. These enhancements included:
 - The Business Hub Dashboard was updated with the addition of Quick Action Buttons. The Quick Action buttons are intended to assist the user in quickly identifying the next steps necessary to facilitate the management of their business. Each button will provide a landing page with detailed information and links to support that business process.
 - The Business Hub was refreshed with an updated user interface and the inclusion of a Checklist Progress Widget. The Checklist Progress Widget provides direct access to the most current checklists a user has been working on. The details of completed steps in the most recently updated checklists will be available directly on the Dashboard after login.
 - The Help Guide capability was expanded to a Help Center. The Help Center is a collection of help guides, videos, and business licensing reference guides that can be utilized to assist businesses and entrepreneurs with starting, growing, and/or operating a business in Pennsylvania.
 - The Help section of the Business Checklist has been updated to include additional information. Depending on the question asked, the provided information may now contain links to help guides and/or video tutorials.
- Phase V began in July 2023. There have been two releases thus far in this phase. The release functionality included:
 - Updates to the Business Checklist for Starting a New Business:
 - Additional tax types, along with their associated information.
 - The ability to quickly edit previously answered questions has been added, as opposed to starting from the beginning.
 - New Action Buttons were added to the Quick Actions.
 - Annual Report/Certificate of Registration. Restricted professional LLCs, limited liability partnerships, and limited liability limited partnerships that are active within the Department of State's records on December 31st of any given year must file a Certificate of Annual Registration.

- Register a Business. This action button was enhanced to provide direct access to specific forms within the Pennsylvania Department of State’s Business Filing Services.
- Twelve new Help Guides were made available in the Help Center. Some of the Help Guides included information regarding Finding Small Business Funding in PA, Hiring Remote Employees in PA, Employer Withholding Information Guide, Retailer’s Information Guide, and more.
- Planning work is currently underway for future releases. This work will include additional enhancements to the Business Checklist and Business Hub to improve the user experience, collaborating with other agencies, and system notifications.

The Pennsylvania First Program (PA First) was established as a comprehensive funding tool to facilitate increased investment and job creation in the commonwealth, and to enable the commonwealth to compete more effectively in the global economy. The PA First Program may provide grants, loans, or loan guarantees that can assist job creators, support workforce development, and invest in growth infrastructure.

Eligible uses for PA First funding include job training, land and building acquisition and construction, purchase and upgrade of machinery and equipment, construction, and rehabilitation of infrastructure, working capital, environmental assessment, and remediation. Program requirements include competitive private investment, eight-year commitment to operate the business at the approved project site, and demonstration of significant job creation and/or retention. DCED monitors projects for commitments to investment, job creation/retention, and site requirements. Imposed penalties shall continue to be in the form of partial to complete grant pay-back.

Program at Work:

Truck-Lite Co., LLC manufactures lights and lighting systems used in heavy-duty trucks, trailers, and body commercial vehicles. The \$270,000 PA First grant was awarded to assist the company with the relocation of its existing corporate hub and R&D operations from Falconer, NY to a site at Knowledge Park, in Harborcreek Township, Erie County. The company will invest \$1.0 million in this project, will retain 582 employees, and create 90 new jobs.

GB Midvale Road LLC manufactures prefabricated structures (booths) like guard shacks, security booths, ticket booths, valet parking booths, toll booths, cashier booths, gas station attendant booths, trailer booths, modular factory offices, and bus shelters. The \$165,000 PA First grant was awarded to assist the company with the expansion of their headquarters and light industrial booth manufacturing operation in Washington Township, Franklin County. The company will invest \$4.3 million in this project, will retain 20 employees, and create 33 new, full-time jobs.

PA First is the source of funding for the (WEDnetPA) which provides the delivery system for Pennsylvania’s incumbent workforce training program known as WEDnet. WEDnetPA provides funding to Pennsylvania companies for job skills training. WEDnetPA is an alliance of 22 partners, which includes 6 universities in the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education, Pennsylvania’s 14 community colleges, Pennsylvania College of Technology, and the North Central PA Regional Planning & Development Commission. The WEDnetPA partners are required to seek the input of local Workforce Development Boards and key economic development organizations to determine the target industries and training priorities in their regions. Since its inception, this program has helped 23,482 companies train more than 1.3 million Pennsylvania workers. Companies of all sizes benefit from the WEDnetPA funding, with small companies (with less than 100 employees) representing 57% of grantees in FY2022-23.

Program at Work:

Innovative Sintered Metals, Inc. received a PIDA-MELF account loan in the amount of \$1,275,000 to assist in the purchase of manufacturing equipment from Vision Quality Components, Inc. The equipment being purchased is part of the larger \$7.1 million acquisition of Vision Quality Components, Inc.'s assets, which include land and building, equipment, inventory, and goodwill. Innovative Sintered Metals, Inc. is a manufacturer of powdered metal parts located in St. Marys, Elk County. The business produces soft magnetic and structural components from stainless steel and iron-base materials for the automotive, medical, electrical, pump, appliance, and lock industries. The project equipment will allow Innovative Sintered Metals to increase its production capacity of products for the security lock, hydraulic pump, electrical, medical, home appliance, and automotive industries. The total project cost for the manufacturing equipment is \$2.3 million. Matching funds include a \$475,000 Farmers National Bank Loan, a \$400,000 North Central PA Regional Planning & Development Commission loan, a \$200,000 Clearly Ahead Development loan, and a \$200,000 Clearfield County IDA loan. As a result of this project, the Company has committed to retain its current 32 employees and create three full-time jobs within three years.

Deer Park Lumber, Inc. received a PIDA-MELF account loan in the amount of \$3.0 million to assist in the purchase of machinery and equipment to be located at their facility in Wyoming County. Deer Park Lumber, Inc. was founded in 1982 and is a second-generation, family-owned lumber manufacturing and forestry services company. They focus primarily on harvesting and sawing logs and producing lumber. The company will undergo a major expansion and modernization of its manufacturing facility. The equipment that will be purchased includes a state-of-the-art bin sorter and an optimizing grading system. This project will assist in streamlining their materials handling and operations and is expected to increase productivity by a conservative 10% to 15%. Additionally, the addition of the bin sorter will immediately provide a more efficient production flow to the mill operations. The investment in automation technology will help position Deer Park Lumber, Inc. for long-term competitiveness in the global hardwood market. Additional project financing includes a \$4.9 million People's Security Bank loan for a total project cost of \$7.9 million. As a result of this GAT project, the Company has committed to create eight and retain 74 full-time jobs statewide within three years.

Program at Work:

Mulherins EM, LLC received a PIDA-CED account loan in the amount of \$200,000 to assist in the purchase of machinery and equipment to be used in their new restaurant space in Philadelphia. *Mulherins EM, LLC* is a start-up created for the purpose of operating a full-service Italian restaurant in the newly revitalized neighborhood of East Market in Philadelphia. The equipment the company is looking to purchase includes coolers, freezers, mixers, wire shelving, worktables, cooking equipment, and filtration systems. Outside of the PIDA project scope, the total project budget is \$3.4 million. These additional funds will be used to complete the construction fit-out of *Mulherin's East Market*, a 120 seat, 2,125 sq. ft. Italian restaurant located at 1100 Market Street, Philadelphia. The total project cost is \$400,000. Matching funds include a \$200,000 equity contribution from the borrower. While there are no job creation requirements for this PIDA-CED project, the company has committed to create 50 full-time jobs within three years as a result of this project.

Equipment Reuse International, LLC received a PIDA-SBF account loan in the amount of \$199,999 to assist with the improvements and renovations to their manufacturing facility located in Erie County. *Equipment Reuse International, LLC* was established in 2014 by Scott Gezymalla. The company's primary line of business is remanufacturing parts and components for Liebherr brand construction equipment. The business provides a dealer alternative for Liebherr parts procurement. The company offers a large selection of parts for several types of machinery, including excavators, bulldozers, material handlers, wheel loaders, and track loaders. Project improvements include residing the face of the building with steel, new roller doors and concrete, plumbing, welding, and electrical work. The company will also be

expanding its parking lot and surrounding area to allow for more work in progress and finished products to be stored outside. Additionally, an overhead crane, clean burn furnace, and forklift are to be purchased. The crane and forklift will increase manufacturing productivity as the company continues to grow, while the furnace will allow the company to recycle oil removed from old machines they refurbish. The total project cost is \$400,000, with financing consisting of the \$199,999 PIDA loan and an equal equity contribution from the borrower. As a result of this project, the Company has committed to retain their current nine and create three full-time jobs within three years.

5. Legislative Authorization:

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) reauthorized and amended the Small Business Jobs Act of 2010 (SBJA) to fund the State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) as a response to the economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

6. Cost Assumptions:

A portion of the administrative funding is being rolled forward to the new fiscal year.

7. Overview of the Program:

The Pennsylvania State Small Business Credit Initiative Program (PA-SSBCI) was established to provide funding to economic development organizations in the Commonwealth for the implementation and administration of capital programs to support small businesses through loans and equity investments through three components. The first component provides funding to economic development partners in the Commonwealth to create revolving loan programs that in conjunction with new small business financing, create lending to small businesses that are not getting the support they need to expand and create jobs. The second component provides funding to economic development organizations in the Commonwealth to provide seed and later-stage capital for existing and emerging companies involved in the development and commercialization of technology advanced products and processes. The third component provides loans to venture general partners of diverse status having the wherewithal to invest in Pennsylvania small businesses led by individuals of diverse status who need support and resources to expand and create jobs.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

During FY2022-23 awards were made to 28 economic development organizations totaling \$73.9 million to operate revolving loan funds and make equity investments in small businesses in the Commonwealth. The partners include the four Ben Franklin Technology Partners and the three Life Science Greenhouses for equity investments, 16 Certified Economic Development Organizations, four Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs), and the Pennsylvania

CDFI Network on behalf of 11 CDFIs. In addition, during FY2022-23, a \$2.3 million loan was made through the Diverse Leaders Venture loan component.

Program at Work:

Altoona-Blair County Development Corporation received \$1.2 million of SSBCI funds to provide lending assistance to small businesses throughout the Commonwealth with an emphasis on the Southern Alleghenies region. The organization will aim for a 10:1 private match on the overall portfolio and will strive for at least 33% of loans to be made towards SEDI-controlled businesses and/or within CDFI Investment Areas.

Ben Franklin Technology Partners of Southeastern Pennsylvania received \$5.9 million of SSBCI funds to make direct venture investments. The investments will average \$500,000 per investment. The SSBCI funds will help reach earlier or less sophisticated companies in search of capital.

ALTERNATIVE AND CLEAN ENERGY PROGRAM (ACE)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The program was established by Act 1 of July 9, 2008, Special Session 1, P.L. 1873, No. 1Cl. 64. The Act is comprised of several components to be administered in the Departments of Environmental Protection, Public Welfare and Community and Economic Development.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) manages these programs and funds to be administered within the DCED Center for Business Financing:

- \$165.0 million for loans and grants to businesses, non-profit economic development organizations and political subdivisions for clean and alternative energy projects. Projects include buildings, equipment, and land development activities.
- \$25.0 million for loans and grants to individuals and small businesses for high-performance, energy-efficient building projects.
- \$25.0 million for loans and grants for geothermal and wind energy projects.
- \$80.0 million for grants and loans for alternative energy production projects involving solar technologies.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, 177 Alternative and Clean Energy projects were approved totaling \$168.8 million; 32 Renewable Energy projects were approved totaling \$25.8 million; 123 Solar Energy projects were approved totaling \$67.26 million; 5 High Performance Building projects were approved totaling \$750,000.

The program supports eligible planning and remediation projects. Planning projects may involve the development of a comprehensive blight plan, code enforcement technical assistance, and the completion of reuse feasibility studies on blighted properties. Remediation projects may involve the acquisition, demolition, and/or rehabilitation of blighted properties or properties affected by natural disasters to include the clearing and preparing of land for future use and projects resulting in visible improvements.

BUILDING PA PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Building PA Program was established under the Act of April 1, 2004 (P.L.163, No. 22) (64 Pa.C.S §1555).

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Building PA program is a \$150.0 million real estate development program managed by the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA). Building PA places investments with real estate fund managers who match the CFA investment dollar-for-dollar with privately raised capital. This combined \$300.0 million is used to provide crucial “gap financing” to viable commercial, industrial and multi-use real estate development projects throughout the Commonwealth.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception to June 30, 2023, \$87.5 million had been awarded to 15 fund managers. Of that total, all \$87.5 million has been committed to 42 projects.

BUSINESS IN OUR SITES (BOS)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Business in Our Sites Program was established under the Act of April 1, 2004 (P.L.163, No. 22) (64 Pa.C.S §1551), as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Business in Our Sites Program (BOS) provides loans for the acquisition and development of key sites for future use by businesses, private developers, and others. The program provides for low-interest-rate loans that have very flexible repayment terms. In most cases, interest does not begin to accrue nor are repayments due until after the first land sale is made or the first lease is executed.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, 68 planning grant projects that totaled \$9.7 million and 121 construction projects that totaled \$613.4 million were approved under BOS. The program has leveraged \$1.5 billion in matched investments. Projects in 55 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties have received BOS funds. In FY2022-23, there were 9 projects approved totaling \$48,710,441.

Program at Work:

RIDC Southwestern Pennsylvania Growth Fund

RIDC Southwestern Pennsylvania Growth Fund received a \$4,568,845 Business in Our Sites loan and a \$3,045,896 Business in Our Sites grant for the redevelopment of the Carrie Furnace located in the Rankin Borough, Allegheny County. The Carrie Furnace site is a historic landmark for the Monongahela River Valley. The former iron-making facility consists of 168 acres of underutilized land, including a vast amount of riverfront property and is only 9 miles from Downtown Pittsburgh. The site is currently owned by the Redevelopment Authority of Allegheny County (RAAC). RIDC is proposing to redevelop 65 acres of the Carrie Furnace site in a three-phase approach. Phase One is redevelopment of 13 acres which includes two 60,000 square foot tech/flex buildings, construction of the main access road, utilities, and landscaping. Phase II is the acquisition of 4 acres and development of a 52,000 square foot Film Ready Tech Flex Spec building. Phase III consists of the construction of a combination of tech/flex building totaling 150,000 square feet. It is anticipated that 50 jobs will be created.

Berks County Industrial Development Authority

Berks County Industrial Development Authority (BCIDA) received a \$4,203,617 Business in Our Sites loan and a \$2,802,411 Business in Our Sites grant to redevelop the former World War II Base that sits adjacent to the Reading Airport on 155 acres. The site has been vacant for the past 80 years and includes 3 parcels (lots A, F, & G) totaling 11.04 acres. BCIDA plans to redevelop these sites and construct three industrial spec buildings ranging in size from 20,000 sq. ft. to 100,000 sq. ft. to address the shortage of occupiable industrial sites in Berks County. It is anticipated that the project will result in the creation of 200 jobs at the site.

FIRST INDUSTRIES FUND (SBF and MELF)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Act of April 1, 2004, No. 22, (P.L. "Act"). The fund is governed by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The First Industries Program provides planning grants, loans, and loan guarantees for projects that relate to the development and enhancement of tourism and agricultural activities within Pennsylvania. First Industries Program loans are available through the Small Business First (SBF) account for land and building, machinery and equipment, and working capital costs and through the Machinery and Equipment Loan Fund (MELF) account for machinery and equipment costs.

Since the program's inception in 2004, over 800 First Industries Fund (FIF) loans have been approved to businesses located throughout the Commonwealth. Many of these loans are for production agriculture enterprises.

Program at Work:

Randy, Traci and Mark Balthaser received a FIF SBF Ag account loan in the amount of \$400,000 to assist in the construction of two 31,500 sq. ft. broiler houses on their farm property located in Berks County. Randy and Traci Balthaser are life-long dairy farmers in Berks County. Their dairy milks approximately 120 cows daily, and they farm approximately 400 acres of crops consisting primarily of beans and corn. Mark Balthaser, the son of Randy and Traci, is a young farmer who has worked on his family's farm his entire life. To provide farming income for Mark personally, he will construct two broiler houses on his parents' property. This new venture will set up a succession plan for Mark to continue the farming operation without drawing another income from the dairy operation. Mark will oversee the poultry operation which will be raising AFB Birds for Bell and Evans. The family intends to switch to organic birds in the near future as they're able to learn more about the industry. The borrower has a 7-year contract with Bell & Evans and the two new broiler houses are expected to hold 34,800 birds per house. Additional project financing includes a \$900,000 Mid-Atlantic Farm Credit loan, providing for a total project cost of \$1,300,000.

Penn Dairy LLC received a FIF SBF Ag account loan in the amount of \$400,000 to assist in the construction of a 9,260 sq. ft. addition to their facility located in Snyder County. Penn Dairy is a highly specialized manufacturer of dairy products. The company uses the best combination of traditional and innovative methods to produce high quality yogurts and cheeses. The Company operates out of a SQF Certified manufacturing facility located in Winfield, Snyder County. Penn Dairy LLC is especially known for its Baby Swiss produced under the Winfield Valley brands and increasingly for yogurts. Penn Dairy LLC recently experienced rapid growth and the construction of the 9,260 sq. ft. addition to their facility will allow them to increase their warehouse and production capacity to meet the increased demand. The total project cost is \$880,000. Matching funds include a \$480,000 equity injection from the borrower/ personal guarantor. As a result of this project, the Company has committed to retain their current twenty-eight and create six full-time jobs within three years.

FIRST INDUSTRIES LOAN GUARANTEE PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Act of April 1, 2004, No.22 (P.L. " Act")

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The First Industries Tourism and Agriculture Loan Guarantee Program provide loan guarantees for projects related to agriculture and tourism within Pennsylvania. Eligible applicants for a loan guarantee are for-profit business enterprises (such as a corporation, limited liability company, sole proprietor, cooperative or partnership), or non-profit organizations engaged in either agriculture-related or tourism-related activities as defined in the program guidelines.

No loan guarantees were approved in FY2022-23. Since the inception of the program, 56 guarantees have been approved totaling more than \$66.0 million. These guarantees have helped to create or retain more than 3,800 jobs.

Program at Work:

KBLJ, LLC

A syndicate of CDFI (Community Development Financial Institution) lenders consisting of Community First Fund, Greater Berks Development Fund, and the Low-Income Investment Fund received a \$2,500,000 guaranty of their \$7,300,000 loan to KBLJ, LLC to fund the construction and equipping of a fresh produce grocery store located in the City of Reading. The store will contain a cafeteria-style cafe offering local ethnic food plates. The 2nd floor of the facility will be used to operate a fresh food distribution warehouse supplying bodegas throughout the region with fresh produce as well as a manufacturing plant producing corn tortilla discs that will be sold to local bodegas and restaurants. The project is expected to help retain 42 jobs. Although this guarantee was initially approved in 2020, the project faced significant challenges during the COVID-19 economic downturn and needed to be substantially reworked within a complex financing structure in order for the project to be completed and be successful. CPF staff worked over the course of many months to see the project to closing, which finally occurred in 2023.

GAMING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & TOURISM FUND-ALLEGHENY COUNTY (GEDTF)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Section 1407 (d.1) of the Act of July 5, 2004 (P.L. 572, No. 71), known as the PA Race Horse Development and Gaming Act (the "Act"), as amended, authorizes the Commonwealth Financing Authority to make direct grants to the redevelopment authority of a county of the second class created pursuant to the act of May 24, 1945 (P.L. 991, No.3 85), known as the Urban Redevelopment Law, on its own behalf or on behalf of community development corporations, political subdivisions, urban redevelopment authorities, municipal authorities, for-profit entities and nonprofit entities located in a county of the second class for economic development, infrastructure development, job training, community improvement, public safety or other projects in the public interest located in a county of the second class.

2. Cost Assumptions:

Funding is provided by specific gaming revenues. The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The program supports projects for economic development, infrastructure development, job training, community improvement, public safety, and other projects in the public interest within Allegheny County. The Redevelopment Authority of the County of Allegheny (RAAC) is the only eligible applicant for funding as identified by law. RAAC accepts, reviews, and evaluates projects on an annual basis. Funding recommendations are submitted by RAAC to DCED for final review and presentation to the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) for approval.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

In FY2022-23, an application for \$10.2 million including 67 projects was approved by the CFA.

Program at Work:

Ross Township – Nelson Run Road Bridge Replacement

RAAC requested \$200,000 in funding for Ross Township to replace a structurally deficient concrete box culvert and bridge. This project will replace the existing culvert with an elliptical culvert along with erosion and sedimentation controls, stormwater improvements, relocation of utilities and paving. The total project cost is \$867,072 with matching funds from local sources.

Municipal Authority of the Township of Robinson – Raw Water Intake Rehabilitation

RAAC requested \$500,000 in funding for the rehabilitation of a raw water intake station located in Robinson Township. Funds will be used to replace pumps, valves, piping, chemical feed lines, and include the installation of a new backup generator. Additional improvements will include redundant and upgraded electrical components and a physical cleaning and painting of the building. The total project cost is \$1.8 million with matching funds coming from a municipal bond issuance.

