GENERAL GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

Program Narrative

The Department of State continues to accomplish its mission and seek ways to advance Governor Shapiro's goals to enhance Pennsylvania's services. The Department continues to strive to improve service to the public and enhance public safety while utilizing technological advances that facilitate access to public information.

Through these endeavors the Department continues to combat fraudulent charitable solicitations; strives to administer fair, accurate and accessible elections; as well as enforce and administer the Commonwealth's campaign finance and lobbying disclosure laws. The FY 2024-2025 budget will enable the Department to continue these efforts by conducting business in an efficient and effective manner.

Bureau of Enforcement and Investigations - Charities Investigation Unit

The Charities Investigation Unit (CIU) of the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigations focus is on investigation of charitable fraud. The CIU administers and enforces Pennsylvania's Solicitation of Funds for the Charitable Purposes Act. During the 2022-23 fiscal year, the CIU opened 348 new investigations and closed 489 existing investigations. This unit is essential to preserve the public's confidence in the charities that solicit funds in the Commonwealth. The requested appropriation gives this unit the resources needed to perform their vital role and protect the citizens of the Commonwealth.

<u>Safeguarding Consumer Safety - Special Investigator</u>

The number of assigned cases at the Department's Bureau of Enforcement and Investigations (BEI) has increased drastically over the last few fiscal years. Since 2019, the number of cases has increased by 68% resulting in significant increases in each investigator's caseload--from an average of 19 cases per month to 32 cases per month. Investigators are overburdened and, therefore, increasingly difficult to retain—investigator turnover has increased from 9% in FY2018-19 to 42% in FY2021-22 and 40% in FY2022-23. The understaffing and overworking impacts BEI's ability to serve and safeguard the citizens of the commonwealth as well as those who visit commonwealth licensed professionals or businesses regulated by the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs' (BPOA) licensing boards and commissions. The requested increase in complement will reduce caseload, mitigate employee fatigue, and make it easier to retain qualified and trained investigators. The FY2024-25 provides funding for one (1) additional Special Investigator position for six (6) months under the Bureau Enforcement and Investigations Charities Investigations Unit General Government Operations Sub-Fund.

Bureau of Elections

The Bureau of Elections is responsible for managing the development and continued operation of the Statewide Uniform Registry of Electors used by the 67 county election offices throughout the state. The Bureau serves both external and internal stakeholders in its mission to support election security, voting systems, voter registration, election management, public-facing and internal applications, and voting technology. Additionally, the Department makes its services available to limited-English proficient voters via its language access plan, which are a priority throughout the state.

The Bureau serves as the main driver of technological innovation and infrastructure maintenance for elections in support of counties, Pennsylvania's 8 million + voters, and key stakeholders. During FY2022-23, 37 schools participate in the Governor's Civic Engagement awards, where 31 of the schools earned gold level awards and six (6) earned silver level awards. Of the 37 schools receiving awards, 28 student poll workers were recognized, and nearly 3,486 students were registered to vote at the participating schools.

The fiscal demand on elections has increased dramatically since the 2020 election. Ensuring all needs are met, such as enhancements to basic IT infrastructure due to unknown initiatives and changes, equipment needs at county election offices, funding for election related litigation, or temporary staff for help with the clerical duties surrounding the increased activities related to the 2024 general election are important and result in a much-needed increase to the overall Bureau of Elections operating budget. The fiscal year 2024-25 budget includes \$1.5 million in operating funds to cover the various funding needs that are anticipated to arise as part of the day-to-day operating costs within the bureau. This bureau has relied heavily on prior year unused waivered funds to cover current year expenses to ensure it can meet its financial obligations each year. This increase in funds will allow operating in the upcoming year and transparency in spending.