H2O PA

1. Legislative Authorization:

The H2O PA Water Supply, Sanitary Sewer and Storm Water Projects Program was established under the Act of July 9, 2008 (P.L.908, No. 63) (32 P.S. §694.101), known as the H2O PA Act.

The H2O PA Flood Control Program was established under the Act of July 9, 2008 (P.L.908, No. 63) (32 P.S. §694.101, et. seq.), known as the H2O PA Act, and authorizes the Commonwealth Financing Authority to provide single-year or multi-year grants to the Commonwealth, independent agencies, municipalities, or municipal authorities for flood control projects.

The H2O PA Dam Program was established under the Act of July 9, 2008 (P.L. 908, No. 63) (32 P.S. §694.101 et. seq.), known as the H2O Pa Act, and authorizes the Commonwealth Financing Authority to provide single-year or multi-year grants to the commonwealth, independent agencies, municipalities, or municipal authorities for High Hazard Unsafe Dams.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Act authorizes the Commonwealth Financing Authority to provide single-year or multi-year grants for three infrastructure development components:

- To municipalities and municipal authorities, to assist with the construction of drinking water, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer projects.
- To the Commonwealth, independent agencies, municipalities, or municipal authorities for flood control projects.
- To the Commonwealth, independent agencies, municipalities, or municipal authorities for high-hazard unsafe dams.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, funds for 20 dam projects with a total of \$50.4 million, 24 flood-control projects with a total of \$80.9 million and 485 water/sewer projects with a total of \$679.1 million awarded.

MARCELLUS LEGACY FUND ACT 13 PROGRAMS

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Marcellus Legacy Fund was created by Act 13 of 2012 to provide for the distribution of unconventional gas well impact fees to counties, municipalities, and Commonwealth agencies.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

Pursuant to Section 2315 (a) (6) (i) of the Act, a portion of the fee revenue will be transferred to the Commonwealth Financing Authority for statewide initiatives that will include abandoned mine drainage abatement; abandoned well plugging; sewage treatment; greenways, trails, and recreation; baseline water quality data; watershed restoration; and flood control. On January 29, 2013, the Commonwealth Financing Authority approved the opening of the following programs:

Abandoned Mine Drainage Abatement and Treatment Program

This program provides grants to restore and maintain stream reaches impaired by abandoned mine drainage and ultimately, to remove these streams from the Department of Environmental Resources Impaired Waters list.

Watershed Restoration Protection Program

This program provides grants to restore and maintain stream reaches impaired by the uncontrolled discharge of nonpoint source polluted runoff and ultimately to remove these streams from the Department of Environmental Protection's Impaired Waters list.

Baseline Water Quality Data Program

This program provides grants to use the scientific principles and practices for water sample collection and analysis to document existing groundwater quality conditions on private water supplies.

Flood Mitigation Program

This program provides grants for the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, and repair of flood control projects.

Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program

This program provides grants for the planning, acquisition, development, rehabilitation, and repair of greenways, recreational trails, open space, parks, and beautification projects.

Orphan or Abandoned Well Plugging Program

This program provides grants to provide mechanisms to plug abandoned and orphaned wells that have the potential to cause health, safety, or environmental concerns.

Sewage Facilities Program

This program provides grants for the planning work required under the Pennsylvania Sewage Facilities Act.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, 20 Abandoned Mine Drainage Abatement and Treatment projects were approved totaling \$7.1 million; 5 Baseline Water Quality Data projects were approved totaling \$1.1 million; 109 Flood Mitigation Program projects were approved totaling \$22.3 million; 867 Greenways, Trails and Recreation projects were approved totaling \$104.7 million; 10 Orphan or Abandoned Well Plugging projects were approved totaling \$1.8 million; 32 Sewage Facilities projects were approved totaling \$980,975; 156 Watershed Restoration Protection projects were approved totaling \$21.3 million.

Program at Work:

Flood Mitigation Program

The City of Sunbury received a \$414,671 Flood Mitigation Program grant to repair and replace the flood wall along Sunbury's waterfront in the City of Sunbury, Northumberland County. The WPA wall is found on the river side of the Army Corp of Engineers flood wall which was constructed in 1951. The river side of the WPA flood wall was constructed with a series of hand laid stone walls that protect the subsoils from eroding. Many portions of the wall are beginning to be undermined by the erosive impact of Lake Augusta. These stone walls have been repaired numerous times over the years and need replaced. The city plans to replace the current stone with Redi Rock to stabilize the wall and prevent any additional erosion and wall failure.

Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program

The City of Hermitage received a \$230,904 Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program grant for the Hermitage Dek Hockey Facility project located in Hermitage City, Mercer County. There has been extensive interest and demand from local residents for enhanced recreational opportunities for youth and adults. The proposed project will construct a Dek Hockey Facility at the Hermitage Athletic Complex. The project includes clearing, excavation, concrete pad, decking, rink, boards, lighting, fencing, and related amenities.

Orphan or Abandoned Well Plugging Program

Clairton Industrial Center, LLC received a \$150,000 Orphan or Abandoned Well Plugging grant to plug two natural gas wells located in Clairton City, Allegheny County. The project is located on a single 7.6-acre vacant brownfield site along State Street (PA Route 837) in Clairton City. The site is bordered on the north and east by railroads owned by Union Railroad Company and Pittsburgh & West Virginia Railroad Company, respectively. Two orphaned natural gas wells must be capped prior to commencement of site preparation activities. These wells date to the past industrial use of the property and now only serve to further discourage investment in an economically distressed community. The added cost of capping the wells threatens the economic viability of DiMarco's proposed brownfield redevelopment.

Sewage Facilities Program

Westmont Borough received a \$30,000 Sewage Facilities Program grant to conduct an Act 537 Special Study Report in Westmont Borough, Cambria County. Westmont Borough used the funds to conduct a system inventory of their entire sanitary sewer system as well as prepare an Act 537 Special study. This special study will be used to analyze Westmont Borough's existing sanitary sewer and determine if consolidation or sale of the system will be a mutually beneficial approach to providing sewer service to the residents of Westmont Borough.

Watershed Restoration Protection Program

Palmyra Borough received a \$150,000 Watershed Restoration and Protection grant to construct a bioswale and a vegetated swale as part of a Pollutant Reduction Plan for Palmyra Borough, Lebanon County. The project will construct a bioswale and a vegetated swale to filter polluted stormwater runoff from a development along South Lingle Avenue. The current drainage crosses private property before discharging into the Spring Creek Watershed area, identified as an impaired stream by Pennsylvania DEP. The stormwater currently flows to agricultural land owned by the Milton Hershey

School. Construction of the swales will achieve local water quality goals to improve the quality of life in the community and support county and statewide initiatives to reduce nutrient and sediment pollution into local waters and into the Chesapeake Bay.

MULTIMODAL TRANSPORTATION FUND (MTF)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF) was established under Act 89 of 2013 to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of the commonwealth.

2. Cost Assumptions:

MTF is funded from transportation-related user fees that are deposited into the Multimodal Transportation Fund. The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Multimodal Transportation Fund was created by Act 89 of 2013 to provide grants to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of this Commonwealth. The program is intended to provide financial assistance to municipalities, councils of governments, businesses, economic development organizations, public transportation agencies and rail and freight ports to improve transportation assets that enhance communities, pedestrian safety, and transit revitalization. The program is administered by the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) under the direction of the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA).

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, 999 projects were funded totaling \$495.0 million under the Multimodal Transportation Fund. In FY2022-23, 154 projects were funded totaling \$55.6 million under the Multimodal Transportation Fund.

Program at Work:

Barnett Township received a \$247,837 Multimodal Transportation Fund grant to replace the Maple Street culvert located in Barnett Township, Forest County. The Maple Street culvert over Cherry Run is in poor condition and undersized, causing heavy downstream scouring in the stream bed. This project will replace the existing corrugated metal culvert with a new 103" x 71" 40-foot-long culvert. Project work will also include mobilization, traffic control, erosion and sedimentation controls, bypass pumping, demolition, excavation, select backfill, pavement, and restoration.

Beaver Falls City received a \$750,000 Multimodal Transportation Fund grant for streetscape improvements along 7th Avenue located in Beaver Falls City, Beaver County. This project involves the demolition and removal of existing site furniture, concrete, landscaping, and overhead utilities along 7th Avenue from 11th Street to 17th Street. 2,400 SY of stamped concrete, landscaping including 24 street trees, green infrastructure, 30 decorative light posts, and 36 benches will be installed. Overhead utilities will be relocated and buried to remove them from the streetscape corridor.

PENNSYLVANIA DAIRY INVESTMENT PROGRAM (PDIP)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Pennsylvania Dairy Investment Program (PDIP) was established under Act 38 of 2019 to support Pennsylvania's Dairy Industry.

2. Cost Assumptions:

PDIP was funded during FY2018-19 by a transfer of funds from the First Industries Revolving Loan Fund as authorized by the 2018 Fiscal Code. The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Pennsylvania Dairy Investment Program was established under Act 38 of 2019 for research and development, organic transition, value-added processing, and marketing grants in support of Pennsylvania's Dairy Industry. The program is administered jointly by the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and the PA Department of Agriculture (PDA), under the direction of the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA).

4. Program Performance and Impact:

No awards were made during FY2022-23.

Program at Work:

PA SMALL WATER & SEWER (SWS)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Grants for small water and sewer infrastructure projects. Pursuant to Article XVII-A, § 1774.1-A, of the Act of April 9, 1929, P.L. 343, as amended (The Fiscal Code) the sum of \$25.0 million was made available to the Commonwealth Financing Authority (the "Authority") for water and sewer and projects. Funding is used for activities that involve the construction, improvement, expansion, repair, or rehabilitation of a water supply or sanitary sewer system.

Eligible projects are those which have a total project cost of not less than \$30,000 and not more than \$500,000.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

Grants are made for small water and sewer infrastructure projects with activities that involve the construction, improvement, expansion, repair, or rehabilitation of a water supply or sanitary sewer system. Eligible projects are those which have a total project cost of not less than \$30,000 and not more than \$500,000.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, 657 projects were funded totaling \$142.8 million under the Pennsylvania Small Water & Sewer program. Projects in 62 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties have received funding.

Program at Work:

During FY2022-23, no PA Small Water and Sewer projects were approved for funding.

PIPELINE INVESTMENT PROGRAM (PIPE)

1. Legislative Authorization:

2016 (P.L., No. 25) (72 P.S. §1741-A.1 et. seq.), as amended by the Act of June 28, 2019 (P.L., No. 20), authorizes the Commonwealth Financing Authority to award grants to hospitals, businesses, economic development organization, municipalities, and school districts for costs associated with extending natural gas pipelines to these entities.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Pipeline Investment Program (PIPE) provides grants to construct the last few miles of natural gas distribution lines to business parks, existing manufacturing, and industrial enterprises, which will result in the creation of new economic base jobs in the Commonwealth while providing access to natural gas for residents.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

As of June 30, 2023, \$26.8 million had been awarded to 40 projects in 27 counties since inception. In FY2022-23 there was 1 project approved for \$338,174.

Program at Work:

Pocono Mountains Industries, Inc.

Pocono Mountains Industries, Inc. received a \$338,174 Pipeline Investment Program grant to construct a gas regulation station at the Smithfield Gateway Center located in Smithfield Township, Monroe County. Pocono Mountains Industries, Inc., in cooperation with DEPG Mosier Associates LP, plan to increase the natural gas capacity to the Smithfield Gateway Center. The proposed project will support the development of the gas expansion by constructing a new gas regulation station at the northern point of the gateway center. The developer has completed Phase 1A of the center and requires increased gas capacity to serve the additional phases of development. Phase 1A supports a medical office and retail space, future phases will include residential and commercial uses.

SECOND STAGE LOAN GUARANTEE PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Act April 1, 2004, No.22, P.L.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Second Stage Loan Guaranty Program is a loan guarantee program that offers guarantees for bank loans to second stage manufacturers, advanced technology, and life sciences businesses to support growth in these vital sectors. The loan guarantees are primarily for working capital but are also available to finance the asset needs of life sciences, advanced technology, or manufacturing businesses that have been in existence for at least two, but no more than seven, years at the time of application.

The program began with \$50.0 million in reserve. There were no guarantees approved in FY2022-23. From inception through FY2022-23, eight projects have been approved for guarantees totaling \$3.4 million. These projects helped to preserve 240 jobs and create 85 new jobs.

TAX INCREMENT FINANCING GUARANTEE PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

Tax Increment Financing ACT (TIF) of July 11, 1990 (the "TIF Act").

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Tax Increment Financing Guarantee Program is a loan guarantee program that promotes and stimulates the general economic welfare of various regions and communities in the Commonwealth, and assists in the development, redevelopment, and revitalization of brownfield and greenfield sites in accordance with the TIF Act. The program provides credit enhancement for TIF projects to improve market access and lower capital costs using guarantees to issuers of bonds or other indebtedness.

The guarantee can help fund infrastructure and environmental projects for industrial enterprises and retail establishments, or infrastructure, environmental and building projects for manufacturers, hospitals, convention centers, and associated hotels. TIF projects can include the utilization of abandoned or underutilized industrial, commercial, military, previously mined institutional sites or buildings, or undeveloped sites planned and zoned for development in accordance with any existing comprehensive municipal plan.

The program began with \$100.0 million in reserve. There were no TIF Guarantees approved in FY2022-23. From its inception through FY2022-23, 11 TIF guarantees have been approved and committed, totaling \$51.1 million. These guarantees have helped to create or retain more than 2,800 jobs.

Program at Work:

The Smithfield Gateway TIF District was created to assist in the public infrastructure improvements needed to complete the Smithfield Gateway development. It consists of 91 acres of property located at the intersection of SR 447 and US 209, just north of Route I-80 in East Stroudsburg, Monroe County. For development to occur, a significant amount of transportation improvements was necessary. It had been a major obstacle preventing development in this corridor of Route 209 for the past 25 years.

With the assistance of a TIF Guarantee in the amount of \$3,882,563, the development of the Smithfield Gateway TIF District was able to move forward. The Smithfield project consists of the construction of certain public infrastructure improvements in connection with the construction of mixed-use development. The public Infrastructure includes the construction of a bypass road that will connect US 209 and SR 447; the expansion of US 209 from two lanes to five lanes; the construction of several new interior roads; the installation of new traffic signals at the intersection of US 209 and SR 447; and infrastructure improvements to the TIF property, including installation of a major storm drainage system, right of way improvements, and the upgrade of utility services such as water, sanitary sewer, and gas lines.

All of these public infrastructure improvements are necessary to complete the Smithfield Gateway mixed-use development which includes, a 40,000 sq. ft. office building for St. Luke's Health Network, Inc.; a 9,000 sq. ft. retail space; a restaurant pad; a fast-food pad; a gas/convenience pad; a mixed-use development with 236 luxury apartments and 65,000 sq. ft. of retail space, including a 28,000 sq. ft. supermarket and three retail pads; 185 age-restricted housing units, including 85 townhomes and 100 senior apartments. The development is expected to create 954 jobs at full build-out.

UNSERVED HIGH-SPEED BROADBAND

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Unserved High-Speed Broadband Funding Program was established pursuant to the Act of November 25, 2020, known as the Unserved High-Speed Broadband Funding Program Act, and authorizes the Commonwealth Financing Authority to award grants to nongovernmental entities, which have the technical, managerial and financial expertise to design, build and operate a high-speed broadband service infrastructure within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, for the purpose of deploying high-speed broadband services infrastructure in unserved areas of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The program will provide grants to be used for the deployment of high-speed broadband service infrastructure in areas of the Commonwealth that are currently unserved, with speeds below 25 megabits per second downstream and 3 megabits per second upstream.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

During FY2021-22 18 projects were approved, totaling \$9.97 million under the Unserved High-Speed Broadband Funding Program.

Program at Work:

During FY2022-23, no Unserved High-Speed Broadband projects were approved.

WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM (PENNWORKS)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Water Supply and Wastewater Infrastructure Program (PennWorks) was established by the General Assembly after overwhelming electorate approval of a referendum in May 2004.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program

The program is administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority. PennWorks, which formally opened for business in January 2005, provides grants and loans to eligible applicants for projects that construct, expand, or improve water and wastewater infrastructure related to economic development. The maximum grant amount for a single project is the lesser of \$5.0 million or 75% of the total project cost. The maximum loan amount for any single project is \$5.0 million.

Applicants may receive no more than \$10.0 million in program grant funds and are limited to \$25.0 million in total funds under the program. Total funding available under PennWorks is \$200.0 million. The program is capitalized by Commonwealth general obligation bonds and loan repayments are deposited into the General Fund.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, funds for 75 projects totaling \$196.5 million have been awarded. These projects will leverage \$289.5 million in matching investments and create 96,599 jobs.

There were no new PennWorks projects approved in FY2022-23.

Program at Work:

COVID-STATE FISCAL RECOVERY WATER AND SEWER PROJECT

1. Legislative Authorization:

Act 54 of 2022 appropriated a total of \$320 million of COVID Relief ARPA funds to the Commonwealth Financing Authority for the administration of funding for water and sewer infrastructure projects.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program

COVID-19 ARPA H2O PA – Water Supply, Sanitary Sewer and Storm Water Projects

The H2O PA Water Supply, Sanitary Sewer and Storm Water Projects Program was established under the Act of July 9, 2008 (P.L.908, No. 63) (32 P.S. §694.101), known as the H2O PA Act. The Act authorizes the Commonwealth Financial Authority to provide single-year or multi-year grants for three infrastructure development components to municipalities and municipal authorities, to assist with the construction of drinking water, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer projects.

Act 54 of 2022 appropriated \$214.4 million of COVID Relief ARPA funds to the H2O PA Program.

COVID-19 ARPA PA Small Water and Sewer Program

Grants are made for small water and sewer infrastructure projects with activities that involve the construction, improvement, expansion, repair, or rehabilitation of a water supply or sanitary sewer system. Eligible projects are those which have a total project cost of not less than \$30,000 and not more than \$500,000.

Act 54 of 2022 appropriated \$105.6 million of COVID Relief ARPA funds to the PA Small Water and Sewer Program.

COVID-19 ARPA PA ARTS AND CULTURE RECOVERY

1. Legislative Authorization:

The COVID-19 PA Arts and Culture Recovery Program was established by Act No. 1A of 2022 and Act No. 54 of 2022.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The program was funded during FY2022-23 with \$15.0 million from the General Appropriation Act of 2022 from the COVID-19 Response Restricted Account to DCED.

3. Overview of the Program:

The COVID-19 PA Arts and Culture Recovery Program was created to provide grants to nonprofit arts and culture organizations, local arts and culture districts, and arts and culture professionals located in the Commonwealth to ensure the stability and recovery of the Commonwealth's arts and culture sector from the COVID-19 pandemic. The program is administered by the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) under the direction of the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA).

4. Program Performance and Impact:

No awards were made during FY2022-23.

Program at Work:

No awards were made during FY2022-23.

PA INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (PIDA)

1. Legislative Authorization:

PIDA was authorized in 1956 by the Act of May 17, 1956, P.L. 1609, known as the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority Act. The fund is governed by the PIDA Board.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the Budget. It is held and administered by the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

PIDA offers loans to businesses for land and building acquisitions, as well as building construction and renovation projects. The program also offers loans to private developers and Certified Economic Development Organizations (CEDOs) for industrial park development and multi-tenant building construction, acquisition, and renovation projects. Eligible business types include manufacturing, industrial, healthcare, and agricultural processor enterprises. Loans are available for both job creation and job retention. During FY2022-23, the maximum loan amount available was \$2.0 million with up to \$2.3 million available for projects located within certain targeted areas.

Since program inception in 1956, over 5,500 PIDA real estate loans have been approved totaling over \$3.3 billion. These loans are leveraged by more than \$2.5 billion in private funds and the recipient companies committed to retain more than 575,000 full-time jobs and create more than 350,000 full-time jobs.

Program at Work:

B.P.I. (By-Product Industries), Inc. received a \$1,794,913 PIDA loan to assist in the purchase of a 52-acre site with a 250,000 sq. ft. manufacturing facility & 20,000 sq. ft. office complex, located at the former Trinity South Plant in Mercer County. B.P.I., Inc. known as BPI, is a Pittsburgh-based company. It was founded in 1982 and has manufacturing facilities in New Castle, PA; Schenley, PA; McKees Rocks, PA; Muskogee, OK; and Bessemer, AL. BPI processes non-hazardous mineral by-products into materials used in steel production and other applications that require refractory materials. The company handles raw, by-product and finished materials in ways that are environmentally safe. Each year, BPI ships more than 100,000 tons of finished products. The company specializes in the processing of inorganic solid by-products, including magnesium oxides, zirconium oxides, aluminum silicates, calcium silicates, calcium aluminates, silicon carbides, iron oxides, sulfur, aluminum, silicon, ferroalloys, soda ash, cryolites, and carbons. This PIDA project allowed the company to expand its existing business through the acquisition and renovation of the manufacturing facility and office complex and create business opportunities in southern and western states and Canada. The rail infrastructure of the Greenville site allows for strategic bulk freight over conventional truck shipments and allows BPI to ship both raw & finished products directly to customers and facilities in Oklahoma, Texas, and Indiana. Matching funds include an equity contribution of \$1,794,913, providing for a total project cost of \$3,589,826. As a result of this project, BPI has committed to retain its 51 employees and create another 22 full-time jobs within three years.

PENNSYLVANIA COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BANK (PCD BANK)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Economic Development Financing Law, Act 48 of 1987, as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is administered by the Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Pennsylvania Community Development Bank (PCD Bank) program is an innovative government initiative that makes capital available for community and economic development lending and provides grants to promote the creation and expansion of Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs) in Pennsylvania. The PCD Bank leverages public sector funds with private sector investment to provide access to capital that is reinvested in distressed regions throughout the state. CDFIs play an important role in providing critical financial resources to low-and-moderate-income and minority communities and in molding the financial acumen of small businesses and community development groups. The ultimate beneficiaries are low-income people and development organizations that support comprehensive community revitalization, including job creation.

PCD Bank was developed by the Department of Community and Economic Development and is administered through the Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority (PEDFA). PEDFA established an Operational Committee of its Board of Directors to monitor operations, approve loans and grants and report program performance to the Board and participating financial partners. The Operational Committee does not approve individual loans made by CDFIs. In 2008 PEDFA created a new program under the auspices of the PCD Bank known as the Business Opportunities Fund (B.O.F.). The B.O.F. has since earned recognition as one of the most innovative programs of its kind in the country. The purpose of the program is to help business owners (often women and minorities) who do not have access to lines of credit or other small business loans from traditional financial institutions. This lack of access to credit prevents these business owners from competing for governmental and other subcontracts. In addition, these business owners often require technical assistance in governmental procurement including achieving certification where necessary and in the preparation of bids that meet governmental and prime contractor specifications.

Two new loans were made to two CDFIs in FY2022-23. Since program inception, 35 organizations have received more than \$37 million dollars of loan and grant funds used to augment their capital base, strengthen capacity, and increase product and service offerings. Those private sector partners who have participated in loan transactions have provided approximately \$6.4 million of the funds. The combined resources have allowed the CDFIs to leverage millions of dollars in funds from additional sources, leading to substantial community investment in key regions throughout the Commonwealth and creating or retaining thousands of jobs.

Program at Work:

Second Story Tours

Second Story Tours is a women-owned company that creates student-centered field trips and walking tour packages. These tours include classroom curricula for history and social studies and recenters traditional narratives to focus on the stories and contributions of underrepresented communities. In August 2022 Second Story Tours received a \$10,000 loan from Entrepreneur Works using PCD Bank loan funds to help support startup costs such as website development and employee training. In its first full year of business, Second Story Tours turned a profit and has already booked almost

double the amount of tours for next year. The company has focused on the Old City neighborhood in Philadelphia for its tours but is hoping to add additional sites as the business continues to grow.

Ways to Work Loan

Mr. Gibson is a Navy Veteran currently employed as a Health Care Technician at a local VA Medical Center. “In my line of work, being able to get around is important to success. As someone [previously] from ‘The Hill’, I’m very happy that this program is being offered in the community.” Mr. Gibson was riding a bus ten miles a day, with a one-hour commute, to and from work. Through the Community Growth Fund’s Ways to Work program, he was able to purchase a 2010 Chevy Cobalt, which cut his daily commute time by over half and allowed him to be mobile in other aspects of his family’s lives.

PENNSYLVANIA ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FINANCING AUTHORITY PROGRAM (PEDFA)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Economic Development Financing Law, Act 48 of 1987, as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority (PEDFA) is self-sufficient. All operation and administrative costs are covered by fees earned on bond transactions. The funding for this program is not included in the budget.

3. Overview of the Program:

PEDFA administers both tax-exempt and taxable bond programs which can be used for land and building acquisition, building renovation and new construction, machinery and equipment acquisition and installation, designated infrastructure, refinancing, and working capital. PEDFA's competitive interest rates and affordable closing costs make the funds cost-effective for projects of all sizes. All bond funds are private investor proceeds; there are no Commonwealth funds at risk and no state guarantee.

PEDFA can issue bonds anywhere within the Commonwealth. It is ideally suited to projects that involve more than one jurisdiction. PEDFA also serves as the issuer of choice for tax-exempt bond projects (excludes housing) that will require a tax-exempt volume cap in excess of \$25.0 million.

PEDFA issued tax-exempt and taxable bonds totaling over \$2.6 billion, helping to create and retain more than 92,000 jobs.

Program at Work:

PennDOT Major Bridges Package One

PEDFA closed on a \$1.8 billion financing for the PennDOT Major Bridges, Package One Project, which consisted of the design, build, financing, and maintenance of six bridges in critical need of replacement across Pennsylvania. Under an availability based P3 approach, all the bridges were bundled into a single concession agreement. The deal represented the largest single offering of tax-exempt, private-activity bonds for a surface transportation project during the year in the United States, and the transaction was recognized by the Bond Buyer as the 2023 Northeast Region Deal of the Year.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY BOND FINANCING PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

Economic Development Financing Law, Act 102 of 1967, as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is administered by the Center for Private Financing.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Industrial Development Authority Bond Financing Program is an administrative function responsible for reviewing all tax-exempt and taxable bond projects being financed through local Industrial Development Authorities (IDAs) for compliance with the state Economic Development Financing Law, as well as all new debt taken on by the IDAs.

The Economic Development Financing Law requires the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to review and administratively approve requests for the issuance of bonds by Industrial Development Authorities (IDA) within the Commonwealth. DCED must determine that the proposed bond issuance is in conformity with the provisions of the law. Upon receiving DCED approval, the local IDA may proceed to issue bonds. However, if the authority proposes to issue tax-exempt bonds that require an allocation of volume cap, DCED must approve the volume cap allocation.

Program at Work:

Da Vinci Science City, LLC

The Da Vinci Science City, LLC's current operations are focused exclusively on overseeing the development of the new Da Vinci Science Center facility in downtown Allentown, Lehigh County. The tax-exempt project was approved in July 2022 in the amount of \$12.0 million. The proceeds will be used to finance certain costs associated with building a new 67,500 sq. ft. science center and STEAM education facility. The building has 30,000 sq. ft of exhibition space and includes a 12,000 STEAM Learning Center. The project was submitted and issued by the Allentown Neighborhood Improvement Zone Development Authority (ANIZDA). Total project costs were over \$68.0 million, with the additional funding provided by a combination of equity, RACP, HUD, and community funds.

801 Residences LP

801 Residences LP is a property developer of senior living communities. This specific project is located on Locust Street in Philadelphia. The project was submitted by and issued by the Philadelphia Authority for Industrial Development (PAID) in the taxable amount of \$101.0 million, with an approval date of May 2023. Bond proceeds were used to finance the acquisition of a 300-unit senior living property which includes 150 studio units, 149 1-bedroom units, and 1 2-bedroom unit.

NEXT GENERATION FARMER LOAN PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

Economic Development Financing Law, Act 102 of 1967, as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. The Next Generation Farmer Loan Program is a Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture program that is administered by the Center for Private Financing.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Next Generation Farmer Loan Program provides an effective means for federal-state industry linkages, whereby the public sector can assist beginning and first-time farmers (borrower) to purchase land, farm equipment, farm buildings, and breeding livestock. The program uses federal tax-exempt financing to reduce a farmer's interest rate for capital purchases. The program may be used between a borrower and lender for a loan to make a direct purchase of farm and agricultural machinery and equipment or between a buyer and seller for a contract purchase. The tax-exempt interest income to the lender or contract seller enables them to charge the borrower a lower interest rate, which is exempt from federal, state, and county taxes that would be applicable.

Program at Work:

Curtis L. and Marilyn B. Nolt

The Curtis L. and Marilyn B. Nolt Next Generation Farmer loan in the amount of \$525,000 was approved in December 2022. The project is located in Chester County and the note was issued by the Central & Western Chester County Industrial Development Authority. Note proceeds were used to finance the purchase of Marilyn's father's 65.8-acre farm. In addition to the poultry operation, the borrowers will grow corn and soybeans on 60 tillable acres.

Jonathan S. and Emma Lynn Stoltzfus

The Jonathan S. and Emma Lynn Stoltzfus Next Generation Farmer loan in the amount of \$616,000 was approved in March 2023. The project is located in Lancaster County with the note being issued by the Penn Industrial Development Authority. Note proceeds were used to finance the purchase of the family farm from Jonathan's parents. The 119-acre farm will be operated as a dairy and crop farm with 80 acres of alfalfa being grown. The chicken house on the farm will be leased to Jonathan's father.

PENNSYLVANIA CAPITAL ACCESS PROGRAM (PENNCAP)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Economic Development Financing Law, Act 48 of 1987, as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is administered by the Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Pennsylvania Capital Access Program (PennCAP) is a loan guarantee program, established in November 1994 by the Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority (PEDFA). PennCAP provides lending institutions (banks, community development financial institutions (CDFIs) and farm credit institutions) with a flexible and non-bureaucratic tool to make business loans that are somewhat riskier than conventional bank loans, in a manner consistent with safe and sound bank regulations. PennCAP can therefore assist lending institutions to expand their markets and to better serve their customer base. The loans can also have an important positive impact on job creation and on the improvement of the effectiveness of Pennsylvania's economy through support of the growth and success of Pennsylvania businesses.

Overall program activity remained steady throughout FY2022-23. Most new loans were enrolled by the newest participant in the PennCAP program, PURSUIT (formerly known as Excelsior Growth Fund), a CDFI (Community Development Financial Institution). Participating lending institutions made nine loans totaling \$315,000 to small companies in 8 counties. Those loans are projected to create and retain 104 jobs.

Program at Work:

Royce Carpentry & Design LLC

Royce Carpentry & Design LLC is a construction company that focuses on finished carpentry. Located in Milford, PA they've been serving clients with home restorations and remodeling since 2018. In June 2023, they received a \$40,000 working capital loan from Pursuit, through the PA SSBCI Revolving Loan Fund that is PennCAP guaranteed. This loan is supporting the expansion of their business as they aim to grow. Funds will support their new shop, advertising efforts, equipment purchases, and hiring new staff. Building on their success to date and with working capital funds available, Royce Carpentry & Design LLC will scale their business.

Value Added Processing, Inc.

Value Added Processing, Inc. is a full-scale ISO-9001-2015 registered, HUB-zone and small-business-certified metal service center located in East Pittsburgh, PA. Value Added Processing, Inc. specializes in metal slitting (processing), storage, freight (via an in-house trucking/logistics division), and metal sales/brokerage for customers in a diverse range of metal-based industries such as construction, solar, manufacturing, pipe, tube, HVAC, battery, and automotive. In June 2023, they received a \$100,000 working capital loan from Pursuit, through the PA SSBCI Revolving Loan Fund that is PennCAP guaranteed. This loan is being used to support their efforts in automating their processes which will increase their efficiency and capacity. Through these improvements, Value Added Processing, Inc. will improve its scalability and create new, safer, and improved jobs.

TAX-EXEMPT VOLUME CAP ALLOCATION

1. Legislative Authorization:

Internal Revenue Code, 1986, as amended and the Job Enhancement Act, Act 100 of 1998.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is administered by the Center for Private Financing.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Federal Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposed a state ceiling on the amount of certain tax-exempt private activity bonds that may be issued in each calendar year by or on behalf of each state. In 2000, Congress passed legislation increasing volume limits per capita. Once per person cap reached \$75, it increased in increments of \$5. Currently, the per capita amount is \$110, however, due to the legislative language, the inflation-adjustment can remain fixed from one year to the next if inflation slows, which has happened in the past. The state ceiling for each year is calculated by multiplying the inflation-adjusted amount by the state's estimated population figure from the U.S. Department of Census' spring/summer population survey. This figure is published in the Bond Buyer, usually, in the third week of December and is released by the IRS. If the Census Bureau fails to release the population number prior to January 1, then the previous year's population number must be used. Once the population and per capita figures are known, DCED allots allocation to the following issuers: Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority (PEDFA), Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency (PHFA), Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA), and local Industrial Development Authorities.

Program at Work:

Grundy Common, LLC

Grundy Commons, LLC was newly formed for the purpose of purchasing and operating the industrial/mixed-use property at 925 Canal Street, Bristol, PA, Bucks County. Grundy Commons, LLC was formed after Advent Design Corporation absorbed TESCO through an asset sale. TESCO is the long-standing brand that provides outside metering resources for utilities whose products range from hand-held tools to specialized field testing equipment. The project consists of the financing of the acquisition, planning, design, equipping, and renovations to the 3.6-acre 270,000 sq. ft. facility. The financing amount totaled \$6,328,000 in tax-exempt volume cap allocation. The bonds project was approved in November 2022 and was issued by Bucks County Industrial Development Authority in November 2022.

EDC Real Estate LLC (B-Tec Solutions)

EDC Real Estate, LLC is the newly formed real estate holding company that will own the facility where B-Tec Solutions and other manufacturers operate. The occupying entity is B-Tec Solutions which is a machining and stamping manufacturing operator. B-Tec Solutions was leasing the facility and had the right of first refusal in their lease, which they invoked in January 2022. Bond proceeds were approved in October 2022 in the amount of \$7,818,250 and were issued by the Quakertown Area Commercial and Industrial Development Authority. Funds were used to finance the purchase of the manufacturing facility that B-Tec Solutions currently leases for its operations.

AIRPORT LAND DEVELOPMENT ZONE

1. Legislative Authorization:

Act 53 of 2022 amended the Fiscal Code and created Airport Land Development Zones (ALDZ).

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

Pennsylvania commercial and non-commercial airports have a surplus of vacant, underutilized land in need of revitalization. The Airport Land Development Zone Tax Credit Program (ALDZ) is an incentive-based tax credit program to foster redevelopment of these underutilized sites owned by airports, providing new revenue sources to the airport. Once designated, the sites become prime spots for business, economic development, and job creation.

Businesses that are established within and/or relocate to an ALDZ will have the opportunity to earn restricted tax credits in exchange for the investment and revitalization of the zone. DCED will administer the tax credits to qualified businesses locating in the zones.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2023, eight Airport Land Development Zones have been designated consisting of 928.1 acres. No tax credits have been awarded to date.

BEGINNING FARMER TAX CREDIT

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Beginning Farmer Tax Credit Program was established under Article SVIII-H of the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L. No. 2) known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971 ("Tax Reform Code") as amended by Act 65 of 2019 (the "Act").

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Program provides tax credits to owners of agricultural assets who sell or rent agricultural assets to beginning farmers. This program is administered by the Department of Community and Economic Development in consultation with the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Revenue.

An owner of agricultural assets is eligible for allocation of a tax credit equal to either:

- 5% of the lesser of the sale price or fair market value of the agricultural asset, up to a maximum of \$32,000.
- 10% of the gross rental income of the first, second, and third year of the rental agreement, up to a maximum of \$7,000 per year.

COAL REFUSE ENERGY & RECLAMATION TAX CREDIT

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Coal Refuse Energy and Reclamation Tax Credit program is authorized by Act 84 of 2016.

2. Cost Assumption:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Coal Refuse Energy and Reclamation Tax Credit provides tax credits to eligible facilities, that generate electricity by using coal refuse for power generation, control acid gases for emission control, and use ash produced by the facilities to reclaim mining-affected sites.

Tax credits may be applied against the tax liability of a qualified taxpayer, which includes a person that owns an eligible facility, or is a transferor, purchaser, affiliate, or assignee of a person to which a Coal Refuse Tax Credit certificate is issued.

The Commonwealth shall issue no more than \$20.0 million in tax credits per fiscal year.

Recipients:

Qualified taxpayers, who generate electricity at an eligible facility by using coal refuse and use the ash produced by the facilities to reclaim mining-affected sites.

EDUCATIONAL IMPROVEMENT TAX CREDITS (EITC)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Educational Tax Credit programs are authorized under Article XX-B of the Public-School Code of 1949.

2. Cost Assumption:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue and authorized in the Public-School Code.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program was designed to enable businesses to assist in the education of Pennsylvania’s children. The program provides a 75% tax credit to businesses that make a one-year contribution to eligible scholarship and educational improvement organizations supporting education in the Commonwealth. If the business makes a two-year commitment, the credit is 90%. Businesses are eligible to earn up to \$750,000 in tax credits per year. In addition, a separate pool of credits is available for contributions to pre-kindergarten scholarship organizations. Those contributions earn 100% credit on the first \$10,000 contributed and 90% on additional amounts up to a maximum credit of \$200,000. Thus, a company may earn a maximum of \$950,000 in credits per year under the EITC program.

The program is authorized to provide up to \$470.0 million in Educational Improvement Tax Credits. Of that amount, \$325.0 million is available for companies that donate to approved scholarship organizations; \$54.5 million is available for companies that donate to approved educational improvement organizations; \$30.5 million is available for companies that donate to approved pre-kindergarten scholarship organizations and \$60.0 million is available for companies that donate to the approved Scholarship Organization – Economically Disadvantaged Schools. Organizations must be a 501(c)(3) non-profit and must contribute 80% of the annual receipts received in donations to approved activities. Scholarship organizations provide scholarship assistance to students, so they may attend the public or private school of their choice (K-12). Educational improvement organizations provide innovative, value added, and advanced academic programming in Pennsylvania’s public schools. Pre-kindergarten scholarship organizations provide scholarship assistance to students so that they may attend a pre-kindergarten program of their choice.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION TAX CREDITS (HPTC)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Historic Preservation Tax Credit (HPTC) program is authorized under Article XVII-H of the Tax Reform Code of 1971.

2. Cost Assumption:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Historic and Museum Commission (PHMC) and the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Historic Preservation Tax Credit (HPTC) provides tax credits to qualified taxpayers who will complete the rehabilitation of a qualified historic structure into an income-producing property. All projects must include a qualified rehabilitation plan that is approved by the PHMC as being consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Rehabilitation*. The Commonwealth shall issue no more than \$5.0 million in tax credits per fiscal year and the credits are awarded equitably for projects in each of the five regions of the Commonwealth (Southwest, Southeast, Central, Northeast, Northwest).

In FY2022-23, DCED approved 22 projects. A total of \$5.0 million in Historic Preservation Tax Credits was awarded. Those funds generated \$400.0 million in private investment.

Program at Work:

Torat Ltd

Torat Ltd proposes to invest \$1.3 million in the restoration of the former Conrad Bischoff Planning Mill and Furniture Factory in Tamaqua Borough, Schuylkill County (PA Northeast Region). The project calls for the rehabilitation of a two-story, former furniture factory in downtown Tamaqua into a Bed & Breakfast facility. The main factory will be converted into the Bed & Breakfast with the two contributing rear buildings to be converted into a visiting artist studio space. A total of \$150,000 in Historic Preservation Tax Credits will be awarded from FY2022-23.

KEYSTONE OPPORTUNITY ZONE (KOZ)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Keystone Opportunity Zone (KOZ) program was created by Act 92 of 1998. The original KOZ's expired in 2008, however due to the tremendous success of the original KOZ initiative, legislation was enacted in 2000, 2002, 2008, 2012, and 2016 to designate additional parcels of land as Keystone Opportunity Improvement Zones (KOIZ) and Keystone Opportunity Expansion Zones (KOEZ). Act 13 of 2019 provided an opportunity to designate additional parcels of land as Keystone Opportunity Expansion Zones in the counties of Lancaster, Clearfield, and Cambria.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Keystone Opportunity Zone (KOZ) initiative was designed to revive economically distressed urban and rural communities throughout the Commonwealth with the powerful market-based incentive of tax abatement. The KOZ initiative fosters private, business, and residential reinvestment in these designated areas to regain the economic stability of the communities. KOZs are virtually tax-free zones. Businesses and residents are entitled to certain tax benefits when they locate in a KOZ. There are 12 KOZ regions throughout Pennsylvania. KOZ size ranges from less than 10 to over 350 acres. Through credits, waivers, and broad-based abatements, total taxes on economic activity in KOZs are reduced to almost zero.

In recognition of the tremendous success of the original KOZ initiative, a new opportunity to participate in the program was realized in 2000 with the Keystone Opportunity Expansion Zones (KOEZ). The KOEZ effort was based on the same principles, criteria, and guidelines as KOZ. This expansion gave communities one more chance to participate in this program.

In December of 2002, Keystone Opportunity Improvement Zones (KOIZ) were authorized. The KOIZ's were designated by the Governor and approved by the local jurisdictions. The 2002 legislation also authorized the enhancement (addition of property) of existing KOZs. In 2003, legislation extended the enhancement deadlines of the KOZ program to June 2004.