Voter Roll Analysts to Preserve Election Integrity and Voter Security

The Department continues to have the utmost highest priority to support the Bureau of Elections' (BEL) efforts to promote secure and fair elections by ensuring the Pennsylvania voters are not disenfranchised. Currently, Bureau staff are often called upon to conduct investigations in two (2) principal scenarios. First, the Bureau must research repeat and unlawful voting through data received through its membership in ERIC, or is approached periodically by federal law enforcement officials or officials in other states to research alleged cases of unlawful voting and to provide copies of voting records and other potential evidence; or secondly, bureau staff are required to research information presented by outside parties as a result of county list maintenance activities (or lack thereof). Hiring two (2) full time Voter Roll Analysts to preserve election integrity within the Commonwealth and ensure voter security while furthering the Bureau's continued efforts will be an invaluable aid. The Department will be able to quickly investigate allegations of unlawful voting and timely refer any evidence of alleged unlawful voting to the appropriate law enforcement officials for potential criminal investigation. The fiscal year 2024-25 budget provides funding for these two (2) positions for six (6) months under the Bureau of Elections General Government Operations Sub-Fund.

Bureau of Campaign Finance and Lobbying Disclosure

The Bureau of Campaign Finance and Lobbying Disclosure oversees the functions of the bureau by ensuring campaign finance reports are filed and posted to the online website and makes all filed lobbying disclosure statement and expense reports public. During FY 2022-2023, the Bureau processed 13,650 campaign expense reports and campaign expense statements and a total of 1,181 new and amended committee registrations and authorizations.

Campaign Finance Auditing

Every two (2) years the department must issue a Request For Quote (RFQ) for campaign finance audits. These audits are required by law and are conducted through a ballot lottery held after each election. In the past, on average, annual audit costs ranged between \$25,000 and \$30,000. In 2023, the Department issued an RFQ that resulted in one (1) bid submittal with a cost of over \$100,000. In effort to obtain additional quotes for comparison at a lower cost, a second RFQ was issued and unfortunately, no bids were received leaving the Department to award the contract at the much higher rate than funds available within the fiscal year 2023-24 budget. To assist in covering those costs, waiver 23-43 was approved on August 1, 2023, to ensure that these funds were available to cover the increase in anticipated expenditures. In preparation for the larger ballot lottery to result from the 2024 presidential primary and general elections, the Department is requesting an additional \$112,000 to supplement the \$20,000 fiscal year 2024-25 cost to carry budget within the Bureau of Campaign Finance and Lobbying Disclosure General Government Operations Sub-Fund for this service.

Bureau of Notaries, Commissions and Legislation

The Bureau of Notaries, Commissions and Legislation's focus is to oversee the functions of the processing and compliance. The bureau serves commissioned notaries public, businesses, county recorders of deeds, individual constituents, and other stakeholders on matters relating to notarial acts, certification of commissioned officers, apostilles, and legislation. During FY2022-2023 the Bureau issued 825 gubernational commissions, 19,031 notary publics were commissioned, and 53,845 documents were certified.

Implementing Act 122 - Business Registration Attorney

Currently, a single attorney from the Department's Office of Chief Counsel (OCC) is assigned to provide counsel to the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations (BCCO); the Bureau of Notaries, Commissions and Legislation; and the State Athletic Commission. With the implementation of a new BCCO registration system and legislation requiring annual reports for all filing entities, the workload for this single attorney has become unduly burdensome. The implementation of Act 122 will require annual reports for all filing entities. This is a very large multi-year lift because annual reports also require administrative dissolutions as the penalty for not filing. This process will begin in 2028 and is estimated that up to 1 million currently registered businesses may no longer be active and will need to be dissolved. The additional attorney will provide the critical assistance that is needed to ensure quality and timely legal services to agency clients. More importantly, the new attorney will play an important role in developing and implementing the procedures for that process. Moreover, adding another attorney now, will allow OCC to create a seamless succession plan and ensure appropriate backup support for the current lead Deputy Chief Counsel position and would also, when needed, provide assistance to other staff attorneys on legal issues relating to human resources, procurement, contracting, the Right-To-Know-Law, and elections.

Administrative Staff Needs within the Department:

Office of Chief Counsel - Legal Analyst to Support Right-to-Know Requests

Currently, the Department's Office of Chief Counsel (OCC) has a single legal analyst within its office headquarters. This position's primary role is to serve as the Agency Open Records Officer for the Department of State. In that role, the legal analyst routinely tracks and handles in upwards of 500 to 700 Right-to-Know Law (RTKL) requests per year. Each request requires the analyst to record, send request to affected parties, gather all records submitted, search all records, issue final responses on behalf of the Department, prepare declarations to be used for RTKL appeals, and make sure that all documents are timely filed with the Office of Open Records—all within the deadlines required by the RTKL. This position will provide critical support to the Department's OCC and the Office of General Counsel's Main Office attorneys, especially in an environment of increasingly contentious litigation.

Office of Legislative Affairs - Legislative Aide to Support Increased Customer Service

The Department's Office of Legislative Affairs currently consists of a Director and Deputy Director and answers over 300 inquiries weekly all while conducting outreach to field questions from five (5) legislative oversight committees. Because of this volume of work, the office is unable to provide the level of customer service to members of the General Assembly that it would like. The additional staff person would allow for quicker and more thorough replies to the General Assembly, ability to assist with resolving constituent issues coming through the legislative office and to help to solve issues without escalating to agency bureaus.

<u>Bureau of Finance and Operations - Revenue Reconciliation Specialist to Standardize Reconciliation</u> Practices and Minimize Risk through Agency Internal Controls

The Department has begun to centralize revenue processing and reconciliation across the agency in an effort to standardize processes and create efficiencies throughout all bureaus with an accounts receivable area. The Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO) has absorbed revenue processing for the largest agency bureau, the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, however, to assume the remaining program areas, additional staffing is required to ensure that sufficient and timely completion of daily deposits and reconciliations can occur while addressing issues and anomalies as needed. In addition to the revenue and reconciliation duties, this position will be required to assist with any refund requests resulting from the Governor's Executive Order 2023-07. This position will be solely dedicated to the duties of the Revenue Section within the bureau. The centralization of revenue processing and reconciliation within the agency will create efficiencies in processes that are currently shown as somewhat deficient within our agency's Internal Control Plan. It also will allow the Department to respond to any refund requests in a timely manner.

The services provided under Voter Registration and Education, Federal Election Reform, the Statewide Uniform Registry of Electors, Lobbying Disclosure, Publishing Constitutional Amendments, County Election Expenses, Voting Citizens in Military Service, and Electoral College appropriations are also encompassed within the Elections and Commissions deputate.

FEDERAL ELECTION REFORM

Program Narrative

The Help America Vote Act of 2002, which was passed by the U.S. House on October 10, by the U.S. Senate on October 16, and signed by the President into law on October 29, 2002, provides funding to implement various election reforms including: voting system replacement upgrades, polling place accessibility and language accessibility and voter education. Legislative Citation: Help America Vote Act (HAVA), P.L. 107-252 (42 U.S.C. § 15301 et. seg.)

Election Security Grant - Voting System Technology

Since 2018, the Department of State has made over \$21.5 million in election security grant funds provided through the U.S. Election Assistance Commission available to county elections offices to improve the administration of elections for Federal Office, including enhancements to technology and make election security improvements. The most recent grant awards were distributed to counties for either the preparation of the replacement of the SURE Vote System, or to enhance their Election Security posture. The remaining funds are being expended directly by the Commonwealth for statewide efforts including Post-Election Audit implementation; election security and technology enhancements for the counties and the Commonwealth and other technological enhancements to improve statewide election administration and security. County and statewide spending for this grant is ongoing. To date, the Department has reimbursed County Election Offices approximately \$21 million towards these efforts.

PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

Program Narrative

The Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs' mission is to protect the Commonwealth's consumers through the administration of the professional and occupational licensing programs. The 26 licensing boards and commissions under this appropriation established by statute, ensure that professionals provide high-quality and safe services to the citizens of the Commonwealth. To accomplish this, these boards and commissions have been authorized to set standards for both initial licensure and practice, and to enforce these standards as well as those established by statute. This appropriation is funded solely from the fees and fines collected by the twenty-six licensing boards and commissions. Legislative Citations: Professional and Occupational Affairs 71 P.S. Section 279.1; 63 P.S. Section 1 et seq.; Navigation Commission for the Delaware River 55 P.S. § 1 et seq.

Military Occupational Crosswalk - Online Portal

Act 35 of 2022 was established to eliminate obstacles to licensing and employment for military personnel and their families. Since its enactment in January 2023, it has provided support to approximately 1,500 veterans, service members, and military spouses through its provisions, which include expediting application reviews and waiving initial licensure fees. Currently, the Crosswalk landing page, launched in February 2023, is presented as a collection of over 300 PDF documents on the DOS website, making it challenging for users to access the information effectively. The complex layout poses difficulties for both service members and administrators, thereby limiting the overall usability of the tool.

The Department seeks to acquire a hosted solution for a dynamic and informative portal website that fulfills the essential business requirements for the Commonwealth, military veterans, active servicemembers, professional licensing boards and commissions, employers, and the general public. The Military Occupational Crosswalk serves to compare the qualification specifics of military occupations with the initial requirements for DOS licensure in related professions, as well as to identify any potential gaps in training, experience, or education. The fiscal year 2024-25 budget request for \$500,000 under the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, the State Board of Medicine, the State Board of Osteopathic Medicine, and the State Board of Podiatry appropriations will allow the Department to acquire a hosted solution for a dynamic and informative portal website.

Safeguarding Consumer Safety - Professional Conduct Investigators Complement Increase

The number of assigned cases at the Department's Bureau of Enforcement and Investigations (BEI) has increased drastically over the last few fiscal year. Since 2019, the number of cases has increased by 68% resulting in significant increases in each investigator's caseload--from an average of 19 cases per month to 32 cases per month. Investigators are overburdened and, therefore, increasingly difficult to retain—investigator turnover has increased from 9% in FY2018-19 to 42% in FY2021-22 and 40% in FY2022-23. The understaffing and overworking impacts BEI's ability to serve and safeguard the citizens of the commonwealth as well as those who visit commonwealth licensed professionals or businesses regulated by the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs' (BPOA) licensing boards and commissions. The requested increase in complement will reduce caseload, mitigate employee fatigue, and make it easier to retain qualified and trained investigators. Fulfilling this request will expand the investigator ranks and give them the resources they need to protect the public and enforce the commonwealth's professional standards. The FY2024-25 provides funding for three (3) additional Professional Conduct Investigator positions for six (6) months within the Bureau Enforcement and Investigations.

The services provided under State Board of Medicine, State Board of Osteopathic Medicine, and the State Board of Podiatry appropriations are also encompassed within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs' appropriation narrative.

Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations

Program Narrative

This appropriation funds the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations for both profit and nonprofit organizations through a restricted revenue account. Its main objective is to provide the best possible means of protecting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Commonwealth against fraud, misrepresentation, and/or other misconduct by requiring the registration of all businesses or individuals doing business in the Commonwealth. A secondary function is the filing of secured transactions under the provisions of the Uniform Commercial Code. Legislative Citations: The Associations Code - 15 P.S. Section 101 et seq.; Article 9 of the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) - 13 Pa.C.S. Section 91401 et seq.; Names - 54 Pa.C.S. Chapters 1, 3, 11, 13 & 15.