The KOZ program was enhanced again in July of 2008. Senate Bill 1412 authorized the state and local governments to expand existing zones, extend expiration dates and create additional KOEZs. Zone expansions must be contiguous to existing zones and not exceed 15 acres. Time extensions may be for seven years or ten, dependent on the local governments' preference. Only unoccupied property may receive a time extension. The legislation also authorized 15 additional KOEZs; the new zones cannot exceed 350 acres.

Senate Bill 1237 was passed in February 2012 to further expand on the ongoing success of the KOZ program. The amendment allowed for the expansion of current designations, extensions of unoccupied parcels, and the ability for 15 new designations of a maximum of 350 acres per designation. In November 2013, 15 new designations were approved totaling 4,753 acres.

With the passing of Act 13 of 2019, the opportunity allowed for 3 additional designations of a maximum of 375 acres per designation in Lancaster, Clearfield, and Cambria Counties. As of December 2021, 1 designation had been approved totaling 342.516 acres.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

As of December 31, 2022, there were 12,167 jobs created and 3,458 jobs retained at KOZ sites throughout the state. In addition, KOZ applicants for the year 2022 reported investing \$1.3 billion in private investment in KOZ sites during the previous calendar year.

KEYSTONE SPECIAL DEVELOPMENT ZONE TAX CREDIT (KSDZ)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Act 26 of 2011 amended the Fiscal Code and created Keystone Special Development Zones (KSDZ).

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

Pennsylvania continues to have a surplus of abandoned, deteriorated commercial and industrial sites in need of revitalization. The Keystone Special Development Zone Tax Credit Program (KSDZ) is an incentive-based tax credit program to foster the redevelopment of contaminated (actual or presumed) industrial and commercial sites. There are often large populations in the immediate area that need employment opportunities. Once it becomes economically feasible to clean up these sites, the sites become prime spots for business, economic development, and job creation.

Businesses that are established within and/or relocate to a KSDZ will have the opportunity to earn restricted tax credits in exchange for the investment and revitalization of the zone. DCED will use the Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) established listing of Special Industrial Areas to certify a KSDZ and administer the tax credits to qualified businesses locating in the zones.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

From inception through June 30, 2022, two Keystone Special Development Zone have been designated consisting of 487.38 acres. In 2023, \$5.2 million in KSDZ tax credits have been awarded to three companies.

OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP TAX CREDIT PROGRAM (OSTC)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Educational Tax Credit programs are authorized under Article XX-B of the Public-School Code of 1949.

2. Cost Assumption:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) program was designed to enable businesses to assist in the education of Pennsylvania’s children.

The program provides a 75% tax credit to businesses that make a one-year contribution to eligible opportunity scholarship organizations supporting education in the Commonwealth. If the business makes a two-year commitment, the credit is 90%. Businesses are eligible to earn up to \$750,000 in tax credits per year.

The program is authorized to provide up to \$85.0 million in Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credits. Organizations must be a 501(c)(3) non-profit and must contribute 80% of the annual receipts received in donations to eligible scholarship recipients. Opportunity Scholarship organizations provide tuition assistance to students residing within the attendance boundary of a low-achieving public school, so they may attend another public school outside of their district or a K-12 nonpublic school.

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Waterfront Development Tax Credit Program was established by Act 84 of 2016.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Waterfront Development Tax Credit Program (WDTC) was established to encourage private investment in waterfront property that creates public access to the water, increases property values, restores ecology, and catalyzes further financial investment and job creation. The Department provides tax credits to business firms that provide contributions to waterfront development organizations to complete eligible waterfront development projects.

The total amount of all Tax Credits shall not exceed \$5.0 million in any one fiscal year. No more than 5% of the contributions received under this program may be used by the Waterfront Development Organization for administrative fees.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

Currently, the Department has six approved (6) Waterfront Development Organizations with corresponding Waterfront Development Projects. The total aggregate cost of the approved projects total over \$150.8 million.

Program at Work:

Ben Franklin Technology Partners:

Coral reefs hold over 35% of the world's biodiversity and are disappearing at an accelerating rate. Inspired by the binding properties of mussels, Mussel Polymers Inc. (MPI) has developed technologies to bind in wet environments (e.g., under the sea and in the mouth) and to enhance the binding characteristics of existing adhesives. The technology is a non-toxic alternative to superglue and creates an underwater bond stronger than epoxy.

In 2022, Ben Franklin Technology Partners of Southeastern PA provided seed funding to scale and commercialize R&D opportunities for dental, defense, and coral restoration formulations. The US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration awarded MPI a grant to develop an underwater adhesive system to attach new corals during reef reconstruction. MPI’s revolutionary underwater glue, Seatak, is a crucial step forward in saving the coral reef ecosystem.

Venture Investment Program:

During FY2022-23, the Venture Investment Program awarded DreamIt IV (\$1.5 million), Global PA Opportunities Fund (\$1.0 million) Activate Venture Partners (\$2.5 million). Additionally, the SSBCI Diverse Leaders Program awarded \$2.3 million to Philadelphia based Plain Sight Capital.

The BFTDA – Venture Investment Program was established in 2001 to address the financing needs of technology-oriented businesses located in Pennsylvania. This Program has received state funding on two occasions. Initially, funds were injected after the dot.com crash including at inception, the Program received \$37.5 million in funding and then subsequently with \$38.0 million that was generated through the sale of \$100.0 million in insurance premium tax credits. The program operates pursuant to the statutory authority of the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority.

The Diverse Leaders Venture Program is a component of the Pennsylvania – SSBCI Program (PA- SSBCI). The Program provides loans to venture capital general partners of diverse status having the wherewithal to invest in Pennsylvania small businesses. SSBCI dollars will be matched by private funding that will create investments in small businesses led by individuals of diverse status that are in need of support and resources to expand and create jobs.

As of FY2022-23, the original two increments of state funding were exhausted. The Program currently relies on loan repayments to recycle capital into the venture community. This critical financing provides Pennsylvania companies with expanded access to vital early-stage capital. The following provides the funding the BFTDA made in 2022.

Based on the data and information gathered over the past year, PBDA is poised to engage in DE Capacity Grant program planning and implementation following the announcement of the grant allocation in 2024.

Program at Work:

The James R. Meehl Innovation Commons at Penn State Behrend is an innovation space for community and University innovators and entrepreneurs in early stages of development.

Elements Aligned LLC, a construction technology company based in Erie, was assisted by Meehl Innovation Commons in developing a new product. The product, called The Panel Dock, is a new means of fastening demountable panels directly to steel stud framing during building construction.

Meehl Innovation Commons provided product design and prototyping, working from the basic initial concept drawing to a complete, patented, manufacturable, working, and tested design.

The student who performed the work was included as a co-inventor on the patent, while Elements Aligned retains full ownership of the property. Meehl Innovation Commons also provided contacts for further development and funding opportunities. Additional ecosystem partners NWPA Innovation Beehive Network, Ben Franklin Technology Partners, Gannon SBDC, Luke Douglass (engineering and construction), and Eric Webber (business development) were also involved in supporting the client's needs.

With the help of Meehl Innovation Commons and ecosystem partners, the idea has become a patented product and a new business, adding one full-time job and a high potential for rapid growth with future investment. Elements Aligned has since received \$110,000 from Ben Franklin Technology Partners for growth and further development, travel and customer discovery, trade shows, sales, and materials. The product is currently ready for mass production.

Program at Work:

Indigo Biosciences is a State College, Pennsylvania based company that makes tools for research and environmental screening. Life Sciences Greenhouse Investments has invested \$1.3 million in this firm, which has grown since its initial investment in 2008 to 20 employees and has brought to market nearly 100 unique assay products serving the pharmaceutical industry and more recently, the environmental services market as well. Ten of these products were introduced in 2023. There is also a service component to the company.

The company's core products are kitted nuclear receptor assays that help accelerate scientific discovery. In fact, Indigo Biosciences is the globe's largest producer of such research tools. The company is on track to reach a revenue rate of \$4.0 million this year, with a goal of achieving revenue of \$10.0 million or more in the next three to five years.

Financial support from the Commonwealth leverages a nearly equal amount in federal funds.

Manufacturing PA Training-to-Career Grant Program: Training-to-Career provides funding to create a short-term work readiness program with direct input by two or more partnering manufacturers to address the skills missing in entry-level applicants. The program also helps to create awareness of the career opportunities within the manufacturing industry. Eligible applicants include any consortium led by a nonprofit organization (such as a workforce development board, manufacturing association, or business education coalition); a training partner (such as a technical, trade or community college); and two or more PA manufacturers.

Manufacturing PA Innovation Program: The Innovation program engages Pennsylvania's best and brightest students with Pennsylvania manufacturers to advance innovation and workforce development. The program supports designated undergraduate and graduate student fellows who are attending Pennsylvania Colleges or Universities and who are partnered with manufacturers to advance new products or process innovations. Projects are selected based on factors including the level of industry engagement, the potential for long term job and business growth, and regional diversity across Pennsylvania.

Manufacturing PA Training-to-Career Grant Program:

In FY2022-23, 19 new projects were launched across Pennsylvania, seven providing awareness and 12 providing training for the following positions: industrial maintenance, lathe operators, electronics and instrumentation control panel builders, assembly, process and mechanical engineers, product development, CNC machinist, digital technician, plastic formation, quality control and production associates, and welding. All programs have a special emphasis to include individuals with barriers to employment. Barriers included were disengaged youth, veterans, low-income single-parent families, displaced workers, language, un/under-employed, transportation, and re-entry. The training programs are two-year contract commitments.

Manufacturing PA Innovation Program:

In the program’s six fiscal years, \$12.1 million has been deployed for 182 projects connecting 141 manufacturers with over 470 students from 21 colleges and universities. The program’s annual Manufacturing Expo attracts over 200 attendees each year and features a keynote and panel discussion that focuses on advancing innovation and enhancing market competitiveness. This Expo is a day for learning and celebrating the efforts of our educational institutions to help keep Pennsylvania manufacturing at the forefront of innovation.

Program at Work:

Industrial Resource Centers

Ameriscend, a packaging-focused family of companies consisting of HPT Pharma, Automotion Technologies, Elmark Packaging, and AmeriPak, sought to enhance their operations and drive Continuous Improvement within their business. They engaged with DVIRC (Delaware Valley Industrial Resource Center) for strategic planning and continuous improvement training and coaching services. The engagement aimed to address the challenges of integrating multiple acquired businesses and implement Lean practices for improved efficiency and growth. The collaboration between Ameriscend and DVIRC resulted in significant improvements and tangible outcomes for the company. The following results were achieved:

- New Sales: Ameriscend experienced an increase of over \$1.5 million in new sales, reflecting the positive impact of the implemented improvements on their business growth.
- New Jobs: As a result of business growth, Ameriscend created four new jobs within their organization, contributing to local employment opportunities.
- Cost Avoidance: Through the identification and implementation of improvement opportunities, Ameriscend achieved significant cost avoidance of over \$100,000 optimizing their resources and minimizing unnecessary expenses.
- Investment: Due to their savings, over the past several years Ameriscend was able to make strategic investments in excess of \$750,000 in various areas to support their improvement initiatives.

Manufacturing Training to Career:

Northampton Community College (NCC)

Northampton Community College (NCC) used Training-to-Career grant funds to implement a 9-week, 265-hour Precision Machining training program. The program was designed for new and incumbent manufacturing workers seeking to upskill, or students with some knowledge and experience in basic manufacturing concepts. Recruitment targeted individuals who are low-income, lack basic technology skills, or are under or unemployed, and veterans, career changers, or out-of-school youth. Students in the Precision Machining training program learned and mastered the skill sets to safely and effectively operate the typical machines found in manufacturing environments and had the opportunity to earn three industry recognized National Institute for Metalworking Skills (NIMS) credentials to validate skills highly valued by NCC’s employer partners. In career exploration components, they identified and aligned their personal strengths and interests with various manufacturing occupations and understand the educational requirements, regional demand, and salaries for each.

Smart Brain Imager

Manufacturer: Infrascan, Inc.

Smartwatches and other portable devices can continually monitor physiological responses, such as heart rate and body temperature, all displayed through apps on connected devices. Infrascan, Inc. and Villanova University partnered to explore their Smart Brain Imager project to advance functional near infrared spectroscopy technology in wireless devices.

According to Infrascan, Inc. working with academia has helped the company advance their open projects from engineering prototypes more commonly found in university labs to something that looks more like a realized commercial product. “The most exciting part of this project is that we’re at the cutting edge of a new medical imaging modality that is coming into full force.” Infrascan, Inc. believes the core technology that Villanova has developed is key to commercialize a wireless, accessible, and easy-to-use brain scanner for personal health monitoring. “The work that is done at Villanova is really a crucial building block to get to that bright future.”

Program at Work:

PREP:

Actuated Medical - Bellefonte (Centre County), began in 2006 with a mission to improve medical devices by integrating electronic motion technologies. Since then, the company’s state-of-the-art, minimally invasive products have improved outcomes and reduced healthcare costs for patients across the country. In March of 2019, as the Coronavirus struck the nation, Actuated Medical quickly pivoted to meet clinicians’ urgent need for personal protective equipment (PPE) and began manufacturing medical-grade, multi-use Face Shields. The shields quickly received praise from the medical professionals who utilized them. The new product line created eight positions and a possible long-term product for the company. SEDA-COG assisted Actuated Medical, Inc. with an EDA COVID-19 loan, an ARC RLF loan, and an IRP loan. The new equipment will enable them to grow their machining capabilities, expand their neural device and endoscope research, and update older equipment. The COVID loan also provided working capital to facilitate their ability to build inventory on a new product they have developed. The ARC RLF and IRP loans were for property renovations. “For more than 12 years, Actuated Medical has been in two buildings. The SEDA-COG loans have enabled us to upgrade the facility and co-locate our team in one larger building. This is allowing us greater team interaction to innovate medical devices that improve patient outcomes. The funds have also been used to purchase advanced equipment to enhance our development capabilities and grow our contract services business,” said Maureen L. Mulvihill, Actuated Medical President & CEO.

Engage!:

Innovative Sintered Metals – St. Mary’s (Elk County) is a fully diversified component fabricator serving the automotive, medical, electrical, pump, appliance, and lock industries. They established an immediate strategy to carve out niche markets where they would become specialists in each product line or process. One key niche is stainless steel components for automotive, architectural hardware, locks, and pump industries. Stainless production represents roughly 15% of the company’s sales. As a result of the Engage! program, Clearly Ahead Economic Development learned about the financing needs of Innovative Sintered Metals. This St. Mary's company was looking for funding resources relating to the acquisition of a company from Clearfield, PA. Clearly Ahead was able to provide financing assistance in conjunction with North Central to assist with the acquisition project. Public funds totaled \$800,000 and private funds totaled over \$6.0 million. They have retained all existing employees at the Clearfield location and have added several new jobs since the acquisition.

- Digital Connectivity Technology Projects (Devices) (\$20,000,000)

7. Overview of the Program:

CPF funds have been allocated for critical capital projects that enable work, education, and health monitoring in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency, and to ensure that all communities have access to high-quality modern infrastructure, including broadband. In addition to providing equitable access, funding will be used to support digital connectivity technology projects to facilitate broadband internet access for communities where affordability is a barrier to adoption and use, as well as multi-purpose community facility projects designed to directly enable work, education, and health monitoring.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

- BIP applications are currently under review, with awards anticipated in early 2024.
- Facilities program guidelines have been posted and applications will be accepted January- April 2024.

NEW PA VENTURE CAPITAL INVESTMENT PROGRAM

1. Legislative Authorization:

The New PA Venture Capital Investment Program was established under the Act of April 1, 2004 (P.L.163, No. 22) (64 Pa.C.S §1551), as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funds for this program are not included in the budget. They are held and administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

3. Program Overview:

The Program was originally allocated \$60.0 million for purposes of underwriting loans to Pennsylvania-focused venture capital firms. The program is designed to ultimately encourage the creation of high-growth businesses in Pennsylvania by requiring loan recipients to match the Program loan award on a 3:1 basis and to focus on Pennsylvania-based early-stage companies. Of the \$60.0 million, 50% is made available to venture capital partnerships located in historically underserved areas of Pennsylvania (also known as the “T Region”); the program encourages participating firms to invest 50% of the received program loans in companies located in these underserved areas.

The main objective of the program is to stimulate venture capital investment in Pennsylvania companies. Specifically, the program strives to:

- Seek and support qualified newly established venture capital managers who are predominantly Pennsylvania-based.
- Continue to support established venture capital funds that maintain a substantial investment presence in Pennsylvania.
- Foster a robust venture capital community through outreach, networking, and industry collaboration.
- Encourage additional capital formation in Pennsylvania by structuring well designed program investments.

Cumulatively, between 2006-2014 the Commonwealth Financing Authority (CFA) awarded total commitments of \$53.0 million to 20 venture funds. The remaining \$7.0 million in Program dollars were spent beginning in 2016 among three (3) additional managers (Activate II, NewSpring Health III, and PLSG Accelerator II). In recent years, the CFA Board has approved a partial recycling of the Program principal. To this end, there have been a total of nine (9) loans underwritten since 2017 totaling \$15.5 million. Total loan commitments to date total \$71.5 million. As of June 30, 2023, the CFA’s active venture funds have current investments tallying \$359.0 million in Pennsylvania related entities not including separately sourced capital. Among the existing companies currently in the portfolio, these investments have helped to create 5,734 jobs.

Program at Work:

Given the risky reputation of venture investing, many PA venture managers struggle to raise capital. Over time, the CFA Program has provided much-needed funding to the PA venture community, and in many cases, as the only institutional investor. To this end, via DCED in-depth due diligence and CFA Board oversight, the Program has provided valuable endorsements that in turn, have enabled managers to engender confidence among investor prospects thereby raising additional capital. Alongside this support, the Program has generated returns for the Commonwealth. To date, the Program has re-paid all invested capital. Currently, the entire portfolio, including cash reserves, aggregate distributions, and remaining asset values is marked at 1.43x aggregate original loan principal.

KEYSTONE INNOVATION ZONE TAX CREDITS (KIZ)

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Keystone Innovation Zone Tax Credit Program is most recently authorized under Act 84 of 2016.

2. Cost Assumption:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Program Overview:

KIZ Tax credits are available to those companies who meet the statutory definition of a qualified KIZ company: 1.) are less than 8 years of age 2.) operate in a specific targeted industry sector including but not limited to, information technology, advanced manufacturing, life sciences and enabling technologies and 3.) is located within the geographic boundaries of a designated Keystone Innovation Zone. Tax credits are awarded based on revenues derived from operations in the KIZ for the two years prior to the application deadline of December 1 (i.e., 2020 is the base year, 2021 serves as the comparable year and 2022 is when the applicant applies for the program.) The tax credit shall not exceed \$100,000 per year per company; there are \$15.0 million in tax credits annually. Recipient companies may use the tax credits for up to five years or they may sell or assign them if the original company awarded the credits has no tax liability in the year in which the tax credits are awarded. KIZ companies often sell the tax credits using a third-party broker to get the highest rate of return, often more than \$.90 on the dollar.

weCreate – Erie County KIZ

weCreate Website Design and Marketing is in Erie, PA and has received multiple KIZ tax credits. They participate in the growth of their region by helping manufacturers and other businesses generate more revenue. They have used KIZ funds to help start two new businesses, MeterEZ (Erie's mobile parking app) and the IV Center (nutritional IV therapy). The reduced tax liability generated from participating in the program has enabled their business to grow exponentially.

MANUFACTURING TAX CREDIT

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Manufacturing Tax Credit Program was established by Act 84 of 2016.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Program provides tax credits to taxpayers who increase their annual taxable payroll by \$1.0 million through the creation of new full-time jobs. For the purposes of the Program, a “taxpayer” is an entity engaged in manufacturing; defined as the mechanical, physical, or chemical transformation of materials, substances, or components into new products that are creations of new items of tangible personal property for sale. The taxpayer must agree to retain the new jobs and the increase in payroll for at least five years from the start date.

Tax credit awards shall be equal to 5% of the taxpayers increase in annual taxable payroll, if increased by at least \$1.0 million above a pre-determined base year amount. The Commonwealth shall issue no more than \$4.0 million in tax credits per fiscal year.

QUALIFIED MANUFACTURING INNOVATION AND REINVESTMENT DEDUCTION

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Qualified Manufacturing Innovation and Reinvestment Deduction was established pursuant to the Act of October 30, 2017 (72 P.S. §§7407.6 and 7407.7) as amended.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax deduction calculated and administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Qualified Manufacturing Innovation and Reinvestment Deduction was established to encourage increased investment and job creation through manufacturing in Pennsylvania. Qualified businesses are eligible to deduct between 5 and 7.5% of their private capital investment from their corporate net income tax liability if they invest more than \$60.0 million in the creation of new or refurbished manufacturing capacity.