As of June 30, 2023, there are 3 million companies authorized to do business in Pennsylvania. There were 16,051 accepted Charitable Organizations, 1,176 Institutions of Purely Public Charities, 93 Professional Solicitors and 377 fundraising counsels registered with the Bureau of Charitable Organizations. In FY 2022-2023 the bureau processed over 233,721 corporate filings and 166,324 UCC filings.

The primary goal of the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations is to make the registration process as efficient as possible, to enhance public access in order to promote a more favorable business climate within the Commonwealth, to promote transparency and disclosure by charities, to educate consumers and to pursue aggressively fraudulent solicitation activities.

Act 198 of 1980 established a restricted account with funding levels to be executively authorized by the Governor to fund the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations.

Act 55 of 1997 increased the number of charities required to register with the Department of State and established a system of mandatory arbitration to resolve complaints of unfair competition filed by small businesses against charities.

PA Business Filing System Maintenance and Hosting

In October 2022, the PA Business Filing System created for the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations for the use of filing all corporate and uniform commercial code documents went live. Since the go-live deployment, there were various shortcomings with the system needing additional focus. After much discussion with the system vendor, Tecuity Inc., it was determined to be in the best interest of BCCO to increase the maintenance efforts to ensure the vendor is able to meet the demands of the bureau. Additionally further changes brought by legislative or regulatory updates will require changes to the existing IT system to ensure that processing times continue to stay at a minimum. The FY 2024-25 budget includes a request for an increase of \$250,000 to be readily available when unexpected changes demand immediate IT adjustments. This is an investment in preparedness, ensuring the bureau can react agilely without hindering operational efficiency. This strategic investment in flexibility will empower the bureau to navigate the constant flux of the business registry environment with confidence, ensuring the bureau's continued success.

Act 122 of 2022 Annual Filing Requirements

Act 122 of 2022 replaced Pennsylvania's decennial business filing requirement with an annual requirement, dramatically increasing businesses' filing and the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organization's (BCCO) processing needs. It is expected that there will be more than two (2) million business registrations processed every year; if an estimated 20% of filings come via paper submission, the bureau will need to manually process 520,000 filings per year, well above its current obligations.

Act 122 also imposed significant notification requirements. BCCO must send notices to registrants on nine (9) separate occasions each year, which goes well beyond the bureau's current activity. Without additional staff, an insurmountable and ever-increasing backlog in business registrations will occur, undoing the improvements the Administration has made in improving business processing times. Additional staff will allow leadership to manage the implementation and enforcement of Act 122, file documents timely, manage new lists correctly, mail notices timely and accurately, answer customer questions, and ensure that the Department continues to file all corporate and charitable documents within the expected timeframe.

An additional change that the bureau expects will be very impactful is the Corporate Transparency Act (CTA), which went into effect January 1, 2024. This federal legislation requires many companies in the United States to report information about their beneficial owners – the individuals who ultimately own or control the company – to the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), a bureau of the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Companies formed prior to the effective date have a year to comply with the new filing requirements; but any new companies must submit their beneficial ownership reports within 90 days of formation or registration to the Department. Eventually, the time frame for filing the ownership report will shrink to 30 days.

While the CTA is a federal requirement, it will significantly impact many of the more than 3 million companies registered to do business in the Commonwealth. The federal law is very complex. For example, there are 23 categories of business entities that are exempt from this new federal reporting requirement. The Bureau is currently receiving consumer inquiries about the new Beneficial Ownership Information (BOI) reporting requirement and anticipates that the number of such inquiries will continue to grow.

Exacerbating the increased demand for customer assistance is the fact that—as reported in industry media and as relayed by the Corporation Bureau Advisory Committee--many law offices in Pennsylvania are opting to not engage in the creation of BOI reports for businesses. Additionally, law firms are withdrawing from filing new business formations altogether on behalf of clients, so that the lawyer or paralegal is not considered to be a "company applicant" by FinCEN by signing the formation filing. Rather, we expect that law firms will instruct clients to sign and submit new business formations directly to BCCO. This unintended consequence of the CTA will result in many more BCCO customer service interactions with consumers who know little to nothing about company formation filing. For this reason, too, it is critical for the bureau to have additional customer service staff available to assist with the increased volume in customer demands. BCCO needs these positions to effectively build this team during the first year of implementation of Act 122 and to assist customers with the changes resulting from the Corporate Transparency Act.