Eligible applications for the program must be:

- An entity engaged in manufacturing.
- Registered to do business in Pennsylvania and subject to Corporate Net Income Tax.
- An Employer directly responsible for the collection, withholding, and remittance of Individual Taxes to the Department of Revenue on behalf of the workforce.
- Able to obtain and maintain state tax compliance clearance status with the laws and regulations of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to the satisfaction of the Department of Revenue.
- Demonstrate a new capital investment of more than \$60.0 million for the creation of new or refurbished manufacturing capacity associated with a new location or expansion project at a commonwealth site (the “project site”).
- Able to provide current and projected employment figures in Pennsylvania and at the project site.

Eligible projects will include the creation of new manufacturing capacity or improvements to existing manufacturing capacity at an identified project site. Limited to the mechanical, physical, biological, or chemical transformation of materials, substances, or components into new products that are the creations of new items of tangible personal property for sale.

RURAL JOBS INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT

1. Legislative Authorization:

The Rural Jobs and Investment Tax Credit was established in Act 84 of 2016 and subsequently amended in Act 13 of 2019.

2. Cost Assumptions:

The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is a tax credit administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue.

3. Overview of the Program:

The Rural Jobs and Investment Tax Credit Program (“Program”) is an investment tool designed to offer rural business owners’ access to capital for business development in rural areas. The capital is sourced to Rural Growth Funds, designated to receive up to \$50.0 million in capital contributions from investors. Tax Credits will be awarded to Business Firms making credit-eligible capital contributions to the fund.

To qualify for a tax credit, credit-eligible capital contributions made by a Business Firm to a Rural Growth Fund must be used by the Rural Growth Fund for rural growth investments in a rural business. Business Firms that make a credit-eligible capital contribution to a designated Rural Growth Fund are eligible to receive a tax credit equal to 100% of the credit-eligible capital contribution.

The total allocation of tax credit certificates that may be awarded for this Program is \$30.0 million. The Department may not issue tax credit certificates that would exceed \$6.0 million in utilization in any fiscal year, excluding carried forward tax credits or amounts reallocated.

Eligible Recipients must:

- Be a licensed rural business investment company under the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act or a small business investment company under the Small Business Investment Act.
- Have invested at least \$100.0 million in nonpublic companies located in rural areas of the commonwealth or other states.
- Be registered to do business in the commonwealth.

Act of May 10, 1939 (P. L. 111) known as the Commerce Law.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The Office of International Business Development (OIBD) provides 100% of the state funding for the OIBD including its full staff complement of 14 full-time employees, 15 international contractors (5 contractors have both investment and trade

responsibilities), 10 Regional Export Network (REN) partners, trade and investment events, and operating expenses to serve its Pennsylvania export clients and hundreds of foreign investment prospects.

OIBD successfully pursued the State Trade and Expansion Promotion (STEP) grant in FY2023-24 with an award of \$500,000 from the Small Business Administration (SBA) to fund the Global Access Program (GAP) through September 2024. GAP is a small grant to support the international business development activities of small and medium-sized Pennsylvania companies.

7. Overview of the Program:

The mission of OIBD is to contribute to the growth and strength of the Commonwealth’s economy by attracting international investment to Pennsylvania and providing value-added business development services to Pennsylvania companies that export products, technologies, and services from the Commonwealth. To achieve these goals, OIBD has developed award winning programming that is supported by outstanding teams of dedicated business consultants in Pennsylvania and around the world. Additionally, OIBD works closely with a statewide network of economic development partners. OIBD continually refines its programs, services, and best-in-class networks of international contractors to promote Pennsylvania as a prime investment location for international companies and increase market access for Pennsylvania goods and services.

Program at Work:

Foreign Direct Investment (FDI): Pennsylvania is a leading destination for foreign direct investment; foreign-owned companies have 5,628 locations and employ more than 365,000 people. In the past year, OIBD provided technical support to companies considering future expansion opportunities, including: a Belgian filtration solutions company in Beaver County, a British pharmaceutical components manufacturer in Clinton County, a New Zealand-based metal fabricator who identified a distribution center in York County and a contract manufacturer in Clearfield County, a Swiss medical device manufacturer in Chester County, an Irish specialized door manufacturer in Montgomery County, a French holiday chalet manufacturer in Lehigh County, a Canadian residential wastewater treatment equipment producer in Lycoming County, a Spanish bathroom fixture manufacturer’s distribution center in Montgomery County, a Swiss food processing equipment manufacturing facility in York County, a Dutch digital health company in Allegheny County, a Polish robotics software company in Allegheny County, a British roof and floor hatch manufacturer in Clearfield County, a Czech energy services company’s US headquarters in Lehigh County, an Italian food production automation equipment supplier’s service hub in Lehigh County, and a Chinese rebar mill in Beaver County.

- **Travaglini USA:** Travaglini purchased a building in the Lehigh Valley to house their US headquarters, warehousing, and sales/service operations. The company is a family-owned meat processing automation solutions designer and installer, headquartered in Milan, Italy. Founded in 1950, the company provides turnkey installation and service of refrigeration, smoking, drying, and aging systems for the production of sausages, hams, cheese, fish, and other meat products. Their work lies at the juncture of automation and food processing. Globally, the company employs 82 people. They plan for their US facility to employ 10 people to service equipment at the locations of two key clients in Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and plan to use the facility to further develop their U.S. market share.
- **Academy of Live Technology (formerly Backstage Technology):** The Academy of Live Technology (ALT) is a joint venture between Rock Lititz, Lancaster-based PA College of Art & Design (PCA&D), and the United Kingdom-based Academy of Live Technology at Production Park (formerly Backstage Academy). Opening in Fall 2024, students of the four-year program earn a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Live Event Design & Production from PCA&D and

gain immersive technical education at Rock Lititz. The creation of ALT was announced on 3/13/23. OIBD was first contacted by Backstage Academy in 2021 to ask how our office could support the initiative. OIBD later assisted with travel logistics, facilitating a meeting with the PA Department of Education, and attending meetings at Rock Lititz alongside PA Council on the Arts personnel. OIBD later supported the company with outreach to potential academic consultants for ALT, attorneys, and contacts within regional academia. Pennsylvania's UK-based Authorized Investment Representative also conducted a meeting at Backstage Academy in South Kirby, UK. Rock Lititz President & CEO Andrea Shirk reported this project will create 15-20 full-time jobs (between ALT and the PCA&D) and generate \$13 million in capital investment.

In summary, in FY2022-23, OIBD successfully attracted 19 new investors in Pennsylvania who project creating over 700 new jobs in the next three years. Additionally, OIBD worked with 70 existing investors on retention or expansion projects. This work is expected to retain at least 6,500 jobs over the next three years.

Export Program: In FY2022-23 OIBD's export program aided 643 companies, completed 1,098 projects, recorded 2,140 export actions (measurable and significant actions taken by client companies to expand their export business), and confirmed more than \$584.6 million in export sales assisted by OIBD. In FY2022-23, 27 client companies submitted success stories highlighting the value of OIBD's export program to their international business development efforts. Below are two examples:

- Actuated Medical (Bellefonte, PA)

Actuated Medical was approached by a customer in Canada with an interest in their NeuralGlider inserter. After much research into the certifications and associated electrical voltage requirements, they still had some uncertainty, so they reached out to SEDA-COG's International Trade Program. SEDA-COG connected them with Pennsylvania's Authorized Trade Representative (ATR) in Canada to confirm the certification requirements, entities involved, and ultimately, the voltage requirements. The research came back confirming what Actuated Medical had also uncovered; that the product needed to be certified or reconfigured with a different voltage. While the sale has not gone through yet, the assistance proved to be valuable and will be incorporated into their strategy moving forward.

Actuated Medical develops and manufactures a new generation of medical devices that incorporates motion technologies to improve clinical care and patient outcomes. They also offer contract manufacturing to medtech entrepreneurs and startups. <https://www.actuatedmedical.com>

- Baillie Lumber Company (Titusville, PA)

Baillie Lumber Company contacted the International Trade Program at the Northwest Commission with an interest in connecting with Pennsylvania's Authorized Trade Representative (ATR) for the ASEAN region (based in Singapore), for assistance in Thailand and the Philippines. The International Trade team at the Northwest Commission scheduled an initial call between the company and the ATR to discuss objectives for the markets and outline the proposed project work.

The ASEAN ATR conducted research for both Thailand and the Philippines and was able to identify a number of companies interested in meeting with Baillie Lumber Company virtually to discuss further. Weekly updates were provided by the ASEAN ATR team to show the progress of the outreach as well as work to schedule the virtual calls. In total, 3 meetings with potential partners in Thailand and 5 meetings with potential partners in the Philippines were arranged for Baillie Lumber Company.

Baillie Lumber Company has also been working with the Australia ATR office and has previously worked with the India ATR office as well.

International Partnerships/Visits by Official, Industrial Delegations: OIBD worked in FY2022-23 to welcome many delegations to Pennsylvania to strengthen international awareness of unique Pennsylvania expertise as well as business opportunities in the Commonwealth. OIBD worked with Duquesne University to identify a partner university in Taiwan with whom to form a collaboration regarding student and faculty exchange for English and Chinese language instruction.

OIBD and its partners across the Commonwealth worked to bring numerous business delegations to Pennsylvania. Working with target industry organizations, Embassies, Consulates as well as the Philadelphia Consular Corps and international chambers in both Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, OIBD welcomed more than 15 international business missions in Pennsylvania. The industries represented included life sciences, robotics, artificial intelligence, defense, food, education, and the rail and related technology. All these industries are strengths of Pennsylvania; it is essential to the mission of OIBD to ensure Pennsylvania gets international recognition for these assets on which Pennsylvania's continued economic growth depends. OIBD led these missions to a diverse group of areas around the Commonwealth, not just to the largest metro areas but also to Cambria County, Monroe County, Lancaster County, Lycoming County, Erie County, and beyond. All these visits help to create an awareness of Pennsylvania's unique business strengths internationally and have an impact on OIBD's trade and investment numbers.

The activities of the PA Tourism Office are designed to inspire and motivate travelers to visit the state who would otherwise not have done so – travelers whose spending supports PA jobs, provides income to our residents, and tax revenues that support critical government services at levels far exceeding the state’s investment in tourism marketing.

Pennsylvania hosted an estimated 192 million in 2022. These travelers injected an estimated \$46.4 billion into PA’s economy; generated an estimated \$4.7 billion in state and local tax revenues; and directly supported an estimated 307,110 PA jobs, and approximately 486,870 jobs in total when secondary impacts are included.

Program at Work:

Digital Marketing - The visitPA.com website reached more than 3.1 million site visitors in 2023. VisitPA.com delivers great results for PA tourism partners – with more than 4.5 million native ad impressions delivered. Advertisers who participated in video promotion on our pillar pages saw 50K+ pageviews and over 1,500 video plays.

The Happy Thoughts newsletter has 159,717 active subscribers who are looking for travel inspiration, deals, and planning tips. Nearly 3.5 million emails were sent with monthly trip ideas and inspiration, and another 1.9 million emails were sent with custom messaging from PA Tourism industry partners. These partners earned more than 58,000 clicks directly to their websites from these custom emails, allowing the Happy Thoughts newsletter to be a major referral source.

Social Media Marketing - The Tourism Office is committed to taking full advantage of the marketing opportunities and potential offered by social media. The Office views social media as an extremely cost-effective method to promote the state as well as specific destinations, events, and attractions throughout the Commonwealth, to a growing number of dedicated followers. Facebook is the largest channel with 220,000 followers, Instagram with 129,000 and 48,500 on X (formerly known as Twitter) and 31.8k monthly views on Pinterest.

State Travel Guide - The Tourism Office produces the annual travel guide, *The Happy Traveler*, which is 100% funded by advertising sales. The guide highlights Pennsylvania’s unique destinations, events, and attractions within the framework of the 11 tourism regions. The 2023 guide’s feature story tapped into the wellness in travel trend highlighting multiple resorts and retreat destinations throughout the Commonwealth. The printed circulation was 250,000 while the online guide receives 300,000+ page views.

Act 58 of 1996 Community and Economic Enhancement Act (along with 14 freestanding Acts, subsequent amendments and one Executive Order) established the programs clustered under the aegis of the GCLGS which provides technical assistance/training to local governments in a One Stop Shop fashion.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The requested budget is in accordance with the Governor's budget proposal.

7. Overview of the Program:

The mission of the Governor’s Center for Local Government Services (Center) is to be the principal advocate for local governments, to provide vital programs efficient and effective services to local officials and municipal employees, and to cut through the red tape expeditiously to solve problems at the local level. The Center provides legislatively mandated (Act 58 of 1996) assistance for local government units (LGUs, which include counties, municipalities, school districts, and authorities) across the Commonwealth. As the one-stop shop for all of Pennsylvania’s local governments, the Center offers LGUs a wide range of technical assistance involving experts in Finance, Management, Fire, Police, Land Use Planning, Intergovernmental Cooperation, Local Taxation, and Municipal Distress. The Center also collects and analyzes statutorily required Local Government Unit’s statistical data for the State Tax Equalization Board (STEB) to ensure accurate distribution of education funds to LGU’s. STEB’s primary purpose is to annually certify the Market Value (MV) of each school district and a Common Level Ratio (CLR) within a county. The MV is used by the Department of Education as one component in its calculation methodology for the distribution of education subsidies to each school district. In addition to education subsidies, the Auditor General uses the MV for other areas of statewide funding. The CLR reflects the percentage differential between the market and assessed values, which is used in appeals of assessments at the county level.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

The Center for Local Government Services provides staffing and support for all programs administered by the Center, in addition to the areas listed above. The Center also continually updates over 50 local government publications pertaining to all aspects of municipal government in Pennsylvania. The Center provides support for every single local government unit, employee, and service in the Commonwealth, along with constituent services to all Pennsylvania’s affected by Pennsylvania local government. The assistance to Pennsylvania citizens, governments, and officials is unparalleled and is highlighted by the Center’s Local Government Training Partnership which trains local government officials throughout the Commonwealth.

Program at Work:

The PEER Program

In recent years, because of the financial, staffing, and operational issues facing many small police departments, the trend toward regionalization has spread rapidly in Pennsylvania. There are now fully operational regional departments employing approximately 900 full-time and part-time officers, with more than 290 additional municipalities contracting from other municipalities for shared police services. Because of this recent trend, DCED has taken a more progressive approach to supporting and assisting municipal efforts to regionalize police, fire, and emergency medical services throughout the Commonwealth. Pennsylvania still has the largest number of municipal police departments in the country at 968 - with 616 (64%) of those departments having less than 10 officers. Consequently, DCED has and will continue to play an important role in helping to provide expert police information and public safety alternatives, mainly in the form of regionalization, to all the municipalities in the Commonwealth for many years to come. Chief Joseph L. Kirschner is the retired Chief of Police of Towamencin Township (Montgomery County) and a PEER. Chief Kirschner specifically, has conducted 26 regional police studies in 19 different counties from the beginning of 2020 through 2023. These studies, and the recommendations and technical assistance later provided by DCED, have resulted in the formation or current development of 14 new regional police departments (a 54% success rate) in Pennsylvania. Chief Kirschner began working with DCED (then DCA) as a police peer consultant in 1988. Since that time, he has conducted 58 regional police studies throughout the Commonwealth.

The Local Government Capital Loan Program- Black Creek Township, Luzerne County

Black Creek Township, Luzerne County, owns 32.63 miles of roadway and had to rent an excavator to maintain its roads, ditches, culverts, etc. Through the Local Government Capital Project Loan Program, they received a \$38,669 loan with an interest rate of 2% to aid in purchasing an excavator. With the purchase of this equipment, they were able to save costs

by no longer renting. Further, they were able to share the excavator with their COG to help with road maintenance in neighboring communities.

The Strategic Management Planning Program (STMP)- Ridgway and Johnsonburg Boroughs, Elk County

Ridgway and Johnsonburg, Elk County, are current participants in the STMP program. Ridgway and Johnsonburg's STMP plans each recommended that the boroughs hire a part-time code enforcement officer and a part time community/economic development coordinator. Through coordination of appointed and elected officials, it was decided that the two boroughs would enter into an intergovernmental cooperation agreement and hire full-time employees for each position, sharing the employees along with the costs through a joint Phase II STMP application. STMP will fund the shared positions for three years. By offering full-time positions with a competitive salary and benefits package, it increases the Boroughs' ability to obtain more qualified and skilled applicants for these important roles.

Working through their Act 47 Exit Plan, and with DCED and the Recovery Coordinator, the City of Johnstown exited Act 47 after more than 30 years of being in the program. When the City entered Act 47, it had experienced multiple years of large and increasing deficits, diminishing municipal services, and the prospect of not paying obligations to creditors and employees. At the time of its exit, Johnstown had greatly improved its management practices and fiscal situation. Operational deficits were eliminated, and the city generated a surplus six years in a row resulting in a reserve fund of \$6.9 million. With Johnstown on stable financial footing, the city is primed to continue its efforts to enhance the quality of life and economic well-being of its residents and businesses.

5. Legislative Authorization:

Municipalities Financial Recovery Act, Act 47 of 1987 as amended.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The budget request represents fund continuation for the Municipalities Financial Recovery Program (MFRP).

7. Overview of the Program:

Act 47 empowers the Department to declare certain municipalities as distressed and provides grants and loans through the Financially Distressed Municipalities Revolving Aid Fund to aid in the recovery process.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

Since its inception, DCED has provided aid to 32 designated distressed municipalities. Currently, four municipalities are designated as distressed. The newest distressed municipality is Newville Borough, Cumberland County, which was declared distressed in August of 2023. The level of technical assistance for Act 47 municipalities is extensive with intensive efforts taken to ensure that the health, safety, and welfare of residents are provided for, and that a plan is in place and being implemented in each distressed municipality. Ten municipalities financially recovered in 2023 and were able to exit Act 47: Franklin Borough, Mahanoy City Borough, Johnstown City, Hazleton City, Rankin Borough, Braddock Borough, Duquesne City, Greenville Borough, Aliquippa City, and New Castle City. In FY2019-20 DCED Secretary Dennis Davin petitioned the Commonwealth Court for the appointment of a Receiver for the City of Chester and on June 22, 2020, Judge

J. Andrew Crompton with Commonwealth Court granted the Order. On November 10, 2022, the Receiver filed a Chapter 9 bankruptcy proceeding on behalf of the City of Chester. That process is currently in federal court. GCLGS staff is also assisting several municipalities that meet the threshold requirements for Act 47 consideration. Although efforts are underway to resolve the fiscal problems of those municipalities short of Act 47, the remedies of the Act may become necessary in some instances.

Program at Work:

City of Johnstown, Cambria County

Working through their Act 47 Exit Plan, and with DCED and the Recovery Coordinator, the City of Johnstown exited Act 47 after more than 30 years of being in the program. When the City entered Act 47, they had experienced multiple years of large and increasing deficits, diminishing municipal services, and the prospect of not paying obligations to creditors and employees. At the time of its exit, Johnstown had greatly improved its management practices and fiscal situation. Operational deficits were eliminated, and the city generated a surplus six years in a row resulting in a reserve fund of \$6.9 million. With Johnstown on stable financial footing, the city is primed to continue its efforts to enhance the quality of life and economic well-being of its residents and businesses.

Borough of Newville, Cumberland County

In January of 2023, Newville Borough Council released a statement that discrepancies had been found in the borough’s financial reports. DCED began to work with the borough, and it became apparent the borough was in immediate need of cash to continue providing services to residents. With past due bills of \$1.0 million, and facing a 30% deficit, DCED moved quickly to bring the borough into Act 47. An emergency loan in the amount of \$800,000 was issued to continue providing vital and necessary services, and a Recovery Coordinator was appointed to begin work on a Recovery Plan. The borough will face hard decisions in the near future, but with the tools provided by Act 47 and technical assistance from DCED, they are on the road to financial recovery.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The requested budget is in accordance with the Governor’s budget proposal.

7. Overview of the Program:

The Program is administered by DCED. The process to apply for grant funding is very similar to the process counties use to apply for other grants administered by DCED. The key differences are the eligible uses of the grants and the reporting requirements. Counties must apply for funding between August 1st and August 15th each year. The amount of grant funding an individual county will receive is equal to the total amount of funding appropriated multiplied by the quotient of the county’s total number of registered voters as of the most recent primary divided by the total number of registered voters in all counties. For example, if the total appropriation is \$45.0 million and your county has 100,000 registered voters of a statewide total of 8.7 million registered voters, then your county would receive approximately \$517,000 in EIGP grant funding. (The quotient of 100,000 divided by 8,700,000 is .011494, and .011494 multiplied by \$45,000,000 is \$517,230.)