STATEWIDE UNIFORM REGISTRY OF ELECTORS (SURE)

Program Narrative

Act 3 of 2002 requires the department to develop and maintain a Statewide Uniform Registry of Electors (SURE) - an integrated voter registration database containing all electors in the Commonwealth and further requires that all costs of operating this system must be borne by the Commonwealth. The Help America Vote Act (HAVA) of 2002 required the development of a centralized voter registration system to be implemented with various enhancements in January 2006. The SURE System has met both requirements and was implemented in all 67 counties. The ongoing support includes the system hosting costs, county hardware support, and help desk availability to support all county users as well as individual citizen system users.

Election Modernization

Modernization of the commonwealth's Statewide Uniform Registry of Electors (SURE) system to the new SUREVote platform is of the highest priority to DOS. However, after a thorough review of the current project, the Department determined that the existing vendor did not meet the contractual standards and expectations needed to build a best-in-class system for voters of Pennsylvania. On December 4, 2023, both Pennsylvania and the contracted vendor agreed to terminate their contract for convenience, and through this termination, the Department will receive a contract reimbursement totaling \$720,400. To ensure that modernization efforts continue, the Department is focusing on the needs of the current platform while working to release a new Request for Proposal in the spring of 2024 to restart statewide system replacement efforts. As part of this project, this appropriation continues to include funding for a new system to support all voter registration activities across the commonwealth. This includes development, software, maintenance, and hosting, as well as the addition of IT staff augmented contractors, election project managers, and consultants for the project.

Increase of Election Technical Staff Complement

As elections become increasingly technical, the Department needs to increase its complement to add data analysts to work on election administration activities. The Department must maintain a strong group of internal experts to assist counties, collect and analyze election-related data, and support developing responses to public inquiries. Hiring five (5) full-time election staff in the technical area of election security and technology to support the Bureau's efforts will invaluably aid the promotion of secure and fair elections. It will improve the Department's ability to oversee elections, to support the counties as they administer elections, and to problem solve and respond to unexpected challenges or issues.

VOTER REGISTRATION AND EDUCATION

Program Narrative

The funding received under the Voter Registration and Education appropriation is used toward all voter registration activities throughout the Commonwealth. Bureau staff interact with each of the counties' election offices, the general public, groups and organizations who are organizing voter drives, as well as coordinators in each state agency that are charged with providing voter registration opportunities to their clients in accordance with the National Voter Registration Act of 1993. The funding in this appropriation also provides for paper voter registration applications to be printed and provided as requested.

Printing and Shipping of Voter Registration Forms for Presidential Election

On September 7, 2022, the Governor signed Executive Order (EO) 2022-03 for the expansion of voter registration opportunities throughout Pennsylvania by increasing the number of state agencies designated as a Voter Registration Distribution Agency. Due to the increase in the demand of forms from various entities, in December 2022, the Department initiated a prospective project with the Department of General Services (DGS) Bureau of Supplies and Surplus Operations on an interagency partnership to assist with inventory and form shipment to customers. To date, 238,155 voter registration forms, 626 multilingual voter registration posters, and 4,974 "Pledge to Vote" cards have been sent to 114 individual entities. Under this new process, the electronic order is placed by the customer, the order is prepared and packaged within one (1) business day and shipped to the customer, normally arriving within 1-2 days at their mailing address, which has received extremely positive feedback. While utilizing this service, there is a financial cost to house the forms at the DGS warehouse. There is already a noticeable increase in the number of forms requested from various organizations and agencies resulting in the need for DOS to print additional items as well, however, the goal to raise awareness for all eligible Pennsylvania voters increases daily by making these items more easily accessible to our community partners which makes this an absolutely needed cost to carry item for DOS. The Department's 2024-25 budget includes additional funding to cover the anticipated increase in costs to print and ship forms prior to and during the period preceding the 2024 presidential general election cycle.