8. Program Performance and Impact:

In the election of 2022, 63 counties chose to apply for grant funding. Bradford, Crawford, Montour, and Susquehanna Counties chose not to apply. Keeping within the law that requires participants to report on expenses no later than 90 days after each primary or November election, counties that received grant funding worked with DCED to provide an accurate accounting of how the county used the grant funding to the following entities:

1. DCED.
2. The chairperson of the State Government Committee of the Senate.
3. The minority chairperson of the State Government Committee of the Senate.
4. The chairperson of the State Government Committee of the House of Representatives.
5. The minority chairperson of the State Government Committee of the House of Representatives.

5. Legislative Authorization:

Act 124 of 2018 establishes the Intergovernmental Cooperation Authority (ICA) for Cities of the Third Class.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The requested budget is in accordance with the Governor’s budget proposal.

7. Overview of the Program:

Act 124 of 2018 provides Harrisburg with the legal tools needed to continue to provide essential municipal services while fostering sound financial planning and budgetary practices. The ICA governing body powers and duties shall be exercised by a governing body composed of five members appointed as follows. One member shall be appointed by: the Governor; President Pro Tempore of the Senate; Minority Speaker of the Senate; Speaker of the House; and Minority Leader of the House. The Secretary of the Budget and the Director of Finance of the City of Harrisburg shall serve as ex-officio members of the board. Except for the Secretary of the Budget, all board members must be residents of the Commonwealth and must be either residents of the City of Harrisburg or have their primary place of business or employment in the City. The statute provides for administrative and operating procedures of the board, including for its ability to hire employees and appoint one advisory committee comprised of professionals engaged in municipal management and finance or other experts as the board deems necessary. The ICA is established to assist the City of Harrisburg in solving its budgetary and financial problems. Such assistance shall include avoiding defaults, eliminating, and financing debts and deficits, negotiating intergovernmental cooperation agreements, preparing required annual reports that describe the City’s financial condition and monitor its progress, establishing and maintaining a publicly accessible internet website, and adopting and publishing a records retention policy.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

Act 124 of 2018 appropriates \$100,000 to cover operating costs and expenses to the ICA under the condition that it holds its initial organizational meeting by May 1, 2019. The effective date of the Memorandum of Understanding approved by and between DCED and the Intergovernmental Cooperation Authority of the City of Harrisburg was May 8, 2019. A Second Amendment in 2023 extended the MOU to June 30, 2028. The MOU between DCED and ICA appropriates \$100,000 annually to cover operational expenses incurred each fiscal year beginning FY2019-20 and ending FY2027-28. The ICA continues to actively operate under provisions of the statute to serve as a financial oversight body of the City of Harrisburg as a successor body to the DCED and Act 47 Coordinator recovery plan operating under the authority of Act 47 of 1987, as amended.

Program at Work:

Funding for ICA operational expenses is in place to cover costs of the ICA board, salary and benefits of the executive director, and any other employee of the ICA. Investment earnings and any other money from the ICA are available to pay for operating expenses and will be included in the approved ICA budget to offset costs. There is the potential opportunity in the future for the ICA to engage in special studies, compliance/performance audits, financial audits, and any other third-party professional services focused assessment of City operations.

Loans for equipment are used to acquire dump trucks, police cars, front-end loaders, street sweepers, or other mechanized vehicles as well as data processing equipment. The program establishes priorities for projects that impact the health, safety, or welfare of the municipality residents, for financially disadvantaged municipalities, and for projects that involve intergovernmental cooperation.

Program at Work:

Black Creek Township, Luzerne County

Black Creek Township, Luzerne County, owns 32.63 miles of roadway and had to rent an excavator to maintain its roads, ditches, culverts, etc. Through the Local Government Capital Project Loan Program, they received a \$38,669 loan with an interest rate of 2% to aid in purchasing an excavator. With the purchase of this equipment, they were able to save costs by no longer renting. Further, they were able to share the excavator with their COG to help with road maintenance in neighboring communities.

The Strategic Management Planning Program (STMP) formerly known as the Early Intervention Program (EIP) was established to help Pennsylvania local governments address and improve strategic financial management. This program can also assist those municipalities that are experiencing fiscal difficulties in a timely and planned manner. STMP was established to assist municipalities with improving financial management planning and operational productivity. It provides matching grants to municipal and county governments to develop and implement multi-year fiscal plans. Also, the Early Warning System (EWS), designed as part of the STMP process, is updated annually to allow for more accurate and complete analysis of the 2,560 municipalities’ fiscal status and financial position. The EWS system is used to help to determine those municipalities most in need of financial assistance and to reach out proactively to them and offer the program.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

In FY2022-23, twenty-five STMP grants worth a total of \$2.2 million were awarded to one county, five cities, eighteen boroughs, and one township to undertake and implement multi-year financial and operational plans. Since the program’s inception in 2004, 343 municipal projects (40 counties, 127 cities, 128 boroughs, and 48 townships) have been completed.

Program at Work:*Ridgway and Johnsonburg Boroughs, Elk County*

Ridgway and Johnsonburg, Elk County, are current participants in the STMP program. Ridgway and Johnsonburg's STMP plans each recommended that the boroughs hire a part-time code enforcement officer and a part-time community/economic development coordinator. Through coordination of appointed and elected officials, it was decided that the two boroughs would enter into an intergovernmental cooperation agreement and hire full-time employees for each position, sharing the employees along with the costs through a joint Phase II STMP application. STMP will fund the shared positions for three years. By offering full-time positions with a competitive salary and benefits package, it increases the Boroughs' ability to obtain more qualified and skilled applicants for these important roles.

New Sewickley Township,

New Sewickley Township completed a Phase I plan after they transitioned their long-time police chief into his new role as township manager. The Phase I plan helped to develop a clear picture of the Township's finances, provide relevant recommendations for financial and operational stability, and offered guidance in current issues facing the Township. Many of the recommendations from the consultant were implemented even before the completion of the plan due to the urgency of the economic development occurring in their municipality. Located next to Cranberry Township, the fastest growing municipality in Butler County, the Township has faced a new influx of economic development that has begun to move into New Sewickley. Due to their outdated zoning, they are seeing valuable agricultural land transferring ownership to housing plans, commercial developments, and solar farms. They are currently working towards a Phase II application to provide funding for an updated zoning ordinance and subdivision and land development ordinance, along with a few other Phase I recommendations.

- Municipal Training - The Municipal Code Official Training Account is for education and training programs for municipal code officials and individuals employed by third-party agencies under contract with a municipality.
- PSU – Pennsylvania Housing Research Council - The Construction Contractor Training Account is for a Pennsylvania-based housing research center located at a land grant university for the construction industry. This assures that the program meets the needs of the construction industry - the education, training, and other activities which are provided by the housing research center, and which must be approved by its industry advisory committee.

- Department of Labor & Industry - The Uniform Construction Code Review and Advisory Council - The Uniform Construction Code Review and Advisory Council was established by the Pennsylvania Construction Code Act (PCCA). The Council consists of 21 members, with appointments made by the Governor and the General Assembly. The members represent industry sectors that participate in the various aspects relating to building - including building component design, construction, building code enforcement, and local government representation. The Council is charged with making recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, and Labor & Industry regarding proposed changes to the PCCA. The Council is also charged with reviewing the most recent triennial building code updates published by the International Code Council (ICC).
- DCED Administrative - The amount utilized by the Department of Community and Economic Development for personnel, program costs, and for other operational costs.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

This program provides extensive education to planning, zoning, and code enforcement officers throughout the Commonwealth on the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code. Also, necessary certification is provided through this training and certification process.

5. Legislative Authorization:

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) has allocated \$6.15 billion to Pennsylvania counties, metropolitan cities, and local government units to support COVID-19 response efforts, replace lost revenue, support economic stabilization for households and businesses, and address systemic public health and economic challenges.

6. Cost Assumptions:

County governments and metropolitan city governments requested funds directly from the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Local governments that are NOT metropolitan cities or counties – called non-entitlement units of local government (NEUs) – requested the funds through the commonwealth/DCED. The first tranche of funding occurred in 2020 and a second tranche was allocated in the late Summer 2022.

7. Overview of the Program:

Allocation of funds to NEUs is based on the proportion of the population in the NEU as a share of the total population of all NEUs. Local governments received funds in two tranches, with 50% provided beginning in May/June 2021 and the balance delivered approximately 14 months later.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

2,445 Pennsylvania municipalities received nearly \$1.0 billion in record time. That figure represents the overall ARPA allocation for Pennsylvania.

5. Legislative Authorization:

Appalachian Regional Commission Act of 1965 (40 U.S.C. App. § 1 et seq., as amended).

6. Cost Assumptions:

Each state is assessed an amount to support the federal ARC program activities. Pennsylvania's proposed share in the state budget year is estimated to be \$750,000.

7. Overview of the Program:

In the mid-1960s, Congress created legislation to address the persistent poverty and growing economic despair of the Appalachian Region. The federal Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965 established the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) to provide funds for projects in the 13 designated Appalachian states. These projects create thousands

of new jobs, improve local water and sewer systems, increase school readiness, expand access to health care, assist local communities with strategic planning, and provide technical, managerial, and marketing assistance to emerging new businesses. Projects are developed in concert with PA’s seven Local Development Districts and the program is administered by DCED’s Center for Strategic Partnerships (CSP).

Related Federal: ARC Technical Assistance (70229): This program provides federal grant funding to support the salary and operating costs for the DCED Center for Strategic Partnerships personnel. The CSP staff assists and advises the Local Development Districts (LDDs) and other non-profit groups and local governments in the submission and preparation of grant applications for construction and non-construction projects. In FFY2022-23, ARC approved \$426,354 in technical assistance funds to the Commonwealth.

For FFY2022-23, ARC invested \$14,095,771 in eighteen infrastructure projects which propose 1,920 jobs will be created or retained. ARC also approved 34 non-construction projects in FFY2022-23 totaling \$8,515,960. ARC funding supported 13 workforce development projects providing industry-specific training to over 5,037 individuals, preparing them to fill vacancies in High-Demand Occupations. Eight colleges and technical schools received funding to purchase equipment to train students and incumbent workers. Over 376 businesses will be improved through the placement of graduates from these programs, as well as by economic development strategies to be outlined in eight regional planning projects. Additionally, three of these studies will develop adaptive reuse plans thereby preserving and restoring existing buildings and trails. ARC funding was also awarded funds to 12 tourism projects which are projected to attract 4,220,500 visitors on an annual basis while improving 219 local businesses and creating 140 jobs. PA’s seven LDDs also received ARC funding to provide business assistance services.

Programs at Work:

Allegheny Shores Local Access Road Project (Allegheny County)

This project received \$1.3 million in ARC Local Access Road funds to construct an access road at Allegheny Shores in the Borough of Sharpsburg to address historic infrastructure barrier that have prevented communities from accessing the waterfront corridor and long-deterred redevelopment opportunities on this brownfield site.

The project involves the construction of .08 miles of roadway (to be called the Riverfront District Connector Road), connecting Sharpsburg Borough to a 52-acre waterfront site along the northern bank of the Allegheny River, approximately 5 miles south of the City of Pittsburgh. Within 3-years of completion, it is projected that the Riverfront District Connector Road will create 146 permanent, family-sustaining jobs. Upon completion of all phases, this former brownfield site is envisioned to be transformed into a 2.2 million sq. ft. mixed-use development including an innovation district for research and development, medical uses, affordable housing, 20+ acres of parks and open space, a marina, and a variety of hospitality, restaurant, retail spaces, and a planned hydroelectric power plant, bringing significant economic benefit to the area.

Moshannon Valley Training Center (Centre County)

This project was awarded \$300,000 in ARC funds to provide a centrally located facility where critical workforce training in the field of emergency services can be delivered.

ARC funds will be utilized to construct a new 9,350 sq. ft. Moshannon Valley Emergency Services Training Center (MVEMS) as the sole provider of training to new and incumbent workers of medical support teams in the region. The need to establish an EMS training facility was driven by two main factors: The closure of a centrally located hospital, which means

that patients need greater life-saving care while on longer ambulance rides to more distant hospitals and difficulty finding qualified staff.

Upon completion, it is anticipated that three communities will be improved with an accredited EMS Training Center which will certify 55 new First Responders and incumbent workers within the region while creating 20 family-sustaining jobs.

Cultivating the Agri-Culinary Industry in Northwest Pennsylvania

This project received \$663,699 in ARC funding to renovate new space for the Edinboro Market in northwestern PA, allowing it to expand its operations with a goal of building an “Agric-Culinary” destination. Opened in 2017, the Edinboro Market provides year-round access to fresh, local foods, an entrepreneurial marketplace for small farms and local food producers, and on-going training for farmers.

Construction will entail renovation of a 3,540 sq. ft. building that will double the retail space, add a café that functions as a classroom and shared-use kitchen in off-hours, and add dedicated space for aggregation and delivery efforts. The project will expand an existing, successful fresh food incubator and establish an education hub that promotes and supports new and established food and farming businesses. Additionally, the Market Team will increase programming to serve both adults and young people developing a roadmap to farming and food careers in northwest Pennsylvania.

It is projected that by the close of the project, 58 businesses will be improved with larger space as well as training to expand their businesses; 20 new entrepreneurs will open businesses; and two communities will be improved with greater access to nutritious foods.

Building a Competitive Workforce to Boost Semiconductor Manufacturing in the ARC Region

With an investment of \$1,400,000 in ARC funds, this project aims to build a competitive workforce in western Pennsylvania in the emerging market of semiconductor manufacturing, as well as address the critical workforce shortage in building information modeling (BIM), welding processes, and heating, ventilation, air conditioning, and refrigeration (HVAC-R) services. In partnership with the Tri-County Workforce Investment Board, the project will implement 41 new Advanced Workforce Trainings conducted by the Steamfitters Local Union 449 JATC in the Steamfitters Technology Center in Harmony, PA. The Mechanical Contractors Association of Western PA will provide connections to their members who perform industrial, commercial, and service jobs in the region and are committed to assist with identifying local workforce needs and referring workers who have completed training to contractors/employers.

The project will target 15 counties in western Pennsylvania and aims to serve 550 incumbent workers and trainees, while helping 525 program graduates secure employment, obtain higher wages, and/or receive an industry-recognized credential.

6. Cost Assumptions:

Estimated \$42.0 million in federal grants for power projects and \$13.0 million in area development projects awarded by the ARC and administered by DCED.

7. Overview of the Program:

ARC has approved DCED as a Registered State Basic Agency (RSBA) for the purpose of administering ARC-funded construction projects in Pennsylvania when either no other federal agency is available or willing to administer the proposed project or when the grantee requests that DCED serve as the administering agency. Following the award of a construction grant in which DCED has agreed to serve as the administrator, DCED will oversee the project and pass-through funds from ARC for costs incurred.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

The ARC program provides essential funds to make rural infrastructure projects feasible. These funds provide for water and sewer upgrades, expansion of broadband, and economic impacts to these rural areas. One project identified below has been completed.

Program at Work:

Southwestern Pennsylvania: The Twin Lakes Center in Somerset County has been providing drug and alcohol rehabilitation services since 1983. In an effort to expand their inpatient services, ARC funding was allocated to renovate and expand their center to add 5,000 feet of space. Twin Lakes will be able to serve an additional 472 patients per year and create 33 new jobs.

6. Cost Assumptions:

Funds for these programs are supported by federal grants. The Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) administers the HUD-funded programs and processes contracts for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) projects, however, the actual funds for these grants remain at the federal level and are drawn down directly from the federal treasury by the grantees. Since the federal dollars do not flow through the state treasury and are receipted by local municipalities, none of the funds for the formula grants in the Overview and Program Performance sections is represented in the Department's budget figures.

Beginning with the FY2019-20 appropriation, the Department allocates up to 3% plus \$100,000 of the funds, which are designated for state administration and technical assistance for CDBG grants. In June 2008, Congress authorized a one-time allocation under CDBG for the Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP 1), to address the housing foreclosure crisis. DCED received a second allocation of Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP3) funds in 2010. The Neighborhood Stabilization funds pass through the state treasury and are represented in the Department's budget.

DCED received two allocations of CDBG–Disaster Recovery funds totaling \$57.1 million. These funds are restricted to the 36 counties impacted by the 2011 flooding disasters caused by Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee. The CDBG disaster recovery funds also pass through the state treasury and are represented in the Department's budget for this program.

In May of 2022, the Department was advised that \$23.2 million was being appropriated CDBG-Disaster Recovery Funds for the impacts of Hurricane Ida. In September of 2022, HUD authorized an additional \$15.1 million which is limited to six counties impacted by Ida. DCED has submitted an Action Plan for the distribution of these funds to HUD.

DCED received an appropriation of CDBG-CARES Act (CDBG-CV) funding under three allocations totaling \$96.2 million. These allocations are intended to fund activities that prepare for, prevent the spread of, and respond to the Coronavirus. The first allocation was allocated using HUD's Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 formula methodology requiring DCED to utilize the Act 179 methodology for distribution to eligible counties, cities, boroughs, and townships. The second and third HUD allocations used two distinct formulas developed by HUD based on incidents of the Coronavirus and other factors determined by the Secretary of HUD.

7. Overview of the Program:

The Commonwealth lacks decent housing, adequate infrastructure, and economic opportunities for low and moderate-income individuals. The CDBG Program, also called the Small Communities Block Grant Program, provides federal funds to develop viable communities with decent housing and a suitable living environment, and to expand economic opportunities principally for persons of low and moderate income.

Over the years of this block grant's existence, DCED and its predecessor agencies have provided grants via a state-mandated formula to eligible cities, counties, boroughs, and townships that support activities to address these problems. Those activities are summarized in several categories:

- Water and sanitary sewer projects have alleviated significant, persistent problems experienced by Pennsylvania residents of small cities and rural areas. The lack of adequate water and sewer often force people in our rural communities to endure conditions that rival third-world countries. CDBG funds the necessities for potable water for drinking and cleaning, as well as public sanitary sewer systems and functioning on-lot systems.
- Rehabilitation of housing for low-and-moderate-income households upgrades and revitalizes the community's housing stock and provides safe, decent, affordable housing opportunities for the homeowners who reside in those structures.
- Construction and improvement of public and community facilities such as senior citizen and community centers which provide opportunities to increase the quality of life for low and moderate-income citizens.
- Provision of public services to vulnerable low- and moderate-income families.
- Economic development projects that bring essential job creation opportunities that directly benefit the employee and build local tax bases.

The CDBG Competitive component provides up to 12% of the funds to the smallest communities that do not receive an annual allocation via formula. The chart below shows the approved projects that support critical water and sanitary sewer improvements, impactful neighborhood streetscapes, slum/blight removal, and resiliency projects in very rural areas of Pennsylvania.

The Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008 established the Neighborhood Stabilization Program, which provided an allocation of funds subject to modified requirements of the CDBG program. Pennsylvania received just under \$60.0 million. The funds were used for activities to make neighborhoods more stable and sustainable. Those activities included the creation of financing mechanisms to purchase and redevelop foreclosed residential properties; purchase and rehabilitation of residential properties that have been abandoned or foreclosed upon; establishment of land banks; demolition of blighted structures; and redevelopment of demolished or vacant properties. An additional \$5.0 million was awarded to the Commonwealth in 2010.

There will be no additional activity under this program. The remaining funds will be transferred to the Community Development Block Grant Program as program income after HUD approval and used in the competitive set-aside.

In 2011, Pennsylvania was hit with two significant storm events, Hurricane Irene, and Tropical Storm Lee. The storms devastated parts of the Commonwealth and a presidential declaration was declared for 36 impacted counties. The Commonwealth received two allocations of CDBG-DR funds, just over \$27.0 million in April 2012 and another \$29.0 million in 2013. Funds may be used for housing rehabilitation, homebuyer assistance, housing development and other housing-related activities, infrastructure improvements, economic development, mitigation and resiliency projects, and planning and technical assistance activities for rebuilding communities that sustained damages from these identified storms.

Due to the impacts from the 2021 Hurricane Ida event, DCED has developed an Action Plan and determined uses and the method of distribution of funds. The plan details how the funds will be allocated to address remaining unmet needs in the following Pennsylvania counties: Bedford, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Montgomery, and York. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has allocated a total of \$38.3 million in Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funding to the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) to support long-term recovery efforts following the remnants of Hurricane Ida, FEMA-4618-DR. The total allocation was

provided in two tranches: \$23.2 million from the Disaster Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022 (Public Law 117-43); and \$15.1 million from the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2023 (Public Law 117-180). The Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) is the recipient and administrator of CDBG-DR funding for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Action Plan for the initial funding was published on November 10, 2022.