Eligible But Unregistered Voters (EBU) Mailer

As a part of the membership to the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) Inc., once every two (2) years, Pennsylvania is required to send voter registration information to individuals identified in the Eligible but Unregistered (EBU) Report. In the upcoming election cycle, information must be mailed to any individual that clearly meets Pennsylvania's voter eligibility requirements, as determine by law, by October 1, 2024, or 15 days before the 2024 voter registration deadline, whichever is earlier.

As part of the 2024 election year, to ensure that the Department remains in compliance with the requirements of ERIC membership, the Department is requesting an additional \$160,000 within its fiscal year 2024-25 budget to ensure there are sufficient funds to cover this mandate that stipulates notifying any eligible voter who clearly meets Pennsylvania's voter eligibility requirements at the time of mailing.

Educating Voters and Promoting Accurate and Updated Voter Rolls through Direct Outreach

Voting and list maintenance are daily parts of DOS life, but the average Pennsylvanian should have information readily available on when, how, and where to vote. It is more important than ever to make sure that the Department has the resources to disseminate accurate information and educate voters on how to register, how to vote, and how election administrators keep elections secure.

In previous election cycles, the Department's Ready to Vote program communicated and sent educational material that informed voters at various points in the election cycle about voting options, how to apply for and complete a mail-in ballot, in person voting options, instructions and deadlines, and assistance in locating voters' polling places. In addition, COPA provided voters an Election Day Hotline to assist with questions or issues on election day. Recently, the Department has used the National Change of Address (NCOA) data to directly reach out through use of a mailing with pre-paid postage return envelope, to voters who may have moved. This mailing is an attempt to encourage a moved voter to register in their new jurisdiction and to send confirmation to the Department that their old residence should be removed, so that their local election authority can plan for an election with the most accurate information possible.

Educating voters on voting rights and processes is one of the best ways the Department can ensure free, fair, and secure elections in the commonwealth. The Department relies on both state and federal funding sources to conduct voter outreach and ensure that varied election information is conveyed to all Pennsylvanians. Federal funding under the Help America Vote Act are anticipated to become depleted in the near future, and because of this, the Department is in critical need of state funds to make up this deficit. The Department's fiscal year 2024-25 budget request includes sufficient funding to cover any anticipated needs to ensure adequate outreach for all Pennsylvanians.

The narrative under General Government Operations Elections and Commissions also encompasses this appropriation.

Program Narrative

This fund was established in 1980 to reimburse aggrieved persons any amounts unpaid from final judgments against any person licensed by the Real Estate Commission. Revenue is derived from additional fees paid by licensees, with interest on investments being retained by the fund. If the balance of the fund goes below \$300,000, it is the responsibility of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs to assess current licensees an additional fee, up to \$10, to restore the account to \$500,000.

Payouts from this fund are court ordered and payment is due within 30 days of being presented to the Department of State. Annually, the Department of State requests spending authority in the amount of \$150,000 to make payment on said judgments.

County Voting Apparatus Fund

The County Voting Apparatus Fund was established in accordance with Act 77 of 2019 to account for the deposit of proceeds for the county voting machine bonds. The legislation authorizes the Pennsylvania Economic Development Financing Authority (PEDFA) to issue bonds on behalf of the Department of State for up to \$90,000,000 to provide funding for counties to replace voting systems. Debt service payments would be subject to annual appropriations by the General Assembly. While county applications for grant funds have expired, eligible reimbursement payments of up to 60 percent of the costs incurred in securing voting systems will continue be made to counties throughout the grant award period.