In the Action Plan submitted to and approved by HUD, \$9.1 million has been set aside to purchase properties subjected to repetitive or severe repetitive flooding or other properties impacted by the storm event. This is a voluntary acquisition program. Properties purchased through the Buyout Program will be demolished and the land converted to greenspace in perpetuity in accordance with 44 CFR Part 80. Approximately 11% will be allocated to infrastructure programs. This distribution is consistent with data used by HUD to allocate the funds to Pennsylvania in which unmet housing damage need represents 80% of the allocation, 12% is represented by unmet infrastructure needs and the remainder is attributable to economic revitalization needs. DCED is choosing not to allocate funds to economic revitalization needs. Consistent with the Notices, DCED will dedicate \$5.0 million toward mitigation projects which may include a variety of planning, housing, and infrastructure projects as well as providing support for adopted state and local Hazard Mitigation Grant Plans (HMGP). These funds will be used to support the integration of resilience measures into residential, institutional, and public facilities which benefit the broader community. DCED is defining the amount available for program allocation to be \$32.1 million, which is net of the 5% administrative allowance and the HUD-specified amount of \$5.0 million reserved solely for mitigation purposes.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

Since FY2018-19, the program has experienced a minor increase in the annual allocation. Continued vigilance is needed to sustain even funding levels. These critical community improvements funded by CDBG are effective and with flexible community economic development and housing tools, enable communities to address a variety of significant local needs. The impact of these funds has revitalized a significant portion of Pennsylvania with nearly half of a million people who have benefited from the projects.

The CDBG competitive program provides essential funds to make rural infrastructure projects feasible. These dollars generally make the monthly water and sewer rates affordable or cover the initial hookup costs for seniors and other low- and moderate-income homeowners.

City of Lock Haven, Clinton County

Project: Lock Haven Skatepark

Awarded: \$856,190

The City of Lock Haven built a skate park in Hoberman Park using exclusively \$856,190 of CDBG – CV discretionary funds. To complete the proper updates to the skatepark, city staff led a community engagement process with the help of the American Ramp Company. The final design showcased a plaza layout, unique ramp elements, and a bowl. The location and uniqueness of the Lock Haven Skatepark make it a vital component of the city’s recreation network. It is

the only skatepark within the City of Lock Haven and the only public facility within a 30-minute radius of the city. This is crucial because of the park's proximity to low-income housing units owned by the Clinton County Housing Authority. Youth living in these units do not have access to large backyards and often socialize at Hoberman Park and the Lock Haven Skatepark. By improving the skatepark and realizing the benefits, the city was able to encourage more residents to explore new interests and expand their current skills.

5. Legislative Authorization:

CSBG Authorization comes from The Community Services Block Grant Act, Title VI, Subtitle B, of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, P.L. 97-35, Public Law 105-285: The Community Opportunities, Accountability, and Training and Educational Services Act of 1998 (Public Law 105-285), and The Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 [original legislation that established Community Action Associations (CAAs)].

6. Cost Assumptions:

Funds for this program are supported by the federal Community Services Block Grant.

7. Overview of the Program:

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program provides funds primarily to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) for the revitalization of low-income communities and the empowerment of low-income families and individuals to become self-sufficient. The Commonwealth's goal for the CSBG Program is to reduce poverty in its communities by supporting the catalytic efforts of local eligible entities with training and technical assistance, program support, and assessment to help them achieve operational success. Program activities supported by CAAs include a variety of community and economic development strategies such as: income and economic asset building, education and skill development, housing

assistance, access to health care and other needed social services, supportive networks, facilitation of client resourcefulness, and leadership abilities. 90% of the funds are required to be distributed to the current 43 CAAs and Limited Purpose Agencies to maintain operational costs and for innovative community and program activities. 5% is allowed for state administration. The remaining 5% is utilized for competitive projects within the CSBG network that extend above and beyond the normal everyday operations, create opportunities for partnerships and capacity building, and provide catalytic movement to address poverty issues.

In the calendar/program year 2022, the CAAs leveraged an additional \$663 million to assist 475,856 low-income constituents. This is \$21.06 for every CSBG dollar expended. The leveraged amounts are derived from these sources:

- 70% Non-CSBG federal funds
- 16% State funds
- 11% Private funds
- 3% Local public funds

The FFY2022-23 allocation to DCED was \$ 31.5 million.

Pennsylvania’s CSBG ‘s 2021 results included:

- 1,206 unemployed, low-income persons obtained a job at or above a living wage.
- 477 persons obtained an increase in employment income and/or benefits.
- 421 persons obtained pre-employment skills and competencies required for employment and received training program certificates and/or a diploma.
- 10,521 organizations, including government entities, for-profit businesses, and financial institutions worked in partnership with CAAs to promote family and community outcomes.
- 693,123 hours were volunteered to CAAs.

Program at Work:

Bucks County Opportunity Council: BCOC Emergency Services has long included financial assistance for low-income households facing a transportation crisis such as car repair, inability to afford car insurance, or no funds for gas to get to work and/or school. BCOC also administers a Wheels to Work program in which reliable donated vehicles are given to those involved in BCOC case management programs. While these supports are crucial, especially for working families, they are targeted to households with a vehicle or those involved in long-term programming. To address the greater needs across the county, BCOC designed a 3 phase Transportation program. Phase 1, implemented in 2022, included existing programming being expanded to include Uber gift cards for people without a vehicle to get to work. Phase 2 or the Lyft Ride Share Program, also implemented in 2022, included hiring a Transportation Coordinator whose role is to schedule Lyft rides for BCOC clients without transportation, but with a transportation need relating to education or employment. This required a BCOC/Lyft partnership to be developed, which allowed for ease of scheduling rides - eliminating any additional requirements on the client’s part such as a Lyft app on their phone. Phase 3, implemented at the very end of 2022, includes a new MH Transportation Concierge program. This program provides MA/Health Choices individuals timely access to transportation services that are not covered by the Medical Assistance Transportation Program (MATP). Funded by a multi-year grant, the MH Transportation Concierge program accepts referrals from Bucks County Mental Health providers.

Fayette County Community Action Agency, Inc. Fayette County Community Action Agency, Inc. (FCCAA) expanded its Financial Education and Coaching Initiatives through increased utilization of its Financial Opportunity Center (FOC) by having a devoted full time Financial Coach available for all our families that are served at our agency in any financial capacity. A FOC is designed to help disadvantaged families and individuals realize lasting economic stability. The Center enables people to make positive behavior changes that will ultimately improve their lives and the lives of their families. The core elements of the Center are financial education and coaching/counseling, employment services, public benefits access, and the bundling of services. The FOC serves as a one-stop center that helps residents learn financial management skills; increase their abilities and confidence in managing finances; manage debt; secure credit and build assets; build budgets; access a quality education or training; earn sustainable-wage employment; obtain health care; find and maintain quality, affordable housing; access home-buyer information courses; access public benefits; and ultimately become self-sufficient. The FOC is modeled after the LISC (Local Initiative Support Corporation) model. The Financial Opportunity Center promotes civic involvement and leadership to each of its clients by equipping and empowering clients to become self-sufficient. Initially, the FOC will first ensure that each client's basic needs are met. Then, coaches will work closely with each client to determine what services are needed to help that client achieve self-sufficiency. Often, these services include education or employment-related programming. Services also include rental stabilization and homebuyer information. By helping each client transition from financial insecurity to financial security, the FOC will also be equipping and enabling clients to become involved members of the community. Workshops have been established and will continue to be developed to help our clients achieve financial stability by enhancing their workplace skills and grow their financial future. These include regularly scheduled Instructor-led small group workshops using financial literacy resources (Hands On Banking, Your Money/Your Goals Toolkit, FDIC Money Smart, Bank of America Better Money Habits, GCFLearnFree.org); instructor-managed independent courses (Accenture, Khan Academy); and remote workshops.

6. Cost Assumptions:

Funds for these programs are supported by federal grants. Personnel costs are a combination of employees in authorized positions assigned to the Weatherization programs and employees assigned to other programs. Costs for employees initially assigned to other programs are charged to the Weatherization programs by SAP hard codes or time sheets.

7. Overview of the Program:

From its inception in 1977, the annual DOE Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) has served the Commonwealth by providing energy conservation and weatherization services to low-income families. Funding for this program is provided by the federal Department of Energy (DOE) and the funding averages \$15.0 million per year. Services are provided through

a statewide network of 34 sub-grantees (non-profits, local governments, and local housing authorities). WAP is intended to increase the energy efficiency of owner or renter-occupied, low-income housing through the addition of energy-conservation measures to the building envelope. This includes the installation of weather-stripping, insulation, application of caulking, the repair or replacement of furnaces, windows, or doors, and the education of clients about energy savings practices. Program benefits include the reduction of client residential energy costs, the safeguarding of client health and safety, and improved living conditions. The federal DOE's Standard Work Specifications for Home Energy Professionals are required for all completed work. Quality Control Inspector Certification is also required for all final inspections.

The Annual DOE program allows an average unit cost of \$8,009. A permanent reduction of energy expenses helps weatherization recipients become more self-sufficient and better able to manage their utility costs. Low-income families that receive weatherization assistance have a lower rate of default on their utility bills and require less emergency heating assistance. Nationally, on average, weatherization reduces heating bills by almost 30%, and overall energy bills by almost \$300 per year depending on the type of fuel and the current fuel prices.

9. Program at Work:

Mr. and Mrs. McIntyre live in Bedford County with their two sons. Their home required a significant amount of work to make it more comfortable and energy efficient. A combination of programs assisted this family. Center for Community Action utilized a combination of LIHEAP Crisis, Whole Home Repair program, utility, and DOE funds to assist this family with their heating needs and make sure their health and safety were maintained. This home received a new hot water boiler after a LIHEAP Crisis referral was received in Spring 2023. The home was assessed for weatherization services however, widespread electrical and moisture issues were identified which would have made weatherizing this home

impossible. Center for Community Action evaluated the down spouting, plumbing issues, and found knob and tube wiring throughout this home built in the 1930s. Additionally, the electrical service needed an upgrade from 100-amp service to 200-amp service. The Whole Home Repairs program was a perfect resource to alleviate the many issues found in the home, preventing weatherization. The home received home repairs to include seven window replacements, a sump pump was installed, gutters and downspouts were replaced and the railing on the front steps was replaced. The utility program installed a bath fan, provided a freezer, a dryer vent, smoke, and CO alarms were installed. DOE weatherization was then able to provide insulation in various areas of the home. The air leakage decreased drastically in the home after all this work. Although the DOE funds invested in this home were limited to only about \$3,000, in total over \$37,000 was spent to make this home more habitable, safe, and energy efficient. The family was thrilled with the repairs and upgrades and was thankful for the extensive work completed on their home.

Westmoreland County Housing Authority received a nice note from Ms. Kalp, an elderly resident of Grapeville. She lives on her monthly Social Security payments and is unable to afford regular maintenance and upgrades to her home. The rising costs of gas worried her, but the services provided proved helpful. Westmoreland County Housing Authority was able to make her home more comfortable and energy efficient by providing weatherization services which were completed in December 2022. Over \$6,500 of the DOE weatherization funds were spent on various measures to help her not only save money on her utility bills but also keep her warmer in the colder western PA winters. The weatherization agency insulated her attic and walls, provided prescriptive air sealing based on blower door results, door sweeps were installed, a basement door was built to better seal off the conditioned space in the basement, a vapor barrier was added to the exposed dirt floor in the crawl space and her dryer was vented safely outside. Ms. Kalp said she loved the agency staff working on her home and the way they kept her informed during the process.

5. Legislative Authorization:

The “Decommissioning and Redevelopment Playbook Program for Decommissioned Coal Fired Power Plants” (Playbook Program) was created in response to an U.S. Economic Development Administration Grant Award under the POWER initiative.

6. Cost Assumptions:

No additional funding is requested.

7. Overview of Program:

The Playbook Program allows DCED to work with our partners to develop a set of redevelopment strategies for closed coal-fired power plants throughout the state. These properties are priority brownfield sites for the agency as they typically are large, industrial-zoned parcels with abundant legacy infrastructure, e.g., sewer and water, rail and road access, natural gas, and electric transmission. These reports are developed by a lead consultant working in concert with DCED and the property owner(s). The reports are a means to catalog and present a broad analysis of the various opportunities and issues that may be uncovered during separate or privately commissioned due diligence efforts. In turn, we are providing a single, publicly available report that could inform a wide range of potential redevelopment concepts. The reports are being referred to as “Playbooks” because once the site has been studied and the information synthesized, we are asking the consultants to recommend a series of at least three distinct redevelopment options – or ‘plays’ – that result from the findings of the analysis.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

This project represents the first step in a long process to redevelop these sites, and the impact is expected to be seen over time. To date, five reports have been completed and one more is in development. The impacts are unfolding in several ways but mainly in the number of site-specific inquiries from developers that DCED and our local economic development partners are fielding. The goal of the program is to spur interest in the sites as viable redevelopment options, and for each project completed DCED is connecting numerous interested parties directly with the property owners to begin a conversation about site redevelopment. These conversations between prospective development interests and the property owner are a necessary first step toward transformational redevelopment of the properties.

Program at Work:

DCED has completed one additional playbook for the Titus Station in Birdsboro, PA. That report was completed in June and there will be no further project activity for this grant given that the performance period concluded during the same month.

6. Cost Assumptions:

Funding for this program is supported by federal grants with a required 100% match for annual ESG allocations. DCED administers the HUD-funded program and processes contracts for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) projects. The Department uses a portion of the ESG funds designated for administrative purposes, which are shown in the financial amounts above.

The annual ESG award received by DCED is generally around \$5.7 million. The program allows for up to 7% of the award for administrative purposes which DCED splits in half with their sub-recipients of the program. DCED also takes \$200,000 out of the total allocation to support the implementation of a Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to meet data collection and reporting requirements prescribed by HUD.

7. Overview of the Program:

The Emergency Solutions Grant previously focused on serving those experiencing homelessness through emergency shelters and transitional housing programs. Under the interim rule published in the Federal Register on December 5, 2011, however, the focus shifted toward programs aimed to rehouse people quickly in permanent housing, prevent a household from entering the homeless system, allow for services to be delivered where the household resides on the street, and support Emergency Shelter operations. The goal is for episodes of homelessness to be rare, brief, and a one-time experience.

The ESG Program has provided grants to units of local government that often subcontract with non-profits to provide services, but nonprofits may also be directly awarded if they are addressing a regional need and delivering services in more than one county. The following activities are assisted throughout the state:

- Street Outreach - Costs of providing essential services necessary to reach and engage unsheltered homeless people; connect them with emergency shelter, housing, or critical services; and provide urgent, non-facility-based care to unsheltered homeless people who are unwilling or unable to access emergency shelter/housing; or an appropriate health facility activity that provides services delivered on the street to persons living unsheltered.
- Rehabilitation, conversion, operational and essential services grants that provide decent, safe, and sanitary emergency shelter to house the homeless temporarily and provide the necessary case management to connect participants to mainstream resources and attain permanent housing. In the event that no emergency shelter is available due to a lack of facilities, or a shelter is at capacity, funding may also be used to pay for hotel/motel stays.
- Provision of rental assistance to provide short-term or medium-term housing to individuals or families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.
- Provide service costs that are necessary services for individuals or families that are homeless or at risk of homelessness to secure stability in permanent units. The services are limited to housing search and placement, housing stability case management, mediation, legal services, and credit repair.
- Provide financial assistance for individuals or families that are homeless or at risk of homelessness to secure stability in permanent units. Eligible costs are limited to rental application fees, security deposits, first and last month's rent, moving costs, utility deposits, and utility payments.

Data is collected and housed in the Pennsylvania Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) as required by HUD. DCED manages the HMIS system as the Lead Agency on behalf of the Eastern and Western PA Continuum of Care.

In the 2022 Calendar Year, the ESG Program provided funding to either subcontract or to provide direct street outreach, emergency shelter, rapid rehousing, and homeless prevention assistance to homeless or near homeless individuals and families. The intent of the ESG assistance is to rapidly transition program participants to stability, either through their own means or through public assistance, as appropriate. Funding provided under ESG is neither intended to provide long-term support, nor will it be able to address all the financial and supportive service needs of individuals and families. Homeless individuals were served through street outreach, emergency shelters, or assistance with placement into permanent housing using ESG funding.

6. Cost Assumptions:

Funds for this program are supported by a federal grant. Under the process HUD uses to fund most of its state-administered programs, the Department processes contracts for HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program projects. However, the actual funds used for these grants remain at the federal level and are drawn down directly from the federal treasury by the grantees. Since no federal dollars go to the state for these contracts, none of the grant funds for the activities listed in the Overview and Program Performance sections is represented in the Department's budget.

7. Overview of the Program:

Pennsylvania has an inadequate supply of decent, affordable housing for low-and-moderate-income households. The HOME program is the primary source of federal funds for the development and improvement of housing options for these households. DCED also works in partnership with the PA Housing Finance Agency (PHFA) to coordinate the delivery of these funds. Over the 20 plus years of this program's existence, the HOME program has provided grants to eligible cities,

counties, boroughs, and townships to be used for homeowner rehabilitation, homebuyer, and rental housing units. Benefits of those activities include:

- Rehabilitation of housing for low and moderate-income households’ upgrades and revitalizes the community’s housing stock.
- Homebuyer assistance helps people acquire homes and build assets that promote their own self-sufficiency as well as promote the sustainability of their community.
- Development of rental housing units provides households with opportunities for affordable housing and/or improves the quality of life for those tenants, especially those with special needs.

These housing activities improve the built environment and provide safe, decent, affordable housing opportunities for the Pennsylvania residents who live in these structures. In more recent years, DCED has expanded the eligible applicants for certain HOME activities to allow for the participation of HUD grantees who receive a small allocation of annual funding and any HUD grantee who propose projects that will be owned, sponsored, or developed by certified Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO). These efforts have helped to expand the role of CHDOs in their communities across the Commonwealth and expand or preserve the supply of affordable housing.

DCED received an appropriation of HOME American Rescue Plan Act (HOME-ARPA) funding in the amount of \$73,094,403. These funds will support acquisition rehab and development of affordable housing and non-congregate emergency shelter as well as supportive services. The Department will prioritize non-participating jurisdictions with the funds to target rural areas of the Commonwealth.

The HOME Program continues to seek projects that target communities and leverage resources to make impactful investments, and the program will prioritize funding based on activities that expand the availability of affordable housing in communities, preserve affordable housing, and support community housing development organizations to revitalize their neighborhoods.

Program at Work:

Franklin County, First Time Homebuyers Project: Franklin County completed two single-family homes designed for First Time Homebuyers. Through more than \$500,000 in HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) funds made available by the Department of Community & Economic Development (DCED) and \$250,000 in private funds, the housing environment was improved through the availability of these additional new, safe, affordable housing units.

In partnership with DCED, Franklin County Commissioners contracted with the Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) known as Luminest, to bring these homes to life. The process involved identifying suitable siting locations in the Borough of Waynesboro, removing existing blighted structures, and preparing the sites for rebuilding. Once accomplished, Luminest guided the building of these two 1,300 sq.ft. homes which include three bedrooms, one and one-half bathrooms, a living area, and a kitchen with an eating area.

These units complement the neighborhood’s architectural design with their two-story elevation, durable vinyl siding, and inviting front porch. The homes were designed with numerous energy-efficient measures including insulation, windows, doors, lighting, appliances, and HVAC units, reducing the cost of ownership.

The owners will benefit from the walkability to the nearby business district, services, and schools. Within a short drive, additional amenities include shopping centers, grocery stores, restaurants, and healthcare centers. Local Police and Fire are close by, as well.

7. Overview of the Program:

The function of these programs is to facilitate the manufacture of factory constructed housing and buildings through a regulatory system established for the mutual benefit of the public, industry, and local municipalities across the Commonwealth.

Manufactured Housing Program

DCED functions as the State Administrative Agency, in cooperation with HUD, to oversee performance of the 11 manufacturing plants and over 300 retailers of manufactured housing doing business in the Commonwealth. This program is based on a national building code that is often referred to as the "HUD Code." This program is funded by HUD through label fees collected from the industry.

Relocated Manufactured Housing

DCED provides guidelines for the habitability and installation of relocated manufactured homes. The division continues to provide training to local authorities who inspect manufactured home installations.

Industrialized (Modular) Housing and Buildings Program

DCED staff serves as the regulatory agency for industrialized (modular) residential and commercial construction based on state legislation. This program establishes the building standards and procedures to provide regulatory oversight of the construction of modular homes and buildings. As a result, the program assures the quality and code compliance of these

homes and buildings to ultimately facilitate the use of modular housing and buildings throughout the Commonwealth. The program is funded by insignia fees collected from industry.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

DCED under the Industrialized Housing Act is authorized to promulgate rules and regulations to interpret and make specific provisions of the act to assure the health, safety, and welfare of the people of the Commonwealth by requiring safe and sanitary industrialized housing and buildings. This includes provisions imposing requirements reasonably consistent with recognized and accepted model code to provide parity with conventional housing and buildings constructed under the Pennsylvania Construction Code Act.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The requested budget is in accordance with the Governor's budget proposal.

7. Overview of the Program:

Keystone Communities is a vital tool to assist communities that have the leadership to pursue and effectuate development opportunities. It is at the nexus of community and economic development and is the financing tool that helps to integrate community and economic development efforts. The program encourages the creation of partnerships between the public and private sectors that jointly support local initiatives such as the growth and stability of neighborhoods and communities; social and economic diversity; and a strong and secure quality of life. Communities may be designated a Keystone Community, a Keystone Main Street, a Keystone Elm Street, or a Keystone Enterprise Zone and receive priority consideration for funding in addition to advanced technical assistance and training. Additional grant funding is available to all communities, including designated communities, for façade programs, planning, implementation of the five-year strategy, accessible housing programs, and public improvement projects. Funds are also provided for grant-to-loan projects to assist with redevelopment projects including those within designated Keystone Enterprise Zones. The grant-

to-loan projects serve as seed funding for revolving loan funds to help communities long after the original grant funding is provided. Communities will need to find additional partners and funding sources to compete successfully for grants provided through the Keystone Communities program.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

In FY2022-23, 51 total projects were approved for a total of \$7,871,430 expecting to complete 187 façade projects, assist in the construction of 74 housing units, improvements to five buildings, and assist in the accessible modifications necessary for 160 units. The overall program awards are expected to leverage \$40,158,997 with \$21,065,477 from private sources.

Program at Work:

Mon Valley Initiative

The Braddock Church Residences is a mixed-income housing redevelopment project located in Braddock Borough, Allegheny County. The former First United Presbyterian Church of Braddock, a vacant property, will be renovated into eight units of rental housing, five of which will be marketed to tenants below 80% AMI with one of these units developed to ADA standards. The 13,000 sq. ft. church was deemed a historic structure in 2020 and proposed renovations will follow the appropriate protocols to maintain these standards. The total project cost is \$2,368,152 with a mix of state, federal, and private commitments totaling \$2,018,152.

City of Warren

The City of Warren will loan funds to DewBoi Property, LLC to renovate the former Brick House Bar on 219 Liberty Street, a building that has been vacant for 20 years and has become a blighted structure in severe disrepair. DewBoi Property LLC purchased this building and four adjacent vacant buildings with plans to renovate them into a cohesive whole for reuse as a boutique hotel, affordable housing units, studio apartments, retail and office space, a restaurant/bar, and a cafe. Funds will be processed as a grant-to-loan for DewBoi Property LLC to begin initial rehabilitation activities at 219 Liberty Street including roof replacement, facade restoration, interior fit-out, security and phone system equipment and wiring, environmental remediation, and signage. DewBoi Property, LLC will repay the loan to the City which will then oversee a Revolving Loan Fund to assist similar type projects in the future within the downtown. The total project cost is \$610,084 with \$427,059 in private investment.

7. Overview of Crisis Interface Program:

LIHEAP funds are distributed by the US Department of Health and Human Services through the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS), which allocates them to the Department. DCED manages the Crisis Interface and Weatherization Assistance Program services through the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) network of 35 non-profit agencies, housing authorities, and local governments. The Crisis Interface responds to emergency situations throughout Pennsylvania. These emergency situations include frozen pipes, broken heating equipment, leaking lines that must be repaired, and heating systems that might require replacement. Once Crisis Interface concludes in April or later depending on available funding via DHS decision, any balance of DCED LIHEAP funds are used for standard WAP services. Additionally, these funds were used in the Deferral Program. Also, a Pilot Clean & Tune Program and a Pilot Cooling

Program were created and launched. Refer to the Department of Energy (DOE) Weatherization immediately following this LIHEAP presentation for details on the WAP.

9. Program at Work:

Mr. Brown lives in the York County area. In FY2022-23, Mr. Brown was referred to the weatherization agency, York County Commissioners, to receive LIHEAP Crisis assistance for his heating system which was a gas steam boiler. By March 2023, the gas boiler was replaced because the old one was broken beyond repair. Mr. Brown expressed interest in receiving weatherization services, but his home was not able to be weatherized due to asbestos. When there is suspected asbestos in the home, the traditional blower door guided air sealing can't be conducted due to the danger of disturbing the toxic asbestos. Mr. Brown was referred for professional asbestos remediation which was provided by a subcontractor for York County Commissioners and funded through the LIHEAP Deferral Program. The asbestos remediation was completed by

April 2023. Mr. Brown's home was then weatherized with DOE Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funds. Weatherization services provided included caulking, air sealing, insulation, pipe wrap, fixing broken glass, and replacing CFL lightbulbs with LEDs. A total of approximately \$23,000 was invested into this home with a combination of programs supported by both LIHEAP and DOE BIL funds. Mr. Brown sent a thank you to York County Commissioners stating that this work "lifted a tremendous weight off his shoulders."

Ms. Kretz lives in Erie. She has been assisted with the LIHEAP programs for the last three years. Over the years, approximately \$1,600 has been spent on her home to make sure she is warm in the winter and cool in the summer. Ms. Kretz has benefitted from the LIHEAP Clean and Tune Pilot Program and has been able to keep her natural gas heating system running smoothly with only minor repairs and an annual clean and tune. Erie County Housing Authority most recently provided a clean and tune in December 2022 during which they also supplied extra filters and a CO detector/alarm. In July 2023, the agency visited Ms. Kretz's home to evaluate her cooling needs. With the LIHEAP Crisis Cooling Pilot Program, Ms. Kretz received an Energy-Star rated window air conditioner with a cover. Ms. Kretz contacted the Erie County Housing Authority to thank them for their help. She explained that she has a terminal illness and can't afford the "extras" that these programs were able to offer.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The requested budget is in accordance with the Governor’s budget proposal.

7. Overview of the Program:

Main Street Matters will build upon the success of the Keystone Communities program in supporting downtowns, main streets, and surrounding neighborhoods. While Keystone Communities designation and funding have been flexible tools used for both community and economic development, the Department recognizes the need to update and make modifications to better support our regions. The Main Street Matters program will include the following changes:

- The addition of eligible cost allowances to provide operational support to designated Main and Elm Street programs. This support is intended to enhance organizational sustainability for the five-year designation and is expected to help them become more independently sustainable after exiting the designation program.
- Updating program match requirements to increase the ease of use for the program and be responsive to economic conditions.
- An increase of maximum grant request amounts in response to realistic economic conditions. A couple of examples below.
 - The façade program is currently limited to a maximum of \$5,000 per property. With the rising costs in both materials and professional labor, it is difficult to complete impactful projects. The problem is also exacerbated by the lack of contractors in rural areas where they find their time and effort is better spent on larger projects, leaving façade award recipients in a lurch to complete small-budget projects.

- Another example is the need for quality planning from the perspective of five-year strategies for designation, feasibility studies, blight plans, etc. Planning grants are limited to \$25,000 grant request which inhibits the grantees from fully developing the in-depth plan needed to address community issues.
- With more competitive dollars the program can:
 - Better assist overall larger developments or anchor buildings in communities.
 - Expand support to projects addressing accessible housing, affordable housing, and blight.
 - Support upper story re-use including current architecture/engineering/design documents for older buildings and zoning and codes-appropriate access and fire suppression systems

5. Legislative Authorization:

Act No. 161 (10/22/2014) amending Title 12 (Commerce & Trade) and Title 64 (Public Authorities and Quasi-Public Corporations).

6. Cost Assumptions:

The Pennsylvania Military Community Enhancement Commission (PMCEC) is funded from the DCED line-item appropriation 10274 titled “Base Realignment and Closure.”

7. Overview of the Program:

The PMCEC was established by Act 161 of 2014, as the latest effort in Pennsylvania’s long-term quest to sustain and enhance the presence of the Military in the Commonwealth. Since 1996, the PMCEC and its predecessor organizations have worked to reverse the trend of losses from the previous Congressional Base Realignment & Closure (BRAC) rounds.

The PMCEC is supported and represented in the State Legislature by the Lieutenant Governor and the Military Installation & Base Development Caucus, whose bipartisan, bicameral leadership also serves via four (4) voting members on the 16-member Commission. The PMCEC’s main mission is to institutionalize public-private partnerships that strengthen the position of military installations and the defense industrial base within the state to successfully insulate these military-supporting entities from future closures, funding losses, and workforce reductions, while simultaneously stimulating economic development and growth. This encourages the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) to add missions and devote contracts that will increase capability and capacity, not only by current Pennsylvania players but via future ones as well.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

According to the most recent (FFY2022) *Defense Spending by State* report (published by DoD and analyzed by the Pennsylvania Department of Labor & Industry), defense spending in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania generates over \$36.7 billion dollars in economic impact and supports more than 201,340 jobs. Pennsylvania now ranks 8th nationally in total annual defense spending (\$17.9 billion), 8th in annual defense contract spending (\$14.3 billion), and 5th in terms of annual defense grant spending (\$295.2 million). While the fact that Pennsylvania is in the Top 10 and our position nationally has improved slightly since FFY2021 may seem encouraging, the reality is that Pennsylvania's national ranking has plummeted from FFY2014, when we ranked 6th in total annual defense spending and 5th in annual defense contract spending. Pennsylvania will only continue to lose further ground if we do not fight daily to recoup these devastating losses in funding, capabilities, and workers, while also actively and strategically investing to ensure we are best positioned to both anticipate and influence the execution of emerging missions and opportunities. Except for California, Pennsylvania has lost more family-sustaining military-related jobs because of BRAC decisions than any other state.

The efforts of the PMCEC are and must be, largely preemptive in nature to enhance the military value of the 13 major Pennsylvania installations to DoD and, simultaneously, the economic value to the local community and the Commonwealth. Federal defense funding is generally not available to support improvements to the areas or issues where the military installations and the local communities intersect. However, these are extremely critical areas that ultimately influence the real and perceived value of an installation to DoD and the community. As a result, PMCEC grant funding is targeted at Local Defense Groups (LDGs) associated with specific installations and their local communities. In FY2022-23, \$255,444 was available for grants and 100% of this funding was awarded for eligible projects. Allocations were as follows. (Please note that local needs and the pipeline of critical shovel-ready projects far exceed PMCEC's limited budget.)

Program at Work:

The Philadelphia Industrial Development Corporation (PIDC) owns most of the former Navy Yard. They control all common areas within the shipyard, which is now a mixed-use campus that has secure Navy sites within the privately-owned real estate footprint. Funds will be used for working capital planning studies for placement and future procurement of "connected" bus shelters. Although "connected" bus shelters are a necessity for the Navy Yard and were contemplated for deployment in the Spring of 2022, PIDC was approached by the Southeastern Pennsylvania Transit Authority (SEPTA) to participate in a planning study that SEPTA launched to examine all current and future mass transit routes. SEPTA want to bring public transit into the Navy Yard on a scale not seen in decades and commence that service in a phased, increasing manner commencing in 2024. Although the SEPTA/Navy Yard mass transit plan is very thorough, there will be significant dollars needed to refine the concepts into an actionable plan. The planned bus routes and new stops will create a more effective transportation corridor to link the Navy Yard and the larger campus with the community, its workers, and visitors.

Letterkenny Army Depot (LEAD) is protected by security cameras, most of which have been in place since 2006. The cameras currently in use are manufactured by AXIS and use China-made parts. Per the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), Section 889 Prohibition on Certain Telecommunications and Video Surveillance Services or Equipment, LEAD must replace these cameras pursuant to the Act. "Team Letterkenny," the Local Defense Group supporting this installation will utilize funds to purchase and install a new camera system, which will include low-light vision, pan/tilt/zoom, and motion-activated capabilities. LEAD's current infrastructure is outdated, hampering the use of newer equipment/technology, and cannot provide the necessary control of the video feeds. These will also be replaced. The project also includes the installation of a high-capacity Network Video Recorder (NVR) capable of storing video data for no less than 30 days; modernization of the police monitoring station, including an adequate number of monitors to ensure the highest video resolution/ability to view all installed camera feeds; and modification of the current monitoring station requiring a facility redesign. The project will result in increased force protection for the Army Depot, satisfy compliance requirements, and improve safety both on the installation and within the community.

5. Legislative Authorization:

6. Cost Assumptions:

Funds for this program are being made available through a federal grant. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released a Notice of Funding Opportunity in September 2023. DCED applied for \$2.5 million and anticipates receiving a determination from HUD in January 2024.

7. Overview of the Program:

Communities nationwide are suffering from a lack of affordable housing, and housing production is not meeting the increasing demand for accessible and available units in many urban and rural areas, particularly areas of high opportunity. Pathways to Removing Obstacles to Housing (PRO Housing) empowers communities that are actively taking steps to remove barriers to affordable housing and seeking to increase housing production and lower housing costs for families over the long term.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

DCED’s application targeted Monroe, Pike, and Wayne counties to pair public education on local housing issues and affordability with the development of strategic plans to address the issues while at the same time updating zoning and subdivision and land use plans and providing the funds to implement activities.

7. Overview of the Program:

The mission of the Recovery Housing Program (RHP) is to “Provide stable, temporary housing for individuals in recovery from a substance use disorder”. In Pennsylvania, these funds are being administered by the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) which is partnering with the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs (DDAP).

For the first allocation of funds, DDAP has recently passed regulations requiring all recovery houses/facilities that receive funding or referrals from the state to be licensed; the recovery housing/facility will be required to meet certain code compliance. The RHP funds will be used to assist recovery homes by paying for physical improvements.

For the second allocation of funds, DDAP will be partnering with Single County Authorities (SCA) to provide rental assistance to recovery homes. The RHP funds will pass through the state treasury and are represented in the Department's budget for the program.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

There are currently 12 contracts executed with recovery facilities under the first allocation, some facilities have multiple locations being assisted. Program performance and impact can be found under the Program at Work section. For the second allocation of funds, DDAP will be partnering with Single County Authorities (SCA) to provide rental assistance to 69 recovery homes. No impact data is currently available.

Program at Work:

The RHP program provides individuals recovering from substance use disorders with a safe and supportive drug and alcohol-free environment, which may include peer support and other recovery support services. We Have A Choice, a recovery facility that received RHP funding was able to upgrade its facility, with a new fire escape, ADA access ramps from all entrances of the building, ADA-compliant bathrooms as well as plumbing and sewer upgrades. During this time, We Have a Choice was able to assist 18 individuals in recovery.

5. Legislative Authorization:

The Whole-Home Repairs Program was established pursuant to Section 3002(1) of Act No. 1A of 2022 and Section 135-C of Act No. 54 of 2022.

6. Cost Assumptions:

The program was funded during FY2022-23 with \$125,000,000 from the General Appropriation Act of 2022 from the COVID-19 Response Restricted Account to DCED.

7. Overview of the Program:

The Whole-Home Repairs Program provides funding for county-wide agencies to work directly with qualified homeowners to address habitability and safety concerns, provide measures to improve energy or water efficiency, and to address accessibility concerns for individuals with disabilities. The program addresses housing insecurity and the climate crisis by

providing grant funding to county programs allowing for up to \$50,000 per residential unit in qualified repairs for homeowners and small landlords to support upkeep and weatherization. Additionally, the program requires a portion of the funding to be used by the counties for investment in construction related workforce development programs.

8. Program Performance and Impact:

The Whole-Home Repairs Program opened for applications on December 12, 2022, with applications due to DCED by January 31, 2023. A unique feature of this program is that the counties are awarded all funds up front. The first county disbursement took place on March 10, 2023, and all \$120,325,000 was fully disbursed to the county participants prior to June 30, 2023. Thirty-one (31) of the participating counties were able to open local Whole-Home Repairs Programs before June 30, 2023, which is a true testament to their dedication to addressing residential housing habitability, accessibility, and energy efficiency concerns in their local regions. As of June 30, 2023, the statewide group of Whole-Home Repair agencies had expended \$982,949 and obligated \$3,204,009 of their Whole-Home Repairs grant funds. Of this, \$513,885 was expended on administrative expenses and \$444,003 had been committed to local residential home repair workforce development programs, and \$2,533,106 had been obligated to 141 residential units resulting in an average investment into each unit of \$17,965.

Program at Work:

Girardville, Schuylkill County - A senior on a fixed income benefited greatly from the Whole-Home Repairs Program administered by Schuylkill Community Action. This homeowner has lived in his 1900s, 2-bedroom home for 30 years and has been unable to keep up with the required maintenance caused by a bad and leaking roof. Thanks to the Whole Home Repairs Program, this homeowner received a new roof, rain gutters, ceilings in the bathroom and kitchen areas, bathtub and shower surround, bathroom flooring, two GFCI receptacles in bathroom, kitchen ceiling light, dryer vented outside, bathroom door, interior handrail installed from the first floor to the basement, three new replacement windows, and all lead-based paint was evaluated and addressed in areas where the paint was in poor condition. The total renovation cost \$24,999 and was truly life changing for this individual. The pre-rehab valuation of his home was estimated at \$19,016.00 and now after renovations is estimated at \$37,766.00. Through this process, the homeowner has been referred to the local Weatherization Assistance Program to ensure energy efficiency in the home as the winter months begin. The homeowner was tremendously appreciative of the work completed knowing this is allowing him to age in place safely and comfortably.

Troy, Bradford County - A disabled senior military veteran received a \$16,515 grant from the Whole-Home Repairs Program to replace his well. The well caved in and the home's exterior water line was damaged leaving him without water for over three months. He lives solely on Social Security and could not afford to make the necessary repairs to bring water back into his home. The Whole-Home Repairs Program grant allowed the local Whole-Home Repairs Agency, Trehab, to provide a new well, new water lines to the home, and a new holding tank to replace the current rusted tank. Since being introduced to Trehab through the Whole-Homes repair program, the homeowner has learned about the Weatherization Assistance Program and has been referred to that program to address other energy efficiency improvements to the home.

NEIGHBORHOOD ASSISTANCE PROGRAM TAX CREDIT (NAP)

1. Legislative Authorization:

Article XIX-A of the Tax Reform Code of 1971, known as the Neighborhood Assistance Act (Act 48-1994) (72 P.S. §8901-A, et seq.) as amended. In July of 2007, Act 55, amending the Tax Reform Code of 1971, made several significant modifications to the program, supporting the efforts of the original Act. Act 55 increased the tax credit rates, increased the cap on contributions for a contributor/investor, extended the credits to businesses that do not pay corporate income tax but pass through their tax liability to individual members or stakeholders, and allowed for the sale or transfer of NAP credits.

2. Cost Assumptions:

Historically, the NAP was supported at \$18.0 million per year for tax credits however, in 2019, the total amount was increased to \$36.0 million (amended October 24, 2018, P.L. 675, No. 100). The funding for this program is not included in the budget. It is administered in conjunction with the Department of Revenue and authorized in the yearly tax code.

3. Program Overview:

The Neighborhood Assistance Tax Credit Program (NAP) is designed to encourage investment by business firms in neighborhoods that need revitalization or stabilization. This is accomplished through the award of tax credits to neighborhood organizations that propose projects in areas such as job training, education, crime prevention, and community services. The organizations, in turn, can provide the credits to businesses that make financial contributions to such projects under the regular NAP or Special Program Priorities (SPP). A portion of the tax credits is reserved for charitable food programs that address food insecurity issues as well as the Neighborhood Partnerships Programs (NPP) which are long-term projects in distressed neighborhoods. In addition, the NAP, through its Enterprise Zone Tax Credit, promotes qualified investments by private companies to rehabilitate, expand or improve buildings or land that promote community economic development and which occur in designated Enterprise Zones (EZP). The NAP, the oldest program of its type in the nation, has served as the model for similar programs in over a dozen states. NAP promotes public/private partnerships and leverages substantial amounts of private-sector dollars for programs that might otherwise have to be funded with appropriated funds, or not funded at all. Since 2016, NAP funds leveraged by corporate contributors total almost \$650.0 million.

4. Program Performance and Impact:

In FY2022-23, DCED awarded 213 agreements totaling \$36.0 million in Pennsylvania state tax credits according to the chart breakdown below. These approved projects covered 31 regular NAP projects, 14 Charitable Food Programs (CFP), 94 Special Program Priorities (SPP), 15 Enterprise Zone Projects (EZP), and 59 comprehensive Neighborhood Partnership Programs (NPP). Private contributions totaled \$106.6 million. DCED continued to prioritize funding to only those applicants that offered the greatest return on investment for the Commonwealth. In addition, targeted geographic areas were recognized. DCED also approved tax credits for Pennsylvania’s food banks due to the continued exceptional burdens they face during the challenging economic times.

to purchase a home, existing homeowners have tools and resources to maintain and stay in their homes and creates additional affordable housing opportunities in their neighborhood.

Lackawanna College – SPP

Tax Credit Amount = \$750,000

Leveraged Amount = \$1,000,000

To address the region's workforce development needs, Lackawanna College will establish the Center for Technology Innovation (CTI). The project site is a six-story building situated in downtown Scranton that required renovation prior to use as an educational facility. This new technology-based education and training center provides affordable degree and certificate programs in Robotics and Automation, Cyber Security, and Advanced Automotive Technology alongside Health Sciences degree and certificate programs. The CTI's Petroleum and Natural Gas Education Lab educates high school students about oil and gas industry occupations and provides an education pathway for students to enroll in the College's School of PNG degree and certificate programs.
